Dear Friend,

I am enclosing a transcript of a radio discussion that I heard and which greatly impressed me. You may have heard the same, and may have taken the same steps I did; namely, I bought several transcripts to pass out among some of my friends, those that I believe need it for one reason, and those, like yourself, who could pass it on to someone else who may need it for the same reason.

I sat listening to this discourse with mixed feelings. One of thankfulness, and the other that gave me a most ominous feeling. The first was because the subject was handled in truth, and the second was because we, as a race, must be X-rayed and dissected in a mental laboratory just like a butterfly on a pin. One who has always judged a person for what he is and what he stands for can find no answer or reason for questioning.

And so, I should perhaps look at this as a neutralizer against at least one program of viciousness, and be glad that the answer is not an apology but a clinical X-ray, manifesting fact.

Thank you for your help last Wednesday afternoon in getting a much too un-informed layman off to a right start.



My dear Rabbi Silver:

Now that I have summoned up sufficient courage to speak to you, I should like to say everything that's on my mind and forever more keep my peace. Please do not throw this in the waste basket until you have read it through, for I feel that one person's serious thoughts and good intentions are worthy of another person's attention regardless how trivial it may seem at the outset. The matter I bring before you is deadly serious all over the country.

May I tell you that it is a very personal reason that motivates me to speak so loudly to you, for it is said that of a thing strikes home it is more deeply felt. It is definitely in regard to a younger sister that I speak. May I speak in the same manner that you speak when you refer to our parents as good and great. My mother is a very good woman noted for her philanthropies, not when it is easy to give but when it means sacrifice to give. My father, M. Heldman, is one of the outstanding figures in the Jewish community. For thirty some years in the furniture business [starting at \$4 per week] first with M. Sepehly, then Kozonah and Rosenthal, then alone, then with Katz Rothstein Co. at present. He is a pillar of strength and light. He has aided hundreds of people expected and received nothing in return. He has given us [his three daughters] fine education and everything we wished but strangely enough, he never wished for anything but worth while things.]

My father's name stands honest and virtuous in the Jewish and Gentile community. There has never been one person to ever say that my father maltreated him in all these long years, nor has he ever said an unkind word to any one. I have resembled my father most and have always tried to be just a little bit as good and honest as he is. Now I must tell you what's on my mind.

My father stands poorless to help my sister who is but one of many thousand of young women today. My sister is petite, vivacious and serious. For three of her four years at college, she had a scholarship which gave her the best education available: School of Education plus study with Melville Smith, master of theory. Lila Robeson, master of voice, Denise Leedy, actress and teacher of drama. After graduation, she substituted for two years and the third year Morgan himself took her from the top of the list and placed her at West Junior High where she is the only Jewish teacher (other) Morgan knew the situation and was afraid to do this, yet, she has become so beloved [word of others, not myself] that she has endeared herself to all the students and teachers, won her permanent contract and should be happy. Yet, she is most unhappy and so are thousands like her. Her age is 26.

From her position, please do not assume that she is uppity. She is not! She is thrifty, an excellent cook and keeps her knowledge under her hat when with young men. The point is important for many reasons that might have been put the blame on this technicity.

But because her morals are not loose, she is left out in the cold. There are thousands of other examples. Just take Hyman [all over 30] Schandler's [Conductor of Women's Symphony Orchestra] 4 sisters. Pretty, good, bright, fine, yet all just existing. Of course, it is fine for a girl to have a good position, be self supporting and have an excellent mind. What else can she do and live out her days. Yet any one of these girls would grab at any kind of a young man regardless of how professional or not, if only he were pleasant and honorable and able to make a fair living.

Now comes a very important point! If young people married early in life, it would be such an improvement because young people do not demand as much as older sisters. Love is full of hope and promise and youth is strong and vibrant and can do things physically that a mature person cannot and will not do. I take my own example. I married at 19 [but about 23]. ~~We had nothing~~ ^{had help of course} After 14 years, we have 3 sons - one almost Bar Mitzvah, one be bird him, and one almost 5. We struggled but grew up with the children. They are almost adults. We attend as many cultural things as 24 hours per day permits.

We are proud of our fine intelligent children and they are
proud of us. We are now starting life over. After a
purely academic life spent in music [the children all play
and music is always in the air] I am able to come to the office
and enter a world of which I never dreamed of. It is hard
and difficult and keen and bright. We ~~have~~ had a full and
complete life and are sensible and relate as we take our position in life.

It may be too late to help the ^{big} ~~strate~~ of feminine
youth of 25 to 40 years, but the succeeding ones must not be left
to suffer the same fate. Every one is very young for them
and we try to have a young lady meet a young man, but they
know they are being thrown together and are self conscious and
nothing comes of it. Young girls could be made to realize
with very little effort that early years of joy and anticipation
though full of struggle are far better than fleeting youth
with the hope of security with its amazement and obstinacy in
the 30's. The men if properly educated could be made to
realize that joy with one woman is far sweeter than
sophistication and base flattery with its barrenness and
hiding and hopelessness.

Our parents of this country stand helplessly
humble and sad while their children are fading and
unhappy, and all their sacrifice and wisdom and
kindness avails them nothing.

of course, if you speak with these young people, they deny all this because they do not admit even to themselves that the genuine spark has not yet been kindled and the promise of old maidishness so throwing lines and sharpened their manner and face. I look as young as any unmarried woman ten years younger. Why cannot the unmarried women be made to feel that life owes us nothing and therefore everything we get is something sweet and precious and full of wonder. There are so many wonderful things about us if we would only open our eyes to see them and our minds and hearts to utilize them. This will not take one lecture. It must take one lecture every month and a very subtle approach. It must not be some new discovery. It must appear as from nowhere in a mist. Young people must not feel that they are being singled out. They must become aware of something subtle in the air that tingles of goodness and yet electric with excitement. The approach must be slow and cautious and wary. I have been coming to hear you from my constabip days. In the last three years I have missed only those Sundays when a musical rehearsal could not be scheduled at any other time. I have seen you grow from a great wise young man to a mature oratorian, leader and inspirational guide.

