Dear Rabbi Silver:

There is an editorial, as well as several other items on the General Motors strike in the February 1st issue of the United States News, that I thought you might be interested in reading. If you do not have this issue, I will be very glad to send you the one I have. To my way of thinking the editorial in particular, is very fair and logical, although it clashes with your view-point as expressed in the informal discussion the other night.

I am quite sure that a good many of the Temple Men club members that were present the other night, as well as myself, harbor the hopes that you will alter your view-point on this question, as well as on the closed shop. To my way of thinking, the closed shop is very incompatible with the sense of justice as I believe you regard it. Of course, being an employer, you might expect this attitude on my part. Just the same, there was a time when I regarded the closed shop as very wholesome, but only until I learned more of it's practical execution. Then it dawned on me that like prohibition, it brought along more evils than it was supposed to eradicate. It is no longer a question of whether the closed shop, or open shop is right or wrong - but which of the two is the lesser evil.

At any rate, I certainly would like to have the opportunity of discussing this topic with you, in rather an informal manner. I don't know whether what I might have to say would influence you to change your mind - - still I won't mind trying.

Dear Dr. Silver;

As you probably know, I am now settled and well adjusted herein Sedalia. The three times I have preached, have had almost capacity crowds; i.e. one and a half persons for each of my forty odd families, or rather members, for several members have no families. I seem to have made a hit with local community, Jews and non-Jews, have been elected to the Ministerial Alliance, otherwise consisting of Protestant clergymen, and the Kiwanis Club, joined the local I.O.B.B., and have been asked to help organize the local Council of Churches and to speak at several special functions,

As to that letter they sent me before making their final decision. It seems that after they received my wire relating to my prefering Sachar's offer to Sedalia, the pres, phoned Dr, Morgenstern for other possibilities and incidentally asked about me, M, said he could not recommend me, would not say why, but said he would write at length, He wrote, still gave no reasons, recommended that the local congregation write to Rabbis Sherman and Gotthelf to see if either would be interested. In the event that neither would be, M, suggested that Sedalia wait until the present class of four graduated in May and then possibly one would go to Sedalia. The local board, really in need of a rabbi, were dissatisfied with M,'s lengthy but evasive letter, sensed personal prejudice, wrote to Rabbi Mayerberg who suggested I be given a chance although he does not know me, and then wired me to come, The officers seem satisfied that for minor and unwarranted matters I was not recommended, and have, I believe, forgotten the matter. When I first spoke to the pred., he recommended that for my sake, and so that the cong. will not be in bad with the college for not taking M's advice, that I get this misunderstanding straightened out, I hope you have succeeded in doing so last Tuesday when you were in Cincinnati. I should like, but I do not need his help, to get along. If he would only desist in his policy of blackballing me every time my name is mentioned to him, I should be satisfied. Does he not feel that he has already done me sufficient harm, more than to compensate for anything I may have done to irritate him or anyone else? Kindly let me know the outcome of your conference. Thanking you most kindly for your help and interest,



The celebrated poet, Yehoash, has spent the greatest part of his literary life and activity for one and only one purpose, to becueath to the Jewish nation a legacy--a treasure of inestimable value. This great poet and scholar has translated the book of all books, the Bible, in the Yiddish language.

Every penny from his meager earnings, every ounce of his strength, the best of his talent was invested in this stupendous and colossal task of translating the Bible from its original--concisely, literally, correctly but not surrendering any of its poetic beauty and beautiful phrase construction. Months had been spent by Yehoash in search of the true meaning of a phrase or a word, and its significance and purpose at the time it was uttered. He spent a long time in the Holy Land and adjoining countries to discover new truths about the Bible.

The translation, in the opinion of the best authorities and Bible critics, is a masterpiece in style, correctness and beauty. Yehoash died before he could see a complete printed edition of the Yiddish translation of the Bible. To perpetuate the name of this great poet and erect an ideal monument to his memory, a national committee was formed to publish a popular edition of the Bible in Yiddish and Hebrew, a copy of which should be within the reach of every Jewish family at a cost not to exceed the sum of two dollars and fifty cents.



My dear Rabbi Silver:

I wish to recall to you a conversation I had with you at your office some time in the middle of last October, about the Bank Hapoalim in Tel-Aviv. I then presented to you a plan for long term deposits in the Bank for the purpose of increasing the capital facilities of the Bank and in this way improve credit conditions of the various Histadruth cooperative undertakings.

