TO THE PREFERRED STOCKHOLDERS OF PALACE BUILDING COMPANY:

Palace Building Company, herein referred to as "Company", was organized and incorporated under and pursuant to the laws of the State of Indiana in the year 1924.

Pursuant to its articles of incorporation it acquired the real estate in the city of Gary, upon which it erected the Palace Theatre Building which it equipped and furnished.

The authorized capital stock of the Company consists of 4000 shares of preferred stock of the par value of \$100.00 each, with an aggregate par value of \$400,000.00 all of which is outstanding, and 20,000 shares of common stock each without nominal or par value, all of which is fully paid, non-assessable and outstanding.

Pursuant to due authorization your Company in 1925 executed a first mortgage on its property to secure a loan of \$300,000.00 evidenced by 19 notes dated June 3, 1925 due serially in varying amounts commencing June 3, 1926 and ending June 3, 1935, the last note being for \$165,000.00; notes numbered 1 to 3 both inclusive, bear interest from June 3, 1925 to their respective maturities at 6% per annum, notes numbered 4 to 19 both inclusive, bear interest at the rate of 6% per annum from June 3, 1925 to June 3, 1927 and from then to their respective maturities at the rate of 5½ per annum. Pursuant to due authorization your Company in 1926 borrowed an additional \$75,000.00 secured by the same first mortgage evidenced by 17 notes dated April 12, 1926, due serially in varying amounts commencing June 3, 1927 and ending June 3, 1935, the last note being for \$47,500.00; all of said notes bear interest at the rate of 6% per annum.

Through October 1935, your Company redeemed notes executed on the 3rd day of June, 1925 in the principal amount of \$47,500.00 leaving a balance due thereon of \$252,500.00 and redeemed notes executed April 12, 1926, in the principal sum of \$19,500.00 leaving a balance due thereon of \$55,500.00. After extended negotiations the officers of the Company were successful in procuring an extension of first mortgage and of the principal of the notes executed June 3, 1925 for a period of ten years and an extension of the notes executed April 12, 1926 for a period of five years.

Since October 1935 an additional reduction has been made in the principal amount of the note so extended and secured by said first mortgage and today the amount remaining unpaid is approximately \$300,000.00.

Your Company's sole source of income is derived from the rental it receives from the theatre, store room and office space and apartments located in its theatre building. In 1930 your Company's income had been seriously affected by the continued business depression and did not earn, in that year, funds sufficient to pay dividends on its preferred stock although as a result of prudent management in prior years it was able to and did pay dividends on its preferred stock through October 1931. Through the years 1932 to 1936 your Company did not earn funds sufficient to pay its fixed obligations and it was in default upon the notes secured by its first mortgage. In 1935 your officers were successful in bringing about the extension of its mortgage and the notes secured thereby as hereinbefore stated.

As a result of several conferences a plan of adjustment has been worked out which your officers believe to be feasible and to the hest interest of your Company and yourself. The mere change of capital structure from preferred stock to debentures will save your Company federal taxes under the present Revenue Act.

The preferred stock was sold along with two shares of common stock for the sum of \$100.00 of which \$90.00 was paid on account of each share of preferred stock and \$5.00 was paid on account of each share of common stock. The Revenue Act of 1936 makes it inadvisable to continue a capital structure which contemplates an outstanding issue of preferred stock and a substantial saving can be made by issuing debentures in exchange therefor, all upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

### PLAN OF ADJUSTMENT

The Company proposes that it will issue and deliver to you as registered holders thereof its Fifteen Year Four Per Cent (4%) and Surplus Income Debenture on the basis of a principal amount of \$95.00 solely in exchange for each share of its preferred stock surrendered to the Company. It is considered by the board of directors, as recorded in the minute book, that these debentures will have a fair market value of \$90.00 at the time of such exchange and the records of the Company will show that the debentures will be issued to you in exchange for each share of the preferred stock at \$90.00 which is the price that you paid therefor. This means that you will have no profit or loss for income tax purposes on account of exchange.

The Company definitely oblightesitself to pay interest at the rate of 4% per annum and permits you to share in the surplus income (as defined in the debenture, copy of which is hereinafter set out) not in excess of an additional 2%. This arrangement has been decided upon only after a most careful consideration of the earning ability of your Company. It would be idle to issue debentures requiring the Company to pay interest at the rate of 6% per annum for the Company would at once be in default as it is not earning an amount sufficient to pay interest at that rate. It is however, now earning an amount sufficient, after deducting operating and non-operating expenses, including all taxes, to pay interest on the debentures at the rate of 4% per annum.

