
Dear Rabbi Silver:

My dear Dr. Silver:

I wish to express to you my sincere regrets for the terrible blunder which I made at Detroit, in connection with your introduction to the Banquet of the Jewish War Veterans. I am keenly sorry that I was unable to make my apology to you personally, following your marvelous address. However, I am sure that you appreciate the fact that I was under quite a mental strain in trying to carry out the program so that it would satisfy the Detroit Convention Committee, as well as others that were directly connected with the affair.

I think that I tried to explain to you that the matter of announcing the skit was not of my doing, but was prompted by a member of the local committee who felt that it would aid the situation for the next speaker, if the skit were put on at that point. However, I realized immediately after announcing the skit that it was a serious blunder, and that the least that I could have done under the circumstances was to have first asked your permission to announce the skit ahead of your address. I assure you that it was a mistake of the head and not of the heart, and that I will be only too glad to do anything that you would suggest in order to make amends for the error.

I want to assure you that your address made this Banquet an outstanding success, and that I heard nothing but the highest commendation for having had the privilege of having you with us. The persons who attended the banquet, as well as the members of our organization, feel that they are obliged to you beyond possible repayment for having been with us, and for having delivered such a wonderful address.

If there is anything that I may be able to do in your behalf at any time in the future, I wish to assure you of my desire to comply with any request that you may make of me. I wish to repeat the fact that I feel very badly about having made the blunder, and assure you that I will do everything within my power in the future to prove to you my desire to make amends on that score. I did not get a chance to hear you. I had to leave because I was suffering a severe cold.


I regret that I did not hear you, but the reports that I read in the newspapers the following day were exceedingly interesting. Father Coughlin had this punishment coming to him.





Contrasting throughout the Aristotelian Ethic and the Kantian Moral Imperative with the revelation of Duty in the Jewish Torah, this book makes a valuable contribution to the study of ethics. Beginning with a discussion of duty in general ethics, Dr. Silver proceeds to give in detail an analysis of the Hebrew conception of duty as defined by the Law, the Prophets and the great Rabbis of Israel, showing that the authoritarian function of Revelation is to hallow the moral law, to give it its special divine sanction, to give to the moral law enthusiasm, i. e., divine inspiration or motivation. In spite of the apparent duality of man, having both a good and evil nature, as Plato and Paul assert, the Jewish conception is unitary. The one fundamental supreme motive is loyalty to the national duty of being a holy people of God. From this are the derivative motives, Imitation of God, sympathy, justice, love of God and man, duty for duty's sake, the sanctification and desecration of the Name and loyalty to God's law. This idea sets the Jew boldly forth on the wide stream of the world, for this conception is not racial but universal, and it is obligatory upon the Jew who would do his whole duty to win all mankind to his Ethics. The book is particularly valuable because of its index, its bibliography, and its chapter and verse citation of authorities. Students in colleges and theological seminaries will find this a helpful textbook.

An enclosing letter received yesterday from Jack Michaelson — on a very old subject about which I had occasion to write to you quite a few times since poor Pearl left her little insurance for Florence and Alvin.

From Alvin's savings account, which started with \$490.47 and which has now a balance (including accumulated interest) of \$491.12, \$100.00 has already been turned over to Alvin — \$50.00 on Sept. 20, 1937 for school expenses and \$50.00 on May 31, 1938 for railroad expenses, etc. for Florence's wedding.

When I turned over to Alvin the second \$50.00, before Florence's wedding, I impressed upon him the ultimate purpose of this fund, stressing

~~the fact~~ that he should try his utmost - in the interest of his future welfare - to confine the availability of this fund to his educational needs, leaving his father to take care of his other needs. During my last chat with Alvin, he brought out the fact that he has been contributing weekly towards house expenses from his salary.

It appears to me that Alvin does not need now \$100. for the little expenses mentioned by Jack in the enclosed letter, but that as in the past Jack is after using this money for his business which is not now, as it has never ^{been} in the past, netting him a living. Someone who has some influence with Jack should advise him to throw up his "business" and look for a job. Otherwise he will continue to be after milk in Alvin's fund.



RABBI SILVER INVOKES JESUS' HELP



By Rev. Fred Haberer, a Gentile Christian
Who Loves the Jews

In the June issue of the Religious Digest on page sixty-eight there appears an interview conducted by a reporter, Mr. William Dinwoodie, with "Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, world-famous Jewish leader of Cleveland."

Mr. Dinwoodie asked, "If Christ were to return to Jerusalem, Rabbi, what message do you think He would bring to His oppressed people, the Jews in Europe and elsewhere?"

To which the rabbi replied, "The message would be: 'Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely. . . .'" (Matthew 5:11).

