

THE AMERICA I WANT

"Out of the longing of hearts and the prayers of souls, Out of the memory of ages and the hopes of the world, God fashioned a nation in love,
Blessed it with purpose sublime and called it--

Thus reads one description of the glorious tradition of our land.

Thus was the dream and goal of America. A land prevailing in peace and prosperity. This was the hope of the founding fathers, an America abounding in righteousness, brother-hood, justice and peace.

Through the centuries of civilization this goal has been our sincerest hope. Philosophers have developed this idealism, religions have grown by its appeal, but despite the ages of wisdom this earth has experienced, we are still far from our "Shangri-La"

Today's complex problems, brought on by a descripted and disheveled world, again remind us of our idealistic ambition. Hillions upon millions of Americans poor and unfortunate, the sweeping tide of war scares, the return of prejudices and descriminations, thousands caused by crime; these are but a few of the innumerable problems of society.

The solution to the above is imperative to the achievement of our goal. But not through this channel alone can our ideal be realized. Society's evils can be remedied only to give way to more. The basis of our troubled hand lies in the individuals who compose it. To accom-

plish the hope of our fore-fathers, to be lead down the paths of rightousness, brotherhood, justice, and peace might appear too fantastic,
but yet it is the great requisite for the America I want.

An analysis of the four characteristics of the desired individual in relation to his effect upon the achievement of our ideals will confirm the above assertion.

Righteousness is the quality of being free from sin and guilt, of acting in accordance with the dictates of morality. Biblical experts have quite agreed that righteousness is the foremost doctrine in the Holy Book. Never has there been such a universal and lysis of this principle as that presented by the prophets. As true at the fresent as the day when uttered are the words of Isaiah, "and all our righteousness are as a polluted garment." What is meant when it is stated that the individual or modern society is lacking in righteousness? The answer is simply this: with few, if any, exceptions man does that which satisfies his emotions whereas righteousness implies the practice of that which has the higher moral conception. If the universal ideal is for a perfect society, the definition of righteousness is quite enough to convince one of the necessity for its adoption.

Everyone of us directs all our moves to our own welfare, regardless of the people around us. Individual wealth, power, and recognition are the aims of each of us. We can blame a great many of the present grievances upon these characteristics that we humans have acquired.

Millions of people barely exist because of poverty while a few live in unlimited luxury. Are these examples of righteousness? No: This is its repugnant adversary. This is what Isaiah condemned 2500 years ago.

Translation from a copy

Letter of advice written by Mr. Joseph Rosengart to his brother-in-law Mr. Herman Cone on the occasion of the latter's departure for America from Germany in April, 1846.

Place your full trust and confidence in God who will send his angels to guard you. So, do not be discouraged, and do not be afraid of leaving or of the voyage, but consider your fate a good fortune, designed for you by GOD.

You may shed tears, because you are leaving your parents' house, your Father, Brothers and Sisters, relatives, friends and your native land, but dry your tears, because you may have the sweet hope of finding a second home abroad and a new country where you will not be deprived of all political and civil rights and where the Jew is not excluded from the society of all other man and subject to the severest restrictions, but you will find a real home land where you as a human being may claim all human rights and human dignity.

Be careful on your voyage and pay attention to your health as well as to your belongings. Avoid the company of all but respectable and educated people. Be modest and polite to everybody. Thus you may surely expect good treatment for yourself.

Every evening and every morning turn to GOD with sincere prayers: do not be afraid of anybody and do not let anybody disturb your devotions. Even if some people should make fun of you at first, they will understand later and show their respect.

I recommend to you the Faith of your fathers as the most sacred and the most noble. Try to follow all the Commandments most painstakingly and thereby attain actual happiness. Do not sacrifice your faith for worldly goods. They will disappear like dust and must be left behind in due time.

Remember particularly the Sabbath day, to keep it holy, for it is one of the most important pillars on which our Faith is established. Do not disregard this day and do not let gold or silver make you blind and do not let any business however tempting induce you to violate the Sabbath, but at least on this day think seriously about your existence and your work.

It is not man's destiny to accumulate worldly goods just to be wealthy, but to acquire them to be used as means for the attainment of eternal happiness. I am, therefore, giving you as a keepsake an excellent religious book for your instruction. Make it your sacred duty to read one chapter on each Sabbath and holy day with serious devotion and meditation. Do not lay it aside when you have read it through, but keep it and read it again from time to time.

You will thereby learn your religion thoroughly, act accordingly and thus be honored by GOD and men. It will be your counsel in good times and bad, and will preserve you from all evil.

Honor your Father and your Mother, that your days may be prolonged. Even in that distant country you can show your respect and love towards your Father by always remembering his good advice and by frequently writing him loving letters, thus

giving expression to your devotion to him and your Brothers and Sisters.

