

I am taking the liberty of writing this little note to you in the hope that you can be of some aid to us. I am the son of the late Norbert Salinger and the nephew of the late Marcel Salinger, both of whom were among your greatest admirers and your good friends. I hope that in their names you will tender us the aid that we need so desperately.

upon the sudden and unexpected demise of my beloved father, we discovered that there had been no insurance or will. In such a case, according to the law of Ohio, the widow is entitled to a certain amount of money, with the remainder going to the children of the deceased. But, Rabbi Silver, my father's second wife, his widow, received the complete estate in her allowance by law, leaving us nothing.

Everyone who came into contact with my father, knew that he was thoroughly devoted to his children, and if he had been given the

opportunity to forge his will, we would have received the greater portion of the estate. But fate decreed otherwise.

But now to the pertinent question and problem. My father has lain in his grave for almost two years without the appropriate covering of a stone. His widow, having received all that he possessed, has refused to erect a stone in his departed memory. She had previously refused to have the body buried in New York City, near his loved ones, contrary to the

wishes of his brothers and children.
She had claimed that the preference
lay with her, as she had been his
wife. In spite of that, she has now
refused to perform her rightful duty.

Rabbi Silver, my mother, with
whom my sister and I have always
resided, has continually struggled
to maintain our home. He is not
in a financial position to erect a stone,
nor is my father's only remaining
brother, now residing in Cleveland, in
a position to be of aid to us.

If you could possibly find the

as a human being, to erect a stone
in her husband's memory, we

Dear Mr. Gradwohl:

Thank you for your letter of May 1st, enclosing reprint of an editorial from the Nebraska State Journal.

In the first place, I do not like the name of your congregation - American Reform Congregation. The name of your congregation is not unlike the names given to so many Jewish children - Donald, Kenneth, Douglas, Sidney, etc. - names that are not Jewish, names that are utterly alien to Jewish tradition. Names like Abraham, Jacob, Aaron, Moses, etc., - names borne by many non-Jews, are disdained by ultra "American" Jews.

The name assumed by your congregation is likewise incongruous. Christian churches are not named American Episcopal Church, American Catholic Church, American Presbyterian Church. The name of your local Episcopal Church is probably St. Paul's Church; the Catholic Church is probably called St. Patrick's Church; the Presbyterian, St. John's Church, etc.

But the group that founded your congregation was apparently disinclined to identify itself with names hallowed in Jewish tradition - Beth-El, Emamu-El, Rodeph Sholom, Temple Isaiah, etc. You named your congregation American Reform Congregation of Lincoln. There is nothing in the name to indicate that it is a synagogue, a Jewish religious institution. In short, it is not American inasmuch as it has nothing to do with America as a political body; since the name has no religious connotation, it is natural to assume that the founders of the "Congregation" intended to minimize its religious purposes, despite their pious protestations to the contrary.

Among the principles you adopted is the one advocating separation of church and state. As a good Jew and loyal American, I heartily subscribe thereto. But your congregation violated that principle by deliberately using "American" as part of the name of your congregation. America is the name of the political and geographical entity in which we live; it is the name of our country for which our sons are fighting and dying. If you had been more profoundly Jewish, if belief in separation of church and state were really a deep-rooted principle of the organizers of your congregation, if you really had a deeper loyalty to the Jewish faith and Jewish tradition, the name of your congregation would have been other than American Reform Congregation.

I am not surprised that you enclose the editorial by a non-Jew concerning your congregation. What does he know about things Jewish? As a matter of fact it is as presumptuous for Mr. McConnell to editorialize about Jewish religious matters as it would be for me to editorialize on Catholic or Protestant religious matters. Nor am I surprised that you sought approval of a non-Jew, for you would find it exceedingly difficult to obtain endorsement of real and genuine Jews - men who revere their religious teachings, men who seek to strengthen the synagogue as a living inspiration in the affairs of American Jewry.

While I am not an organization Zionist, I believe that Jews have as much right to advocate a national Jewish homeland as Americans of Polish, Czecho-Slovak or Irish origin have the right to advocate a homeland for their respective peoples. The Irish in this country are no less Catholic or American because they take pride in and are devotedly interested in the land of their ancestors - Ireland. Why shouldn't Jews adhere to their ancient hopes for a Jewish Commonwealth in the land of their forefathers without forfeiting their rights as American citizens?

