Dear Rabbi:

I was very pleased to receive your letter as it was the first indication that I had that you are obtaining a much needed rest. The reports here were rather conflicting. Some indicated that you were still in New York and others that you were either on the way or were preparing to go to Palestine. With the situation so uncertain I know that it is difficult to tell when you may be on the move, but I hope that in the meantime you will have been completely rested.

I did not acknowledge D'Ascenzo's letter, first because I wanted to get your views and, secondly, I was also puzzled as to the \$1800 figure. Assuming that Mr. Szyk will design the corridor windows and one chapel window, his fee, on the basis of \$300 each, would be \$1200. I shall write to Mr. Gittelson, whose address I have obtained, and will ascertain whether this arrangement will be agreeable to him.

I had hopes of seeing you before you left Cleveland for, as you will recall, we had a tentative date for July 1st. I wanted to discuss several things with you, most important of all being the installation of air conditioning in the chapel. Whatever method of installation is used will result in a change in the appearance of the chapel. The question, therefore, is: shall we sacrifice appearance for comfort. I have turned over the plans which George Nachman prepared to Arthur Friedman who is an expert on air conditioning. I hope that a means will be found by which benefits can be obtained without destroying the appearance.

You have probably learned that Mrs. Kraft found it necessary to resign. Last Tuesday we listened to six voices, two of which were excellent. Either one of them will make a vast improvement in the choir.

Rabbi Nodel reached the city last night, but I have not yet spoken to him. He is undoubtedly busy endeavoring to locate living quarters for himself and family. He is preparing to

Dear Dr. Silver:

At the Indiana Community Relation Council meeting in Indianapolis, I heard the saddening news of the death of "Duke" Margolis. He was a swell guy, and I know we shall all miss him.

The AJCongress man from Minneapolis said the Mt. Zion Congregation of St. Paul is seeking a successor before the Holy Days. No doubt you are acquainted with Milton P. Firestone, president of the congregation. Would you be so good as to write him in my behalf, recommending me for the pulpit? I am sure I could render the congregation and community competent service.

I know you are more than busy with the pressing affairs of world and Palestine Jewry, but I returned from two years of war to find that our Council friends have been tireless in pushing non-Zionist rabbis into some of the leading pulpits of the country in the past few years. Besides, except for an opportunity such as this, as a ~~returning~~ returned chaplain (without an emergency placement committee), I have only the choice of returning to my small congregation at a pre-war salary. Have you ever thought of how badly your own Temple alumni have fared in this political game of rabbinical placement?

Enclosed is a sheet of biographical data to refresh your memory. You might wish to call attention to my competent service to Decatur and Hammond, my educational background, and war record. I am now 34 years of age and single. This will be the first letter you will have written in my behalf since I obtained my first pulpit ten years ago.

Dear Rabbi:

I have your letter and first of all wish to tell you that you are entitled to considerable credit for your accomplishments in connection with the British federalization proposal. I hope that the President's action can be interpreted as a rejection of the proposal and that the British will be told, once and for all, not only that the admission of the one hundred thousand displaced persons must be unconditional but that the United States is not interested in any plan that is inconsistent with the Balfour Declaration and the Mandate.

When I received D'Ascenzo's letter I immediately wrote to him and I indicated an unwillingness to disturb the Szyk situation any further. I tried to point out to him that inasmuch as his original price was \$10,000.00, it ought to be sufficient if the new price were \$12,000.00, as in reality the additional work would be confined principally to the corridor windows. I have not heard from him, perhaps due to the fact that my letter arrived after he had left on his vacation. If he will accept \$12,000.00 and if we pay Szyk \$1500.00, we can keep the entire cost down to \$20,000.00. This will still necessitate hard work, because so far we have slightly less than \$5000.00. I am having a meeting tomorrow with Paul Wintner for the purpose of getting him and his committee to renew activity.


