At the Special Meeting of Stockholders of United Aircraft Corporation, held on December 30, 1941, the stockholders authorized the amendment of its Certificate of Incorporation so as to provide, among other things, for the creation of 265,669 shares of Preferred Stock, of the par value of \$100, each. Attention is especially called, however, to the provision that, in subscribing for whole shares of stock upon fractional warrants, the form of subscription upon only one of the surrendered warrants need be signed.

Certificates for shares of the Preferred Stock will be delivered as soon as practicable after January 13, 1942.

Subscription rights evidenced by full warrants may be transferred by executing the form of assignment indorsed thereon and delivering the warrants so assigned. Subscription rights evidenced by fractional warrants may be transferred by delivery, without written assignment. The Federal stock transfer tax is payable on any transfer of a warrant, at the rate of 5¢ for each share of Preferred Stock to which such warrant entitles the holder to subscribe; and appropriate stock transfer tax stamps should be attached thereto, and cancelled, when a warrant is transferred.

Stockholders are reminded that their rights to subscribe may be valuable and, if not exercised, should be sold, so as to avoid loss, and that the privilege of subscribing will expire and the warrants will be of no value after 3 o'clock, P. M., on January 13, 1942. Purchases or sales of whole or fractional warrants cannot be made through the City Bank Farmers Trust Company, but should be effected through brokerage houses or banking institutions.

My dear Mr. Baker:

Please pardon the long delay in answering your letter. I have been away from the city a good deal of the time and my correspondence has lagged.

In reply to your inquiries permit me to say that the ritual of the Prayer Book draws only upon the Old Testament and the works of later Jewish liturgists, poets and rabbis. Only the Old Testament is recognized as the authoritative Scriptures by Judaism. Every congregation is autonomous. We have nothing corresponding to the bishop or any hierarchy. Our congregations may join voluntarily regional or national conferences such as the Union of American Hebrew Congregations or the Synagogue Council of America, but these bodies are purely for mutual consultation. They have no authority over the individual congregation.

We have three main groups within Judaism in the United States -- the Orthodox, the Conservative, and the Reform or Liberal.

Mr. Levy has shown me your letter in which you state "I also would like you to please convey to Rabbi Silver my sincere and humble apologies for encroaching upon his personal right to express his opinion". I am very grateful to you for writing as you did, but really, I did not resent your criticism. Every American citizen has the right to express himself. I claim that right for myself, and I certainly concede it to my neighbor. I also know that in the heat of a bitterly contested national election, men are given to express their opinions and preferences with a certain amount of vehemence. Thoughtful men, and those who have a sense of humor, discount much of it.

What men should not do is to punish an institution because the man at the head of it has expressed himself in opposition to their views. This might endanger the freedom of the pulpit and the effectiveness of its leadership.

OUR TEN COMMANDMENTS

THE BILL OF RIGHTS

Condensed by Ernst Altshul

Copyrighted 1942

I.

Congress shall make no law to bar free speech - or press -
Or creed, - or peaceful gatherings to seek redress.

II.

Establish a Militia for the safety of the state;
The people's right to carry arms no one shall violate.

III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, become a resident
Of any home, - unless by law, or owner's free consent.

IV.

No one shall search a person, his home or his effects,
Without a sworn-to warrant, when a good cause he suspects.

V.

No person charged with serious crime shall before a court be cited
Unless he were (in time of peace,) by a grand jury indicted.

VI.

One, so accused, has rights to have a counsel for defense,
Trial by jury of his peers, and to hear all evidence.

VII.

In common law, where more than twenty dollars are at stake
A trial jury's verdict no other court shall break.

VIII.

Excessive bail and heavy fines this statute shall prevent,
Neither permit unusual or cruel punishment.

IX.

By granting Constitution's rights, therein enumerated,
Present rights shall not be denied, nor yet depreciated.

X.

Powers which the Constitution neither bars nor delegates
Are reserved to all the people or to their respective states.

The reading of the "Bill of Rights" in our Temple Bulletin, so little taught by our teachers of children between the ages of, say, 9 - 14, gave me the idea that it could be made more palatable to those children if put in verse and condensed in a way to be easily memorized.

Would you be so kind as to express your candid opinion on this project?

Of course they are only what we used to term "Schnittelverse" but one cannot expect real poetry on a subject which would seem dry and insipid to the average child if they were to commit it to memory.

Do you think that the public schools might be interested in it? Your opinion as an eminent educator may prompt me to offer it^{then}; As I have no ulterior motives in the matter, writing of mediocre verse being my "Zeitvertreib" in my sleepless nights and miserable days, I have gone even to the expense of having this copyrighted and printed, thinking it a more worth-while subject than some of the Jewish "Christmas cards" bearing with the names of the senders.