No matter how blue, or weary or forsaken as difficult circumstances in life leave us, I have always left through the comforting prayers and fatherly guidance, clear and calm and full of goodness and hope. No matter how black your subject begins, it is always full of comfort and understanding and resolve to go on at the conclusion. If only there were thoughts more like you. May you live very long. The world needs just such sympathy of one man for another. That is why I have never spoken of this subject to anyone. I have always hoped and hoped. But somehow this Sunday, with all the woes of the world which you set to right so patiently and wisely and with all the hungry souls who have so sated with love and comfort when they hear, I summoned up sufficient courage to speak to you. It requires a great ~~moment~~. There is no one greater than you in America to carry the torch of light to the young people's hearts. These young people of 18-25 are the backbone of tomorrow.

These young people must not feel that two or three children a hardship. Let them have a few close together, and young, and they will grow up forever with their children. I at 33 do not have the patience nor the strength to bear privation and pain [of course if one must, one does] as I could at nineteen, for then pain is not pain but a step toward a great hope. God is with her children at every step and youth triumphs through youth's determination and hope, over the 30's when every thought is so meticulously pondered.

At 30 one says, "Shall I or shall I not have a child? What will I give him etc?" At nineteen, one is as busy with the child, by the time he is 30, he has a young man or woman on his hands and has the maturity of years to be more thrifty and self-sacrificing and a state for the child's and his own good.

If you have read through patiently thus far, I am really grateful to you. If my thoughts are all clear, I have been a good pupil for your wisdom has been my guidance, and you have been my teacher.

I do pray as Esther prayed to Abasheera, that ~~you~~ I have found favor in your thoughts and that I can worry no more on this score, for whatever you wish to do will never fail and this work will be greater than many other things. I do not diminish your foreign and American endeavors. But even in this God's beautiful peaceful land, young people are unhappy because of fearfulness left over from the last war. 




The dead are like the stars by day,

You perhaps will remember that I wrote you from Prague during the last years in my function as director of the Democratic Refugee Committee.

I am enjoyed to find your name on the list of the National Committee of the American Civil Liberties Union and you may be interested to learn that I am the former secretary general of the German League for the Defense of the Rights of Man from 1926 to 1933. On account of this function I was expatriated by the Nazis on the first list (August 1933).

Just a few months in the States I wish to get in touch with all those friends who are working here in a similar way as I did in Europe.

You will quite understand that I would like to work here in my old field and for your kind information I herewith beg to enclose a curriculum vitae.

400 copies of the monthly edition were sent to important European personages.

I also sent propaganda material to Germany and called these pamphlets "German Wahrheitsdienst".

I was one of the leading persons who started the Nobel-Price-campaign for Carl von Ossietzky being the only visible success against Hitler during the last years.

Until 1933 I wrote about 3000 articles and profiles on social problems and political persons in the German democratic press (BERLINER TAGEBLATT, VOSSISCHE ZEITUNG, WELT AM MONTAG, DORTMUNDER GENERALANZEIGER etc.).

Further articles I published in the Czech, English and Swedish press and American magazines.

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

He was really the centre of all the manifold branches of work which lay within the field of the great Jewish Community in Berlin. Mr. Seeliger dominated with admirable energy and knowledge this large field of duties. His talent of organisation is as great as his power of analysis and solving the most difficult tasks. He was the right hand man of the revered President of the Community Mr. Stahl. I can say further that Mr. Seeliger always showed the highest sympathy and understanding for the special religious problems which arose. I always met with his strongest help and assistance.

I would congratulate any Jewish Community in any part of the world which would succeed in getting the valuable talent, the character and pleasant personal appearance of Mr. Seeliger at their disposal.

Mr. Herbert Seeliger, born on March 15th 1903 at Neumark Westpr., residence at Berlin C 2, Kleine Frankfurter Str. 8/9 is in the employ of the Jewish community since the beginning of 1930.

When entering upon his duties he had been junior-barrister and acted at first as law-assistant at our administration-office of justice. In this position he had to see to all the occurrences of juridical consequence, before all to numerous will,- foundation- and insurance-matters as to the settlement of the affairs concerning the taxes and the law of labour of the community. He had also, to attend to the representation of the community at the court and the authority.

Mr. Seeliger's substantial knowledge, large industry and independent work soon stroke the *direction* of the community so that he was shortly untrusted with the settlement of difficult special affairs. At that time he passed the second public examination without interrupting the service for the community.

Then Mr. Seeliger had been appointed manager of the administration of taxes, extremely increasing its productivity owing to his creative ideas and improvement of the working method. When the economical situation of the members of the community grew worse and their solvency decreased he knew how to manage with abt. 35000 members obliged to pay taxes by treating them in a very clever and individual, partly quite modern way, thus increasing the revenues to a maximum. Furthermore he strengthened their readiness for paying taxes and improved respectability of the community and of its arrangements.

At the same time Mr. Seeliger had charge of the department handling the retirement from the community, of the statistical department and of the forwarding office of the newspaper of the community, the official mouth-piece of the board of directors. When managing this departments he has proved to be a man talented for successful organisation. He build up a distributing office, the staff doing excellent work; so he procured work and earnings to a great many Jewish unemployed.

By working hard and meeting the difficulties he set up a card-index of the members of the community- at that time more than 160000 in number- which was built up by and by to a comprehensive and representative register of the community.

When at the beginning of 1936 the managing director of the community emigrated and retired from service the authorities of the community did not know any man more suitable to succeeding their highest official than Mr. Seeliger who has been appointed thereby secretary-general of the community.

The trust put in his person and his ability has not been disappointed. Mr. Seeliger knew how to answer the requirements of this hard and responsible post under the prevailing circumstances. There is hardly a branch within the working range of the community in which Mr. Seeliger had not cooperated owing to his thorough knowledge of the administration and the form of which he had not influenced. Especially in the line of finances and in making budgets he rendered excellent service.

