

The United Aged Home MOSHAV SEKENIM, Jerusalem

is the largest Charitable Institution in the Holy Land, and has been established to care for old men and women in reduced circumstances, who are unable to care for themselves.

These old people find in the Home a comfortable shelter of spacious accommodation, fresh air, good beds and clean linen. They receive careful attention wholesome

food and kind care, and are able to spend their declining days in studying the Law and praying for the welfare and well-being of their benefactors.

With the help of the Almighty and due to the zealous and unfailing support of generous co-religionists, the institution has developed from a kitchen and food-distributing centre into its persent important position as a large and congenial Home for hundreds of aged people, a credit and honour to the Holy City and an eloquent testimony to Jewish charity.

The Institution, the largest of its kind in Palestine, consists at persent of a number of large new buildings some distance from the City Walls. Situated on a tract of land some 40.000 square yards in area, surrounded by a beautiful fruit and flower-garden, the enlarged Home contains 200 airy and commodious bedrooms, a vast dininghall and a library of most valuable works.

There are four large synagogues or study and prayer, a bath with a mikvah, two hospitals for the sick and ailing, and a pharmacy.

The inmates of the Home, dwelling within its amenable shelter, now number 300 old men and women.

As the date for the national convention of the Zionist Organization of America approaches, there is increasing interest in the question of the choice of a new president to succeed Morris Rothenberg who last year announced that he would not be a candidate to succeed himself. Excitement is particularly tense as to whether the new president will be "one of the old crowd," or whether fresh blood and spirit will assume control.

Many who have been close to Zionist administrations for the past dozen years feel that now is the opportunity to clean house and to return to Zionist leadership men of intellect, ideals and statesmanship. One of the outstanding men in the country whose name is constantly being mentioned as a leading contender for the position of Zionist head is Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland. There is no doubt that Rabbi Silver possesses the ability and the understanding as well as the necessary idealism, a quality which has long been lacking, to administer this office well. He comes uncontaminated with political intrigues. In his own city he withdrew from the regular district and was named leader of a group of fine people who as the Cleveland Zionist Society have been champions of a new deal for the Z. O. A. It is possible that Rabbi Silver may be the man for whom Zionism has been waiting.

My dear Mr. Fein: Please pardon the long delay in acknowledging your kind letter and your statement "Jewish Youth Should Table Zionism". I read both with great interest. A fundamental error in your thinking is that you assume that interest in Zionism and interest in helping American youth to solve its economic problems are mutually exclusive. This, of course, is not the case. The true Cionist is also a Loyal citizen and wherever he lives he endeavors to devote himself to all movements which will make for the greater economic security and well being of the country in which he lives. Many leading Zionists are outstanding champions of social justice in this country and in other lands. It is not a case of "either-or". Both are important. Zionism does not contemplate the transplanting of the sixteen million Jews in the world to Palestine nor is it predicated upon the liquidation of Jewish life outside of Palestine. It aims to establish a strong and culturally creative homeland in Palestine. With all good wishes, I remain Very cordially yours. AHS: BK Enc.

While our present civilization is tottering to its self-destruction, we young people are being held in a confused state of mind by Zionist propaganda.

In my mid-western city the Young Jewish Clubs have been organized into a league which has an ample number of advisors and chaperons. From the very start, Zionism was made the principle topic expounded by well-meaning seers. With fervent passionate discourse, with statistical blueprints, with emotion-strained voices, these romanticists appealed to us. But even though this furore continued unabated over several years it has met with comparative slight response. Those employed are practically united in their resistence to leaving established roots and embarking for Palestine; even the unemployed are disinclined to start anew in strange surroundings. The only tangible result has been an outlet for wistful thinking.

We are realistically confronted with a most trying situation. The superannuated have trapped themselves in an economic maze which seemingly has no outlet; and now frantic for release the savage instincts are very perceptible under the worn veil of civilization. This man-made plague has, as ever before, been blamed on the Jews--a people who have even weathered the devastating results of programs. Now however, under the current duress, our weakened elders advise our flight to a mythical haven.

How Palestine can be pictured as the solution of the Jewish problem is beyond all logic when one takes into consideration the present background. England controls the country with an iron hand, and necessarily so. Angry Arabs resenting the intrusion of our race have flared up time and time again but mighty England has kept the fire to a smouldering degree. Should we Jews by some miracle obtain the complete independence of Palestine, then our immediate and persistent problem would arise with the Arabic peoples. So Zionism from a practical viewpoint cannot assure one of less hardships——but only increased aggravation.

With fascistic countries on the rampage for more and more territory, an independent Palestine, with a concentrated percentage of the Jewish race, would rather seem an ideal set-up for annihilation. Herr Hitler could easily concect some provocation on order of the "Reichstage Fire" and re-enact another invited slaughter. The previous one being the foolish unresistence on the Sabbath while Roman legions butchered at will. On that distant occasion fanatics prevailed and if the same practice is followed again, then only those RAME wise, calm Jews--scattered by geographical classification but firmly united by spirtual bonds--would survive to see a better world.