I will greatly appreciate your true criticism before I shall decide to subject it to the opinion of others who are connected with public schools, or else give newspaper publicity.





Your letter to Mr. S. D. Schwartz, concerning our little talk when you had dinner at his house before your lecture, has been brought to my attention.

It really seems peculiar that the Rabbis are entirely united against this article, for it is the first time I have seen them united and the laymen are practically united in favor of the article. Will you kindly read the enclosed copies of letters written by one of the members of Dr. Mann's congregation to Dr. Goldman and to Stephen Wise. You can keep them if you desire.

Personally, it seems to me a question of what is good for the Jews, or what is good for Judaism. Judge Frank's article takes care of the first part, and you are looking after the second part. If this is not so, I would like a short note from you concerning your views. Dr. Mann had a sermon against the article a week ago in which I believe that much of Judge Frank's stuff was distorted. I am not accusing Dr. Mann of this, but simply believe that the Rabbis take a different viewpoint from that of Judge Frank.

Dear Doctor Goldman:

I have just read with a mixture of interest and chagrin your vicious tirade against the monumental exegesis on American Judaism by Jerome Frank, and wonder if you realize the destructive effect of such sophistry upon the cause of the Jew. At no time in your article do you resort to the fundamental process of reasoning, but rely on your irrelevant verbosity to befuddle your readers and thus stir their emotions without making the slightest appeal to their reason. In the same vein as all self-anointed Messiahs you arrogate to yourself the divine mission of shedding tears over the nonconformity of those millions of American Jews whose true feelings Judge Frank so ably elucidates. Your basic error has always been that you presume to classify the Jew as a separate and distinct national entity, which alone is enough to alienate the vast majority of Jews from the cause of Zionism. The only appeal which Palestine has had for most of us who have made material contributions to its upbuilding has been our desire to relieve suffering, and we have done so in spite of our aversion for Jewish Nationalism rather than because of it. Only the bombastic drumbeating of the fanatic Zionist will eventually destroy that feeling of compassion, and alienate those magnanimous souls.

Your notions about "loyalty to our homeland" are based upon a false premise that the Jew is a member of a separate and distinct nationality. No Jew of my acquaintance, except the few fanatics, is willing to subscribe to such an absurdity. No amount of emotionalism can possibly convince a rational being that Judaism is anything but a religion, and is analogous only to other religions and not nationalities. To what homeland, gray, does the Christian, or Mohamedan, or Buddhist or heathen owe his allegiance? There is a very definite sect of Negro Jews in North Africa, and one of Mongolian Jews in China. Would you have us believe that all these are part of one nationality or race?

In all sincerity, it is my humble conviction that your irrational emotionalism is destroying the very noble motives which many American Jews have cherished in their material support of a refuge in Palestine, and I for one shall refuse henceforth to contribute one penny to that noble cause until chauvinistic nationalism is completely eliminated.

In conclusion let me add that you could have rendered the American Jew a much greater service by reprinting Judge Frank's article, written in simple Anglo-Saxon, than by attempting to arouse your readers by Hitlerian vituperation, clothed in alien English which most of your readers don't understand anyway. Of course, emotional Jews are deeply impressed by expensive verbosity and confused phraseology, which Emil Hirsch aptly called "Fine Langwitzch."

Dear Doctor Wise:

In reply to your recent request for my renewal to Opinion, I deeply regret my inability to continue to support your paper for the same reason that millions of American Jews refuse to subscribe to a form of propaganda which is distasteful to them. I have read your paper for a number of years and am sorry to find that your columns are controlled as rigidly as those of your totalitarian friends and foes abroad. No contributor is ever permitted to express himself contrary to your pet theories on Jewish nationalism and Jewish "self-defense", and yet you are no doubt a staunch champion of the "Freedom of the Press." It is my conviction that in a democracy, in order to achieve unity, we must invite all contrary opinions to be freely expressed on controversial subjects, so as to enable every reader to judge the merits of a cause independently. Unfortunately, "We the People" are the victims of an intellectual oligarchy which arrogates to itself the divine right of doing our thinking for us. You probably agree with Hitler that "the people are all swine" and incapable of thinking.

In spite of this inhibition, I have the audacity to register my aversion for Jewish Nationalism, the promulgation of which will continue to exacerbate the status of the Jews in America. Why isn't it reasonable to promote a place of refuge for the Jew without demanding political sovereignty? What chance would a Jewish State have in this maelstrom of international hatreds, intrigue and aggression? Furthermore, what possible chance of success is there for a Jewish political entity, when even the self-chosen "leaders" of Zionism are ever wrangling among themselves like alley cats?