In conclusion let me say that in this crucial period of Jewish history, it behooves every Jew to work in a spirit of solidarity and good will with all other Jews for the furtherance and advancement of our religious heritage and our religious institutions. We must not foment denominational differences. We should abjure fictional and factional divisions. I appeal to you, in the name of an imperishable faith, in the name of a great people who have contributed so much to civilization, to join the banner of a United Israel, so that we may be strengthened in the fulfillment of our mission to spread the ideals of the Torah as a way of life.

Regarding Richard Sogg & Mr. Grover (Epstein)

My policy has always been to encourage and cultivate the youngsters of the Temple who are at all musically inclined. Richard Sogg is one of these, has musical talent and ability - plus, and is moreover interested in the organ. With but a little training he could be of considerable value to the Temple in many ways. I have suggested that he take organ lessons this summer of Mr. Kraft. His main drawback is an instrument to practice upon. For many reasons I would not like to allow the large organ in the Temple to be used much for this purpose. So I would like some thought given to the possibility of allowing the Hammond organ in the chapel to be used for this purpose. A small fee could be charged, or else the organ given outright where there was a chance of our recovering later in the use of the services of the organist. This would also apply to Mr. Grover who I understand is to play for the High School work next winter. (See Rabbi Kramer) An expression of opinion would be appreciated.

Summer Choir



Our Flag

By

(This article is, with some verbal changes, a reprint of one which appeared in The Hartford Times on June 8, 1940.)

WHAT does the Flag mean to us, this year above all other years?

It evokes memories. It reminds us of the beginnings of our nation "conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal." It reminds us of men who had a vision of a country established on justice, founded on the principle of the inalienable dignity of all human personalities, dedicated to the freedom of men to live and dream, to speak and write and read, to assemble and petition, to vote and dissent, to worship God, to participate in all of the multifarious activities of life in a republic—in accordance with one's will and capacity and with due regard for the identical rights of others. It reminds us of the beginnings of a great and noble experiment in representative democracy among a people diversified in origin, in faith, in historic tradition and heritage, yet united in will and purpose to have that experiment succeed.

THE Flag offers a challenge.

For, as we proceed from the consideration of our national beginnings to the evaluation of our history since then, we are thrilled with the realization that the experiment which European lands scoffed at and scorned has succeeded beyond the most daring dreams of the founders. As at the beginning—we stand today as a nation which dares to believe in the reality and validity of an ideal; a nation retaining its faith in God and man; a nation committed to liberty and justice for all within its borders; a people united while scorned and regimentation; a people strong because of the massed strength and dignity and democratic discipline of its constituent parts. We were the only bulwark of democracy—then. Alas, we were almost the only citadel of democratic freedom in the last decade when the voices of

scorn and mockery were raised against us from Europe.

The Flag is a symbol, the visible, beautiful symbol of our past glory and of our present dignity. It is the symbol, too, of the heroism and the sacrifice of American men and women in every part of the world for the preservation of the American Way of Life against every threat wherever offered; a symbol of the faith of American men and women, backed by our substance and our lives, in the validity of their Way of Life and in its everlasting rightness. And as a symbol it challenges us, the heirs of yesterday's valor and promise, the witnesses of and participants in today's sacrifices, to be worthy of our heritage and strength, and vigilant in its preservation.

And as we accept the challenge which the billowing folds of the Star-Spangled Banner offer us, this standard becomes also the symbol of a hope, the assurance of a promise. The hope is for the perpetuity of freedom in our land, its preservation inviolate. The promise is for today and the morrow, that unity and liberty, that justice and brotherhood, that amity and cooperation will continue to be controlling factors in our living together.

BY these memories, then, by this challenge, by this hope and by this promise—may we find ourselves consciously rededicating our communities and efforts, that as the lights go on once again all over a world which had been "blacked out," we may find the American people standing and marching in ranks closed, with souls enkindled, to the end that the lights of faith and of freedom may continue to burn undimmed on this continent, and that, perchance, God willing it, we may be privileged not only to rekindle the lights but to keep them burning everywhere in a world that is now tortured and bleeding.