For the last years the regular estimate, balancing on an average of abt. RM. 15000000,-- ~~expenditures~~ and revenues- on account of the steadily increasing demands to the community, was decisively influenced by Mr. Seeliger. The like is to be said regarding the staff-department. 1800 employees and officials were subordinated to Mr. Seeliger as principal of the staff, who made out not only new articles of agreement of salary and appointment but also managed to get trustful, harmonious relations between the direction of the community and the officials under maintenance of order and discipline.

Summarizing we emphasize that the abilities of Mr. Seeliger have been extremely useful to the community and that even the numerous and difficult problems to be handled by the community the last years could be easier mastered owing to the reasonable and active assistance of Mr. Seeliger. Particularly that tasks of emigration and of trustee administration of the members of the community could be pushed on an account of his prudence and capacity. Disposing of a large science of law, sound judgment and thorough knowledge of the ramified administration of the community in total and being a true advocate of Jewish matters he has been the right man who advise and help the board of directors in hardest times.

By his diligence and dutifulness Mr. Seeliger has always set an example to the employees subordinated to him. Although he was some times forced into being hard against officials they have always esteemed and worshipped him. Owing to his good behaviour, objectivity and personal modesty he knew how to grow in favour and to win great authority over the representatives of the community.

In spite of his ~~youth~~ and of having some changes to emigrate Mr. Seeliger has kept his responsible post faithfully, disregarding his own person. We know that his departure will be a big loss to the community, our gratitude to him, however, commands us to give him the chance of getting a position abroad. This is the reason why we give him already now this certificate ending in the cordial wish for his future welfare.

Herr Herbert Seeliger, geboren am 15.3. 1903 in Neumark/Westpr., wohnhaft in Berlin C.2, Kleine Frankfurterstr. 8/9, steht seit Anfang 1930 im Dienst der Jüdischen Gemeinde.

Er war bei seinem Eintritt Gerichtsreferendar und wurde zunächst in unserer Rechts-Abteilung als juristischer Hilfsarbeiter beschäftigt. In dieser Stellung oblag ihm die Bearbeitung aller rechtlich bedeutsamen Vorgänge, insbesondere der zahlreichen Testaments-, Stiftungs- und Versicherungsangelegenheiten sowie die Erledigung der steuer- und arbeitsrechtlichen Sachen der gesamten Gemeindeverwaltung. Auch die Vertretung der Gemeinde vor Gerichten und Behörden gehörte zu seinem Arbeitsbereich. Herr Seeliger fiel der Leitung der Gemeinde durch seine gediegenen Kenntnisse, seinen grossen Fleiss und sein selbständiges Arbeiten bald auf, sodass er nach kurzer Zeit mit der Erledigung schwieriger Spezialaufgaben betraut wurde. In dieser Zeit konnte er auch die zweite juristische Staatsprüfung (Assessorexamen) ablegen, die er, ohne den Dienst bei der Gemeinde zu unterbrechen, bestand.

Er wurde darauf zum Leiter der Steuerverwaltung berufen, die er durch schöpferische Ideen und Verbesserung der Arbeitsweise auf die Stufe höchster Leistungsfähigkeit brachte. In einer Zeit, in der die wirtschaftliche Lage der Gemeindemitglieder sich verschlechterte und ihre finanzielle Leistungsfähigkeit im Sinken begriffen war, verstand er es, durch außerordentlich geschickte, teilweise ganz neuartige, individuelle Behandlung der rund 35000 steuerpflichtigen Gemeindemitglieder das steuerliche Ergebnis für die Gemeinde auf ein Höchstmaß zu steigern, die Steuerfreudigkeit der Gemeindemitglieder zu stärken und gleichzeitig das moralische Ansehen der Gemeinde und ihrer Einrichtungen bedeutend zu erhöhen.

Gleichzeitig mit der Steuerverwaltung leitete Herr Seeliger auch die Austritts-Abteilung, und das Statistische Büro der Gemeinde und die Expedition des Gemeindeblattes, des offiziellen Organs des Gemeindevorstandes. In diesen Abteilungen hat er mit besonderem Erfolge seine organisatorischen Fähigkeiten bewiesen. Er richtete eine eigene, ausgezeichnet funktionierende Verteilerorganisation für das Gemeindeblatt ein und verschaffte damit zugleich einer grossen Anzahl jüdischer Arbeitsloser Arbeit und Verdienst. Er schuf in zäher Arbeit und unter Ueberwindung grosser Schwierigkeiten eine Kartei sämtlicher, zu jener Zeit über 160000 Seelen betragenden Gemeindemitglie-

der, die⁹¹ nach und nach zu einem umfassenden und vorbildlichen Gemeindekataster ausbaute.

Als im Anfang des Jahres 1936 der Verwaltungsdirektor der Gemeinde infolge Auswanderung aus dem Gemeindedienst ausschied, wussten die Gemeindebehörden keinen besseren zum Nachfolger dieses ihres höchsten Beamten zu berufen als Herrn Seeliger, der gleichzeitig damit von ihnen zum Generalsekretär der Gemeinde ernannt wurde. Das Vertrauen, das sie damit seiner Person und seinen Fähigkeiten entgegenbrachten, wurde nicht enttäuscht. Herr Seeliger verstand es, allen Anforderungen, die dieses schwierige und verantwortungsvolle Amt unter den obwaltenden Umständen an ihn stellte, gerecht zu werden. Es gibt in dem grossen Aufgabenbereich der Gemeinde kaum ein Arbeitsgebiet, in dem Herr Seeliger vermöge seiner gründlichen Kenntnis der gesamten Gemeindeverwaltung nicht gewirkt und dessen Gestaltung er nicht beeinflusst hätte. Besonders wertvolle Arbeit leistete er u.a. auf dem Gebiete der Finanzverwaltung und des Etatwesens; der Gemeindeetat der letzten Jahre, der infolge der ständig wachsenden Anforderungen, die an die Gemeinde gestellt wurden, in Ausgaben und Einnahmen durchschnittlich eine Höhe von 15 Millionen Reichsmark erreichte, wurde von ihm in seiner Planung und Feststellung entscheidend beeinflusst. Das gleiche gilt von der Personalverwaltung. Herr Seeliger, dem als Personalchef die rund 1800 Angestellten und Beamten der Gemeinde unterstellt wurden, schuf hier nicht nur teilweise neue Besoldungs- und Anstellungsverhältnisse, sondern verstand es auch, unter Wahrung einer guten Ordnung und Disziplin ein vertrauensvolles und harmonisches Verhältnis zwischen der Leitung der Gemeinde und der Beamtenschaft zu gestalten.