In the event the Company earns more in any one year than is necessary for the foregoing purposes, you will share therein up to but not in excess of 2% per annum on the principal amount of your debenture.

The debenture to be issued and exchanged on the basis hereinbefore provided is substantially in the following form:

## FIFTEEN YEAR TOUR PER CENT (44) AND SURPLUS INCOME DEBENTURE DUE DECEMBER 31, 1951.

Palace Building Company, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Indiana hereinafter called "Company", which term shall include its successor, for value received hereby promises to pay of the Company, City of Gary, State of Indiana, on the 31st day of December, in then lawful money of the United 1951, the principal sum of \$ States of America and to pay to the registered holder hereof at said office interest at the rate of 4% per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of July and January of each year, commencing on the 1st day of July, 1937, and in addition thereto from surplus income as hereinafter defined, additional interest at a rate not exceeding 2% per annum of said principal to the extent that such additional interest can be paid out of the surplus income of the Company; all interest shall be cumulative and be paid in the then lawful current money of the United States of America to the registered holder hereof by check mailed to the last address of such holder as shown on the books of the Company for the registration and transfer of debentures.

Surplus income means the surplus income of the Company remaining after deducting (on an accrual basis) from the gross income of the Company from all sources for each calendar year, an amount sufficient to pay all corporate operating and non-operating expenses, including all taxes.

The amount, if any, of surplus income applicable to the payment of additional interest on all debentures outstanding as of the 31st day of December shall be accrued as of that date, and the Company shall pay on the 1st day of April next, such additional interest at a rate not exceeding 2% per annum, as the surplus income shall suffice to pay.

This debenture is one of an authorized issue of registered debentures of the Company known as its Fifteen Year Four Per Cent (4%) and Surplus Income Debenture Due December 31, 1951 limited in aggregate principal amount to \$380,000.00 at any one time outstanding.

The obligation of your Company for the principal of and interest due on all of the debentures of this issue is on a rank equal to and on a parity with its obligations to its general creditors.

This debenture at the election of the Company is subject to redemption on any interest payment date at the principal amount hereof and the unpaid cumulative interest due thereon, upon thirty days prior written notice mailed by the Company to the registered holders hereof as hereinbefore provided. In case the Company shall elect to redeem less than all of the outstanding debentures it shall draw by lot in any manner deemed by its Board of Directors to be proper from the numbers of the debentures outstanding, the debentures or portions thereof to be redeemed. If this debenture is called for redemption and funds therefore have been duly set aside by the Company on or before said redemption date, then interest shall cease to accrue hereon from and after said date fixed for redemption.

This debenture is transferable by the registered holder hereof, in person or by attorney duly authorized in writing at the office of the Company, in the city of Gary, State of Indiana, upon surrender and cancellation of this debenture, and upon such transfer a new registered debenture or debentures of the same aggregate principal amount will be issued to the transferee in exchange therefor, upon payment of all stamp, transfer and documentary taxes required by law and a charge of Twenty-five cents  $(25\phi)$  to cover the expense of the Company incident to said transfer; provided, however, in the event additional debentures are to be issued there shall be an additional charge of Twenty Five  $(.25\phi)$  for each additional debenture. The Company may deal with and treat the person in whose name this debenture is registered as the absolute owner hereof for all purposes.

No suit or action may be commenced on account of default, if any, in any of the provisions of this debenture on account of the failure to pay interest when and as due hereon except and unless the Company is in default for two successive calendar years on interest payments and then only in the event that at least three registered holders owning debentures of an aggregate principal amount of \$25,000.00 or more shall have first made written demand upon the Company at its office that said interest be paid and the Company after the expiration of thirty days therefrom shall have failed to pay such interest, or make suitable provision therefor.

No recourse shall be had for the payment of the principal of or interest on this debenture or for any claim based hereon or otherwise in respect hereof against any incorporator, stockholder, director or officer, past, present or future, of the Company or of any successor corporation by virtue of any constitution, statute or rule of law, either directly or through the Company or any such successor corporation, or by the enforcement of any assessment, penalty or otherwise, all such liability, whether at law, in equity, by constitution, statute or otherwise, all incorporators, stockholders, directors and officers being released by the owner or registered holder hereof by the acceptance of this debenture.

