I. Maarsen, Chief Rabbi of The Hague, has thus far published at his own expense critical texts of Rashi's commentaries on the Minor Prophets, Isaiah, and the Psalms. His critical apparatus is very helpful and valuable.

First edition. The first book printed at Ortona in the Abruzzi and the first book of this press. This finely printed work, one of the best examples of Soncino's printing, is a defense of the Catholic religion against Judaism and at the same time defends Reuchlin against the attacks of his contemporaries. It is an important work in the "Battle of the Hebrew Books," in which Reuchlin played the chief part. Manzoni, Soncino's biographer and bibliographer, says: "We should pity this sincere Jew, who in order to live amidst intolerance was obliged to publish books which instead of humiliating him, rather cover those who ordered them with contempt." Only four books were printed by this press.

Dear Doctor Silver:

Although a stranger to you I write upon the suggestion of Doctor Joshua Bloch, of the New York Public Library, as well as Doctors Finkelstein and Ginzberg of the Jewish Seminary.

For several years I have engaged in a most painstaking research, based upon source documents, of the advent expectancy amongst Christian writers spanning the Christian era, beginning with the apostolic, and then the church fathers, running down through the medieval period and into the pre-reformation and reformation periods proper, and finally into the dawn of the 19th century. These materials have been gleaned from leading libraries in Europe and North America. On numerous occasions I have gotten invaluable materials through the New York Public Library, the Union Theological Seminary Library, and the Harvard Andover Library. We now have some 7 thousand source documents.

Occasionally I have thought of the desirability of at least a general grasp of contemporary Jewish writers in the field of the outline prophecies of Daniel 2 and 7, and the year-day principle as applied to the 1290 and 1335 and 2300-year periods, as well as the 70 weeks. Your book is indeed an invaluable contribution. I sought to get a copy from Macmillan, the publishers, but they are sold out. I shall pick up a second-hand copy when I can secure it.

I find, Doctor, that for the first four centuries there was a general agreement amongst leading Christian writers that the first four world powers of Daniel 2 and 7 were Babylon, Medo-Persia, Grecia and Rome; that Rome's break-up was perceived at the time of occurrence by a rather large group who recognized that the clay was being mingled with the iron; that the ten horns had appeared on the fourth beast. They, of course, connected this with certain parallel prophecies in the Apocalypse. The recognition of the antichrist was rather tardy. It was not until around 1000 A.D. that men began to speak and write definitely concerning this. This increased in pointedness and in general agreement as we come to pre-reformation and finally to reformation times.

I was most astonished to find in Abrabanel's "Wells of Salvation," his portrayal of the little horn as the papacy, and to find the illustrated commentary by Manasseh, with a sketch made by Rembrandt, naming on the picture, Babylon, Medo-Persia, Grecia, and the legs of iron

as Rome and Mohammedanism.

I have been particularly anxious to get as complete a list of these Jewish writers as is possible, and to find when the year-day principle began to be enunciated and applied to these periods in Daniel. I gather that nothing very definite is to be found prior to Saadia on this whole point, although of course on the four world powers, Josephus and then Rabbi Johanan, have left very clear records.

On a separate sheet I am tabulating the men that I have found to date, and ask, Doctor, if you would be good enough to check this through, and to make any suggestions that may occur to you.

I was deeply impressed with the fact that Aphraates, the Persian sage in the fourth century, with practically no influence from either Western or Eastern Christian writers, as your friend, Doctor Gavin, told me the other evening, presented virtually the same position as held by Eastern and Western Christian as well as Jewish writers in the early centuries.

Trusting, Doctor, that you will be kind enough to check this through, and give me a clue to any writers of importance that I have missed, and especially to indicate the earliest writers along these two special lines, I am

My dear Rabbi:

I have read with great interest excerpts from your speech delivered before the B'na B'rith convention in this city. I have long hoped that you or some other prominent speaker would discuss that subject expressing the thought that the question of anti-Semitism is being overemphasized and commercialized by a great many Jewish organizations. You, of course, expressed it admirably much better than any one that I know of could do.

During the recent B'na B'rith membership drive I was almost driven mad by the constant stream of hysterical, panicky letters, pamphlets and black-bordered telegrams. Instead of stimulating me to any activity in their benalf it disillusioned me, and I handed in my resignation. Most of my friends with whom I discussed this matter felt the same way. They, too, were of the opinion that we should all be alert and helpful towards our fellow Jews throughout the world but that the neurotic psycology employed by the membership campaign committee was most harmful as it aggravated the entire question and helped create the situation which we are so frantically hoping to avoid here. It tended to develop suspicion and a strained relationship between the average Jew and non-Jew with whom most of us had been on friendly terms.

I sincerely hope that you will continue in employing your talents and eloquence in this direction. There is much we can do in constructive work of good will and friendship instead of fomenting ill will and hatred through spreading such propoganda as described above.

With many thanks for the numerous enjoyable services which I have attended at your temple and for your efforts in every worthwhile movement in this community, I am