As for Jewish self-defense in America, I also feel that our organized activities are childish and quite futile. We are trying to cram a barrage of propaganda down the unwilling throats of an inimical Gentile population which has been nurtured on hatred of the Jew for thousands of years. Why not direct our activities toward our own people and teach them the error of their ways? If I have your eloquence and influence, I should devote myself to the task of enlightening the Jew on the serious dangers of his active or passive espousal of communism. In order to fight Hitler we needn't have holy communion with the bloody tyrant of the Kremlin, who is beyond doubt the direct cause of Hitlerism and all the present chaos. Never have I seen an article or editorial in

your columns dwelling on this danger, and yet every thinking man must know that the enormous growth of antisemitism here in the recent past is due to the Gentile conviction that the Jew is a communist and a traitor to his country. This land has grown rich and powerful thru the stimulus of private enterprise and individual initiative, and when a hated minority openly allies itself with any subversive forces, it must not complain when its traducers grow ever more militant.

I know that if you have been patient enough to read thus far you have already set me down as a traitor to Judaism, but, honestly, if my small voice crying from the wilderness can arouse the slightest inclination in you to open your columns to a free discussion of these burning Jewish problems, then I am sure the fate of the American Jew will take a definite turn for the better, and the circulation of your paper will grow by leaps and bounds.

In conclusion let me add that by far the harshest irritant to the vast majority of American Jews is the pernicious habit of a few vociferous demagogues purporting to speak for all of them, when there is not the slightest evidence that they really represent the sentiments of even a fair minority. That is the definite pattern of every totalitarian dictatorship, and can only have the most destructive effect upon the helpless and inarticulate masses.



Dear Sir:

Since I do not know exactly what organization headquarters to address this to, I am appealing to you.

My husband is a Greek Macedonian, the only member of his family in this country, and we have received no news from his home since the German invasion. Since conditions are so severe there that starvation is expected for so many this winter, we feel compelled to offer our home as a refuge for at least one, if such an evacuee could be obtained, and brought to this country. We are comfortable enough to be able to feed, clothe, and educate, but do not have a large enough reserve to pay the cost of transportation, or entry fees, if such exist under present conditions, into the United States.

The family lived in Salonika, and in the village of Lethe, or Livata, just outside the city. I would be particularly interested in receiving his mother, if she is still alive, which I doubt. Her name is Styra Grammisi, widow of Anastas Grammisi, and lived in the village, but might possibly be in the city, if alive now. Other members of the family were Angelo, Mary, who married George Pappas, Vasil, and Nickoforo. All were married, all had children. I would be more than glad to take all if that were possible, but if is not, so I can take but one or two and then I would leave to the discretion of whomsoever investigated and made arrangements. If no members of the family can be located, there is a cousin named Daphne, whose last name I do not know, but she lived in Lethe which is very small.

Since some description of our circumstances may be necessary they are as follows: there are four in our family, my husband, 45, myself, 34, a son 13, a daughter 10. We live in a six room upper of a two family home. We own our own business, a farter shop, which clears about \$35 weekly, and I am employed also, earning \$15. We have no bank by about \$400. in savings against illness, operations or sudden need. I think that we could promise that any vacue we might receive would be reasonably cared for, and not become public charges unless conditions in this country change radically.



Dear Rabbi:

As always, it was a pleasure on my part also to see you and talk with you the other evening. Incidentally, your talk was up to your usual high standards. In fact, I was again thrilled by it and the consensus of opinion amongst those who discussed it with me was that not only was your talk apropos, but brilliantly so. However, who am I to attempt to gild the lily?

No doubt it appears strange that I did not quickly contribute toward paying off the Temple mortgage. It is not entirely reluctance because of financial reasons. It is due, frankly, to a feeling that the business end of the Temple has become so commercial and has aroused such reactions because of a hard boiled attitude on the part of Mr. Levy or your office, that it has tended to cause a feeling of resentment and a depreciation of the spiritual quality with which I prefer to associate the Temple.

To be specific, in the case of Mother Haber, she feels terribly let down by the way she has been treated in connection with holiday tickets. I was told of other cases where the attitude has been so peremptory and so super-businesslike that I just can't connect this with religion.

I realize that you have a fixed financial problem, but I realize, also, that the Temple is becoming such big business that it threatens to overshadow the religious end.

I don't know how aware you are of this growing feeling amongst a great number of people. My criticism is that your office could handle these situations much more tactfully and in a much less hardboiled manner.

