Dear Sir,

I hardly know how to begin my letter. I have something to tell you and hope that you may spare me a few minutes of your time.

To begin with, I am an 18 year old Jewish student, a high school graduate, whose only wish is to continue his studies in the field of Aeronautical engineering. I have met the requirements of several universities in regards to scholastic standing and studies, including the University of Minnesota. But the obstacle which is blocking the way to the realization of this ambition is the lack of financial assistance. My parents are unable to pay for my tuition. There is no adequate institution over here; and even if there is, I would have been unable of attending it for no simpler reason than I am a Jew. I can't study abroad at the expense of the Iraqi Government for the same cause. The governing body for our Jewish Community won't help in such matters. I do not need money because in the United States I can obtain a part-time employment and earn something sufficient both for living and tuition fees. I could secure neither a passport nor a visa if I am not sponsored by someone or some organization in the state. I must not add that the employment I am going to have is my only

resource. I have to prove to the governments of both the United States and Iraq that there is someone to give me financial support.

I have stated my need clearly and directly and as to my qualification I am prepared to give ample assurances. Enclosed herewith are copies of letters of recommendation by my former teachers together with one from the University of Minnesota. My photo is also included.

My last hope stands in your hand. Should you think my case worthy of notice and try to assist me, I may become a scientist at least, if not a great and famous man.

Sorry to have bored you with this letter.

I have examined the papers which have been submitted on your behalf and find that you have met our requirements with respect to required scholastic standing and studies, so that under ordinary circumstances an admission certificate would be issued to you for study in our Institute of Technology for a course in aeronautical engineering. However, at the present time our registration is so unusually large that we must restrict the number of foreign students who will be accepted.

Under the present regulations, therefore, we can admit only those who come under one or the other of the following groups:


1. Those who are sent by their respective governments.

Dear Sir,

I have known Mr. Akram Haron Fattal, since my return from the States in December 1945, after having remained there for twelve years studying and lecturing.

I am writing of him on the assumption that I am fairly well acquainted with the requirements of various universities and also what makes good students.

My first impression of him was at the begining of the school year when I gave him an assignment and came with it excelling in it the work of any other student, by way of quantity and quality. His English essays, were on many occasions read in the class as a model, not only as a good English Composition, but also because of its common sense, and constructive thinking. At times I was really astounded at the force of his logical and systematic arguments, and also the sincere appeal which at times seems to be challenging.

His ability to grasp and absorb is remarkable. But what is really more remarkable is how he endeavours to make use of what he had already absorbed. He is very energetic, and no task appears to be too difficult to perform. Very obliging, "anything else, Sir?" you always hear him inquiring, after finishing what he was told to do.

To put it concisely, he is brilliant, industrious and creative; he is also congenial, sympathetic and well-behaved. I am sure he could easily adapt himself to the environment of New England. On one hand he displays a puritancial attitude, while on the other he is athletic enough to be a potential material for the rigours of football training.

I admit that I probably painted a picture of Mr. Fattal too perfect to be true. But then of course, I relied upon your discretion and wisdom to deduce the person who has no flaw whatsoever, hasn't yet arrived. When all is said and done, Mr. Fattal however will undoubtedly later on not only be a credit to his alma mater, but he will probably render yeomanly service in alleviating the backward conditions existing in his native country upon his return from your institute fully equipped with the tools of building up.

Dear Sir,

Mr. Akram Heron has been studying under my supervision for the last two years. He first came to see me, to take up additional Mathematical courses and explained his reason at that time. He said that he was preparing himself when he is to graduate from his school to study at M.I.T. He intimated that it would be advisable for him, if he could take such sciences that are not given in the Alliance School. So when he is ready to write to you he should be fully prepared.