Zusammenfassend möchten wir betonen, dass die Leistungen des Herrn Seeliger der Gemeinde in ausserordentlicher Weise genutzt haben, und dass gerade die zahlreichen und schwierigen Probleme, mit denen die Gemeindeverwaltung sich in den letzten Jahren zu befassen hatte, durch die verständnisvolle und tatkräftige Mitarbeit des Herrn Seeliger leichter bewältigt werden konnten. So waren es im besonderen auch die Aufgaben der Auswanderung und der fürsorgerischen Betreuung unserer Gemeindemitglieder, deren ordnungsmässige Durchführung durch seine Umsicht und Arbeit gefördert wurde. Ausgestattet mit reichem juristischen Wissen, vermöge seiner Urteilskraft und gründlichen Kenntnis der gesamten weitverzweigten Gemeindeverwaltung sowie seiner Verbundenheit mit allen jüdischen Dingen war er der rechte Mann, in schwerster Zeit dem Vorstand ratend und helfend zur Seite zu stehen.

Durch seinen Eifer und seine Pflichttreue hat Herr Seeliger den ihm unterstellten Angestellten stets ein Beispiel gegeben. Wenngleich sein Amt den Beamten gegenüber zwangsläufig zuweilen auch Härten mit sich brachte, hat er sich doch immer ihrer Wertschätzung und Verehrung zu erfreuen gehabt. Dank seinen guten Umgangsformen, seiner

Sachlichkeit und seiner persönlichen Bescheidenheit hat er es verstanden, sich nicht nur Beliebtheit, sondern ein besonderes Ansehen bei dem gesamten Gemeindevorstand sowie bei den Mitgliedern der Repräsentanten-Versammlung der Gemeinde zu verschaffen.

Trotz seines jugendlichen Alters und verschiedener Möglichkeiten auszuwandern, hat Herr Seeliger unter Hintanstellung seiner Person bis jetzt treu auf seinem verantwortungsvollen Posten ausgehalten. Wir wissen, dass sein Fortgang einen schweren Verlust für die Gemeinde bedeuten würde. Unsere Dankbarkeit ihm gegenüber aber gebietet uns, ihm die Möglichkeit der Übernahme eines Postens im Ausland nicht zu verschließen. Deshalb geben wir ihm heute schon dieses Zeugnis, das wir mit dem herzlichen Wunsche schliessen, dass es ihm in Zukunft recht gut ergehen möge.

These days Mr. Herbert Israel Seeliger, former secretary-general of the Jewish community at Berlin has emigrated to Shanghai. Mr. Seeliger was with the administration office of the Jewish community since 1930, soon getting an influential post. Acting at first at the revenue office he has been appointed secretary-general after Mr. Walter Breslauer having retired. At the same time he ~~was appointed~~ for the staff department. In 1939 he has been elected member of the board of directors of the Jewish community.

In spite of his youth Mr. Seeliger is one of the men who are able to form judgment to himself. He has been always anxious to be objective and free from prejudices when acting at Jewish work. At one view he has seen things and people as they are, ranging with them as per their connections. As principal of the staff department Mr. Seeliger had to take care of abt. 1500 employees. It was just about it that he could prove his capacity, his clearness of opinion and his great objectivity.

Mr. Seeliger fully understood the indispensability of a constructive solution of all matters regarding the Jewish emigration. One could rely upon him, when being necessary, to convincingly explain the reasons for pushing on the solution of the emigration problem.

It is with highest regret that we see the retirement of Mr. Seeliger from his position, before all at a moment that makes it difficult to find out the right Jewish men who are qualified in every respect. His departure will create a real blank. We wish, however, that Mr. Seeliger will succeed not only in building up an existence for himself but also in realizing his resolution to facilitate the emigration of a great many Jews.

When Mr. Seeliger took leave of the board of directors and of the members of the administration office, Mr. Carl Israel Fuchs addressed to him hearty words of appreciation, praising Mr. Seeliger and his work. He did not forget to mention that the trust put in Mr. Seeliger's person has been never disappointed. He had always seen to improving the organization of the administration work. One could rely upon him as a man whose actions based upon frankness and straightforwardness, thus answering all the suppositions of trustful co-operation.

Mr. Fuchs ended his speech in words of confidence. Mr. Seeliger has proved to be an able and capable man. People of that kind will always reach their aim.

Siedlung auf San Domingo

Von der Wanderungs-Abteilung der Reichsvereinigung der Juden in Deutschland werden uns folgende Ausführungen zur Verfügung gestellt:

Zwischen der Dominikanischen Regierung und einer in den Vereinigten Staaten von Amerika gegründeten Siedlungsgesellschaft, der „Dominican Republican Settlement Association“, ist eine Vereinbarung zustandegekommen, wonach 500 jüdische Familien in San Domingo angesiedelt und die Siedlung allmählich bis auf 100 000 Personen gebracht werden soll. Während die Gesellschaft die finanzielle Verantwortung für die Siedlung übernimmt, verzichtet der Dominikanische Staat auf alle Gebühren, Zölle und Steuern gegenüber den Siedlern. Ein großes, günstig gelegenes und zum Teil schon in Kultur befindliches Areal steht bereits zur Verfügung der Siedlungsgesellschaft, die alsbald mit der Ansiedlung zunächst einer kleineren Gruppe beginnen will.

Unter diesen Umständen wird es interessieren, über die geographischen, wirtschaftlichen und sozialen Verhältnisse der Dominikanischen Republik näheres zu hören.