Between the date hereof and December 27, 1936, the officers of the Company will endeavor to procure the deposit of all of its preferred stock. Under the plan hereinbefore outlined upon the deposit of preferred stock your Company will issue a certificate of deposit evidencing the fact that you have deposited your preferred stock. When all such shares of preferred stock have been deposited the plan shall be effective provided, however, the Company may declare the foregoing plan effective if at any time prior to December 27, 1936, the holders of 75% or more in par amount of the preferred stock of the Company then outstanding have deposited their stock. This Plan of Adjustment and the debendures to be issued may be modified if in the opinion of the officers of the Company the modification does not materially and adversely affect your rights.

No preferred stock may be withdrawn after the Planof Adjustment has been declared effective. If the Plan of Adjustment is not declared effective on or before December 27, 1936, all deposited preferred stock shall be released by the Company to the depositors thereof or their assignees without any expense to them, provided, however, the period of deposit may be extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by the Company, in which event no preferred stock may be withdrawn prior to such extension.

The reason for placing the date at December 27, 1936, is due to the fact that in order for your Company to save on income tax as hereinbefore suggested it is necessary, under the Revenue Act of 1936, that the plan be consummated prior to December 31, 1936. Therefore, we urge you to give this matter your early and earnest consideration and sincerely recommend that you accept the Plan of Adjustment and deposit your stock.

Your Company is making every effort to hold down the costs of the adjustment of its capital structure and for that reason has not employed a reorganization manager. The Company is undertaking to carry out this adjustment through its officers and there is no charge or other remuneration paid or given directly or indirectly for soliciting the exchange on the terms hereinbefore set forth. As a result your Company is not only saved the fee of a reorganization manager but the necessity and expense of registering the issue under the Federal Securities Act of 1933 as amended since the proposed issue is within the classification of exempted securities.

There is enclosed herewith an Instrument of Consent, Deposit and Proxy which you are respectfully requested to execute and forward immediately together with your preferred stock endorsed in blank, with signatures witnessed, to the Company at its office at 18 North Eighth Avenue, Gary, Indiana.

All legal details in connection with the Plan of Adjustment and matters incident thereto are subject to the approval of Messrs. Goodrich and Emison, Attorneys, Indianapolis, Indiana.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

By way of introduction, the writer is secretary of the Jewish Recreation Council, whose purpose is to encourage Jewish physical activities, and instead of asking our mutual good friend Joe Selzman to act as my intermediary in arranging an appointment with you, I am writing you directso that you may in a brief pause during your valuable time refer to the message which I am trying to convey to you.

We, as a race, are known for our cultural and business development; we have outstanding Jewish scholars and recognized business leaders.

We are, alas, woefully negligent in the development of our physical assets due to our neglecting our physical education.

I have an unusual request to ask of you, which, while it may be along different lines, is, I feel, just as important in its relationship to Jewish life.

The Jewish Recreation Council is pioneering to interest our own people along physical activities. While other cities have institutions to encourage such developments, under the name of Y.M.H.A., Cleveland, altho a large City, has not provided for its Jewish youth.

Our Jewish young men are enrolled in the Y.M.C.A.
Our welcome there is questionable, for the writer has personal
knowledge of instances when applications for memberships have
been rejected when the applicant has mentioned they were Jews.
Where, then, can we affiliate to develop our embrio Jewish athletes?
The answer is a Y.M.H.A.

It would be folly to make demands for such an institution in these uncertain times. While our Jewish brethren are suffering persecution and need help to survive, our Jewish people must send financial help to them.

We are therefore organizing an unselfish, legitimate organization, operating on a modest scale, backing ourselves, and struggling, as all pioneers must, for recognition.

In an effort to interest the Jewish Youth League, we have already informed Mr. Max Fine, its president, who is recommending to the Executive Board the addition of an athletic program to its cultural activities.

With that brief introduction, we proceed with our purpose in this letter.

On November 28th, we are inaugurating our Fourth Basket-ball Season. We hope that this will be our banner year.

It is our fervent hope that we can enlist your interest in our endeavor to start the new season with a pretentious program.

We feel it would lend prestige to our cause to have you start our new season with a Godsend, and have you sound the whistle opening the start of the season.

Six organizations, with a total membership of over 400, are represented by six teams; due to lack of facilities, four other organizations were denied membership.

All games are played weekly at the Jewish Center, and are played on Saturday nights, with an expected attendance of more than 300 fans, the total seating capacity of the gymnasium.

Our players consist of high school and college "stars" who play a clean, fast and entertaining brand of basketball. It is commendable that they play for the sport, without any hope of compensation, and in the spirit of our aims.

The weekly admission fee is nominal and is enough to cover our actual expenses.

Motion pictures will be taken of the opening ceremonies and as much of the game as may be practical.