Therefore, I have been coaching him in these subjects steadily, and I am definite that he will have no difficulty in following his lessons:-

- 1) Plane Geometry
- 2) Algebra
- 3) Solid Geometry
- 4) Trigonometry

Some of these courses, such as Algebra and plane geometry he studied at two different places independently. He took them in his school, as part of the curriculum, and he studied them under my tutorship. My duty towards him was to fill in the gap between his school studies and the requirements of both the London University Matriculation and to what you may require of him when he is to seek admission.

I want to reiterate and emphasize that in my estimation he is a good material for the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Dear Rabbi:

It is at the suggestion of your secretary Mrs. Klein that I am writing you this letter explaining the predicament I now find myself in, hoping you will find (after reading my letter) that my problem merits your attention. Also, if it is at all possible, I would sincerely appreciate the opportunity to speak to you personally.

To state my problem as briefly as possible, it is this. After four years of my undergraduate work, four years of medical school and approximately two years of hospital work I find myself in the unique position of being in physician's role but no place to practice.

After receiving a B.A. degree from Ohio State University I applied to dozens of medical schools and was turned down by all but two, Middletown University School

of medicine in Boston and Chicago Medical School both classified as unapproved by the American Medical Association. Realizing that attending an unapproved school presented certain limitations I hesitated, but wanting to be a physician I decided to go to Middlebury with the hope that the school would be recognized by the A.M.A. - Also, at the time, I went to Middlebury with the knowledge that at least, I could practice in Massachusetts.

But after a short while in school I discovered that unless the school became recognized I would not even be able to practice in Massachusetts. - The future therefore not being very bright and thus being a war on, several of the students decided to enlist but we were told by Selector Sturz that as a medical student should remain in school for we were essential to the public welfare.

I remained in school and after graduation in April 1845 began my internship at the Best Eye Hospital Brooklyn N.Y. (an internship approved by the A.M.A.) While at the hospital I performed all the duties of a regular intern, delivering babies, performing

operations, setting fractures, diagnosing and treating etc. - I completed my internship in June 1896.

Now, today, although I and many (physicians) whom I have consulted, will feel that I am capable to practice medicine I put myself in this position by not even being able to take an examination which would prove to my capability. However, through a peculiar set of circumstances, my classmates and older graduates of Middlesex can practice medicine & they can practice medicine in New York, Massachusetts and my home state Ohio.

You may well wonder whether  
mae they can do this and I can add,-  
Well, the school is now closed - after  
the closing of the school the New York  
Board of Regents passed a ruling which  
permits Middlesex graduates to take the  
State Board Examinations if they were residents  
of New York prior to their entrance into  
medical school. The Massachusetts legislature  
passed a similar bill for their residents

Unfortunately I can not qualify in either  
instance to poster, the legislative passed  
a bill which allows veterans to take  
the State Board Examination, but through  
no fault of mine, I am not a veteran.  
When I was ~~eligible~~<sup>(I thought)</sup> for a commission  
in the Army the war was over and  
I was informed by the Surgeon General's  
office that I was no longer eligible -  
During the war several of our graduates  
did receive commissions as medical  
officers -



So here I am in the unique position  
I believe of being an M.D. who has no  
place to practice. - Realizing full-well  
my position, and after numerous attempts  
to try to remedy it, I decided that perhaps  
my only choice was to try to get into  
an approved medical school - for you  
see Doctor Silver I want to be a  
physician badly enough that I could  
be more than willing to spend another  
four years in medical school. - But, for  
example in attempting to gain permission

to enter the freshman class at the State University I was turned down again. - I was informed that there were too many veterans applying for entrance into medical school for them to consider my application.

As now Bobbi I am appealing to you (as a perfect stranger, I realize) for advice and any help you might be able to give me. - like Bobbi if you could possibly find the time during your busy day to see me personally I would appreciate it to no end. I realize you are now involved in matters of world wide importance, but to me, my little problem seems to merit <sup>some</sup> attention. Actually it not only <sup>involves</sup> the future of myself but there is my wife and child to consider.

I want to thank you for your indulgence in a perfect stranger and hope again you will find time to see me.