Die Wanderungs-Abteilung der Reichsvereinigung verfolgt die Fortschritte des obengenannten Plans mit großer Intensität. Sie bittet aber von Anfragen und Anmeldungen abzuschenken.

Die Dominikanische Republik gehört dem Tropenbezirk an. Sie bildet den östlichen Teil der Insel Haiti in der Gruppe der Großen Antillen, die dem südamerikanischen Kontinent nördlich vorgelagert ist. Der westliche Teil der Insel wird von der Negerrepublik Haiti eingenommen.

Das Gebiet der Dominikanischen Republik umfaßt rund 50 000 qkm (also eine relativ nicht sehr große Bodenfläche). Etwa die Hälfte des Bodens soll kulturfähig sein; aber erst etwa ein Viertel ist in regelmäßigen Anbau genommen; der Rest ist Wald und im Süden Savanne.

Im Norden des Landes zieht sich die schmale Sierra de Monte Christi lang, der Westen und das Zentrum wird von einem vielfach gefalteten Gebirge eingenommen, in dem die höchsten über 3000 m ansteigenden Erhebungen liegen. Zwischen der Sierra de Monte Christi und dem zentralen Gebirgsmassiv erstrecken sich in der Ostwestrichtung die Täler des Yuna und des Yaque mit der alten, recht dicht bevölkerten Kulturlandschaft La Vega a. Im Süden schließt sich an das Zentralgebirge ein etwas breiterer flacher Küstenstreifen, das Gebiet des Zuckerrohr- und Bananenanbaus, in dem auch die Hauptstadt Ciudad Trujillo (früherer Name San Domingo) liegt.

Die Bevölkerung

Die Bevölkerung von etwa 1,5 Millionen setzt sich nach einer dominikanischen Statistik von 1920 zusammen aus 25 v. H. Weißen, 50 v. H. Mestizen und 25 v. H. Negern; aus historischen Gründen ist die Bevölkerung des Südens wesentlich stärker mit Negerblut durchsetzt als im Norden. Die Freindlichkeit und Hilfsbereitschaft der eingeborenen Bevölkerung wird von unseren Einwanderern oft hervorgehoben.

Die Zählung von 1920 stellte 8 jüdische Familien mit zusammen etwa 50 Köpfen fest. Inzwischen ist der jüdische Bevölkerungsanteil durch die Einwanderung auf schätzungsweise 450 Menschen gestiegen, die fast durchweg in der Hauptstadt wohnen. Vor kurzem wurde eine jüdische Gemeinde gegründet, die bereits ein gedrucktes Gemeindeblatt herausgibt. Jüdischer Gottesdienst wird regelmäßig abgehalten; die Torarollen sind von nordamerikanischen Gemeinden gestiftet worden. Es besteht ein Hilfkomitee in Ciudad Trujillo.

Jüdisches Krankenhaus in Berlin

Kranke und Insassen, die drei Tage und länger in Krankenanstalten, Hospitälern, Heil- und Pflegeanstalten, Kliniken usw. aufgenommen worden sind — aber nicht als Dauer-Patienten (-insassen) —, haben ihre sämtlichen Lebensmittelbezugskarten und Seifenkarten des laufenden Versorgungszeitraumes beizubringen und der Verwaltung zu übergeben. Falls sie über den bei der Aufnahme laufenden Versorgungsabschnitt hinaus versorgt werden, sind auch die Bezugskarten der künftigen Versorgungszeitraume einschließlich Bestellscheine abzuliefern. Wenn die Anstaltsverwaltung trotz wiederholter Anforderung die Karten von dem Kranken oder seinen Angehörigen nicht oder nicht vollständig erhält, so hat sie das für den Wohnsitz des Kranken zuständige Ernährungsamt hierzu zu benachrichtigen, das die Einziehung veranlaßt.

Von 1452 bis in die Mitte des 18. Jahrhunderts war die Insel Haiti unter spanischer Herrschaft; der Kultureinfluß der Spanier ist heute noch daran zu sehen, daß die Landessprache spanisch ist. Die Hauptstadt der Insel wurde von Columbus Bruder gegründet und San Domingo genannt. Die Stadt ist vor einigen Jahren nach einem Erdbeben wieder neu aufgebaut worden und zu Ehren des damaligen Präsidenten Ciudad Trujillo genannt worden. Sie zählt jetzt etwa 80 000 Einwohner. Briefe von Einwanderern schildern sie als hübsch und gepflegt, verschweigen jedoch nicht, daß es neben den Pracht- und Villenstraßen auch große Elendsviertel gibt. Den Lebensstandard eines europäischen Arbeiters haben etwa 6000 ihrer Bewohner, einen höheren Lebensstandard kaum 1000. Da die Bevölkerung auch der übrigen Städte und des Landes sehr bedürfnislos ist, bieten sich also, wie hier schon bemerkt sein mag, für Kaufleute keine günstigen Erwerbsmöglichkeiten. Die zweitgrößte Stadt des Landes ist Santiago de los Caballeros mit 36 000 Einwohnern, es gibt noch weitere 5 Städte mit mehr als 10 000 Einwohnern, von denen San Pedro de Macoris (19 000), Imbert (12 500) und Puerto Plata (12 000) genannt sein mögen.

Das Klima

Das Klima der Dominikanischen Republik ist typisches Tropenklima; die Lufttemperatur ist warmfeucht mit geringen Schwankungen im Verlauf des Jahres. Die Dreiteilung der tropischen Länder in die warme Zone (bis etwa 600 m über dem Meeresspiegel), die mäßig-warme Zone (zwischen 600 und 1800 m) und die kalte Zone (überhalb 1800 m) gilt auch hier. Die Mehrzahl der Ansiedlungen liegt in der warmen

und in der mäßig-warmen Zone; die Nähe des Meeres macht auch die warmen Tages- und Jahreszeiten erträglich. Genauere Angaben über die klimatischen Verhältnisse liegen nur aus zwei Orten des Tieflandes vor; zum Vergleich sind die Angaben für Europa beigegeben.