Meanwhile our Jewish Youth, rent with conflicting emotions, has been dissipating its energies by internal bischering. Pertinent problems have been ignored. The wide-spread pressure of these problems are being met daily in contacts with frustrated unemployed, many of whom never had an opportunity since leaving school; with the acquaintance of those climbing up the ladder via CCC; with the struggles of those trying to keep a family group intact; with those remaining engaged for years and years and years. All this we know, too well, but mired down in irrevelant Zionism nothing is being accomplished to ameliorate these acute conditions.

Not once have I heard an advisor suggest affiliation with other youth groups toward mutual economic advancement nor have our periodicals tried to cope with the immediate problems of youth. Instead we are all advised to remain aloof and aesthetically dreaming while the progressive AYC many movement, with limited support, is chiefly responsible for the Benson-Amlie Youth Bill, now pending in Congress.

This bill provides permanent vocational training and employment on public works under a decent wage scale for those 16 to 25 years of age, and also to subsidize students; these projects being in no way connected with military or private enterprise. The bill, IF ENACTED, would provide all young people with an opportunity for social usefulness and moral strengthening.

Until the AYC acted, youthful idealists were ignored while those more equipped to combat a relentless world have secured, or are on the way to securing, necessary assistance. This leads us to point an accusing finger at our advisors who seemed greatly concerned over personal interests but refrained from employing their mature guidance on behalf of bewildered youth. So under the circumstances it may be necessary to formulate our own policies.

The American Youth Congress is composed of the YMCA, TWCA, National Students Federation, American Students Union, and the National Council of Methodist Youth. As you see, organized Jewish Youth has been conspicuously absent in a movement of undisputable merit. Only by eliminating untimely discussion, and putting our shoulders to the wheel, can we avail ourselves of the opportunity to help our fellows in a true democratic manner.

I felt terribly bad that I did not get a chance to say goodbye to you and Mrs. Silver and the boys. After all, that was more important than the races. I did not even see you get away and the first thing I knew when I asked for you I was told you had gone. Nevertheless, I sincerely hope that you and your family will have a very pleasant and healthful summer and will return in the fall in fine spirits and good health. The picnic was a huge success. Out of the 20,000 tickets which I ordered and sold 19,300 were cashed in through the various concessions. That in itself tells the story of the fine time our children had. There was an exceptionally large crewd in the evening and many of our board and outstanding members were present. The Alumni dance at the Log Cabin was not a success. It seems that people would much prefer dancing on the main floor where they have plenty of room than being confined to the Log Cabin. I think for next year we should think up some other stunt. It seemed a shame to put money in an orchastra with very few people taking advantage of it. Regarding my vacation, I have not as yet made up my mind where and when to go. I am fully cognizant of the fact that I need one. I feel it, but I am quite uncertain as to what I plan to do. A great deal depends on Miss Salberg. She is coming back July 1st and if her eye is in such condition that she can do close work, I shall feel more inclined to consider a vacation, if not, I would not want to force her to do anything that would not be right, and go away and worry about conditions at the office. I shall arrange June the 30th

somehow to get away for a short time anyway.

I have been successful in the last few weeks in getting a few new members and I have others lined up who have promised to join in the fall. I look forward to quite an influx of new members before the Holy Days.

The summer choir has been engaged. We have a quartette and from what Mr. Willard tells me they are very good. Our Friday evening services, by the way, have been very well attended. have also arranged for Mr. Kraft to play at the branch services for the high Holy Days, and he and I are now lining up the members of the choir for those services. We had two auditions for baritone. At the first, we had six men and at that time the committee decided to hear three of the six again. We had them here late yesterday afternoon and they sang with the entire choir to determine how their voicec would blend with the other singers. We have not as yet made a definite decision. The committee felt that we ought to wait and perhaps hear a few more voices. We are making contacts now through various other channels to see if there are available some additional baritones. If not, we will have to make choice from one of the three we heard. It is not an easy matter to get baritones in Cleveland. There is no doubt that we are spoiled after having a man like Dixon. It will be very difficult to satisfy us now but, nevertheless, we shall do the best we can, I assure you.

We have not yet called a meeting of the finance committee regarding the question of dues. I was most anxious to get the choir matter off my hands before going into this other matter. I might also mention at this time that I have signed up the other members of the choir for the coming season.

My collections this month have been very good. We went considerably ahead of June, 1935. I hope it keeps up. You can easily understand how good the collections were that even I feel satisfied, which is something. The boys are busily engaged in cleaning

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the school building and while we have considerable work ahead of us I have so planned it that I hope to be all set and ready to go when the season opens.

I received a letter this morning from your brother, Maxwell, in which he made inquiry as to your address. He stated that he had not heard from you and was quite anxious to contact with you before you went to Palestine. I told him the address we had available and if you will please cable him or write him your permanent address when you have decided he will be most happy.

I do not know of any more news at this time so will close with kindest regards from Mrs. Levy, myself and everybody at the office to all of you. I will write to you from time to time keeping you informed as to all the doings.
