I cannot reconcile myself to many things now going on, but the draft of the eighteen year olds was the bitterest dose I have had to take, since the war began.

I have steadily written against war, but at the moment, one dares not be too outspoken. The editors simply can't run the stuff. However, it gladdens me to know that a citizen has the courage and ability to put into writing and send to the War Department letters like yours. I agree with all you say-- and one hundred percent. If you follow my column you know that we're on the same side in this.



Dear Rabbi Silver:

This society has for its principal objective the publication of the Biblical Encyclopedia Torah Shelemah, of which Rabbi M. M. Kasher is the Editor.

We are endeavoring to free Rabbi Kasher, brilliant author-editor, of all financial burdens which his work entails. We wish to enable him to devote his time and genius exclusively to the actual preparation of the material for the Encyclopedia. I am told by Rabbi Kasher that you were kind enough to assure him of your help in this undertaking and I am therefore writing to ask you to extend your assistance which is so urgently needed. Our plan now is to publish each year about one thousand of the remaining seven thousand pages. This, of course, will entail extended research by scholars who are cooperating with Rabbi Kasher, and will also involve printing and other expense. The total outlay will be approximately Forty thousand dollars annually. To achieve even this limited objective, it will be necessary to obtain the financial and moral support of all of our old friends. For your information, I may add that the tenth volume is now in press.




My dear Rabbi Silver:



My Dear Rabbi Silver,

I can't resist the impulse to convey to you the following report. I am in receipt of a press release from the Eighth Air Force in England that my son, Lt. Alvin, a bombardier on a B.17, was awarded the Air Medal "for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight". I know of no finer gift that I could receive at this festival of Purim.

Alvin is your boy too. You doubtless recall him and his brother Robert at the pulpit last October during the harvest festival, assisting you with the Torah.

Alvin evidently possessed an unusual talent in precision skill. After his first missions in December he was withdrawn from his regular crew and assigned to the 385th Bombardment squadron. This is a veteran group that holds the Presidential citation for shuttle bombing late in 1943. He was assigned to a lead B 17. And it was while serving in that capacity that he directed the bombing of some very important targets over Germany. Photographs revealed the success of the mission and the award was the consequence. He wrote nothing about this in his letters which we have received two and three times a week. The information came to us in the official release.

You will pardon my natural pride in his achievement. But I know how deeply interested you are in what our Jewish boys are doing at the battle front. So I wanted you to share the exhilaration this event has brought to my wife and myself.

Alvin has been in the service two years. Upon finishing his work at high school, he refused to consider college at that time and went to work at an optical factory in Rochester. During the first few months he did photographic work for the company. But during the last eight months he did precision work on prisms for bombsights. He had already made up his mind that he was going to become a bombardier. When he was eighteen he gave up his work, came home and enlisted as an aviation cadet. When he appeared before the board for his final classification, he was asked whether he cared to change his preference to that of pilot. Believe it or not he said he preferred to drop the eggs. We pray that God will watch over him and bring him safely home. His brother, Robert, in the service two and one half years has been assigned to M. Intelligence and ^{has} been training in Japanese, etc. for over a year.

Mr. Clayborne George and I now have our offices in the Hickox Building, which building will be torn down this summer. The doors of every decent office building in Cleveland have been slammed in our faces because we are Negroes.

Mr. James Wolf, who has offices in the National City Bank Building, is the manager of the National City Bank Building, the Guardian Building, and the Citizens Building. About two weeks ago he instructed Mr. Palmer, the resident manager of the Citizens Building, to show us four rooms on the sixth floor of that building. Since that time Mr. Wolf has decided he will not rent to us because we are Negroes. Mr. Wolf, as I understand it, is a member of your Temple and the thought occurred to me that a word from you to him might persuade him to rent us the space.

Our situation is indescribably desperate and I am certain that, because of our experiences in this connection, you cannot understand our feelings and our thoughts.

Dear Rabbi Silver,

This note is being written by Hope Griswold Curfman and Marvin Krichman. Perhaps you will not remember Hope Griswold. About twenty years ago you were very nice to a little girl on a train when her father, James H. Griswold, found that you and she were both going toward Chicago on the same car. Now she is married to Captain Curfman and he is stationed here in Topeka along with Marvin Krichman. After finding that we were both from Cleveland and knew you, we began to reminisce in the fashion of people away from home. We found that about ten or twelve years ago Hope and her father went to hear one of your sermons. As far as Hope can recollect, the title of your sermon was, "The Ten Greatest Men in History". We were most interested in your selection of men, but she wondered at your omission of Jesus in the list. Perhaps after a lapse of so many years, Hope's recollection is erroneous, either as to the exact title of your sermon or the list of men included.