Die Tagesdurchschnitte der Temperatur schwanken in Ciudad Trujillo zwischen 16° und 32° Celsius.

Nach Berichten unserer Auswanderer treten in der Dominikanischen Republik Tropenkrankheiten heute nur noch selten auf. Die Hauptstadt ist praktisch frei von Malaria; es empfiehlt sich dennoch, nur unter Moskitonetzen zu schlafen. Schutzimpfung gegen Typhus ist jedenfalls notwendig. Das Sanitätswesen ist gut ausgebildet; es gibt genügend Krankenhäuser und Ärzte, aber jede Krankheit ist kostspielig.

Im Anfang seiner Aufenthalts dort wird der Einwanderer durch die veränderte Ernährung oft leichte Verdauungsstörungen bekommen. Da der Tag heiß ist, die Abende jedoch verhältnismäßig kühl sind, ist es zweckmäßig, sich nicht zu leicht zu kleiden, um Erkältungen vorzubeugen. Die übliche Kleidung des Mannes ist der weiße Leinenanzug, die Frau trägt helle Kleider. Ein gute Regenmantel ist in diesem regenreichen Lande unter allen Umständen wertvoll.

Industrie und Landwirtschaft

Der einzige entwickelte Wirtschaftszweig ist die Landwirtschaft. Den klimatischen Bedingungen entsprechend ist der Süden des Landes das Gebiet der Zuckerröhrplantagen und der Rohzuckerproduktion; der Norden, insbesondere um die Städte Moca und La Vega herum, ist altes Kulturgebiet, in dem in Klein- und Mittelbetrieben Kaffee, Kakao, Tabak und Getreide gezogen werden. Extensive Viehwirtschaft wird im Osten und im Nordwesten betrieben. Unter dem Einfluß der Nord-Amerikaner, der sich seit dem letzten Viertel des vergangenen Jahrhunderts entwickelt hat, sind alle Zweige der Landwirtschaft stärker aufgeblüht und ist auch das Verkehrswesen weiter ausgebaut worden.

Die öffentlichen Eisenbahnstrecken umfassen erst 260 km; eine Strecke geht von der Hauptstadt aus, die zweite von dem im Osten gelegenen Hafen Sanchez durch das La Vega-Gebiet nach dem Hafen Puerto Plata im Norden. Dieser Hafen ist mit der im Süden gelegenen Hauptstadt durch eine moderne Autobahn verbunden worden.

Die industrielle Entwicklung steht noch weit zurück; der einzige bedeutende Industriezweig ist die Zuckerraffination die überwiegend in nordamerikanischen Händen liegt. Daneben bestehen für den örtlichen Bedarf Brauereien, Reismühlen, Seifen-, Tabak-, Leder- und Schuhfabriken. Die übrigen Lebensbedürfnisse werden, soweit möglich, in handwerklichen Betrieben hergestellt, zum großen Teil jedoch eingeführt. Etwa ein Sechstel der Einfuhr be-

sind meist fensterlos, haben dafür aber Türen zum Hof und oft auch zur Straße. Das tägliche Leben spielt sich zumeist im Hof („patio“) ab. Über die hygienische Einrichtung ist wenig bekannt; die meisten Wohnungen sind wenigstens mit einer kalten Eische ausgerüstet. Man kocht auf Holzkohle, mit Petroleum oder elektrisch (110 Volt Wechselstrom oder 220 Volt Drehstrom); Gas gibt es nicht.

Das Schulwesen

Die kulturellen Verhältnisse haben unter der Führung des früheren Präsidenten Generalissimo Trujillo wesentliche Fortschritte gemacht. Insbesondere wird uns das Schulwesen als recht gut geschildert. In Ciudad Trujillo allein gibt es etwa dreißig Schulen von der teuersten höheren Schule bis zur Aufbauschule; aber auch die Volksschulen sind mit Aufbauklassen bis zum Abiturium versehen. Den Mädchen Schulen sind großzügige Haushaltsschulen zur praktischen Ausbildung angeschlossen. Besonders wird in den Schulen auf die Hygiene der Kinder geachtet. Außer diesen Grundschulen gibt es Fortbildungs- und Handelsschulen und auch eine Universität.

Die geschilderte Struktur der Bevölkerung und der Wirtschaft machen es verständlich, daß für intellektuelle Berufe kein Platz ist. Ausländische Aerzte erhalten kaum jemals die Zulassung zur Praxis. Auch die kaufmännischen Berufe sind für die Bedürfnisse des Landes reichlich übersetzt. Die Eingliederung in den Handel ist dem Einwanderer dadurch besonders erschwert, daß die soziale Lage der Bevölkerung Kreditgewährung auch bei kleinen Beträgen erfordert, so daß schon ein bedeutendes Kapital dazu gehört, um durchhalten zu können. Die wenigen ausländischen Firmen rekrutieren ihre Angestelltenstäbe aus dem Mutterland; sie verlangen neben der notwendigen beruflichen Ausbildung die vollkommene Beherrschung des spanischen und der englischen Sprache. Gelernte Handwerker werden kaum gebraucht. Als Selbständige finden sie die Konkurrenz der billig arbeitenden Neger vor, als Arbeiter die gesetzliche Begrenzung der Ausländer auf 30 v. H. der Belegschaft. Mit ganz besonderen technischen Spezialkenntnissen und gründlicher Sprachkenntnis wird es jedoch in einzelnen Fällen dem Handwerker, dem Techniker, gelegentlich auch dem Kaufmann gelingen können, eine ausreichend bezahlte Stellung zu erhalten.

Kolonisation wird gefördert

Findet der Einwanderer in den städtischen Berufen nur selten Möglichkeit, sich einzulegen, so ist die Regierung auf der anderen Seite bereit, die landwirtschaftliche Ansiedlung zu fördern. In diesem Sinne ist auch die Einwanderungspolitik der Dominikanischen Republik ausgerichtet. Die Gesellschaft gibt dem einwandernden Siedler zur Durchführung seines Vorhabens Land, Baumaterial und Vieh und begünstigt ihn auch sonst. Man muß sich jedoch darüber klar sein, daß landwirtschaftliche Tätigkeit unter den ungewohnten Verhältnissen nur für junge, gesunde und bedürfnislose Menschen möglich ist. Wie Berichte von Siedlern zeigen, ist die Ernährung des Landwirts aus seinem Boden gesichert; nicht leicht wird aber infolge der Absatzverhältnisse die Beschaffung von Mitteln für die übrigen Bedürfnisse, wie Kleidung usw. sein.