Unfurl this banner, then, to the breeze! Stand reverently before it! Salute it with hands and love and resolution! It is the symbol of our self-consecration, of our loyalty and of our pledge of sacrificial devotion—

Our Flag!



Dear Rabbi Silver:

I am a young Jewish girl of 25, a teacher doing graduate work in vocational guidance and psychology at Western Reserve. Most of my contacts up to the age of 23 were Christian, because I attended Penn. While I am not an orthodox Jew, I am a devout Jew, and believe in God with all my heart. This is by way of introduction. For the past year I have joined zionist organizations and read everything I could on the subject, and listened to all the discussions enthusiastically. I have attended all your services whenever I could get away from Sunday School teaching, and was impressed. I have been very greatly influenced by Van Passen. If a Christian could do all that for the Jews, why then can't the Jew do much more for himself?

This has been working on me until it has become a mania. The elders are doing much; but, what about the youth? I may be wrong but in all my contacts with all these organizations it has seemed to me that the Jewish youth of this community as a whole are prone to avoid any of the important or significant attitudes toward their own problems. So many are ignorant of modern Jewish activity; those that are zionists cannot bother with those who know nothing. There is no group which goes about trying to enlighten this large group who are ignorant or and know so little about their people. This seems to me to be tragic! I have tried on my own to organize groups but to no avail. It is these youth who can carry on the work that you are doing so brilliantly.

My idea is to try to get some of the elders to support a few of the youth, who are conscious of the need, in forming a group which will have forums, lectures, study groups, and try to set up an organization to enlighten the youth of the community and awaken them to the fullness of their responsibilities. It need not be wholly zionistic, for I believe, that if they are enlightened they will naturally turn to zionism.

I would gladly devote my time to this worthy effort, if one of the local temples, with its junior organization to begin with, would start the work with the end plan in view to serve the community or some part of it in this work.

A program of guest speakers, book reviews by responsible and recognized authorities, could be developed as part of this program. A tie-in with a local musical organization would assist materially in attracting attention. It is a big job but I, and the few I have lined up are willing to tackle it.

These people have promised to cooperate in the program: Miss Myrtle Sokolsky, teacher of French, and quite adept in dramatics; Mr. Harry Herman, owns a jewelry shop and has a thorough zionist background; Mr. Benjamin Sternberg, formerly from Hollywood, doing a movie production at Belfair, and splendid in publicity and organization work; Mr. Blaine Perrigo, prominent artist in Cleveland; Mr. Morton Serman, draftsman, thorough zionist background; Miss Jean Heller, secretary of Histadrut offices; Miss Florence Hirshberg, who had done much with racial problems in Cleveland; Miss Lois Freeman, quite active in Jewish Youth affairs. Harry Albert of the J.Y.A.B. has confirmed my idea that there is a need for this type of group; Mr. Moxom of the Histadrut wished for such an organization of youth in affiliation with his group. It will only work with a man of your standing, and with an affiliation with a group that seems neutral.

Will you help us? I shall be glad to discuss the matter further with you at your convenience. We anxiously await your opinion.

Dear Rabbi Silver :

It is with great reluctance that I am writing you with reference to what I consider a matter of great importance to our people and I know that you will be interested in it.

My home is in New York City and I came to Cleveland on Memorial Day to pay tribute to some members of my family that are buried here. I stopped at the Statler Hotel that night and while in the hotel lobby with my wife and some other people we met there we heard some music strains from the floor above and a considerable amount of discussion by others on the floor about the hotel permitting such an affair on such a day. We were told that there was a Jewish dance going on and that every effort should be made to have it stopped. Some of the non-Jews told us that one of the hotel officials told them that they made a serious mistake and that they have tried to stop it after the booking was made but that the organization (Jewish) would not agree to it. Some of these people were war veterans and had just returned from Memorial services. They were about to go up and start a little trouble but several in my group (not known to be Jewish) persuaded them not to. As a matter of fact the entire hotel lobby was buzzing about this affair.

