Dear Rabbi Silver:

During a short visit to Cleveland I attended your service on January 2 and listened to your sermon.

The prospect to the year of 1938 you gave in this sermon the people you would like to meet in this year, differ considerably from the prospect the Jewish history gives the same people.

For the people you would like to meet in the year of 1938 Jewish history will be nothing else than what it always has been:

Jewish history is ~~is~~ a not-ending story of persecution, misery, sorrow, trouble, danger. Jewish history is a story of outlawry, immigration, homelessness, strange countries, strange languages. Jewish history is a long story of hope, longing, despair, a long story without an happy end.

The people you would like to meet in the year of 1938 should know this history. They should know that the same fate that happened to their ancestors will happen also to their descendens. They should know that one day the happiest and the richest country in the world, the most clever and the most perfect constitution human brains ever invented, will be nothing else than a milestone on their eternal road. The people you would like to meet in this year should know that this same year will bring them closer to their Jewish destination. They should know that just today 1½ million of their own brothers in Rumania, that just yesterday ½ million of their own brothers in Germany and that just last week 3-4 million of their own brothers in Poland were stricken by the same Jewish fate. They should know that all these millions suddenly lost the right to be human beings, lost the right to make a living, lost the right to support their old parents and their sick children. This people you would like to meet in the year of 1938 should know that the others consider them as 'the sons of the darkness', that they tolerate them only so long their mind is occupied with their own prosperous live but that they are ready to overtake them as soon as unemployment or unsuccessfulness gives them more time. They should know that their is not a persecution complex but a persecution

history interrupted only by short times of rest. They should know that this fate happened to the Jewish people at all times during their history and that there was no exception at any time in any country.

If the people you would like to meet in the year of 1938 will know these facts they will know their Jewish fate and they will not be surprised when this same Jewish fate will be here one day. And if they are prepared for their Jewish fate may be they will take it like their ancestors took it and they will not perish if the year of 1938 will not be the year of the Messiah.




For the forthcoming issue of the Literary Supplement of the "Masmid", we are encouraging our students to submit essays dealing with the Messiah Idea in Judaism.




Dear Madam:







My dear Rabbi Silver,

Several years ago I approached you concerning the translation of your "Speculations" into Hebrew. Since then my journalistic and literary experience in Tel Aviv has made my style more vigorous and pliant and has drilled it to scientific exactness. Since coming back to the U.S., I have translated Rabbi M. M. Kugel's "The Meaning of God", and Prof. Tschernowitz's "Toldot Ha-khalakim" (into English). I am now at work on Rabbi Shimon Seldin's "The Jew and the Universe".

A Hebrew rendering of the "Speculations" or any other weighty work by your pen would go far toward enhancing your power in Tel Aviv and Jerusalem circles.

Very few Hebraists have my understanding of English and very few can use Hebrew with skill approaching mine. You may dislike me personally, but this is labor for hire, and in a case like this it is competence which is the first consideration.

I have not at this moment any of your books before me, but I remember them sufficiently to enable me to give you an idea of what the undertaking might cost. For the "Speculations" I should expect \$2.75 a page - any page whether half blank or over-run by tiny notes. For a book like "Religion in a Changing World", the price would be \$2.50 per page. The arrangement would be \$125 paid in advance, a second payment to be made as soon as 100 pages are done, - that and all payments thereafter in accordance with the actual number of pages completed, at the price set forth. The book is to be finished by September 1, 1938. I await your prompt answer.

## A REALIZATION OF JEWISH YOUTH

Peggy Lopman  
Audrey Ettlinger

The Jewish Youth of America has at last given thought to the problems of his race. It has never before occurred to him that he might one day be confronted by a hurricane of prejudice. The American Youth is beginning to face the realization of race distinction.

Hitler gesticulates magnificently, orates with passion, and why? - to stamp down a people who are unfortunately in the minority. The German Jews have suffered untold hardships because of Hitler's propaganda, his unquestionable leadership, and his loathsome intolerance. The youth of Germany have been helpless; unable to remedy the situation. Their minds have been active, their hands bound. But I feel that we, the youth of America can, and in encouraging each other will begin to "do something".

The dispersion of the Jewish people throughout the world, in many countries and many cities is an outstanding element of our difficulties. More important, however, we feel that they are scattered in spirit more than in body. This is a new idea and may seem slightly radical at first to some of our elders who still live with the idyllic remembrance that a Jew is a Jew not only in heritage, but also in soul. Let us think this over. The average American Jewish Youth is a Jew in name only. He feels none of the true religion that was felt by the patriarchs of Judaism. Because he does not feel his religion he thinks that he is superior to the orthodox believers and superior to the orthodox customs. We, therefore, feel justified in saying that if the Jews were not Anti Semitic themselves, other people would not be. We must unite; fight together; and keep peace together.

The realization has come that Judaistic affairs have not improved in the past five years, and that in all probabilities will continue to disintegrate in the years to come. That is, the disintegration will continue if nothing is done about it. We are the coming generation of adults, and it is we who shall have to face the inevitable

crisis. Let us not shirk this knowledge. The Fate of Judaism is in our hands.

May I impose upon your time by asking your kind intervention on behalf of a highly meritorious Jewish scholar? Dr. Salomon Gandz has applied for the Clay Fellowship at Ohio State University. I have sent a letter of recommendation to the Dean of the Graduate School, a copy of which I am herewith enclosing. I wonder whether you could see your way clear toward exercising some influence that Dr. Gandz's application be favorably acted upon.

I wish to add that Dr. Gandz, in addition to his searching inquiries in the field of history of mathematics, including the edition of the "Mishnat Hamidot", several essays in the MUCA, etc. has also made significant contributions to the studies of rabbinical law. His volume on talmudic law in the Monumenta Talmudica has been regarded for years as the basic contribution in this field. Somehow he has not been fortunate in making the necessary adjustment in this country. Having served for years as librarian and teacher in Arabic at the Isaac Elhanan Yeshiva, he lost his position because of a personal conflict.







Having read so often about your interest in the welfare of humanity, may I kindly ask at this time, if in some way dear Rabbi, could find a solution to my problem, that may pave the way out of my difficulties.

I was employed as a custom guard, and was removed in 1924.

At present, I am employed as a stock boy, distributing merchandise by hand truck on the selling floors of a large department store in New York.

Out of my meagre income support a single sister who since the death of our parents during 1926-28, has been im-

able to earn a living due to a physical breakdown.

Another single sister Grace, whom I also helped out prior to September last, has been broken in spirit over the thought of my struggle to make ends meet, became depressed and is now a mental patient at the Pilgrim State Hospital, Brentwood, L. I. N. Y.

Perhaps Rabbi, you can in some manner, intercede in my behalf personally with the Hon. Henry Morgenthau, Jr. Secretary, United States Treasury, to reconsider my removal with a view of reinstatement.

It is for my sisters sake I am making this appeal to you Rabbi, to kindly intercede for me in this matter.

If I am reinstated it would mean a lot to me (a better salary) and happiness to my sister at home, and more so to the one in the hospital whom I expect home soon, and will then be

in a better position financially, to help her until such time to enable her to find employment.

For nearly eight years I have been steadily employed in my present capacity.

Born in the City of New York I served with the British Colonial South African Forces, where I received an honorable discharge, and the Queen Victoria War Medal.

I am a member of the Knights of Pythias.

I hope dear Rabbi, you will be able to help me out, <sup>and</sup> assuring you, I will always appreciate your efforts in my behalf.


