

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



Dear Abba.

I was delighted to receive and read this day, editorial in The Cleveland News of April 5. 1937.

I beg to enclose copy of proposed circular. in Hebrew and Yiddish, which Mr. Tausner prepared in connection with father's book, and which he handed to me today. If the enclosed meets with your approval, I will translate it into English, and will turn it over to Mr. Tausner to have him print*about 1,000 copies which he will mail to the trade.

The said gentleman has thus far given me much aggravation due to his natural laziness and continual delay in getting things done in connection with father's book.

on March 18th

I received a cable/from father stating that he was informed by the Palestine Express Company that Mr. Tausner refuses to accept the books on account of the \$55.00 express charges which he was to pay for the same. Instead of 'phoning me on the matter at once, he just let the thing ride until I received the said cable. As soon as I received the latter. I forwarded to Mr. Tausner check for this amount, and he immediately had the books delivered to his store.

I also received a letter from father yesterday in regard to this matter, stating that he regretted not having taken care of express charges himself, believing that Mr. Tausner will be glad to pay for same himself, and deduct this amount from the income of the sales of the book!

The said Mr. Tausner further complained that he has no room in his store for all the books. I therefore told him to ship to my branch all but about 100 copies, and I will keep them here until he can use the balance.

My dear Dr. Silver:

I gratefully acknowledge your communication relative to Mr. Marvin Rozofsky who is desirous to become a supervisor of music during the playground season. I introduced him to our Recreation Commissioner, J. Moble Richards, and acquainted him with your recommendation which is of great value to us, I assure you.

Our City budget is wholly inadequate this year also.
We were unable - among many other things - to make an appropriation of \$3,000 for park music, for example. The appropriation made for the Division of Recreation is only \$43,000. It should be \$75,000 at least and perhaps \$100,000. We are leaning heavily on WPA and NYA for this very reason. Suffice it to say, that we simply must economize in every direction as a matter of necessity and not as a choice. The uncertainties of the relief situation make our problems even more difficult. Marvin may have to continue as a playground leader or playground director, because we may not have sufficient funds to employ a music supervisor nor other supervisors of special activities. We may have to borrow available talent from WPA and NYA to do this work and we probably will. We have to.

I am stating the existing condition with utmost candor. It is preferable to do this than to avoid it and make vague and uncertain statements. You will, I trust, agree with me. Please be assured, that we are desirous to give your recommendations full consideration. This Department has not been the recipient of any request or suggestion from you. For this very reason, we are desirous to consider your views in a most sympatheti; manner. - I have asked Mr. Rozofsky to keep in touch with me and/or Mr. Richards. No decision would be made before the end of May. Our playgrounds will again operate this year for a ten (10) week period only.

Under separate cover, I am mailing you two booklets which contain a rew of my talks, also an address given in German. You will honor me by glancing at them. I will value your "reaction" to some of our ideas and ideals therein stated.

Dear Rabbi :

In the spring of 1933 the Ohio Unemployment Commission issued a report recommending the enactment of unemployment insurance legislation.

This report was attacked by the Ohio Chamber of Commerce on the ground that three of the Commission's members - the late Dr. I.M.Rubinow, Professor William Leiserson and yourself - were born in Russia. This fact, the Chamber claimed, is clear evidence that unemployment insurance is subversive propaganda sponsored by foreign communists to undermine American tradition.

From the PREFACES

TO VOLUMES I and II

THE studies presented in this volume (Volume I) were determined by the manuscript material that formed their starting points. This material, culled from diverse sources scattered in several libraries, is but a kaleidoscopic reflex of Jewish life in the Middle Ages as it found expression chiefly in the countries under the sway of Islam. The nature and variety of the material precluded a unified presentation construed on the framework of a central theme. The studies with their accompanying texts are primarily designed as contributions to a more comprehensive and intimate understanding of Jewish affairs in the past in its various manifestations, institutions, and interests.

Apart from the political and economic conditions that were on the whole controlled by his Gentile masters, with now and then a high Jewish official, like Hisdai ibn Shaprut in Spain. protecting actively Jewish interests, the Jew lived his own communal life in devotion to his traditional ideals and practices. The focus of the internal Jewish life lay in the study and the cultivation of Judaism in its various aspects and disciplines. Hence the affairs of the seats of learning and of their representatives figure so much in the sources at our disposal. The Gaonates of Babylon, Palestine, Egypt and Syria are discussed through the letters of the presidents of the academies. The economic difficulties of the schools, the rivalry between the Geonim, the contacts with numerous communities of several countries, the inner organization of the Yeshibot, the conflict between the Gaonate and the Exilarchate in their final stages and other topics are passed under review in the course of the investigation of the new material.