I then left with you a pamphlet describing the plan and a certified statement of the financial status of the Bank. You told me at that time that the plan appealed to you and that you would, when an opportunity offers itself, cooperate in that work. Since the time I have seen you, we have carried on activities in a modest way in a number of communities with a fair measure of success. In order to further stimulate this work, the Bank Hapoalim has ent over to the United States one of the members of their Staff, a young man named Abraham Dickenstein who is rather capable and fully versed in the economic and financial conditions of Palestine. He possesses the knowledge of the English language in a measure sufficient to carry on conversation and even to address small gatherings. I found him to be a great help to the work.

Mr. Dickenstein is coming over to Cleveland either on the 28th of February or the 1st of March. I advised him to call on you when he gets to your city. I hope you will find it possible to cooperate with him in this work. He is in a position to give you any information you may desire, as to the various activities within the sphere of the Histadruth as well as all through the Yeshuv in Palestine.

MRS. COPLAND IN ADDRESS TAKES ISSUE WITH RABBIS

Mrs. A. Shirley Copland, wife of Judge David Copland of Cleveland, and president of B'nai B'rith Wo-men's District Grand Lodge No. 2. has just completed another tour of visitations to some of the auxiliary P'nai P'nith Lodges in her district B'nai B'rith Lodges in her district. While on this trip, she met with members of her executive committee to lay plans for the coming convention of the District Grand Lodge in Cleveland, to be held in conjunction with the Men's District Grand Lodge, at Hotel Statler on May 22 to 25 in-clusive. While in St. Louis, she was a guest speaker at a B'nai B'rith banquet held at The Coronada Hotel and attended by over 800 members of the order. On the following day, February 23, she was tendered a luncheon in her honor by the women's auxiliaries of that city and attended by over 700 members. Following that, she was the guest of honor at a luncheon tendered her by the combined auxiliaries of Chicago.

Mrs. Copland is a forceful speaker and was enthusiastically received in the various cities visited by her.

In the course of her address in St. Louis, she said "Lately, it seems to be quite fashionable for some rabbis to devote much time in their sermons to excoriating women for their failure to live up to the Jewish traditions of our ancestors and to observe the ritualistic rites in the home. With this view," she continued, "I take violent issue. Judaism has survived—and will survive — largely because of the Jewish consciousness of our women. The Jewish home of today is as much Jewish as it ever was, with perhaps less of the bombastic rituals of the past. On Friday nights and on holidays the spirt of Jewishness still pervades the Jewish home. She always has been and is, an inspiration to her men folks and she it is who always has exerted, and does exert today, a wholesome influence for Jewish consciousness in the hearts and plastic minds of our children. With the perplexing problems which confronts Jewry today, she realizes the need for unification of effort on the part of all Jews, and is the guiding spirit in seeing to it that communal organization work of the American Jewish community has become wider, more intelligently directed and more intense."

Guy Father Coughlin, Royal Oak, Mich. Dear Sir. I am going to ask your secretary who reads this first to make an exception and put this on your desk for your perusal, inasmuch as a man who feels free to criticize should be broad-minded enough to listen to the other fellow's voice also fair enough, isn't it?

> From the first sermon to the last I have given you a fair chance to expound your views to me, and my first impression is my last, namely:

That fellow, Coughlin, puts himself across to the masses primarily on the basis of oratorical accomplishments, which in and of itself, is no mean attainment because of its rarity, but this does not impress me one iota. I predicted when these orations started that in view of the fact that there was so little logic embodied in those oratorically emballished phrases the man would talk himself in and out of the good grace of the masses, even though most of them are not well posted in the many ramifications of this highly complex economic structure.

And sure enough - Father Coughlin - did talk himself in and out. They are not hanging on any more breathlessly to hear what Father Coughlin has to say why? Not because, the oratorical flashes are less bright and powerful - not at all - one is conscious of the fact that Coughlin is straining himself to the tmost to dramatize his worke - but the message itself has an empty ring - making a hollow mockery of the highly polished phrases, and today's sermon is no exception.

Let me make a suggestion - stop polishing up on your oratory - of that you have a superabundance and enter a course of several years of study of the social sciences, economics, the history of money and banking, commerce, corporate organization and management, concentrate on the highly complex problems involved in attaining an equitable distribution of wealth amoung 120 million people with a wide varation as to their individual talents. The universities are open. Also don't forget that you must after spending years of study on these subjects supplement your learning by actual experience. This will give you some idea of how ill equipped you are to speak to the multitudes who have already caught on to your drzmatized illogical sermons - however, ignorance is bliss - which explains 100% your self-assurance. Confession is good for the soul - Father
