Your father in-law, Mr. Horkheimer, was particularly gracious and helpful. My dear Rabbi Silver,

France.

Your letter reached me this afternon, and need I tell you how delighted I was to hear from you? Your kind words: "Of course I stand ready to help you", warmed my hearth and brought me more encouragement in my present predicament than anything else could do. Never during our long and friendly aquaintance did I believe that a time may arise when I will to appeal to you for any material assistance. But when forced by circumstances it certainly gives the greatest satisfaction to learn, that the great Rabbi Silver, whom I have been adoring for years, is also a friend "in need."

Since I wrote you my first letter I thought that it will not be neccessary for me to establish my contiplated periodical. Several friends of the Rockers intervened in this affair with the desire to bring about an understanding between Henry Rocker and myself. Among those friends of his were also Rabbi Armand Cohen and David Walpaw. But after a few days they gave up and told me frankly that their efforts were unsuccessful. Rocker, as usually, threw the whole responsibility upon his brother-in-law and flatly refused to consider my demand for a weekly salary of meager forty dollars.

I know that I don't have to tell you how poorly such a small salary would be for the work and other efforts that I do for the Jewish World. However, as it is, I would have to get along until some better times will come from somewhere... But these people **state** stubburnly refuse to submit to my demands. Why? Becouse there is something more behind their stubburnnes. It is the influence of my zionist and other "friends" who desire to get rid of me and drive me out of Cleveland. Believe me that I do not exaggerate becouse I know what is being carried on "behind the scenes."

The Jewish World is still a business which

brings in around sixty thausend dollars yearly unsolicited and inspite of bad management. The Rocker family still draws over two hundred dollars every week. Noone could tell me that this paper cannot pay its editor forty dollars per week. It could if the publishers would, firstly understand what's all about, that is, if they would know that a daily preser paper cannot always rely on the scissors... Secondly, if there would not be "politics" behind it.

Unfortunately the situation is such that even the Rockers themselves believe that I achieved a too high standing in the community. Henry Rocker talked it in to himself that he can do without an actual editor and get all the so-called honors that go with the title himself... It is now more obvious to me than ever before that he wants to get me out of the city.

But I have no other city where to go to. I lived in Cleveland well over twelve years. This is my home. Here I have some enemies but also thausends of friends. I gave the Jewish community of this city the best years of my life. I have served the community faithfully, not for business, not for politics, not for huge personal profits, becouse I never made a half-way decent living. This is the only place where I could stay, and where I must stay after all these years. It would be easy for some of my enemies and my employers to see me go, but I am sorry that I cannot fulfil their wishes simply becouse I have no place where to go to...

Whatelse could I under these conditions do than to establish a well and lively edited weekly in both laguages, English and Yiddish? I know that I will have to struggle for my and the papers existence. I am well aware of the hard and responsible work that is ahead of me. But I also know that you will be happy to learn that the Jewish masses of our city are almost solidly behind me and stand ready to lend me every assistance, moral and financial, that I might need. I feel sure that within the first six months my many friends will help me to achieve a resonable circulation for my paper. I am also sure that they will help me secure every possible advertisement. Thanks God that I do not stand alone. The Jewish masses of this city are appreciative of all that I have accomplished and will not let me go down ...

As to the Jewish World I sincerely believe

that my paper will not be a competition at all. I have no desire nor the least intention to compete with the Rockers, or to induldge in any controversy with them. I will simply look out for my own interests and put in every effort to make a living. But you don't know the Rockers and you don't know how far they will go to ruin anybody whom they consider their competitor. Knowing them as well as I do I certainly must be prepared for everything. That I am, since I cannot permit people whom I gave twelve years of honest, devoted service, though I have been always underpaid, to ruin me now, when I am somuch older and phisically ill.

The Rockers themselves forced me into the publishing business, and if they will have to suffer financially as a result of that they will have to blame but themselves.

As far as you are concerned I need not tell you what your good name has always meant to me. You may rest assured that you will not be put in any unfriendly relations with the Rockers, if this will only depend on me. They may surmise that you will come to my help. They will however never find out if this really so or not. They may speculate if they wish but they will never know the facts. The honor of Rabbi Silver has always been dear to me and will always remain dear.

Now as to your question what help you could extend me, I wish to state the following:

When establishing my weekly I am well aware of the fact that the first year will be the hardest. This is due to the fact that the National advertisements are not placed in papers during the first year of their existence. I intend to begin sometimes in September and will, therefore, be forced to get along somehow until January, 1938, when the national advertisements will keging begin to flow in. During these almost fourteen months I will have to rely on paid circulation and keet local advertisements only.