I received your telegram asking me whether the present period is comparatively safe enough not to cause you to postpone your contemplated trip to Palestine and whether in my judgment more settled conditions will prevail a month or two later. I am inclined to believe that there is no point in waiting. No one can foretell what the conditions in Palestine are likely to be. The pending Anglo-Arab conference in London may affect the situation favorably or unfavorably. No one knows what Great Britain has up her sleeve. For the moment there seems to be a relative lull. It may be worse later on. My advice would therefore be that you go.

I am not able to give you a clear answer on the financial matter. Perhaps it will clear up later on.

Dear Uncle Abba:

One whole year has elapsed since I wended my weary way homewards from Japan. The war years are but poignant flash-memories at this stage of the game. As you already know, I immediately returned to my college studies, and I expect to receive my degree this August, when I shall have reached my twenty third year.

Psychologically and emotionally, as they say, I feel that I am properly "adjusted" to our absorbing pattern of civilian life. I have definitely reached that point in my young life where I must make my decision concerning my future career, and that decision has been reached.

As suffering is the badge of our people, so is a life of public service peculiar to the Silver blood. I have cast my "Yarmelke" into the Rabbinical Ring - not because I feel it is dutiful to carry on the proud heritage of our family, which is naturally an important consideration, but because I am resolutely convinced that this is the kind of life's work I can cherish as my own. Perhaps, deep in my heart, I knew long ago that my dubious talents would be ultimately attracted to this field. This choice, incidentally, is not a sudden one. I have been weighing my decision over and over again - especially during the past year.

Dad and Mother are delighted at this, as you would probably imagine. I have a problem, however, and I am writing to you, at Dad's suggestion, for your own gracious counsel and advice.

As I previously mentioned, I shall graduate College this summer. For obvious reasons, I would prefer to go to Cincinnati. However, I will not be prepared to enter the Collegiate Department of the Hebrew Union College until the fall of 1948. That three year military hiatus in my studies naturally set me back a good deal. But, since my return, I have been assiduously striving to make up for lost time, with Dad's wonderful assistance. (What a prodigious Jewish background your generation of Rabbis was heir to!)

And here's my problem, concerning which I earnestly solicit your advice.

Dr. Wise has been anxious for many years to have me enter the Jewish Institute of Religion. I had a conference with him last week, during which he confided to me that if my decision was to remain in New York, instead of going to Cincinnati, I could, with due preparation, enter the Institute this Fall of '47. As you know, we have been members of the Free Synagogue for a great number of years. I graduated from their Sunday School and High School departments. I was Bar Mitzvah'ed there. Before the war, I was head of the Junior Youth Organization; and since my return, I have been elected President of the Senior Youth Group. As a matter of fact, since my return from the Service, I have been even more active in the various activities of the Synagogue - Zionism, Inter-Faith, etc., for the very simple reason that I am very fond of this work. Naturally, it's very gratifying for me to have Dr. Wise take this deep, personal interest in me.


Recognizing the fact that I would have to wait until September, 1948, in order to be ready to enter the Collegiate Department of HUC, do think it advisable and appropriate to start here in New York in September, 1947, with an eye towards transferring a year or two later to Cincinnati? Should I then actually decide to transfer to HUC, do you think that there would be any difficulties in effectuating that transfer? And, as to the long-range view, what do you think of the comparative opportunities in the rabbinical field upon graduation between the two schools?

That's a load of questions, Uncle Abba! May I nevertheless hope that at your early convenience you will want to find the time to kindly answer them for me.

I feel sure that your worthy advice will prove exceedingly helpful to me on the above. Needless for me to assure you that whatever my ultimate decision will have to be, I will feel deeply grateful to you for it.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

About a year ago, you contributed the sum of \$1,000.00 in support of the work of Haganah. During the last year, the organization has strengthened and augmented its efforts many-fold, and has been, in the main, responsible not only for the defense of the Jewish Settlement in Palestine, but also for at least some flow of refugees from the DP camps in Europe to the Jewish Homeland in Palestine.