I took the trouble to find out who was running this affair and to my amazement I found that the dinner dance and entertainment was sponsored by a local B'Nai B'Rith Lodge. The crowd was a very young one and if they had not already seen military service they should have been in it now. Here they were all on this MOST SACRED DAY OF TENDER MEMORIES dancing away to the strains of loud peppy music of a large orchestra. What a shame and especially for a Jewish group and under the present anti-semitic conditions. Could they not have picked any other day of the year but this one. Yom Kippur could not have been any worse. How can Jewish organizations especially under such stressing times be so irresponsible in the exercise of good judgement. I can understand how incidents such as this can cause very serious consequences and I feel that the leaders of this group should be called on the carpet and who can do a better job than you, and should be clipped good and proper. It is extremely dangerous to permit such leaders to act for any of our groups. Means must be found to prevent any such occurrences in the future.

I am sorry to have to occupy your valuable time and I know how valuable it is, since I have had the extreme pleasure of hearing you twice in New York, but knowing of your sincere interest in our welfare and knowing that you will act promptly and vigorously, I could not help but take this liberty. This incident did disturb me very much and I cannot help but feel that I have actually stopped what might have turned out to be a small riot. The comment that I heard is not fit to print. There were many soldiers and their families there and you can imagine how they all felt.

If I do not cool off by the time I get back home I may raise this matter with the New York B'Nai B'Rith Council so that this protest can be carried up to the officials of the National Council. I am sure that such an affair could not be conducted in New York on this day. I however feel that this may not be necessary since I am sure that you will properly treat this matter here.

Permit me to take this opportunity to convey to you the great esteem the Jews of New York have for you and that ^{your} presence in New York is and always will be a red letter day. I hope to again have an opportunity to again hear you in the very near future.


No other information concerning 2nd Lt. Alvin L. Kob-

Dear Emil:

Your letter of the 13th both pleased and pained me. Your candor in writing me pleased me. That was in character. That you report to have done--pained me, coming from you!

Why you, who know me so well, would undertake to defeat me after the Nominating Committee had brought in my name and thus make me a party to a contest which is most distasteful to me--baffles me. True, I am a Zionist. It is equally true that you are an anti-Zionist. Yet--since both you and I are gentle men and men of fairness--we have been friends and congenial colleagues through all the years. I remember the joy I knew when you were named Vice-President. It was ~~X~~ genuine^{XXI} because I trusted you and liked you, and worked with you despite ideological differences. How you could, now, after the Nominating Committee had made its report, which is, of course, public property, become a party to the creation of a contest against me who am not an extremist, and have been ^{your} devoted friend--I cannot understand. That grieves me beyond words!

You attempt to justify this action on your part on the ground of "the recent roster of Presidents". I am looking at the roster of past Presidents of the C.C.A.R. since 1900 when the Founder died: Silverman, Krenskopf, Stolz, Phillipson--four anti-Zionists. Then--Max Heller, a Zionist. After that: Schulman, Gries, Rosenau, Grossman, Franklin, Galisch, Simon, Wolsey, Enelow, Lefkowitz, Newfield, Goldenson--twelve anti-Zionists in Succession. Then--Levy, a Zionist. After that: Curriek and Leipziger--two anti-Zionists, followed by Heller--a Zionist. Freshof certainly has been a conciliating, unifying force:

Why, then, would you or others break the tradition of accepting a Nominating Committee's report and make me the spanked boy ~~400-0?~~? And do you realize what this precedent would mean in the future when the Nominating Committee's reports will be exposed to organized drives from the floor? This has never happened before. If it happens now under the peculiar reasoning and tenacity of this hour of controversy, can't you see what the situation may be next year or the year after?

Frenkly and in all honor--I did not seek the nomination. Not one word was ever spoken by me asking anyone to nominate me. I was asked whether I would consider the nomination, asked by several people unbeknownst to each other. I was, of course, receptive. The next I knew was when someone wrote me that I was placed in nomination.

Had Mann been nominated by the Nominating Committee, rest assured that I would not be a party to snatching the nomination from him after the report of the Committee had been made.

