In reply to your letter of the 29th ult.,

I wish to say that as far as the Chicago Jewish community is concerned, quantity is not always quality, and what may surprise an outsider is quite simple to one who lives in its midst. Second, the few people, in this case the Rabbis, who are interested in my work helped me in the publication of the two preceding volumes as can be seen in the prefaces. I hate to approach them again.

In regards to the sum required for the publication of the volume, I may say that, while it will cost approximately \$2500, I do not expect to raise that sum, and certainly do not expect you or any one else to whom I addressed my letters to raise it, or even a considerable part





Dear Rabbi Harris:

I have to hand a copy of an address delivered last November at The Temple and titled "THE TOWNSEND PLAN AND SOCIAL SECURITY".

Officially, I do not wish to commit myself regarding the Townsend plan. Personally, I will say that I enjoy the sentiments carried against that plan, inasmuch as today there is not one man in Congress today who will vote for the plan--in fact, Dr. Townsend himself has given up the idea!

However, this is not the purpose of this communication at this time. I would like to call your attention to a statement contained on Page 4 of the address as, quote:

"If a State has an old age pension which gives the pensioner \$30 a month, the Federal Government will add to this amount \$15 a month so that the man or woman will receive \$45. If the State pays a smaller pension, the Government's share will be one-half of the amount paid by the State.

"Inasmuch as the average pension in States which already have pension laws amounts to less than \$20 a month, this Social Securities Act immediately raises the benefit for every person at least 50%, raising it to \$30."

The statements, as above, is entirely incorrect. Inasmuch as the S_0 cial Security Act provides 50% of the pension in the case where a state already has a mandatory old age pension law.

It will interest you to know that the Old Age Pension clause of the Social Security Act does not effect, directly or indirectly, the applicant receiving a pension! The act provides that the Federal Government reimburse the State Government to the amount of 50% of the total pensions released

by the state government. In other words, if an applicant now receives \$30 a month pension, he receives the same amount under the Social Security Act. The only direct benefit is given to the State Government who will be helped by the Federal Government to the extent of 50% of its appropriations to the people.

Another example. The Boyd Appropriations Bill for Ohio asks the Ohio Government to allot the sum of \$18,000,000. to pay for Old Age Pensions in Ohio for the fiscal year of 1936. In this event, the Federal Government will contribute 50% or approximately \$9,000,000 of the \$18,000,000 in question.

For further proof of the veracity of the above statements, I refer you to Mr. M. L. Brown, Chief, (Pro Tem), Division of Aid for the Aged, Columbus, Ohio.

Do not remit by cash unless registered as this bureau cannot assume any responsibility for unregistered mail.

In order to expedite the issuance of the registration take the enclosed special application blanks together with your bill of sale, clerk's certificate or sworn statement of ownership to your local or nearest Deputy Registrar who will either complete the application for you or will check and verify the same for correctness and completeness. The Deputy Registrar will stamp your bill of sale, clerk's certificate or sworn statement of ownership and will also stamp the application with a notation that the bill of sale has been inspected and stamped. This procedure eliminates the necessity of forwarding the bill of sale with the application to this bureau and applies in all cases except when the applicant is outside of the state at the time of application in which event the proper bill of sale, clerk's certificate or sworn statement of ownership must accompany the application and proper fee to this bureau. All three copies of the application must be forwarded to this bureau in the special return envelope enclosed. The owner as named in the bill of sale must personally sign the application before a Deputy Registrar, Notary Public or other person authorized by law to administer oaths.

This special number will not be issued if the car to be registered has not been legally and properly registered in 1936. If the car has not been properly registered go to your nearest Deputy Registrar and have corrections made before sending the application to this bureau. All applications for special numbers must be received in this bureau not later than March 1, 1937. Under no circumstances will a special number be held or reserved after that date. You are therefore urged to return the enclosed application at once.

The congregation is anxious to start our afresh. A strong man in that pulpit can become a great power in the Jewish community in Chicago which is, as you know, the second largest Jewish community in America. The Chicago rabbinate can well stand the addition of a strong man. If, however, you plan to devote much of your time to what you are doing now, I do not believe that you would be doing yourself and the congregation justice in accepting that post. As I see it, this congregation needs active and intensive cultivation and development. It probably needs a radical overhauling of its Sunday School. It has a large financial problem which can be solved provided the Rappi will work assiduously with his laymen in its solution. Decidedly, it is not a part time job. If you plan to remain in the ministry, then a change to Chicago would, I believe, be a great stimulation to you. If, however, you plan gradually to work your way into another field of endeavor, then I would not advise you to consider this proposition. With all good wishes to you and your dear ones, and hoping that Clem is now fully recovered, I remain As ever. AHS: BK

Dear Mr. Silver,

my friend Paul Hagen shortly returned from a trip to America and informed me of your kind interest in our work in aid of German refugees. As secretary of the above mentioned Committee and after a three years activity I may say to see the consequences of a barbarian system and I can only repeat my friend's request to kindly assist us in continuing our work.

From the beginning of our aiding work for the German refugees we try to find a constructive solution of the problem but there is a lot of difficulties as you perhaps know. In the meantime we have to care for the necessary funds for our proteges must have aminimum for living. During the last three years we have collected these funds in this country which is a poor one and peoples now are unable to assist us in future as they have their own difficulties in this critical time. Therefore we appeal to our American friends for aid.

As a consequence of the Anti-Jewish laws in Germany a large number of refugees come to us and many of them are absolutely without funds - their relatives in Germany cannot transfer any money in many cases or the refugees have lost their job at home already a long time before and savings are gone. We need \$8. monthly for each refugee and our funds now are absolutely unsufficient for the number of refugees who have nothing than our assistance in this time.

Therefore I ask you to kindly go into the matter and to see how to help us to maintain our humanitary work.
