My dear teacher and friend -

In the first anniversary of my entry into the armed forces of the United States as a chaplain, I can't help but think of my training at the temple as a boy. Under the influence of my teachers there, and with the inspiration I received from you as rabbi of the congregation, I became a rabbi in Israel. Today with many of our colleagues I am in uniform serving men of Jewish faith

in the army.

I am deeply indebted to the Temple not only for the education I received, but for the scholarship which enabled me to attend the Hebrew Union College. The only way I can repay my debt to the Temple is by becoming a fine rabbi. However, through the Finance office of our post I am sending to the Armed Services Fund of the Temple a small donation. That fund has not only helped our men and women in the services - but also has helped me personally. To me it has seemed that the fund and the spirit creating it are a

Dear Dr. Silver:

Dr. Wischnitzer met you some time ago in Cleveland, and since that time it has been my wish to tell you something about the work I am doing.

My study on the paintings of the Dura synagogue is almost completed. Needless to say that your volume on "Messianic Speculation" was very helpful, particularly because of the chronological arrangement of the material. There is no doubt that the Dura scenes form a coherent ensemble in spite of all Rostovtzeff and others have said. Also there is no doubt that the leading idea is messianic.

I have been able to interpret all of the unidentified subjects and to find out the relationship of the scenes which at first sight appear disconcertingly disconnected.

The problem now arises, how to bring out the book or rather how to obtain the funds necessary for the purpose.

A publisher like Brentano's Co. would probably not undertake the publication at their own risks.

Would you care to put us in touch with them and would it be possible for you to interest some people you know and who have confidence in your judgment?

The manuscript is about 80-90 typewritten pages long with an additional 70 pages of plates.

I should be very glad to show you the material and discuss it with you at your early convenience.

Could I see you on your next trip to New York?



As a former Coal Miner + at present
an employee of the Lincoln Electric Company,
I applaud what you had to say in your sermon-
Lecture, "Taking Stock of '43 - Retrospect + Prospect."
And I am glad that there is one liberal in
Cleveland who has the intelligence + the back-







Dear Rabbi.

Jan 13th

We have again come west on a health search. I went through a sinus operation in November; the doctors thought that this might be at the bottom of my asthmatic trouble, and that several months in a dry warm climate would be helpful. So here we are in Tucson, where it's so dry that the editorial in this morning's paper is calling for rain; and while it doesn't get really hot here for another 4 or 5 weeks, it was 58° max. here yesterday, against 23° top in Cleveland.

While living quarters here are difficult to find, we were lucky to find a small home, in which the owner, a very genteel widow, continues to occupy her room, and we have the rest of the place. Our youngest daughter, Marion, has been at the University here since September, and is very enthusiastic about it. She lives on campus, and we see her two or three times a week. I feel that I have been making progress here, slowly, as it hasn't been quite warm enough to sit out in the sun regularly, as it will be before long. We expect to remain here until May, 2^d, except for a few short



Mayer Sitting This One Out

Special Correspondence

CHICAGO, Jan. 15. — Milton S. Mayer, author of an anti-Semitic article in the *Saturday Evening Post* two years ago and an anti-war article entitled *I Think I'll Sit This One Out* in 1939, has informed his draft board he is willing to sit out this war in the penitentiary rather than be drafted into the U. S. armed forces.

Mayer revealed today that he has asked exemption from Selective Service on the grounds that he is personally opposed to the present war and would rather not become involved.

Mayer is a public relations man for prewar isolationist Robert Hutchins, president of the University of Chicago. Two months ago, Draft Board 9 here classified him 1-A and he appealed. He has not yet heard from the appeal.





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

Dear Rabbai Silver;

I was indeed sorry not to have been able to say goodbye to you before I left for the Navy. You were out of the city. However, I spoke with Rabbai Harris and he took my name for The People records.

Today I attended services for the first time and thought you might be interested in what took place. I am enclosing the printed service, autographed by Rabbai Julius Mark, of Nashville, Tenn., our Chaplain.

A ten man choir accompanied by a piano sang in the same manner as our own choir. There was no soprano; however I personally believe an all male choir to be more impressive than a mixed one. We all wore our hats during services.