Other data throw new light on events in the life of European Jewry, notably among them the diplomatic endeavors of Hisdai ibn Shaprut on behalf of Jewry in Christian Europe. Conditions in Palestine and in Egypt under Mohammedan rule are further illustrated by new material forming a supplement to what has been incorporated in my work on the Jews in Egypt and in Palestine under the Fatimid Caliphs and elsewhere. One section deals with the Jews in Mosul and in Kurdistan, a district hitherto very scantily represented in the annals of Jewish History. The purely literary side of the present volume is composed of fragments of Halakhic writings of the Gaonic period and also of Genizah booklists that testify to the Jewish cultural interests of the bygone ages.

The second volume of the present Texts and Studies is devoted to the affairs of the Karaites in the Near East, Turkey and the Crimea, and Lithuania and Poland. The considerable manuscript material incorporated in this book extends from the 9th to the 19th centuries. As in the first volume so the studies here were determined by the new material available to the writer, who is fully aware of the existence of still more material not accessible to him in spite of his sustained efforts.

Karaism had a leavening influence on the development of Judaism in the Middle Ages, especially in the countries of Islam. Karaism cannot forsooth be regarded as a really liberal movement because, owing to certain of its doctrinaire aspects, it had a tendency towards legalistic stringency. And yet, by its very nature as a rebellion against the established form of Rabbinism, it allowed a good deal of freedom of thought and investigation.

The Karaites were a minority within the Jewish people itself a minority in the countries of its dispersion. Their problems of adjustment to the general life of their environment and their relations with the Rabbinate majority are depicted in the material dealt with in this volume. The section, which describes their settlement in Jerusalem up to the First Crusade, reveals them as an aggressive element engaged in missionary propaganda for their doctrines. This was the time of Karaite ascendancy, when Karaism vigorously stood its ground as a leavening force in Judaism. Other sections show us Karaism in its period of decline when it was subject to the influence of Rabbinism.

Like its predecessor this volume furnishes us with a wealth of new data concerning personalities and actual conditions bearing on phases of our history hitherto only obscurely known. The veil is lifted from scenes which reveal distant vistas that should stimulate the desire for further exploration. As an aid to further research a Hebrew index and glossary as well as a general index covering both volumes have been supplied which, it is to be hoped, will facilitate the consultation of the present work.

Referring to the present applicants. A number of these men apparently have over a period of years been giving fairly substantial amounts and, no doubt, in accordance with their means. There are others who have not so qualified. To be specific:

\$275 (nothing for 1937) to the Community Fund, and owes \$175 on these subscriptions. To the Jewish Welfare Fund over the same period he subscribed \$135, of which \$56.25 is unpaid.

LOUIS BERGMAN: This man's gifts to the Community Fund have been small. To the Jewish Welfare Fund he gave nothing until 1935.

MORMAN E. HANDEL: He gave nothing to the Community Fund in 1936, and subscribed \$40 for 1937. To the Jewish Welfare Fund last year he gave \$5.

JOSEPH E. ADAMS: He gave \$7.50 to the Community Fund in 1936, and \$15 in 1937. To the Jewish Welfare Fund he gave \$10.

LESLIE GOOLFRIEND: For the last five years, according to available data, he has given \$1 each year to the Community Fund, and nothing to the Jewish Welfare Fund. Perhaps he is one of the Government's "dollar-a-year" men!

that applicants, having learned that they cannot be admitted unless they "come across" for charity, either begin to give or begin to pledge something more than their earlier inadequate gifts. To my way of thinking, this should not qualify them. They should be put through a course of training for a few years, during which period they should give adequate amounts to our organized charities. I mention this fact because many of the applicants, after becoming members, quickly recur to their old habits of insufficient giving.

I have heard it said that there is some objection to this sort of censorship on the ground that it makes a collection agency of the Club. I take issue with this statement, for I think in pursuing your present course you are doing only your manifest duty; something which you owe to yourselves and to the rest of our membership.

I thought of writing you here in reference to my proposed publishing of my book -

THE ETHICS OF JUDAISM from the Aspect of Duty.

last May, you suggested that I publish the same. I then hesitated, even as, I recall, I very much hesitated for a long time before publishing my "Justice and Judaise".

Since that time, I spent a good deal of my'leisure' hours in revising the work, adding new material from the medieval sources, abbreviating the book on the whole, and especially putting it into shape for a reader-public. It is now meady for publication.

I have also obtained from the Rioch Publishing Co. an estimate of the cost of publishing it, which is talk the neighbor-hood of \$800., and which cost I hope to be able to manage.

However, before finally making up my mind "to publish it - or not -I much desire to learn your own reactions on the manuscript, - in brief, nothing less than your candid opinion as to its worth-whileness for publication. Your hoped-for perusal of the same, you can make during several at-leistre sittings. No need of course to remind me that this field is not your specialty. I'm not interested in that phase of it, as this work is not primarily intended for the pundit, though I have tried to be 'scientific' and exact about my material. It aims for the general intelligent Jewish and non-Jewish public.