Really, Emil, I can't see what the whole subject of Zionism has to do with my becoming Vice-President of the C.C.A.R. I was not named because I am a ~~moderate~~ Zionist but because I am a member of the C.C.A.R., to which I have been, and am devoted. Should I ever get to the Presidency, I would be the President of the C.C.A.R. and labor to keep it great. I respect the opinions of my colleagues even when I differ from them. You know that! And I hope that my colleagues will be as fair to me as I have striven to be fair to them at all times.



Mr. Eric Saunders, of the British Consulate in Cleveland, just telephoned me and suggested that I send you a copy of the letter which I addressed on June 11 to the British Overseas Airway Co. in Baltimore. I am enclosing a copy herewith, and the reply.

I should like to obtain a priority for air passage to London and Jerusalem. The purpose of visit is stated in this letter. I should like to add, that among the leaders of British Jewry whom I should like to see are Chief Rabbi Joseph Hertz and Dr. Chaim Weizmann. I shall be elected, next week, President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, and I should like to discuss with the Chief Rabbi general post war religious tasks confronting the Jewish people. With Dr. Weizmann I should like to discuss the Palestine movement which which, as you may possibly know, I have been identified actively for many years. I should also like to have the opportunity of discussing with members of the Jewish Agency in Jerusalem the general Palestine situation. I was Executive Chairman of the American Zionist Emergency Council up to the first of this year, and may resume that post upon my return.

I flew to England in the Spring of 1942 on a somewhat similar mission and was grateful for the many courtesies extended to me by the representatives of the British Government both in this country and in England.


The God I worship and believe in is a real force and does real and understandable things. Nature itself is a tangible explanation of life and God's workings. Can I not give them this to love and worship?





A DETAILED REPORT ON THE LIBERATED JEW AS HE NOW SUFFERS
HIS PERIOD OF LIBERATION UNDER THE DISCIPLINE OF THE ARMED
FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES

I. DELIMITATION

On May 1 and dates thereafter, Dachau Concentration Camp, its affiliated and related camps were taken by the advancing American forces. Thereafter and continuing into the present, the liberated were relegated to a new status, one of qualified freedom. This period, now a matter of seven weeks, is arbitrarily noted as the period of "Liberation".

This report regards the complexion of this continuing period.

II. FURTHER DELIMITATION

This report is based upon a study of prevailing conditions among Jewish DPs (Displaced Persons) in an area extending from the Brenner Pass in the south to the north Munich Staging area in the north and from Eggenfelden in the east to Turkheim in the west.

III. AUTHORITY

Authority for this report resides in DS assignment through Hq 7th Army with specific purpose of working with the peoples of the respective camps.

IV. STATISTICS

It is approximated that some 50,000 Jews remain of the millions brought to Germany. Of this number 14,000 reside in the area indicated in Sect. II. The distribution of Jews among these camps varies. At Feldafing there at present 3100 Jews. At Neustift there are 11. Camps Turkheim and Buchberg are all-Jewish camps.

V. CAMP CONDITIONS

At best, each of the camps are sub-standard. At Turkheim, 450 Jews continue to live in the double barbed-wire enclosure which still retain the deadly electrical apparatus that kept the ambitious from escaping to life. The camp is literally a cess pool. By any standards, the sight would be condemned. At Buchberg, 1000 Jews live in a once active powder factory. Built in barracks style, the dilapidated structures are overcrowded with individuals. Such items as soap, tooth brushes, linens, laundry facilities are out of the question. Plumbing, where found, is not capable of serving the number housed.

At the better camps, rooms house more than is desirable. Many must sleep on the floor and the cellars are used as dormitories.

The hospitals are well organized and well supervised.

FOOD

The food situation is in keeping with the general camp complexion. At Mittenwald two meals were served per day. The morning meal consisted of a piece of bread and coffee. The second meal included soup and beans

An attempted riot on the part of the liberated was quelled. The calorie content per day, according to the physician on the grounds, was 900 to 1000 calories.

Here is the daily menu at Garmisch:

- Breakfast - Bread (300-350 grams daily)
Butter or margarine - Ounce twice per week. 4 oz. per person.
Coffee
- Dinner - Bean soup (daily)
Horse meat - $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. per person. At times canned meat.
- Supper - $1\frac{1}{2}$ liter of soup.