It may be interesting to you to know that of all the men at Great Lakes (it is the largest Naval camp in the country) there are approximately 100 Jews. Of course my information may not be accurate but I do know that in my company I represent 50% of all the Jews. There is one other Jew in my company which totals 140 men.

The Jewish Welfare Board distributes various items to us such as Mezuzahs, Jewish calendars and abridged prayer books.

Both of my children, Joan and Gail, attend your Sunday school and I would deeply appreciate your contacting them and help their moral since I am sure that they are not accustomed to getting along without me. I have never been away from home for as long a time as I will be now.

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

I am enclosing a clipping of the New York Tribune of February 9, 1944, with reference to the resolution unanimously adopted by the City Council in connection with the White Paper.

There are three items with relation to this action that I should like to call to your attention.

First: The recorded official position taken by the legislative body of the principal American city should have considerable effect politically, and upon public opinion generally.

Secondly, and perhaps most interesting, the resolution was seconded by Stanley M. Isaacs, not heretofore known as a friend of our cause, and who, in fact, has frequently been seen and heard in the company of Lessing Rosenwald. Mr. Isaacs, being an office-holder and possibly seeking reelection and political advancement, may be presumed to know which way the votes fly. It is indication that whatever a politician's private affiliations may be, his public acts vis-a-vis the voters, are best indications of the strength of the Zionist movement in this country.

Lastly, and least important is the fact, gratifying to me personally, that Councilman Vogel, who introduced this resolution and spoke so eloquently in its support, comes from the Coney Island section of Brooklyn, and calls himself one of my Zionist pupils whose Zionist activities have been and are largely influenced and guided by me. Mr. Vogel has been of great assistance to me and my associates in the activities for the Magen David Adom, the Order Sons of Zion and the Jewish National Fund.

May I suggest that you write a few words of commendation to Mr. Vogel. I am sure that he will appreciate hearing from you and that he will be strengthened and encouraged in his further endeavors on behalf of our movement.

Adjectives generally reserved for the Axis were applied in provision yesterday to Great Britain by Councilman Edward Vogel, in asking the City Council's support for his resolution memorializing the New York Congressional delegation to use its influence to keep Palestine a haven for Jewish refugees.

Before the Council adopted the resolution unanimously, Mr. Vogel cited British commitments given after the last war to maintain a Jewish homeland in Palestine. Then he described the British White Paper suspending Jewish immigration to Palestine as a "cruel, inhuman, uncivilized act." The White Paper is "dastardly and cruel," Mr. Vogel said, because there is no other refuge for European Jews except the haven provided by Palestine.

The resolution asks New York City Congressmen to petition Secretary of State Cordell Hull "to make representation to the British government that the United States confidently expects Great Britain in the interests of humanity, tolerance and justice and the observance of international covenants to complete the establishment of a Jewish homeland in Palestine and, to that end, immigration be continued without interruption and the White Paper be abrogated."

Councilman Stanley M. Isaacs, Manhattan independent Republican, in seconding the resolution, chided Mr. Vogel for "language far more critical than I intended," and declared that the British people, during the present war, "have risen to the greatest heights of any people in history."

He told the council that Prime Minister Churchill, as a member of Parliament, had denounced abrogation of British commitments in Palestine, and declared "it is now fitting to ask him to

Further reference is made to your letter of February 7th requesting refund on unused ticket #7451 upper 5 Columbus to Washington for use February 1st and ticket #1504 for bedroom B from New York to Columbus for use January 31st.





Dear Rabbi Silver,

Congratulations for your great achievement for which all Jewish people must be grateful and heartened.

From broadcasts of news commentators tonight, particularly Norman Jay's open letter to Senator Wagner (W.M.C.A.) it seems to me that increased attention at long last, which you have so highlighted is being focussed upon the cause of the Jewish people. I heard Dr. E. M. Birkhead speak unequivocally on the subject last Sunday.

If I may include some comments about myself in this letter. I am trying to believe with due reason that the Museum will not throw me out because I am bespeaking attention to action not that takes into account the momentous events (and how they may shape) of

the present time.