It was not until today that I obtained final consent from Stanley Dienor. The personnel of the committee will be completed tomorrow and arrangements will then be made for a meeting with this group so that it can commence work.

Rabbi Nodel has obtained temporary quarters and commencing September 1st will have a permanent home in an apartment on Ansel Road between Hough and Wade Park. It is not what he wants but will be satisfactory until conditions are relaxed and something better can be obtained. It is pleasing to note that he is making a favorable impression wherever he goes. Everybody speaks of him in a complimentary manner.

We are all well, but could use a vacation. I am in hopes that before the month is over Sylvia and I will be able to get away for a short time.

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



Unless a greater value is declared and stated herein the shipper agrees that the value of the shipment is in fact above 100, and that the liability of the company shall in no event exceed such value.

5. Unless caused by the own negligence or that of its agents, the company shall not be liable for:

- Differences in weight or quantity caused by shrinkage, damage, or preparation.
- The death, injury, or illness of persons or live freight.
- Loss of power, battery, tools, equipment, machinery, parts, stones, valuable papers, or other matter of extraordinary value, unless such articles are enumerated in the receipt.

6. Unless caused in whole or in part by the own negligence or that of its agents, the company shall not be liable for loss, damage or delay:

- The act or default of the carrier or owner.

14. 

Dear Dr. Silver:-

Under separate cover I am sending you the volume of Centenary addresses delivered at Emanu-El. My address is on 'The Significance of Israel and Judaism for a New World Order'. There are things theological in it which will interest you. As to the Palestine matter, it gives a clear statement of how I felt in Dec. 1944. I was very conservative when I said at least 3,000,000 Jews had been slain in cold blood; now we know officially that 6,000,000 were the victims. And there seems to be no end. As I told you when you were good enough to come to see me, my heart aches for the tragedy of Israel. All our ideologies pale into insignificance when we consider what is happening to us. I made clear to you what I want. If the Zionists could get what I advised them to take in 1937, - adequate partition, it would be the best. Immigration into Palestine of as many Jews as possible is the real core of the matter. Thus far not even the 100,000 which the President of our country asked and we are told is still insisting upon, have not been allowed to come. We

should insist upon the 100,000 as a beginning. For if the British Imperial power could see its way to do what Truman asks, it would be the best proof of the sincerity of its wish and the adequacy of its power. For even the advocate of the bi-national state which I abhor, admits that in the last analysis, whatever Britain decides upon, will have to be imposed upon the Arabs.

The rumors are so conflicting. Every day we read something else. What will be the end God only knows. As I think about all these conflicting statements, I have a feeling that perhaps you made a mistake in not going to Paris, and after a fight for your ideas, throw your influence on behalf of what is evidently now the real desire of the Jewish Agency: an adequate partition. I am well aware what you suffered at the hands of the persons we discussed.

Excuse me for speaking to you so frankly. You know by this time what my real wish is, namely, to do as much as possible for our suffering brethren. As to the theoretical part, you also know from what I told you, I'll take care of it in the future, and I am not afraid of words. The main thing is to get the Jews in Palestine, a safe and strong and promising place.



A confirmation letter and the extract of the Report which was prepared by the Department of Social Work of the General Council.

1. The confirmation was given on 16.9.46, and it is in power until the beginning of Tamuz 4707.
2. The date of preparation of the last report is 29.8.46.
3. The activities of the institution: The study of the Torah in Talmud and Commentaries, and the giving of an elementary education in morality manners and fear of the Lord in the Yeshiva centre, and the establishment of branches to the central institution. The number of those who study in the central Yeshiva is 125, in the Yavneh Talmud Torah and in the branches 378. There is also a special branch for students of the Oriental Community. The Talmud Torah pupils pay tuition fees 400-750 mils monthly. At the kitchen of the Institution 140 pupils get free meals. Those who study at the Yeshiva and the lecturers are supported with a monthly salary. A central building of 3 stories is being built on the plot of the institution for a Yeshiva and Talmud Torah and a Dormitory for the pupils.