When Hope discussed this with Marvin, his position was that Jesus would have been included in your sermon about the ten greatest men in history, unless religious teachers were excluded from the scope of the sermon, or the basis for determining the ten greatest men was their deeds during their lifetime rather than the influence they have had in history. Marvin predicated his position on what he believes is the attitude of reformed Judaism toward Jesus: that is that he was a great religious teacher, but not divine.

We hope that without too much inconvenience you can recollect or refer to your file of sermons

for the answer. We realize the many demands on your time and we do not want you to consider our inquiry an urgent one, but we are most interested in your answer.







I want to state a situation and I hope that you will understand the spirit in which this letter is written.

Sometime ago, we wrote to you asking if you would be willing to exchange your bulletin for our paper. This arrangement has proven of untold benefit to The Post, not alone in the fact that we have found your bulletin interesting and often a source of news, but, just as important, in the fact that you were thereby able to become acquainted with The Post.

Now, however, we have decided to ask for a paid subscription from every rabbi on our complimentary list.

I do not want to hide behind the paper shortage, and I want to state the case frankly. We have been spending a lot of money on expanding our news coverage and probably now have a larger budget for news than all the other Anglo-Jewish papers combined and must be somewhere near to spending as much for actual news as the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, and certainly more than the independent Jewish Press Service.

This has been a great strain on us, especially since our advertising department has not been able to bring in enough revenue to warrant this kind of expenditure, and since we do not seem to be able to get any national advertising to speak of, we have been forced to check into every possible additional means of income.

We could, of course, cut down on our news, or cut down on the number of pages in the paper, but I think you will agree that this would be unwise, for any number of obvious reasons.





Would you please send me a statement of your views on this subject, in as complete a manner as possible? Also, please include information on the Meir assassin and the true issues behind the affair; the David Frankfurter incident in Switzerland; the Struma catastrophe; the Stern movement in Palestine; and the British White Papers on Palestine. I would appreciate it very much if you also would include a bibliography to which I could refer.

Dear Dr. Silver,

May I ask an especial favor of you.. I know that your time is taken up with many important things, but if it is at all possible I should like to have you give me a few minutes of your time to discuss a personal problem.

Briefly, my problem is one of a mixed marriage that will not take place until early in Nineteen hundred and forty-six (1946). The young man involved is an Englishman, a research scientist, who is at present working on the problem of malaria in a remote district of Northern Rhodesia.

I, as you may have gathered, am Jewish, extremely proud of my background, and with strong Zionist tendencies.

When Mr. Robinson comes to the United States, on his very limited leave, we want to get married as soon as possible under the sanction of Jewish law. The difficulties are, of course, that Mr. Robinson is not confirmed in our faith, and living in the deepest jungle gives him no chance to contact a rabbi in Africa for instruction.

This is essentially the whole story, except that I may add that we are both much concerned over what can be done. This, in view of the fact that Mr. Robinson, being both liberal and pro-Zionist, wants more complete instruction than just the merest details that will make him acceptable to our Jewish Faith and People.

If you don't consider it too presumptuous of me, may I ask you to grant me an appointment this week. A friend of mine, who knows my story, and upon whose suggestion I am writing to you, will be leaving Cleveland this forthcoming Saturday, and I should like to have her with me at this meeting..





My dear Bob:

I write you this note on the eve of Passover. We are preparing here for the celebration of the Seder service tonight. I hope that you, too, will be able to participate in the ancient and beautiful ceremony of the Seder.

The war news which has been pouring in during the last few days has been very thrilling and exciting. The air is full of all sorts of rumors on the eve of our Festival of Freedom and it looks as though the final defeat of the worst enemies of freedom of our generation is near at hand. The sooner the better.

I trust that you are well. I have not forgotten the long letter which you sent me some time ago. I have taken the liberty of sending on your suggestions on what the servicemen in the armed forces can do in the matter of combatting anti-Semitism to the Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai B'rith and to the Jewish Welfare Board. I think there much substance to your suggestion. Something along the line which you suggest is already being worked on. A great deal is being done of course here on the home front in the matter of good public relations and the elimination of frictions between religious and racial groups. Much more of course needs to be done. A good deal will depend on the economic conditions which will prevail in our country after the war and how smoothly our economic life will be re-adjusted to peacetime pursuits. If there is no large-scale unemployment and depression after the war, the problem of anti-Semitism is not likely to be very serious.

Here at The Temple we are all busily engaged in the customary religious and educational activities and the added war responsibilities and tasks.