Not being a heavy contributor, I suppose I have no right to talk this way but it is not said in a spirit of criticism only. I am trying to tell you the truth even though it is bound to arouse some resentment against me. That is the reason I have not contributed to the Temple mortgage, outside of the fact that right now the demands from all sides are terrific and enlarging.



Dear Dr. Silver:

It was very gratifying for me to hear from Mr. Dickenstein of your interest in his work in this country for the past three years. His success in raising over \$550,000, in the form of investments in the Workers' Bank and in long term loans for Shikun during the past three years, shows how difficult it is even for good Zionists to appraise the interest of many American Jews in Palestine.

I have kept in close touch with his activities, and it is interesting that a considerable sum of money was obtained from non-Zionists. While these gentlemen were not interested in the ideological approach to Zionism, they showed a keen interest in the economic and industrial development of Palestine.

Mr. Dickenstein's activities were not reduced merely to the process of selling shares, but were primarily educational in nature. Each investor obtained a clear conception of the realities of Palestine and its potentialities.

It is my personal opinion that these investment activities in no way interfere with the Welfare Fund drives. Thus, for example, in our own city of Chicago (the city which is the ^{DA/6 '38 & '39} center of Anti-Zionism), we have induced non-Zionists to make investments in the Workers' Bank. As a result of arousing their interest, even in 1940 and 1941, and familiarizing them with the realities of Palestine, they became more interested in Jewish life generally, and finally we have induced them to become captains of their respective industries in the Welfare Fund drive. As a matter of fact, one of these gentlemen has increased his contribution to the Welfare Fund in view of the fact that we brought him closer to Jewish problems, by making him first an investor in Palestine. One of these gentlemen, Dr. Max Woldenberg, is now the head of the Chemical Division, and another, Mr. Isadore Katz, is head of the Produce Division.

I am mentioning these facts to prove my contention that an interest in Palestine from the investment standpoint,

February 7, 1942

strengthens the confidence of Jews in Palestine and increases their contributions to Palestine. They think of the contribution, psychologically, as an insurance for their investment, and indirectly it also deepens their loyalty to the Jewish community as a whole. I made a study of some of the investors in the Workers' Bank in Chicago, and I found that none of them have decreased their contributions to the Welfare Fund even in the critical year of 1942.

It is in these difficult days, in the most critical hour of our people, that we are endeavoring to establish an investment instrumentality, under the name of Ampal, American Palestine Trading Corporation, I know it requires courage to launch such a project in these days. We are making a small scale experiment to obtain \$100,000. If this will be successful, we may enlarge our experiment to the extent of a million dollars.

We are very cautious and careful in our transactions. Our object is to advance money to public and semi-public institutions, controlled either by the Histadruth or the Jewish Agency, by assisting them in their agricultural and industrial expansion. I know that \$100,000 will not solve the problem, but I feel that it is a worth while experiment to make.

The work was started a few weeks ago and it is my understanding that Mr. Dickenstein already sold \$60,000 worth of shares. The company is now in the process of formation. We have to iron out some minor difficulties, and we are endeavoring to proceed as cautiously as possible, feeling the responsibility we have towards the investors as well as towards the good name of Palestine. The people who are interested in this project do not look for profits or personal aggrandizement. Our objective is "Palestine".

I would like to have the privilege of discussing this matter with you and getting your views. It is not our intention by any means to hurt the Palestine fund-raising institutions. We feel, on the contrary, that such an institution will strengthen the fund-raising activities; it may supplement them.

Please write me and I will be glad, at any time convenient to you, to take a 'plane to Cincinnati and discuss this project with you in greater detail.



First of all, I learned from a confidential source that he had made application to the Division of Aid for the Aged for a pension, and that is why I sent for him. I then found out that Jimmie was employed by the Commodore Hotel at a salary of \$75.00 per month and that he regards the job as temporary, although he has been there for several weeks. I explained that the financial position of the Temple was not improving and that it was the feeling of the members of the Finance Committee that his pension be discontinued.


In view of his belief that his present job was temporary, I offered to aid him in getting steady employment and contacted a concern that I represent, with whose head Jimmie has already had an interview. I am informed that they will shortly either employ him or place him elsewhere. In any event, he will have a job as long as he applies himself.

Under all of the circumstances, I felt that he should not expect The Temple to continue his pension and apparently Jimmie agreed with me when I explained this to him.

Therefore, I suggest that he be advised that inasmuch as he now has an income and will likely soon have a permanent position, he is not in any economic danger, especially since his income exceeds that which The Temple had previously paid him.