I do have a hunch that this work should prove a good follow-up on my first published literary venture. But I am only its author, with the natural prejudices in this connection. I therefore crave for another man's point of view on its merits for publication. You realize of course that the publication of this particular manuscript is no life-or-death matter to me. It's simply yes or no. If it's no - I'll just salt it away and forget about it - and perhaps try some other subject at a later opportune period.

Now, I know that you are a pretty busy fellow. But, then, unlike our Big Fellow in New York you read quite a few books during the year. One book, then, more or less, would that make such a great difference?

In brief, you will help me a great deal at this moment if you will advise me by return mail that you are satisfied to give the manuscript your leisure-perusal and advise me thereupon of your opinion as to its worth-whileness for publication. Dear Rabbi Silver:

For the past few years the Histadruth (dederation of Jewish Labor in Palestine) has planned to make the sea an important factor in the upbuilding of the country. By introducing Jewish workers in the Haifa port, by organizing a cooperative of the lighters in Haifa, by taking the initiative in the construction of the Tel Aviv port, by organizing a fisherman's co-operative -- a new branch of Jewish colonization has been launched.

The Histadruth is determined to develop maritime labor such as shipping, fishing and the training of Jewish workers for those tasks on a large scale. The Histadruth is anxious to help in the construction and development of the Tel Aviv port. It has therefore organized a new company, the NACH SHON LTD. The Histadruth has invested in this company the sum of 20,000 pounds of which 15,000 were immediately invested in the Tel Aviv port and the balance in initial activities connected with sea work.

In the name of the Histadruth, our well-known and esteemed co-worker, Mrs. Golde Myerson, has come to America to conduct the activities of selling additional 30,000 shares for NACH SHON so that our people may acquire the necessary means for their new enterprise in Palestine. The NACHSHON is also planning to buy ships so that some of the millions of pounds spent annually by Jews coming to Palestime overseas, and for export and import, may remain in the country. These ships will also serve as training schools for Jewish youth in every relation to transport and shipping.

We know that you will readily conceive the importance of this work. As we are now organizing a National Committee for aponsorship of this Eretz Israel sea enterprise, we are asking you kindly to serve on this Committee.

We anticipate with pleasure your immediate acceptance as aponsor, on the enclosed card.



Dear Rabbi Silver:

Undoubtedly you have heard of the Lomza Yeshiva in Poland as a great center of Jewish learning. The Lomza Yeshiva has been in existence for the last 54 years. It has produced great scholars whose fame and influence has been far and wide. Students from all over the world including the United States flock there to quench their thirst for higher Jewish learning. This sacred institution in ow facing the severest crisis in its history.

Unfortunately due to the distress of our Polish brethren, particulary in the section where the Yeshivah is located this institution has been unable to meet its obligations. creditors are now threatening to sell the buildings of the Yeshivah at auction. Only speedy help will save this institution. Need I tell you what a calamity this would mean to our people?

I assumed the chairmanship of an amergency Committee to obtain 350 contributors of \$100 each, for the sum of \$35000 is necessary to clear the Yeshivah from its debts. Our committee already succeeded in obtaining more than half of that quota. We must, however, obtain the sum necessary in order to secure the existence of the Yeshivah.

The renowned Rosh Yeshiva, Rabbi M. Gordon has been forced to come to this country for the purpose of saving the Yeshiva, is now visiting Cleveland. I, therefore, take this ocasion to ask you dear Rabbi, as an outstanding spiritual leader to extend your kind help to Rabbi Gordon in his sacred mission. Who like you can realize what a Yeshiva of such magnitude means to our people.

I trust that you will do everthing possible to help this great scholar and saint, and through him thehundred of students of the Lomza Yeshiva.



My dear Hillel:-

I have your letter of the 27th inst inviting Mrs. Rivitz and myself to sit at the head table at the Sholem Asch dinner on Sunday evening with the other officers of the campaign.

I am leaving for New York on the 29th to attend a very important conference over the weekend with our New York counsel, in preparation for a very important case which has been pending between our company and Tubize for two years. The case is on the active docket and will come up for trial on Monday or Tuesday, May 3rd or 4th, and I am expected to go on the stand as a witness. This means that I will be in New York not only this weekend but the fore part of next week as well; and I am scheduled to be in New York again on Friday, May 7th - so that if I am not through with the case I may have to remain in New York the balance of the week.

This is the way things have been going with me week-in and week-out. It is very difficult to explain to others why I do not show up at these meetings. I am out of town so much that when I get back I am swamped with an accumulation of correspondence, appointments, etc. and it takes me several days to clean them up - and by the time I finish I am again called out of town. I wish it were otherwise, but this has been my situation these past few years, and conditions are getting worse - not better.