AUS DEN GEMEINDEN

BERLIN:

Herbert Israel Seeliger

In diesen Tagen hat der bisherige Generalsekretär der Jüdischen Gemeinde zu Berlin, Herbert Israel Seeliger, seine Auswanderung nach Shanghai angetreten. Seeliger ist im Jahre 1930 in die Verwaltung der Jüdischen Gemeinde zu Berlin eingetreten, in der er sehr rasch zu einer einflussreichen Position gelangte. Ursprünglich in der Beitragsverwaltung beschäftigt, wurde er im Jahre 1936, nach dem Weggang von Walter Breslauer zum Generalsekretär berufen und zugleich mit der Verwaltung des Personaldezernats betraut. Im Jahre 1939 wurde Seeliger in den Vorstand der Jüdischen Gemeinde zu Berlin gewählt.

Herbert Israel Seeliger gehört ungeachtet seiner Jugend zu den Menschen, die sich ein selbständiges Urteil bilden können, er war immer bemüht, in der jüdischen Arbeit sachlich und vorurteilsfrei zu sein. Ihm war es gegeben, Dinge und Menschen mit schnellem Blick zu erkennen und sie in die gehörigen Zusammenhänge einzuordnen. Als Personaldezernent hatte Seeliger eine Angestelltenchaft von etwa 1500 Menschen zu betreuen und gerade dabei bewährten sich seine ausgezeichneten Gaben, seine Klarheit des Blickes und seine absolute Objektivität.

In allen Fragen, die mit der jüdischen Auswanderung zusammenhängen, hat Seeliger die Notwendigkeit einer konstruktiven Lösung begriffen und man konnte auf ihn rechnen, wenn es galt, überzeugend die Argumente darzulegen, die für eine beschleunigte Entwicklung des Auswanderungsproblems sprechen.

Mit großem Bedauern sehen wir einen Mann wie Seeliger aus seiner Tätigkeit scheiden, zumal in einer Zeit, in der es nur schwer möglich ist, in jeder Hinsicht geeignete jüdische Menschen für die Arbeit zu finden. Die Lücke, die durch seine Auswanderung entsteht, wird sich kaum wieder schließen. Seeliger aber wünschen wir, daß es ihm gelingen möge, nicht nur sich selbst eine Existenz aufzubauen, sondern daß er seinen Vorsatz, vielen anderen aus seinem Kreise die Nachwanderung zu erleichtern, in die Wirklichkeit umsetzen kann.

Anlässlich seiner Verabschiedung richtete namens des Gemeindevorstandes und der Gemeindeverwaltung Herr Carl Israel Fuchs an Seeliger herzliche Worte der Anerkennung. Er würdigte die Leistungen und die Persönlichkeit Herbert Israel Seeliger's und

fügte hinzu, daß er das in ihm gesetzte Vertrauen stets gerechtfertigt habe. Seeliger sei immer bestrebt gewesen, Verbesserungen in der Verwaltung durchzuführen. Bei ihm habe man die Gewißheit gehabt, es mit einem Manne zu tun zu haben, dessen Handlungen auf Offenheit und Gerechtigkeit gegründet waren

und der damit alle Voraussetzungen für eine vertrauliche Zusammenarbeit erfüllt habe. Herr Fuchs schloß seine Ansprache mit Worten des Vertrauens. Seeliger habe bewiesen, daß er etwas zu leisten vermöge und Menschen dieser Art werden das Ziel, das sie sich gesteckt haben, immer erreichen.

Dear Doctor:

It is with much concern that I step into your thoughts. Necessity knows no bounds and as a consequence, I must ask your indulgence while I enumerate the reasons for this letter.

I was in the employ of an Omaha Insurance Company and was calling on Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. In 1938 I sold some policies in Clinton Illinois as I did in hundreds of other railroad centers. Some months later I got into trouble thru some applications for insurance and was sentenced to this penitentiary and have been here since last spring. I am now eligible for Clemency but it seems that the sheriff in Clinton Illinois has a hold on me here(Detainer) and I cannot go before the Board as long as that hold is on my record. This sheriff has agreed that he has lost no money but seems to show vindictiveness only in his attitude in maintaining this instrument and I from within these walls, can do nothing to allay his moves. It ~~means~~ means that I shall have to stay here until September 1941 unless I can get someone

to bring some pressure to bear on him. I am a Clevelander as my Father was a Rabbi there until his death in 1920 and am also a veteran of the World war. And you married me in your study in November 1925. I ask this favor of you because I feel that you can help me and I shall be most grateful for your efforts in my behalf in any manner that you can.

Rabbi Cohen of Galveston has promised to help me to get Clemency as soon as this matter in Clinton is taken care of but I cannot, as I previously mentioned, do any good until the hold is lifted.

I am sorry to cause you any inconvenience but I am tired of this place.

In my letter of March 16, I stated ~~that~~ another letter would follow. I could not write sooner due to my illness. I am going to explain to you in detail ~~the~~ ^{the} seven plans, mentioned on page two, article five of ~~the~~ letter in your possession, known as the complete banking system:

--1--

The system shall be known ~~as~~ ^{President} the Federal Guarantee Savings Bank Insurance Company for the sole purpose to secure all the savings depositors' money. And every bank may join as a member of the institution above mentioned.

--2--

That any depositor brings in money for savings, whatever interest may be, whether 4, 5, or 6. One half per cent of each and every dollar shall go for the Federal Insurance plan. The banks shall issue a policy as per above mentioned. That will make the money 100% secure.

