My dear Rabbi:


Among the many letters I have been receiving from refugees I felt that the enclosed letter was most touching and I am sending you a copy written just as I received it with all the grammatical errors.

Rabbi I cannot bring home to you strongly enough the fact that I think that The Cleveland Co-ordinating Committee should continue their work allowing strangers to sign affidavits for refugees so that hundreds of refugees may be helped who are unable to leave Europe because of the fact that they have no relatives to sign affidavits for them.

I sincerely feel that The Jewish Welfare Fund should continue supporting The Cleveland Co-ordinating Committee to the utmost and even if it is necessary that we are compelled to go out and raise our quota next year to take care of these refugees--it must be done. That is my opinion.





Dear Abba:-

Let me thank you for your fine co-operation of last Friday. As I expected, I found our meeting with Parker and our own intimate talk thereafter helpful indeed in my present situation, and especially clarifying as to the "next move".

My further reflections on my present problem as a result of these talks have confirmed me in the following conclusions which have revolved in my mind as you know for sometime, and to the following plan of action.

I do not believe that spending more time with the bank in connection with the new work, will, even at best, bring me any nearer to any sort of security. Even though the bank had voluntarily offered me a title in this connection, I could not approach this new work with any sort of certainty of future security. The results of soliciting new business are for obvious reasons very uncertain, and to depend on that alone for the permanency of my job, especially when my main source of new business - my vital connection with a branch - is taken away, is obviously a risky proposition. The present situation therefore boils down to the proposition of perilously hanging on to the bank for a doubtful period and then being let out. Why then allow myself this discouraging possibility, and waste that precious interval during which I could freely - unhampered by continued connection with the bank - make concentrated efforts to realize my ultimate plans? It therefore seems to me that should you be able, as you so kindly suggested, to find a place for me now on the staff of the U. J. A., I would be glad to accept that at once and devote myself to that work to the best of my ability and continue in it until a suitable opening is found in due time in the Rabbinate. Besides, my contacts in this new work should obviously prove more helpful toward that ultimate end.

I perhaps need not add that the present developments in the bank have left with me in this sphere nothing but a spirit of discouragement and that a complete and immediate change of occupation, no matter how arduous, will mean nothing less than a heartening and rejuvenating experience.

I received yesterday the enclosed letter from father. Mother also wrote an encouraging letter. I am enclosing father's letter because he writes at length about the old problem of the sale of his book. I expect to write to him shortly and will appreciate a definite "lead" from you in this connection so that I may be able to write to him something definite and satisfying on this matter.

My dear Mr. Eigenfeld:

I feel I should write you this letter of explanation.

I had been repeatedly warned not to mix into Leon Weisenfeld's affairs. I was told that it would be just a waste of time on my part; that it would do nothing but give me head-aches and that all the reward I would receive for my efforts would be in a lack of appreciation and a lack of co-operation. As you know, I went ahead nevertheless, regardless of consequences. I felt that as a friend I should do what I could to render any assistance possible.

You know the innumerable conferences we held and the time, the energy and the difficulty we encountered in planning various meetings. You know the trouble we encountered to get the people to come to the last meeting and after they came the further difficulty to evolve a plan that would be workable. And what happened? Weisenfeld himself kicked it over, and we are back where we started. This is about as much as any person can possibly endure.

Frankly speaking, I can not figure Weisenfeld out. I cannot understand why the matter has suddenly become a matter of life and death. I can not reason out or see why there must be instantaneous action and why we must start all over again when we were apparently going along reasonably well under the newly formulated plans. Really, I do not understand what Weisenfeld expects of us under the circumstances.

People who came to the last meeting made pledges. These pledges were contingent upon the fact that there be other pledges. It was understood that the money realized from these pledges was to be kept intact and utilized only for the purposes of helping Weisenfeld make down payments on his printing machinery and if the money was not so used, that no part of same was to be expended, but was to be returned to the individuals who gave it. We all agreed upon that plan as decidedly fair and proper. We agreed that there would be no "Schnoring"; that the individuals who subscribed would be given coupons for their money which would be

be redeemable partly in printing, partly in cash. A committee was decided upon which would take charge of the funds for the purpose indicated, and would see to it further that the purposes of the meeting were carried into effect.


Apparently Weisenfeld does not desire this plan. The Committee is not functioning. The coupon idea is out. There have been no new meetings of the Committee, but all its actions are nullified. Leon now wants us to collect the money pledged right now and to expend it as he feels it should be expended, without waiting for others to contribute and not making one pledge contingent upon the others. This cannot be done unless we start afresh so that no one is misled by our actions. There are other factors as well.

It is utterly impossible to collect the money at once, and if we do succeed in doing so, how can we guarantee to those who gave the money that their desires with reference to keeping the money intact until all the money is in be kept in accordance with their wishes, when the money is being expended in dribs and drabs and when the committee appointed by the meeting is not even functioning?