I know it is not your fault, it is the Board of Directors' fault, however, if you would explain to them in your own way and show them the light of truth, they would recognize it.



Dear Dr. Silver

I am writing to thank you for the telegram which you were so good as to send to the reception arranged by the Friends of the Hebrew University on Tuesday. Naturally I should have been but pleased if it had been possible for you to be there, but in the absence of that possibility I much appreciated your kind message.

My stay here has been very short - I am leaving to-night - and I have not been able to get beyond New York. I shall have liked to have an opportunity of talking with you about the work of the Friends in this country. The University of course gets very substantial help from the American Friends, both financially and otherwise; but I cannot help feeling - and indeed it seems to be generally agreed - that the amount of financial support is far from being commensurate with the possibilities of this

great Jewish community, with its keen and wide-spread interest in Palestine. I get the impression that the University is in danger of falling between two stools: the Zionists, with other claims on them which they consider more urgent, tend to leave the University to the non-Zionists, and the latter have not the enthusiasm & the driving power which are needed to put the University "on the map." I feel that, while a certain amount of non-Zionist help can always be counted on, the University will not get the support that it ought to have in America unless the great body of Zionists are made to feel that it is primarily their responsibility. And I feel that it is you who can give the proper lead in that direction.

I trust that you will forgive me for appealing to you in this way. In a sense I write "pro domo"; but the University is one of our greatest national assets, and the appeal is not merely a personal one.

If you feel that you can do anything, and if I can help in any way from Jerusalem - where I hope to take up my duties as Chairman of the Executive Council about the end of the month - I shall be only too pleased.

My dear Rabbi Silver,

This afternoon I attended the Memorial and
Memorial services at your magnificent temple. I was
there as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Keller of
Coleridge Road. I am not of the Jewish faith, but
none the less I experienced the ultimate object of
all religions: that inner peace and serenity which
open the door to a full and happy life. Your
sermon on the real and vital spirit of memory as a
stepping-stone between us the living, and our dear
dead brought me very close to those of my family
and to the many good friends whose lives were
taken in the war. . .

I have but recently returned to this country
after many years of service underground with our
allies. I have seen and touched a world over-
flowing with hate and greed and calculate savagery.
Parenthetically, may I add that the last house
of worship I was in was in France in 1914. The
chair was dominated by a machine-gun whose
message, while opposed to yours, was no less urgent).

This letter - hastily conceived as it is - had to
be written; for I could not, decently, withhold my salute
for so impressive an experience. Were I not so hard-

pressed for time, I should have called upon you. That, however, is a privilege, which I have reserved myself where next I am in your city.







My dear Abba:

I phoned your N.Y.P.B. Committee office this morning in the hope of arranging to see you here in the event you stopped off here on the way to Cleveland. It was their impression that you would go direct to Cleveland from the Convention. I followed the last, incidentally, naturally enough, with the closest interest and great gratification, including particularly your second personal triumph, which was expected. I suppose you know that though I was not there physically, I was there fully in spirit.

I was very desirous of having a chat with you in connection with my still tentative plans to visit the folks at Palestine at an early date. I know that they are expecting me, and I am most anxious to see them at this crucial time, as you can imagine. As you know, I was ready to make the trip last June, but owing to Bessie's visit at that time, I postponed the same for the end of the year, following your good advice. Should I make the trip this December, this is the time to set about making definite arrangements with my bank, booking passage, etc. Now, what complicates the matter at this juncture, brother, is no more nor less than the question of expenses for this trip, which should run, I imagine, to about \$2,000.-\$2,500. Were it not for Marion's definite plans to get married late next January or beginning February - in connection with which Marion will be pleased to write you and Virginia herself - I had hoped to be able to scrape together the necessary funds for the trip out of my own reserves. But in view of the said new development, I will need those spare funds for the wedding expenditures and whatever usually goes with it. This is my present problem, brother "Anthony". . . . I was thus wondering whether at least a part - say 50% - of the mentioned trip-expenses could not properly come out of the money which the folks had sent you some time

ago for safe-keeping, particularly since they are not in need of same at present.