--3--

If any member banks fail then the Federal Insurance Company will take complete control and pay out in full to each depositor, if so desired, by presentation of the savings book. I expect, under the new system, banks will never fail. But there is one possible chance that if a city supported by one or two large factories, if they close, then the workers as a rule, leave town and demand their money and that only happens once among a thousand banks.

--4--

Any officer of the bank, anytime they defraud the bank or perjure themselves or violate the rules shall be tried by Federal Court. If found guilty the minimum penalty should be not less than 5 years in the Federal Penitentiary to hard labor without pardon. Or if they take money, from the bank, by fraud, not exceeding \$1,000, the minimum should be 5 years and any additional thousand, a year extra. If the violator refunds in full the money to the bank, he should only serve 5 years and the rest of the term shall be pardoned.

--5--

All loans that the bank may make should require Federal Insurance Policy to guarantee the loan. The loans should be made for single homes or duplex, only. They should pay for the term of the loan \$10. out of each and every \$1,000 to get the policy. Any loans made for commercial purposes, such as factory buildings or finance factories or office buildings or another commercial purpose, the insurance rate should be, for the term of the loan, \$50. on each and every \$1,000. If there are applications for hundred loans on homes, they shall approve 90 loans on single and 10 on duplex. Loans on homes, not exceeding 10 years. Loans on business property not exceeding 20 years or less. No loans should be made on new apartments. See pages 3, 4 & 5.

Dear colleague, dear Dr Silver!

Allow me to send you firstly my reverence, my very very great admiration for your powerful and excellent 2 lectures, especially for the marvelous lecture in the Yearbook of the golden Jubilee of the Centr. Conf. of American Rabbis: "The world Crisis and Jewish Survival." I have not the honour to know you personally, but who is a rabbi in Europe who doesn't know rabbi Dr Silver of Cleveland? And I, I honour you peculiarly as the loved son of the old Mr Silver and his wife in Jerusalem. Your father have celebrated his 79th birthday (I am in the same age) on our Purim festival in the best health my man ! He honoured me with his fine book:
"Go up!"

In this occasion I have a great request to you. I was sustained to leave my congregation in Karlsbad after 50 years of rabbi in this town. Since 1933 I live here in Jerusalem. What I see here in the midst of the rabbis of Geulat Yisrael, that is a very great misery and poverty, and on account of this misery a sharp decay of the spiritual life of Judaism is me. No wonder! Remember the words of our own that the first necessity in the one

of every day is the advance of the days, but when

slavery. In this moment I wrote to him, knowing

I also agree with you about Mr. Rosenbaum. He has been one of those unfortunate "experts" in whom the practical businessmen among our Jewish leaders have put such implicit confidence - almost messianic hopes. And he has been wrong time and again.

We shall probably go to Maine this summer although our plans are not definite. I will know more about it as soon as Virginia makes up her mind.

three weeks ago I wrote to you a letter of which I enclose the copy. So far I had no answer. However , conditions are developing in a rather serious way. In so far that more and more people in Germany are compelled to leave within a short time. Furthermore, in so far that the money wanted per capita is not as my correspondents were writing 100dollars, but two hundred dollars. I received this morning a cable from the Palästina-Amt ,Berlin that I shall deposit this sum at the Swiss Bank here and that they shall send it to Geneva. The case concerns a young lady who got the order to leave immediately. Besides, all of us know that the danger of Italy's entry in the war is imminent and that we are not allowed to wait even for a few days. I am in full despair because you can imagine that I have not the money wanted from me and I will not bear the responsibility that these human lives shall become victims of the Gestapo.

I would be very grateful to you if you would at least let me know whether there is help to be expected from the JDC or another relief institution .

Dear Abba:

I've been wanting to write you since last Wednesday - a week ago to-day - when I heard Klkan address the Hadassah group here. I don't have to tell you how honest a person Klkan is and in all the years that I've known him I've never known him to make a compromise on his sincere beliefs and just convictions. So, imagine my surprise (and delight and I knew you'd be delighted too - my first thought was "I wish Abba could hear this") when I heard him give an impassioned talk on Palestine and Zionism. He came to talk ~~to them~~ on the Welfare fund and it's relation to the various groups in the community. Here the "hadassies" (Elk's name for them) thrilled!

Incidentally, Klkan is a good and forceful speaker. I didn't know that side of him at all. I've heard him give a funny talk, a pep talk, a sales talk and I knew he was good on his feet but I dreaded going to hear him when he was the guest speaker. When I got here and listened to the women rave about his oratory, I determined that he'd never know, if in the most private recess of my mind I'd find him lacking. An organization invited me to accompany Elk and to sit at the speakers table. I had nervous indigestion for days previous to it, but how I relaxed after the first ten minutes! - and later on, after we left the admiring throngs, Elk appreciated my "Pop you were o.k." He laughed at my fears but I think he was a bit nervous too, he wanted my approval.

We've passed our sixth month in Milwaukee and I can't begin to tell you how happy we all are, Klkan, the children and I. The community

welcomed us most cordially and it is really remarkable to see how much affection, admiration, cooperation and respect Elkan has won in so short a time. He's doing a swell job and we both wantt you to know that to you and to you alone thanks must go. You backed the right horse Abba and your satisfaction out of that would be a human reaction, BUT from the personal side, I know all of this will make you and Virginia happy. The only fly in the ointment is that the compensation is small, a thousand out of six for the college girl makes good management a necessity and I'm tryingto excel. That too will adjust itself in time. The important thing is that we're happy, we're busy, we like the community and the community likes us.

We were thrilled when Esther phoned us on Sunday and told us she was going to you for second Seder. She's completely on her own and really uses good judgment. We hope you and Virginia find she is as nice a girl as we think she is.

Elkan and the girls join me in affectionate regards to you, Virginia and the boys.



In his second letter he writes that we should not send him any money but he would like us to help him get a position with the JDC. He will be perfectly willing to do everything that is in him so they will be satisfied with him. He is a man capable to do literary work and any other work in that capacity. For eight years, he was co-worker of the Polish Daily at Warsaw and was all his life an active worker for the Zionist Organization.