In order to pull trough I must have at least five thasend dollars. That is two thausend to begin with and the other three thausend as a reserve fund, if it should be neccessary to cover any losses during the first fourteen months. I am investing one thausend dollars and my friends among the plain people will raise in the form of stock buying two thausend and five hundred dollars.

Bear Rabbi Silver,

I must report that the old shul is in tip top condition. She has had her face lifted, washed and scrubbed behind the ears, painted and primped until she has begun to look quite pert and saucy. People are still getting married, and there have been quite a number of funerals—average age of the deceased about 80. The dead lie buried without murmur or complaint. And the newlyweds are presumably too blissfully happy to be anything but dead to the world. It is only the living who are dissatisfied.

Rabbi Harris came in today, and I am planning to leave for Boston tomorrow night. He tells me that some 75 applicants have converged on Hollywood, but that no one with less than seven years experience will be considered—again that mystic number 7. How wonderful is this blessed word experience. It gives an aura of sanctity to the open conspiracy of the aged and incompetent against youth. You remember what Morris R.Cohen said about the importance of experience.—The more experienced the lamb the more sheepish he becomes.

With Binstock in Chicago, New Orleans is to my knowledge still open. Lack of experience of course makes it unthinkable for me to aspire so high. Julius Mark is spoken of as the probable successor. He is the fellow who gets The Temple Bulletin and preaches on your sermon topics one month after... He has experience.

There is an opening however at Temple Beth-El in Jersey City. Maurice Thorner is the rabbi; but being well advanced in years the congregation wants an associate who will presumably succeed to the pulpit in a few years. Dr. Morgenstern has recommended me there, and I have been asked to preach a try-out sermon August 28th. This, I have been informed, is the only available date--which seems to indicate that there is an oratorical contest in process. Perhaps you can help me there. Surely you must have some connections either in Jersey city proper or at least in New York who could be of assistance to me. The president of the congregation is Dr.B.S. Pollak, and the secretary, Mr. Philip S.Birnbaum. Another of the chief machers is Dr. Julius Heilbrunn. Irving Liebow seems to think that h is father might be able to help me, and has written him in my behalf. I am very eager to land that job and will certainly appreciate anything you can do to assist me.

The Zionist situation appears to be even more muddied than before the Providence Covention. There is a definite feeling that had you beeen at the convention Rothenberg would have been elected -- and what is more he could have been elected anyway if he had had the guts to make a fight for it. Instead he permitted himself to be maneuvered into a peace compromise which has turned out to be a double cross- with the Lipsky gang ensconsed in power under the shadow of Wise.

I trust you have had a pleasant trip thus far and willhave an enjoyable visit in Palestine, Gad and the Arabs willing.

Some of my fondest recollections of my first years in Cleveland are bound up with your dear father and mother, both of whom now have gone to their eternal rest.

Dear Mr. Seltzer: Complying with your request, I am herewith outlining briefly my political activities as a member of the Ohio Senate for ten years. You will please excuse the continued use of the personal "I" throughout this letter, since I know of no other way of placing my record before you. Twenty-five years ago I started in politics as a follower of Theodore Roosevelt and became active in the Progressive Party. In and out of office during these years I have always fought the "invisible government". Whenever necessary I fought the party organization in the Senate which at times was bent on protecting privilege, and with all the emphasis of which I was capable I protested against those in political life who were interested in legialation for special privilege and the venal politicians whose main efforts were directed to kill legislation which was in the interest of the toiler and the wage earner. I fought the schemes and activities of these defenders of privilege during five sessions of the Senate and as long as I live. in or out of office, I promise to continue to do so. For illustration, permit me to note the attempt to enact the Gifford Bill which would have stripped our judiciary of its nonpartisan character and force it back into the control of partisan politics, and the enactment of the Liggett Bill which would have denied the right of the people to nominate candidates by petition, if it had finally become a law. I led the fight on both measures and succeeded in killing them. I tried to uncover graft and grafters in road contracts. Whenever the defenders of privilege attempted to protect the public utilities of the state by price increases, taking money directly from the pockets of the consumer, even before these increased prices had been sanctioned by the Public Utilities Commission, I led the fight against them. I was a leader in the fight for the Minimum Wage Bill for Women, the Teachers Tenure Bill, and the Anti-Fireworks measure.

I fought the commercial lobbyists who had infested the legislative halls. We enforced the registration of these lobbyists and curbed their activities.

I led the fight on fee-splitting of inferior courts in Ohio and was largely instrumental in putting the Anti-Saloon League out of business in this state.