Why Am I the "Happiest Man" in Ohio

Clevelander Tells Reason for His Claim and Outlines His Philosophy

BY FREDERIC L. WALTERS

WHEN Joseph Grossman, 1472 Crawford avenue, challenged the title of Tommy Hopkins, Ottawa, as "The Happiest Man in Ohio," and went so far as to proclaim himself the happiest man in America, he opened the floodgates to a tide of questions that almost threatened to engulf him.

Happiness! The whole world is in search of it. The hunt for gold, the struggle for power, gigantic wars have been waged only as a means to that end. Mistaken men have perfused themselves, robbed and murdered for a mistaken conception of happiness. And so when Mr. Grossman's challenge was published in The Plain Dealer, part of the world that knows Joseph Grossman stormed his office in the Electric building and demanded the key to the magic door. So Mr. Grossman began to explain, and he has been explaining ever since.

"Why am I happy?" he repeated. "But

come and have lunch with me. If you want to know a man, eat with him or play with him. Don't judge him at his work, for there you will see only one side—the practical, matter-of-fact, selfish side."

The development of a morose, melancholy, shy youth who was almost friendless, into a man with hundreds of friends, well known as a public speaker and humorist, nicknamed "Sunshine" by the Ad Club, that is the story of Joseph Grossman.

"When I was a young man," he said, "I was very studious. Night after night I withdrew to my own room, never mingling with the young people who came to my father's house. I was wholly wrapped up in myself and my books. I never went to a dance until I was 21. At last I began to realize that there was something wrong with my scheme of things, that

there was more to be got out of life than I was getting. So I began to cultivate friends, and to my friends I offered only my best side. If one asked 'How are things with you?' I didn't buttonhole him and begin a history of my troubles. I told him everything was as good as gold and hoped it was the same with him."

Hard work, self-control and the ability to make friends—these are the things that bring happiness, he says. Pessimism he hates above all things.

"In 1901 I went to New York in partnership with another man for seven years," he said.

"These were the most unhappy years of my life. The work was uncongenial, my partner and I could not agree in many things and at last I decided to come back to Cleveland where I belonged and go into the insurance business. When I told my partner my decision, he only scoffed and told me I would

never succeed. I have had others tell me I would never make a public speaker, and that I could never do this or I could never do that."

He paused to bang his fist on the table, while his black eyes snapped.

"The man who deliberately discourages you, who tells you that you are no good, that you will never amount to anything, that man, I say, is a criminal and ought to be treated as such."

"My mother," he continued, "was my guiding spirit. When anyone else tried to discourage me, when I lacked confidence in myself, she would say over and over again: 'You can do it, son; you can do it. Just believe you can succeed and you will.'"

He talks of hard work with the same enthusiasm that other men speak of their vocation.

"I can't understand why any man should not enjoy his work," he said.


"The greatest happiness in life comes through hard, persistent work, not too much, so that your vitality is sapped and your nervous system run down, but a full day that leaves just the right amount of pleasant fatigue and makes rest enjoyable. For how can a man enjoy his leisure time except through the contrast of hard work?"

He summed up his philosophy with this: "Live your own life as you see it, and let no obstacles stand in your way. Carry a little sunshine with you wherever you go; it is just as easy to be an optimist as to scatter the poison of pessimism. And above all things, at no one discourage you. The road to happiness is long and hard, anything that is worth while does not come easily, but, believe me, the victory is sweet."

The rest of the time I shall travel and visit around, and I shall offer my services to the Jewish Agency to serve in any way I can. I expect to stay until next summer. If there should be any way you feel that I can serve the cause of Zionism, please be assured that I shall be available as long as I'm there.