This menu is typical with variations in such instances where the camp director is bent upon helping people in his charge. Often the charge is made - "More food was given in the concentration camp".

CLOTHING

The greater percentage of the liberated are still imprisoned in the striped uniform forced upon them by the oppressor. UNNRA, supposedly the organization to assist in this matter has thus far done nothing, the Red Cross has helped a bit, but hardly enough that the job is being done. At Dachau the store houses supplied some clothes for a limited number of the liberated.

SUPERVISION

There seems to be no set plan for the supervision of these camps. Feldafing is commanded by Military Government. Munich Staging Area is under the control of Dachau which has an elaborate T/O for the maintenance of its camps. Buchberg is commanded by a FA unit. In most instances, the officers in command have had no training or preparation for the job. At two of the camps visited, the COs were operating under directives unknown to G-5. UNNRA teams are on hand at a few of the camps but are unable to justify their office. At Turkheim the CO is not on the grounds but operates the unit from the city. At Pensing, the CO of the airport forced 60 Jews to vacate the property requisitioned by MG with no further concern than - "let them go find another place". With the exception of the Dachau organization the camps are somewhat on their own. Where the CO is conscious of his responsibilities, the liberated find their lot somewhat better.

VI. PROBLEMS OF THE JEW

The Jew is being singled out for destruction finds himself in a strange situation. He does not want to return to the scene of the infamy perpetrated against him, yet he wants to make sure that he has pursued every path that may lead to a limb of his once possessed family. His problem:

WHERE IS MY FAMILY?

He is not recognized as a Jew even though of his original number a handful remain. he is counted among his persecutors. The Hungarian Jew (Some few thousand remaining out of 1,000,000) is an Hungarian, and as such a member of an enemy nation. He is subject to forced labor when Hungarian Nationals are called out for that purpose. Polish Jews (not a single Polish Jewish child under the age of fourteen has as yet been found alive in this area.) are to this date considered Polish Nationals and are subject to all directives bearing upon that people.

The Jew does not want to return to his former home. He seeks a new place for the rebuilding of his new life. His problem is:

WHERE SHALL I GO?

From one to six years, the liberated suffered. The qualitative freedom given him is not without the problem:

WHEN SHALL I GO?

In the meantime he suffers from the curse of hate. Anti-Semitism continues even in the camps of the liberated. At Murnau, the Polish peoples (all military men) suggested the segregation of the Polish military of Jewish descent. Reports stagger in of violence of one sort or another resulting from this disease. The exchange of words is frequent. A continuing problem to the Jew:

LIBERATED FOR WHAT?

VII. MISSIONS AND REPRESENTATIVES

During these past weeks, Missions and Representatives of varying hues have trekked through the misery of the liberated offering verbal balm for their wounds. Here and there the mission went beyond the words but not very far. The Jew has been constantly asking, most times with tears, "where are our representatives?"

"They can not come as yet," is our constant reply, "but they will soon arrive."

"But can they not send word to sustain us in this bitter hour? A word of reassurance?"

Here and there a Jew would speak up as a representative, but in most cases he turned out to be a false messiah on a picture-taking tour or in search for an experience to give him the right to say - "I was in Dachau".

The Jew still waits only because he must. The guard at the gate, the blocked roads, the tattered garb, the endlessness of the road all say - wait! But it is with little faith and less hope.

VIII. OUR ACTIVITIES

We have observed the conditions under which the Jew must continue to struggle. We have sought wherever possible to have his lot improved. We have attempted to explain the workings of the Army so that he might understand that in six weeks the wrongs of six years can not be repaired. We have at the same time, by collecting and publishing lists, sought to bring together broken segments of surviving families. We have apologized for the failure of our organizations to enter upon the scene.

IX. CONCLUSION

Liberated, but not free - that is the paradox of the Jew. In the concentration camp his whole being was consumed with the hope of salvation. That hope was his life, for that he was willing to suffer. Saved, his hope evanesces for no new source of hope has been given him. Suffering continues to be his badge.




