I welcome the opportunity to add my voice, in approval of your forthcoming book, to those of the considerable musber of peace workers who believe with you that a federal union of the mations along lines similar to those of the American Federation, the Canadian, Australian, Swiss and other federations, is the minimum amount of world organization that is strong whough to achieve permanent peace. I theroughly agree with you that the League of Nations, as it is at present organized, contains prociecly the same weaknesses which rendered our American Articles of Confederation a weak and ineffective bond of peace and union, and thus led to the discussion and the adoption of our present federal constitution, which with one exception has maintained peace among our large number of states for over a century and a half.

The record of the League's ineffective efforts in South America and the Far East to control the member states and to maintain world peace indicates a similar need to reconsider the form of the League's organisation, and to develop its legislative assembly, its Courts and its executive Council into the three vital organs of a world federation with adequate powers in the limited field of international relations to lay down international law, to interpret it, and to enforce it.

As you are probably aware, I have been working towards this end since the opening of the World War in 1914. Before the close of the war I had published a pamphlet on the need of a world government organized on federal lines. After the close of the war and the establishment of the League on Nations I made a careful analysis of its organs and powers in my work, THE ROAD TO WORLD PRACE, in which I strongly urged the League's development into an organic federation by the four following steps: The addition to the Assembly of a second chamber whose numbers are apportioned according to population; the adoption of majority rule instead of the rule of unanimity; the gradual transfer of the armament of the member states to the control of the federation; and the grant of compulsory jurisdiction to the World Court, its decisions to be enforced by the power of the federation.

I also agree with your view that the powers of the world federation should be exercised directly upon individual citizens and not upon states as political bodies. In a later work, THE UNITED STATES OF THE WORLD, I have compared in detail the method of operation of the American constitutional powers with the method of operation of the League's functions, showing that the American method makes for peace, while the League method, applied to powerful states, would lead to war. In fact, the application of force to an organized state is about the best possible definition of war.

Your legal conception of a dual citizenship, a national and a world citizenship, also meets with my hearty approval, and I hope that the publication in book form of your essays in World Unity will exercise a powerful influence in leading advanced political thought to the acceptance of a federation of nations as the only adequate solution of the problem of world peace.

THE JETISH STUDENTIN MEDICINE

That there has been a steady increase in the number of Jewish students in medicine is apparent. Numerous complaints have been registered as to the difficulty the Jewish student has in entering a medical college. Medical schools far away from the large centers of Jewish population have indicated the extraordinary number of Jewish applications. American medical students have applied for admission in European schools in numbers so large as to evoke inquiries from abroad. The vident Nazi program and its repercussions everywhere, including our own country, sug est to thoughtful Jews the advisability of securing facts on the basis of which an intelligent approach to the problem can be made.

The Jewish aspect of the matter is but a part of the larger problem of too many doctors. (American Medical Association Bulletin, Feb. 1934; W. L. Bierring: Social Dangers, etc.). But the increasing number of Jewish youth seeking entrance into an already overcrowled field not only aggravates the general difficulty but creates a problem for the Jewish people as well as for the Jewish medical student.

Investigation revealed that three excellent previous studies have been made by Dr. Harold Rypins, Dr. A. J. Rongy, and Dr. Max Danzis.

Dr. Rypins' study of some years ago, was confined for the most part to Jewish medical students in New Y rk City. Dr. Rongy's study (1930) was based on a questionnire circulated among fifty chapters of a large medical fraternity. Dr. Danzis' (1934) was based on a survey of approved medical schools. The three men unite in declaring that while there is limitation of Jewish enrollment there is no anti-Semitism involved in the admission of Jewish students to medical schools. Their estimates of the number of Jewish medical students range from 17 to 20 percent.

The figures here submitted confirm in general their findings. This study indicates the numerical and percentage annual increase for a ten year period, 1924 to 1933, in the number of Jewish doctors graduated. It offers, perhaps, a first approach to a study of the problem of interneships.

A questionnaire was sent to the deans of sixty-five active medical colleges.

57 responses were received.

34 contained definite data for the ten year period.

10 included figures given by Deans as approximately accurate.

The others were from two year schools or so indefinite as not to warrant use.