I am deeply moved by the most wonderful family devotion shown by Sol with regard to his niece who is the only survivor of his once large family abroad. The niece has already arrived in Palestine on a certificate and I have since been working to secure a certificate for her husband, Josef Finkielman, whom she married in captivity.

Dobkin cabled you on October 23rd, 1946 as follows:

"YOURS 21/10 RE JOSEF AND RACHEL FINKIELMAN
CERTIFICATES NOW UNAVAILABLE THEREFORE NOTED
CASE SPECIAL CONSIDERATION WHEN CONDITIONS
PERMIT ALSO ASKING PALOFFICE PARIS ENABLE
JOSEF JOIN WIFE PARIS VIEW WAITING THERE FOR
CERTIFICATE REGARDS
DOBKIN"

Accordingly, I wish that when you meet him in Basle or perhaps in Paris, to remind him that he must fulfill his promise and enable Josef to rejoin his wife. By the time you arrive in Europe they will probably have a number of certificates at their disposal and Dobkin must be prevailed upon to allocate one to Rachel's husband right away. He must see to it that the Jewish Agency in Paris should send to Finkielman in Poland a certificate which would enable him to arrive in France and from there proceed to Palestine in order to join his wife there.

It is very likely that I may send you a cable to Basle in order to remind you of the matter. You will probably be angry at me for bothering you with such items, but I cannot help it and I know you will do anything you can for Sol.

I am writing to you in your capacity as president of the Zionist Organization of America to secure whatever assistance you are able to afford us in obtaining a scholarship grant for a young man who is registered with us.

This young man, Herbert Hans Heller, originally of Vienna, came here from Palestine last year in order to study electrical engineering at Case. He intends to return to Palestine on completion of his studies. Although he has attained an exceptional record during the one semester he completed at Case (four A's and two B's), he has been told by the school that there are no scholarship resources open to him. Mr. Heller has funds to complete the present semester of school, but will be unable to pay his way any further. Assuming that he works part time during the school year and full time during the summer, he will need about \$3,500 to complete his schooling.

As secretary of the local Joint Educational Loan Committee, which combines the scholarship resources of the Council of Jewish Women, the Jewish Welfare Federation and the Educational League, I am prepared to present his request to that committee. I know, however, from recent experience, that chances for securing such a sizeable sum from our committee are quite slim.

I am therefore writing to you in the hope that you might know of some resource through one of the Zionist organizations which might be available to Mr. Heller. I have worked with Dr. Falkman in attempting to secure funds through the local organization without success. Mr. Heller would, of course, be available for an audience with you at any time if you so desire.

As a large contributor to the United Jewish Appeal, I am writing you with reference to a matter which, I believe requires your serious consideration:

For your information, my contributions to UJA were as follows:

The reason for the drop in contributions during the war years was that I felt the monies would never reach the Jews in Europe. I might have been wrong, but feeling as I did, I certainly was not going to take any chances of enriching the Nazi treasury or any other countries that were anti-semitic. As you will notice, with the end of the war I increased my contributions, and in 1946 contributed \$65,500.

I am writing you all this because I am also interested in the defense of the Jew in this country, being interested in the Anti-Defamation League, which is part of the Joint Defense Appeal for fund-raising purposes. I feel the UJA and the JDA are interlocked. I cannot see how a Jew in Europe could get very much help from the Jews in America if the American Jew lost his status.

Inasmuch as we business men are being taxed entirely too much on these various drives (and I hear this from a lot of business men) all causes - good and bad - are going to be affected materially unless there are less individual drives. Therefore, insofar as the two causes mentioned depend greatly on one another, I feel the coming year (incidentally, it is not going to be an easy year in which to get money) there should be one drive made for both causes. As to percentages, I feel that can be easily adjusted.

Of course, the United Jewish Appeal drive has great appeal

for the Jews of America, especially in New York, but so has the Joint Defence Appeal, because in the latter case they say "Let's defend ourselves, so we can defend others. Furthermore, the Joint Defence Appeal has terrific romance in its fund-raising.