Sould you accept, Rabbi, there will be assisting you the following:

Mr. Samuel Levine and Mr. Emanuel Berlatsky, who are affiliated with the Council Educational Alliance; Mr. I. S. Rose, and if available, Mr. Max Rosenblum, neither of whom needs any intriduction to the sporting world; and last, but not least, Mr. Max Fein, president of the Jewish Youth League.

We are enclosing a few of the notices which the newspapers have very generously published in their columns, and trust that we may have you with us on this occasion to inspire our followers in the goal we have set for ourselves.

Ctherwise Such a personal circular. Mr. T. is convinced will recive attention, as the usual bookseller's circular will not. At the bottom of the said circular letter, will be mentioned that orders for the book may be forwarded to M. Tausner, Hebrew Bookseller, 200 East Broadway, New York. We are to finance the printing and mailing of the circular letter, and Mr. T. will take care of the printing and the mailing of the same to about a thousand names on his mailing list. The price of the book may be listed as \$2.00.Mr. T. believes. and he is to receive the usual 33 1/3% commission.

Mr. T. volunteered to hand a copy of the book this week to the reviewer of The Day and to ask the latter to write a review of it as soon as possible.

Thanks for your kind letter of Nov. 9th.

In connection with the same, I again visited Mr. Tausner, who finally consented to draw up himself a circular to his trade, mentioning incidentally Father's relationship to us. He will peruse parts of the book before so doing, and will then write up the circular in Hebrew and submit it to me for rendering it into English. We might have the circular in both languages - one side Hebrew and one side English.

Mr. Tausner does not care to have shipped to him at present more than 300 copies - 250 linnen cover (for which he will set the price of \$2.00) and 50 copies de luxe (@ \$2.50.) This, I believe, is a practical suggestion. If and when there will be a demand for more copies, we can then request Father to send them on. Incidentally, this smaller number will mean a smaller cash outlay for you.

Mr. Tausner will print 4000 instead of 1000 circulars, and will turn part of them over to other booksellers. to whom he will consign quantities of the book. The latter will in turn put their imprint on the same before they will forward them to their trade.

Mr. Tausner's commission on the same will be 40%. He figures that the additional 7% or so, will be his profit for placing a number of the copies with other booksellers, whom he has to allow 33 1/3% off on the list price. Mr. Tausner will mail the circulars at his expense. I will pay for the cost

of printing same.

I believe that Mr. Tausner will do a conscientious and honest job in the matter.

It will help if you will drop him a line telling him of your confidence that he will do this job not merely as a matter of business but also as a special courtesy to yourself, which you will be pleased to reciprocate along the lines of ordering from his firm Hebrew books when ever you have the occasion.

I believe that the proper thing to do now is for you to write to Father in this matter and ask him to forward at once 300 copies of his book (250 and 50, as above) to Mr. Tausner.



Cleveland, Ohio.

My dear Abba,

I must ask of you a very delicate and personal service, one of a strictly confidential character of course, and one which is of great importance. You may be sure that if it were not of importance I would not trouble you with it. Even as it is I am reluctant to bother you; and were it not that I feel that I can rely upon your cooperation in this matter you may be sure that I would not approach you with it.

I hope earnestly too that you will take my word for it that the matter is one of unusual importance, and that the information which I ask will be of very great service, that you will have confidence in this statement of mine and for the present at least ask me for no particulars, but merely get for me the information I need.

I want to know what is the reputation in the community of two physicians and one lawyer. The two physicians are Dr. S. B. Abrams, 105 St. and Carnegie Ave. and a Dr. Mitchell, whose first name is unknown to me, who is located at Euclid Ave. and either 101st or 102d Street. I want to know with regard to them particularly whether they are gynecologists, and especially whether they are regarded by physicians in general as men who operate in accordance with the highest legal and ethical standards; whether they are regarded as first-rate or second-rate or third-rate men in their fields; and especially whether Dr. Mitchell is of a type who would perform an illegal operation upon a woman if called upon to do so. The attorney in question is Mr. Jonas Abrams, a brother of the physician cited above of the same name. Mr. Jonas Abrams' office is in the Fidelity Building. I would like to know whether he is regarded as a lawyer of high standing and of sound ethical standards and motives, or whether he is of the more unscrupulous and shyster type.

I am certain that if you yourself know nothing of these individuals you will, with your usual fine judgment and tact, know how to secure this information in a quiet way, without attracting attention or arousing any suspicions or undue reactions. Please accept my assurance that this is a matter of great importance and that your cooperation will mean a great deal to me.