There are two things about this answer of Rabbi Silver which strike us forcibly. First, he admits that the words of the Lord Jesus Christ have weight, because he quotes Him, and thus indicates that He has a message which is of importance for the Jews who are being oppressed in so many quarters of the world today. Not so long ago pious Jews considered it a sinful thing to read the New Testament. No rabbi would have dared to quote the words of the Lord Jesus Christ for fear of being considered an apostate, a "meshumed." The Lord Jesus Christ was considered a false prophet who was to be despised above all other false prophets. If any Jew did confess that he believed that Jesus was the Christ, that is, the Messiah, that Jew was considered an outcast from his people.

ONLY HALF A TRUTH

Now we come to the second thing which

strikes us so forcibly in the rabbi's reply, namely, that he did not quote the whole statement made by Jesus and recorded for us in the Gospel of Matthew. The full statement is:

"Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for my sake. Rejoice, and be exceeding glad: for great is your reward in heaven: for so persecuted they the prophets which were before you." (Matthew 5: 11, 12).

Rabbi Silver omitted three vital words: "for my sake." When we read the full statement, we get an entirely different impression of the message than that conveyed by the partial quotation given. Persecution is "blessed" if it is "for my sake." Those who are persecuted for Christ's sake are in the same class as the prophets of Israel who were also persecuted by the Jews of their day because they were God's appointed messengers to His people. These holy men of old denounced their people's sin, showed them what the will of the Lord was, and pled with them to repent and thereby secure deliverance from the certain judgment which was coming upon them because of their disobedience.

PERSECUTED AS PUNISHMENT

The Lord Jesus Christ never said that mere "persecution" as such was a blessing, but rather that false persecution for His sake would be blessed. Rabbi Silver would have a hard time convincing the Jews of Germany, Austria, Poland, and Rumania that the sufferings through which they are passing are a "blessing!" Yet are not many Jews suffering false charges and being persecuted falsely in many places today? Who would run away from a blessing? Yet the daily papers state that vast numbers of Jews are beseeching British and American Consulates to grant them passports to leave the place of persecution. No, those Jews who are being persecuted in Europe and elsewhere today are not being persecuted for Christ's sake, although they are indeed being persecuted falsely in many instances. The daily confession of the pious orthodox Jew is:

"Because of our sins we have been driven from our land."

God says that it is their iniquity which is the cause of the sufferings of Israel in the lands of their enemies. See Leviticus 26:39. Modern Jewish leaders say that it is because of jealousy and anti-Semitism that Israel is suffering. God's Torah indicates the way out of the predicament:

"If they shall confess their iniquity, and the iniquity of their fathers, with their trespass which they trespassed against me, and that also they have walked contrary unto me;

And that I also walked contrary unto them, and have brought them into the land of their enemies; if then their uncircumcised hearts be humbled, . . . then will I remember my covenant. . . ." (Leviticus 26:40-42).

Why not meet these conditions? Why not confess the iniquity of heart and soul which has led so many Jews to reject their own Messiah and seek help in their distress from earthly governments, Zionism, money and influence?

PERSECUTED FOR MESSIAH'S SAKE

If Rabbi Silver will call upon his people to join with him in doing just that very thing which God demands every Jew shall do, he will experience what the Lord Jesus Christ was talking about when He said: "men shall revile you and persecute you and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely for my sake." Ask any Jew who has publicly confessed his faith in Jesus as the Messiah of Israel whether or not he has experienced it. Or, better still, if you who read this are not a follower of the Messiah, ask yourself these questions:

"Have I ever falsely accused a Jew of accepting Christ for gain? Have I ever reviled any Jew as being a traitor, an apostate, because he said that he believed in Jesus?"

That is the sort of persecution which Jesus said was "blessed" to those who endured it, because it is "for my sake." It is blessed because there is a great reward in heaven awaiting the one who is so persecuted.

PERSECUTED BY SATAN

In all fairness, we must include still another persecution; this time it comes from one who has ever been back of every diabolical scheme to inflict suffering and anguish upon the Jew. He is the one behind the scenes, the greatest Jew biter of them all—SATAN!

Down through the pages of human history we have seen him at work with increased zeal as every one of the ages drew to a close. As each cycle of God's purpose completed itself, Satan released his venom, stirring the nations of the world into a frenzy of hate for the Jew, and uniting them in a determined effort to wipe him out. History has shown us what happened in Egypt, in Babylon, in Medo-Persia, in Greece, and who does not know the story of the unparalleled persecutions under the iron hand of Rome? Not only has he sought to destroy God's chosen people, but he has tried repeatedly to thwart God's plan for man's salvation through the Messiah, who was born a Jew.