Frankly, it seems to me we are just going around in a circle and we are not getting anywhere. I feel I have done everything I possibly could and that I can go no further, and do no more.







Dear Rabbi Silver:

I was somewhat surprised to receive a personal note from you acknowledging my unsolicited contribution to your Welfare Fund. The amount was hardly worth the effort. I could not quite decide whether you wished to place yourself on record that my poor contribution was unsolicited or whether it was motivated by the promptings of a noble nature. I choose to believe the latter.

All white people on the western continent are more or less foreigners in that they are either immigrants or the descendents of immigrants. I believe it was Ralph Waldo Emerson who said, "It takes seven generations to make a gentleman." In line with his thought I believe, in many cases, it takes just about seven generations to make a real American of a foreigner.

To be a true American one must have the principles which our early forefathers struggled and fought for deeply ingrained and engrafted into one's very soul. A thought never to be forgotten is the one that our forefathers came to these foreign shores of America to flee intolerance and to enjoy the right of worshiping God according to the dictates of their own conscience without fear or hindrance. To be intolerant, to believe in class distinction, is to be un-American. Much of the trouble that is prevalent these times is due to two facts:

(1) The doctrine of hatred that was preached and instilled into our people during the World War.

(2) Foreigners coming to this country and enjoying rights and freedom such as they never had in their own land, are very much predisposed to intolerance toward those who differ in race, culture or religion. Such people, not having become enough Americanized, do not realize that such actions and behavior are very un-American.


Dear Rabbi Silver;

As you know, this has been another active and accomplishing year for the Consumers' League. Through the persistent and vigorous efforts of Elizabeth Magee, in making numerous trips to Columbus to appear before legislative committees, and by securing the co-operation of other interested groups, it has been possible to retain the law limiting the hours of work for women in industry on the State statute books. If it had not been for the activities of the League and especially Miss Magee's able work, I am sure the amendments would have been passed which would have weakened this law seriously. There were unusually strong efforts on the part of certain groups to do this but fortunately they were not successful.

The League has also taken an active part in pressing for an administration of the State Unemployment Compensation law that will carry out its functional purpose and not become just a playground for politicians. In that connection, I want you to know how helpful it has been to have Rabbi Cohen as a member of the State Advisory Committee on Unemployment Compensation. He has worked closely with Miss Magee and his help has been most valuable.

The League's office has continued to be a center of helpfulness and advice to which both men and women in industry turn constantly when they are confronted with problems of exploitation and injustice.

My dear Rabbi: -

Last night, being unable to sleep, I happened to pick up a magazine and read of the fate of thousands of Jewish refugees, who finally escaped to a boat for various points of debarkation, and who were not only pillaged on lands from which they were seeking to escape the many injustices they had gone through, but after having been fortunate enough to gain transportation on a boat, they were robbed by the officers of the boat which they had had the good luck to reach; and of course, knowing that they were unable to land that many of these refugees were never heard from again, I began to ponder as to what harm the United States of America could suffer by becoming a haven for these refugees in the following manner: -

The United States is dotted with a number of so-called ghost towns or cities, which were constructed during the War as cantonments. Not only these, but there are other various small towns where Fortune smiled on large industries, which since have closed down. Could both of these be put into use for housing of these refugees, who would not be permitted to engage in any profitable agriculture or industry to compete with the present American manufacturing industries and labor, but could have the right to manufacture for their own use and pursue agriculture for their own consumption only.

These particular groups are termed concentration camps in Europe, which I will term restricted areas, and the people of these sections would not be permitted to leave this area, for any other purpose than to purchase supplies. Touring the country would not be permitted, and they would not be assimilated into the regular channels of the life of the American public, until such time as the quota of immigrants would automatically release a certain number each year.


It is my contention that if this country could become a haven for a great many of these refugees, that instead of becoming an economic liability to the United States, it would become an asset in view of the fact that the Refugee Committee would have to guarantee their maintenance. The chief hardship would be in getting these people started the first year to be self-supporting. After that, they would have their crops for their own use and manufacture various items of necessity. Any surplus could not be shipped into the regular channels of trade.

I believe that this plan, although not democratic, would be more than appreciated, inasmuch as it at least gives them security and the right to live. It would not be detrimental to the United States, yet undoubtedly a human cry would be raised if these people were permitted to assimilate into the regular channels of trade. In other words, my plan would be to practically create a duplication of the WPA, whereby certain groups manufacture items for persons on relief, and in this manner become a self-rotating and self-supporting organization.

I do not know whether or not any of the other persons in this work have thought of a plan of this nature; I don't know of course how much reaction it would have by a plan of this type to salvage human wreckage, yet it should certainly at least be broached to public officials for a reactionary sentiment.

If there is anything in the contents of this letter, which might naturally aid the birth of a new idea and plan for aiding these people, it certainly should be given proper consideration.