A group of responsible Jews in New York and other parts of the country have been continuing a steady, but informal, campaign to raise the funds necessary for the purchase or lease of ships and other materials. At the call of the leaders of this group, several of us in Cleveland have undertaken to raise up to \$100,000.00 within the next thirty days, through private solicitation and without any city-wide campaign.

The life and death struggle conducted by Haganah in the transportation and defense of refugee immigrants deserves unusual sacrifice. I have volunteered to act as secretary of the Cleveland Committee, and have also, for myself and Mrs. Sachs, pledged \$2,000.00 for this work, payable \$1,000.00 with the first \$50,000.00 raised, and \$1,000.00 with the balance of the \$100,000.00 collected. To date we have received checks totalling approximately \$8,000.00.

Will you please help and encourage us in this effort by (a) sending your own check promptly in an amount at least double your last year's contribution, and (b) obtaining three to five checks from your personal friends and ~~business associates~~, also as promptly as possible. All checks received at this office will be promptly forwarded to the appropriate authorities in New York, who will acknowledge same directly to the donors.

Notes on the New Prayer Book.

Quite a few composers have written numbers to correspond with the opening numbers of the Sabbath services of the new prayer book. I have no less than four such sets, of decidedly varying merit. For the week-day services however, I have found nothing, which leaves us decidedly in a hole. I am therefore suggesting that for the time being we try the following expedients to get by until something better can be arranged.

1. Use the Psalms we now have in our library.

I. Mah Tovu. we have plenty of these, and good music

II. Tov l'Hodos. ditto,

III. I will lift up (I can't think of the Hebrew title, but it will be sung in Hebrew) We have at least 3 of these, all good music. Use the above for opening numbers, and rotate, until we can find good music for the week-day numbers.

- 2. Is there any money left from the Prayer Book gift, to apply on the choir-books necessary to have the music to match the prayer books.
3. I am very dubious about finding numbers for the week-day openings<sup>psalms</sup>. The commercial element enters into the picture, in that while composers can get a return from the Sabbath psalms, there is probably very little possibility of many temples using the week-day music. I have seen none advertised.
4. It must also be kept in mind that most of the outstanding services - old as well as new - are written with the bach psalms for the opening numbers so the other numbers have almost inevitably been written as conclusions, and it is not always easy to write to order - we have it click. It would be a decided mistake I think and a step backwards to sing numbers that would be jiggery-pokery in music, simply because the words were right.
- (H min') 5. If it is agreeable to you, I would like to schedule Mendelssohn's great cantata "Dear my Prayer" for Sunday, Jan 19th. I will arrange the rest of the service so that we arrive at the address by 11:10 or sooner.
6. Do you wish to retain the use of the Etz Chayim after the scripture reading, with the use of the new prayer book.
7. Where will the Hymn come, after the "May The Words," as at present?

I will try to see you on the above Saturday or when mutually convenient, and you can pencil your comments on the margin as has been your custom in the past.

For Rabbi Nodel:-

Attached to this is a letter from Rabbi Singer of Chicago. In it he recommends that I get in touch with Dr. Eric Werner regarding the music for the Three Holidays as well as that for the High Holydays. Passover will be on us before we know it, hence my wish to get action in the matter, for there is quite a bit of new music for Passover that we will not only have to order and wait for after that, but which the choir will also have to learn; and I would like to get it in hand as soon as possible. I think you know that I tried to get an En Kelohenu from Dr. Werner that Rabbi Silver wanted, and that to date while have I have had four letters saying that the En Kelohenu was available, yet I have not seen the music. So you can understand why I am asking that you contact Dr. Werner in the Name of The Temple, leaving me out of it altogether. I believe that you know him, hence will have a line of approach that I do not seem to have.