Although your sainted Mother is now in Heaven and although you never knew her, you can show her your greatest respect and love by following the Faith as she did. You will thus be able to know her and be with her in Heaven.

Your Sister and Brother-in-law in America will surely receive you in their home with loving care. Consider their home as your Father's house and be respectful and modest toward them, show them your filial devotion and be attached and faithful to them, as you have always been toward us. Follow their advice and their suggestions and, whatever you may undertake, first ask them for their counsel. They will always give you the best advice and you will derive benefit therefrom, I am sure.

If you should be lucky enough to become wealthy in that distant land, do not let it make you proud and overbearing. Do not think that your energy and knowledge accumulated that wealth, but that GOD gave it to you to use it for the best purpose and for charity. Do not forget that you are also under obligation to assist your relatives and to help them to get ahead.

However, if you should not become wealthy, be satisfied with what you do have and try to be as comfortable and happy as if you had the greatest treasures.

Follow the middle way between avarice and waste. Do not be stingy, but live according to your position and your finances and be particularly liberal toward the poor, and charitable to the needy. Be glad to help and give part of your bread and give assistance to the distressed.

Do not let anybody call you a miser, but be known as a philanthropist. On the other hand, do not be extravagant, or a spendthrift. Even if the necessity should occasionally arise to spend more than usual, never feel obliged to squander. It is of utmost importance that you keep account of your expenditures and live within your income.

I am closing with the quotation:

"Do right, trust in GOD, and fear no man!"

Red, Demy Busch There has recently come to the attention of RabbitGilver, Dean Emerson, Mr. Eugene E. Wolf and myself, the tragic case of Dr. Arthur Kraus, formerly a member of the Department of Philosophy of theCollege of the City of New York, and now in Cleveland for a few days.

Dr. Kraus was dismissed from his teaching position five years ago because he protested against, xxxxxxxxxxxx illiberal activities resulting in the death of two students in the Universities of Poland. He felt the matter keenly because he is of Polish birth and was educated in Polish universities. He has been unable to secure another position in the intervening y ars.

His funds are utterly exhausted and his health impaired by worry and undernourishment. He is badly in need of immediate assistance if he is to be rehabilitated physically and spiritually.

Pr. E. C. Lindeman, Prof. John Tewy and other eminent men in New York will probably intervene with Mayor La Guardia for Dr. Kraus' reinstatement in the College of the City of New York.

They have been familiar with the case for many years and have expressed full confidence in and sympathy with Dr. Kraus. At least 100 outstanding professional xmenaxminist professors, ministers and publicists have endorsed Dr. Kraus.

Our purpose in writing you is to urge you to give as generously as your means permit to aid in the immediate rehabilitation of this unfortunate man. A prompt response to this appeal will multiply the value of your gift.

We regret this urgent personal appeal but we know of no agency equipped to give the kind of care this situation demands. We can look for aid only to generous individuals like yourself who with are moved by the unnecessary and prolonged suffering of a sensitive person in this situation.



Dear Rabbi Silver:

Polish Jews largely motivated my addressing our Fathers Sons gathering - to ask them to give the Polish families an opportunity to come here as we gave our Russian Refugees during the period of the 1900-1903 exodus. But as the hour was too late for speechmaking, I did not have time to submit my plan.

The experience that I had during the Russian exodus justifies my claim that we can bring here over a million persecuted. Polish families with less difficulties than we experienced bringing the Russian families. With millions of well to do Jewish families all over the country - every one of them ought to gladly assume the obligation of taking complete charge of one Polish family-give them temporary food and shelter and successfully start them earning their own

livings.

My plea would be; to start Personal Service Societies wherever wealthy Jewish families are to be found - and organize to take care of families coming here until they are the indispensable members of the communities that the former Russian Refugees now are.

Though I am physically unable to give you any active service, I will gladly devote any time to it in order to start such a Personal Service Society here in our city.

I will personally appreciate any time or thought that you may be able to give to this suggestion - and my kindest personal regards.



Hebrew Language

Hebrew, like Latin and classic Greek, is a literary, and not a colloquial language. The exact time when Hebrew ceased to be the living. vernacular language of the Jews is not known. Some Hebraists maintain that they lost the living use of the Hebrew during the Babylonish captivity, but the belief of many is that they retained the partial use of it for some time after their return to Palestine. and lost it by degrees. There is no convincing evidence, however, to show exactly when it became a virtually dead language, although there are satisfactory reasons for declaring that it gave place to a corrupted form of the Aramaic language, a mixture of Syrian and Chaldean or Babylonish speech called the Syro-Chaldaic dialect, several hundred years before the Christian era, and that more than a century before this era it ceased to be used even as a written language and was thereafter studied only as the language of the sacred books, by the learned.