In the Museum library there is a large volume - two feet in one dimension and more than two feet in the other - of sketches of Palestine by David Roberts. 

Dear Dr. Silver, -

I am greatly encouraged by Your favorable opinion on the proposal on a Palestine yearbook expressed in Your letter of March 14.

While it is up to You to decide what the Emergency Council shall do or not do, I do not see any other chance for the successful realization of the above plan. The Zionist Organization alone could hardly insure a sufficient circulation for a Palestine Yearbook, and it is very improbable that the other wings of the Zionist Movement would help in promoting an edition for which they would get no credit. Still ~~no~~ less probable is a special arrangement on such a project among the component parts of the Emergency Council. Thus, although I found a very great interest on the part of the Bloch Publishing Company, which seems to be most suited for taking over the circulation of the Yearbook, I arrive at the conclusion that unless some new development takes place, the idea must be dropped for the time being.

I cannot resist the temptation to say, without any direct connection with the Yearbook project, a few words concerning Your remark on the ad hoc character of the Emergency Council. On the first hand, I do not believe that the Emergency Council, especially since its reorganization under Your leadership was able to adhere in all cases to this conception (which is theoretically correct). But even ignoring certain arrangements which point to permanency rather than to emergency, I have reasons to believe that the Zionist membership in this country (and this applies to all "denominations") is ready to welcome unity on a more organic and permanent basis. The use of "Emergency", as a slogan becomes ineffective when continued for several years. What is now needed is a kind of a Supreme Zionist Council based on a definite modus of democratic representation. Such a permanent council would be more fit for the constructive tasks which must be prepared NOW in connection with the approaching end of the War.

Since a year, for instance, I have been trying on several occasions to convey to Zionist minds the necessity of beginning now the legal and propaganda work for a National Loan to obtain the large means which will be needed to conduct a post-war mass immigration to Palestine. But our "wings" consider this task as belonging to the Emergency Council, and it is not on the other hand recognized as an "Emergency" because it did not yet hit us on the nose. Thus we are helplessly ^{approaching} a situation which will be more fatal to our cause than any defeats sustained on the political field.



I am hesitant to intrude at this time when so many serious problems require your attention. I feel, nevertheless, that you would wish to be consulted on this subject. It concerns contributions by Cleveland Jews to Flou Stone Mather College.

This is the 50th anniversary of the college and the alumnae are conducting a campaign to raise \$50,000 for a dormitory to be built after the war. The opening of the drive was arranged to coincide with the 4th War Loan, and alumnae were asked to give bonds. The Trustees of the University have pledged to match (up to \$50,000) the sum raised by the alumnae.

Now, a special gifts committee has been formed to extend the appeal to non-alumnae. The plan calls for



solicitation by mail: a form letter accompanied by a personal note by the solicitor. As a member of this committee, I was asked to submit names of Jewish prospects.

Since I believe that you consider contributions to the University one of the responsibilities of the Jewish community, I wonder if you would have time to discuss with me, the proper approach. I should like

"The net result of the Hurley-Marshall-Stimson maneuvers will probably be to KILL THE RESOLUTION REGARDING PALESTINE. Senator Taft is reported to be somewhat irked, because he took great pains to ASCERTAIN IN ADVANCE that the RESOLUTION WOULD MEET NO ADMINISTRATION OBJECTION.

"In Congress there is a strong feeling that, insomuch as the bars against Jewish Refugees have been let down in this and many other countries,

HOMELESS JEWS SHOULD NOT BE BARRED from their Original Home (Palestine) especially in view of the money they have poured into it for irrigation and reclamation projects. These projects probably have made it possible for Palestine to SUPPORT AROUND 4,000,000 PEOPLE, yet there are only 600,000 Jews in Palestine today.

"Furthermore, the Jewish Refugee Committee, of which Secretary Hull is Chairman, has recommended that, because of difficult transportation, Jews in Europe be sent to Mediterranean areas (the Holy Land of Israel) rather than across the Atlantic.