Now once again Satan builds up the fires which have been burning desultorily for years. He moves men—his dupes—across the checkerboard of world history.

"The kings of the earth set themselves, and the rulers take counsel together, against the Lord, and against his anointed, saying, Let us break their bands asunder, and cast away their cords from us. He that sitteth in the heavens shall laugh: the Lord shall have them in derision." (Psalm 2:2-4).

At a time like this, spoken of by the Psalmist, would it not be wise to be under the loving care and protection of Him "that sitteth in the heavens" rather than be numbered with those who will cry out to the mountains and rocks and say:

"Fall on us, and hide us from the face of him that sitteth on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb: For the great day of his wrath is come; and who shall be able to stand?" (Revelation 6:16, 17).

FACING THE SITUATION SQUARELY

If Rabbi Silver, or any other Jew, really believes that Jesus has a message for the Jews of today, then, in all fairness, His message should be heeded. If that message is to be found in the words recorded in Matthew 5:11, then all the words recorded there are equally important and none of them may be omitted. It is not fair to change the entire meaning of that message by omitting the words, "for my sake."

When the rabbi admits that Jesus has a message for Israel today, he admits the authority of Jesus. And there is no higher Court of Appeal to which we can go for a reversal of His judgments because "it is he which was ordained of God to be the Judge of quick and dead." (Acts 10:42). If we admit His authority, then we have voluntarily placed ourselves under the jurisdiction of that same authority. Jesus has called upon all men to be followers of Him. He has said that those who do follow Him will suffer persecution from those who reject Him, but He has also promised that the reward of those who are thus persecuted will be great in heaven. We quote the words of Stephen, a martyr of the early Church:

"And they stoned Stephen, calling upon God, and saying, Lord Jesus, receive my spirit. And he kneeled down, and cried with a loud voice, Lord, lay not this sin to their charge. And when he had said this, he fell asleep." (Acts 7:59, 60).

It is not easy to confess that Jesus is the Messiah and to bear the reviling and persecution and false accusations which are sure to come "for my sake." But He has promised that "great is your reward in heaven: for so persecuted they the prophets which were before you." Will you join the glorious company and share the eternal reward of those who all through the ages have been persecuted for the sake of the Messiah?

I AM NOT CONCERNED ABOUT THE JEWISH NATION

I am not concerned about the Jewish nation or about the land of Palestine. This may seem very strange in the light

of current events. It may seem strange when one listens to the questions which are upon Jewish hearts and lips today: "If the Jewish people are God's chosen people, why does He allow the awful things to happen to them that we read about every day? If God loves the Jews with an everlasting love, if they are as the apple of His eye, why does He not stop the modern Hamans in their discriminations and persecutions against the Jews?"

In these days when Jewish leaders and world politicians are shaking their heads gravely and are trying desperately to find the solution to a very difficult situation, I rest confidently upon the promises of the God of Israel. Listen to His words spoken so many years ago through the Prophet Amos:

"I will sift the house of Israel among all nations, like as corn is sifted in a sieve." (Amos 9:9)

Because of their disobedience God has done this. The reason the Jewish people are spread over the whole world today, living without a King, and without a country is because God said, through His servant Moses, that if His people did not hearken unto Him and obey Him, He would scatter them over the face of the whole earth. That is why they are to be found in every land and in every clime. God, in His love and faithfulness, is now allowing His people to be persecuted and driven from countries where they have settled. God allowed a Hitler to come upon the scene—He allowed other Hamans to arise, so that the Jewish people would be uprooted; so that they would be stirred up as an eagle stirreth up her nest to get her eaglets to fly. That might seem hard, but some of us know that surgical operations are hard on us, yet we submit to them so that afterward we might enjoy better health.

What God is starting to do these days with His beloved people, the Jews, is the greatest thing that has ever happened to them. Listen to what God says regarding this event. Your Prophet Jeremiah records this:

"Behold, the days come, saith the Lord, that they shall no more say, The Lord liveth, which brought up the children of Israel out of the land of Egypt; But, The Lord liveth, which brought up and which led the seed of the house of Israel out of the north country, and from all countries whither I had driven them; and they shall dwell in their own land." (Jeremiah 23:7,8)

There you have it, from your own Scriptures. God hears the cries of His persecuted people, He sees their tears and knows all their afflictions, and He is allowing this to go on so as to get His people back into the land that He promised to them. Yes, He is working all these things together for the good of the Jewish nation. This, to me, is very clear and it is clear to every student of Prophecy, whether he be Jew or Christian. What we see happening today, and things that will yet happen to Jews, we know are according to