As the total number of doctors graduated in 1933 was 4895, the figures may be taken as a fairly definite picture of the situation: that in the ten year period, the percentage of Jewish doctors graduated has nearly doubled.

on the other hand, it would be extremely unwise to discuss the problem on the ARCHIVES percentage basis. Jews as and such are not entitled any more than any other group to a greater or less percentage of doctors. To say, for instance, that the Jewish population in such an area is fifteen percent, therefore they are entitled to fifteen percent of doctors, is a dangerous business. Carry this idea to its logical conclusion and you would limit the number of Jewish doctors in the country to 3-1%. And if Jewish doctors, why not Jewish lawyers, or merchants, or bankers, or economists? The only justification for discussing percentages at all is because we Jews ourselves desire to try to solve the problem before a rising resentment shall take it out of our hands.

No matter how much sympathy Jews have for the Jewish student, we have to envisage the facts of the situation as they press upon the medical schools. We understand their desire to distribute as widely as possible among all racial and religious and cultural groups the privilege of practicing medicine. We sympathize with it. We must try to make them understand the reasons why so many Jewish youth desire to enter medicine or other professions. Dr. Rongy stated them clearly. I agree with him.

- 1. The Jewish intellectual tradition
- 2. The pride of the Jewish parent that his child go higher

3. The difficulty young Jows meet in getting employment because they are Jews.

For Jews the problem is a practical one. Itinvolves the future of a large group of our young people in their relation to the nation as a whole, and the effect of so great a number from one group not only going into the same profession, but settling down in the great centers where keen competition does not make for high ethical standards.

In this connection the number of Jews knocking at the doors of medical schools who are doomed to disappointment is startling. I went through the last published lists of the Scholastic Aptitude Tests (Dec. 1933) and, allowing for errors in names, I found 3097 Jews out of 9676 (32%). Dr. Pepper, Dean of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, also took the trouble to go through the fists. He wrote me: "Iestimate that one half these names are those of Jews and so we believe that one-half of the applicants today for admission are Jews." He further writes: "In 1932 there were 12,280 applicants for admission into the medical schools of the country." If his calculation is right, that means about 6,000 Christians and 6,000 Jews sought entrance. On the basis of the number taken in, that means that nearly 5,000 Jews are refused annually. Personally, I believe Dean Pepper's figures rather high. The correct number is somewhere between his 50% and my 32%. But even if approximately 4,000 Jews apply each year, the number who will not in the nature of things matriculate is so large as to demand, in my judgment, that the Jewish youth of the country be acquainted with the situation and discouraged from pursuing medicine in such large numbers of purely practical grounds.

This conclusion is strangthened by a study of the interne situation. A letter was sent to one thousand Class A hospitals of one hundred beds and over, asking the

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number of internes appointed annually since 1924 and the number of Jews and Christians.

Of the replies received, 421 yielded factual information.

There are 29 Jewish hospitals in the United States of a hunred beds or over.

These replies were segregated in order to find out how many interneships are available annually in Jewish hospitals and how they are filled.

The total number of physicians graduated last year (1933) was 4895. If 20% were Jews, and our study would indicate the number to be between 19 and 20 percent, we find that 979 Jews became doctors last year. Whereas there are only 482 interneships available in Jewish hospitals, of which last year 389 were Jews. 590 Jewish doctors, therefore, were placed in Christian, private and public institutions or were not placed at all. A number of letters indicate that there are many Jewish men who cannot be placed at all. Many hospitals superintendents comment on the large number of applications from Jewish doctors. Of course, one graduate may apply for interneship in fifteen or twenty hospitals, but the facts remain that in a considerable number of cases it is impossible for the Jewish graduate to secure an internesh p.

Despite this, it is obvious that the number of Jewish internes absorbed in other hospitals is large. But there is a limit to the Jewish absorptive capacity of non-Jewish and general institutions. The facts in the interne situation strengthen the conclusion reached in our survey of the graduates, that steps should be taken to discourage Jewish youth, for their own sakes, from entering the medical field.

In conclusion may I suggest for your consideration a number of practical steps which might be helpful? What we need is a program of education that will bring these facts to the attention of Jewish youths and their parents. I suggest:

- 1. That outstanding Jewish physicians in every community be given a statement of the facts and that they be requested, wherever possible, to use their influence to divert the attention of our youth from medicine unless they are truly inspired and capable.
- 2. That the rabbis should be similarly informed, requesting cooperation in their synagogue bulletins and from their pulpits.
- 3. That a series of popular articles, carefully prepared, be printed in the Jewish press.

4. That other contacts be made among Jews and Christians designed to open up other fields of activity for Jewish youths so that a sounder economic balance may be given to Jewish life in America.

In making these suggestions, I would have you consider at the same time the element of possible danger involved. The problem is now dormant. Publicity might shove it into the open and medical colleges throughout the country may be tempted to yield to a pressure, which though now working silently may become organized and vocal.