Over a period of years I fought the crooked justice shops and mayor's courts and finally succeeded in putting an end to raiding homes as well as commercial law enforcement in connection with these courts.

I was the organizer and leader of the fight against the Marshall Bill which would have restored them to these practices.

I fought to win jobless men a square deal by attacking crooked employment agencies and introducing measures for their regulation.

I was the author of the bill to lower the tax on insurance premiums as well as a measure for the removal of officials guilty of misconduct in public office. This bill was passed and a number of public officials guilty of misfeasance, malfeasance and nonfeasance were removed under the law.

I fought and succeeded in protecting the "Library Fund" from being used by other political units.

After eight years of hard work I succeeded in having a measure passed providing for the feeding of prisoners at cost by the sheriffs of Ohio.

I was the author of the bill providing for speedy election returns and made the fight for voting machines.

Senator Burke and I led the fight for the retention of the Primary election law in Ohio, and when petitions were filed by Harry Davis to do away with the primary law we led the successful campaign against this proposal.

I was the author of the Police and Firemen's Pension Bill.

When Harry L. Davis proposed his reorganization bill Senator Burke and I fought this measure and succeeded in amending it, so that the Davis gang did not succeed in putting over a number of vicious provisions.

I fought for the repeal of the Pence Law, but I opposed the setting up of a professional collector by Governor Cooper to that repealer. The bill would have empowered a Superintendent of Investigation which would have further corrupted law enforcement in this state.

I fought the establishment of the state constabulary, so that this branch of government might be used in industrial disputes.

I consistently fought the spoils system and opposed narrow partisanship.

I fought for adequate old age pensions in Ohio as well as the child labor amendment. Led the fight for its ratification.

Fought for the strengthening of the Blue Sky Laws.

Was one of the leaders in the fight against deadly pollusion of Ohio streams and lakes.

During most of the time that I was a member of the Senate we had a governor of the opposite political party from my own. I took the same attitude toward him as I would have had he been a member of my own party. The right things he favored, I favored. Those things that I believed to be wrong I opposed. Senator Donahey, I am sure, will be glad to testify that this was his experience with me.

I opposed the Sunday Dance Bill as well as the Bible Bill wherever introduced, and openly fought the Klu-Klux-Klan on the floor of the Legislature.

At the time of the appointment of a Manager for the City of Cleveland, I was responsible for the selection of Daniel E. Morgan as its Manager, when the controlling forces of the Republican Party were interested in the appointment of a lesser individual.

I have skimmed over the record briefly and hurriedly because in a long period of political life many things could be added which would only add to the bulk and not to the substance of the letter.

Sincerely Hrnny Lutash Notes on a discussion held at the Oakwood Country Club, Wednesday evening, August 26th, 1936, where the following persons met at the instance of Mr. Philmore J. Haber:

Mr. Haber opened the discussion by explaining that he was interested in finding out what, if anything, the B'nai B'rith could do to stimulate Adult Jewish Education in this community.

He said that the B'nai B'rith was keenly interested in lending its support to a program strong enough to attract the Jews of every community, and designed to lead to a better understanding between Jew and Jew and Jew and non-Jew.

He stressed further that the Binai Birith was seeking no laurels or credit for itself, but was willing to cooperate with existing organizations towards this common goal.

Mention was made by several persons that this might be a propitious time for a co-ordinated program, since at least two of the temples, Rabbi Brickmer's and Rabbi Silver's, were considering discontinuing their lecture courses.

Mr. Harry Wolpaw pointed out that a single series of popular lectures might be arranged in co-operation with all the temples, while Rabbi Cohen pointed out that these pupular lectures might be followed by small discussion groups or seminars, arranged in conjunction with these lectures.

Rabbi Harris suggested that the present Institute of Jewish Studies might be brought into use in connection with such a program.

Milton Grossman expressed the belief that a purely religious and scholastic approach would be doomed to failure, and that papular subjects should be chosen for any course selected.

Mr. Eugene Wolf emphasized the fact that a program of this kind must deal with vital Jewish problems, and that if it did deal with vital questions it would undoubtedly receive the community support.

Leo Weidenthal suggested that a program sponsered by the leading temples under the name of the Cleveland Jewish Community Forum, is another approach to this situation which might be considered.

The consensus of opinion in response to Mr. Haber's question was that a better organized program in Adult Jewish Education was possible in this community; that the support of the B'nai B'rith would be welcomed; that the persons present were willing to co-operate in such an endeavor, but that nothing further be done or no definite action taken until other Rabbis and lay leaders had been consulted.

The discussion closed with a hope of meeting after labor day, during which time some of those present said they would sound out other persons in the community about this matter.