"All this has aroused a strong feeling in congress that the original Woodrow Wilson-Arthur Balfour DECLARATION (dated November 2, 1917) favoring Palestine as a NATIONAL HOME for the Jews MUST BE KEPT ALIVE at least to the point of leaving Palestine OPEN TO JEWISH IMMIGRATION, DESPITE BRITISH DECLARATION to the contrary." This means the White Paper of May 17, 1939 to be made effective April 1, 1944, to the ETERNAL SHAME OF GREAT BRITAIN. ←

Dear Mr. President:

This is a resolution which is being tendered to you through an average citizen of this, our Republic. Yes, Mr. President, this is a resolution, of three million souls, who have gone to the haven of peace as martyrs of liberty and freedom. They are the three million human beings, which form the first line of democracy's defense and were the first victims of the heinous plans of dictatorship, torture, murdered, and slaughtered on the altar of freedom. They were the first line of that defense which very few recognized and which many today are attempting to minimize. It is in their names that I, a citizen of our Republic, present to you their resolution signed with their invisible fingers in blood, sweat, and tears, requesting of you, who today, is the only leading statesman, mothered and cradled in the precepts of liberty, justice, freedom and equality, to in some measure, recognize the sacrifice which they have made without fanfare, without banners, and without eulogy.

The Palestine (?) resolution with regard to the White Paper which is now pending in the U. S. Congress is a true explanation of the ideals for which mankind is giving its life, wealth, and sacrifice. I implore you, as a man of justice, to use your good office with respect to this resolution so that it may not be said that America, the cradle of liberty, has refused that same right of heritage and liberty to others less fortunate. Is it not true, Mr. President, that our cherished liberty bell bears the inscription, "proclaim liberty throughout the land and to all inhabitants thereof." It is your privilege today, Mr. President, to put these words of the scripture to effective use and prove to the world that America, the cradle of liberty today, is cognizant of the weariness of other peoples and shall assist them in building a cradle of their own within which they may rest their weary bodies and work, learn, and teach. As they have done once before, give them again the opportunity of helping the world build another foundation upon which we may build a healthy home for all mankind wherein man will live as the sages of old have prophesied, each man the others brother, each nation, the others assistant, every man a being of dignity and respect.

There are about five million souls left, Mr. President, on the face of the European continent who are sworn enemies of dictatorship and facism and because of such convictions, they are doomed to extermination. In the name of the King of this universe, they beg of you to intercede for them for there is none other ~~but~~ for them to appeal to.

With humility I personally ask your forgiveness and pardon for this lengthy letter ~~and introduction~~ or shall we call it this lengthy resolution of the dead? I do humbly and respectfully submit same to you with the supreme knowledge and assurance that you will give it your kind consideration if it will only be permitted to reach your attention, for your principals of justice, truth, and righteousness can only move you to act favorably as a representative of this martyred army of democracy of three million souls.

The news of the resignation of Rabbi Melbourne Harris, which I read in the Temple Bulletin, came as a great surprise to me. I cannot imagine what field of endeavor he has chosen, but I am sure it could hardly be as spiritually rewarding as being associated with you in so great an institution as the Temple.

A month or so ago, I wrote you concerning the pulpit in Akron and Rabbi Alexander's retirement, and asked that you be so good as to use your influence in my behalf. As I stated, I feel I have carried my congregation to as full a development as it can achieve in a community of this size, its membership more than doubled during the four years of my incumbency. My work had been similar in Decatur, Ill. which I held for four years following my ordination, as you will recall. Not having heard from you with regard to Akron, I am taking the liberty of writing you again anent the vacancy at The Temple.

While I had never considered very seriously any assistantship since I was located in Decatur, an assistantship or an associateship to you, my Rabbi since I was six years old in the First Grade at the old 55th St. Temple, could only be a true discipleship. What, may I ask, are the plans of your board for a successor to Rabbi Harris? I feel certain that I could fill the post with the fullest satisfaction to yourself and the Temple, should my rabbinical record meet with your approval and recommendation. I could be available, if need be, by June 1.

To be associated again with The Temple would be coming home after an absence of 15 years. It would, I am sure, be revitalizing to my mother to be back among her friends and relatives again.

May I discuss this matter with you personally? I shall be in Cleveland Saturday morning on my way to New York for a JWB meeting Monday afternoon. Warmest personal regards to you and family, in which Mother joins me,