Now we have the supplementary music to the new Prayer Book issued by The American Board of Rabbis, and written by Grimm, Zilberts, and Adler, and also a small supplementary book to the Hymnal which I shall show you. The main thing we want is as follows.

1. Settings of the opening Psalms for the 3rd & 4th Week day morning services. (You will note that Rabbi Singer is vague on this)
2. The music for the three festivals, which Rabbi Singer says Dr. Werner has gotten together and published (?)
3. The music for the High Holydays. This last is not as immediately important as we do not yet have this prayer book, and there is still plenty of time.

I realize that I am asking a good deal of you, but I hope you can get your secretary to write the letters, and also depend a great deal on the fact of your personal acquaintance with Dr. Werner. It is a large contribution you can make to the music of The Temple, though I shall take it as the greatest of personal favors if you can help me out in this matter.

the problem you pose, for the revision of the Prayer Book was made without reference to the available musical material. Some of these Psalms were never in the Cantor's repertoire, for they were used originally for private devotion and not for the chanted parts of Public Worship. This departure imposed the task of creating new material in line with Jewish musical tradition.

Our Committee has issued Vol. II of the Union Hymnal to meet the additional settings for the High Holidays. This collection will appear in permanent form to supply the needs for the coming Holy Days.

We have another Collection for the Three Festivals (Passover, Pentecost and Tabernacles) edited by Dr. Eric Werner of the Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati. Wherever possible, we have used traditional material adapted for modern use. ~~also~~ For the Memorial Service, there is more material already available. I have set the El Male Rahamim (chant) for organ, Choir and Solo (Cantor) published by Bloch Publishing Co. 31 West 31st St. *(This very good)*

I would suggest that you get in touch with Dr. Werner of the Hebrew Union College for further information.

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

Dear Dr. Werner:

I am writing this letter for Mr. A. R. Willard, the musical director of The Temple, requesting certain materials from you which are necessary for the proper musical portions of our service. It seems that Mr. Willard had written you in the past and has not, as yet heard from you.

The music library here at The Temple contains the supplementary music to the new prayer book written by Grimm, Zilberta, and Adler and also the small supplementary book to the hymnal.

The main thing we want now is as follows:

1. Settings for the opening Psalms for the third and fourth week-day morning service. In reply to a letter which we wrote to Dr. Jacob Singer of Chicago, he says that the revised prayer book was made without reference to the available musical material and therefore, some of the Psalms which open the services, in this particular case, namely the third and fourth services, contain Psalms which were never in the Cantor's repertoire and they were used originally for private devotion and not for the chanted parts of public worship. This departure imposes the task of creating new material in line with Jewish musical tradition. I am sure you know whether such material is available. Musical settings for Psalms 5 and 36.
2. The music for the Three Festivals which Dr. Singer says you have edited. Is this published and is it available?
3. The music for the High Holy Days.

This last is not as immediately important as the rest since we do not yet have this prayer book and there is still plenty of time.

I would appreciate whatever assistance you can give us in creating a well-balanced musical service to go along with the newly-revised prayer book. Naturally, the fact that we are one of the few temples which has its main service Sunday morning, does create some problems.

Dear friend J.J.:

the kashes which you asked me in your letter of Febr. 18, have never yet been posed to me by Mr. Willard. To the contrary! Mr. Willard urged me to make the En kelohenu in my arrangement available to him, which I, after some hesitation, did, since the piece is being copyrighted, but not yet printed. I asked him to return the manuscript immediately after having made photostats. Please urge Mr. Willard to return the manuscript immediately, since I shall need it for a solemn service on March 7th and want to have it sometime before.

*What do you suggest?* Now as to your questions. You put me on the spot with the first question, since Dr. Singer's reply is perfectly correct. These psalms, belonging to tachanun or to private devotion, were in medieval times not sung by the chazan. I would suggest to you to have a good composer, but not a super-modern one, to compose music for these passages. Since they have to serve for Sunday services, they should be composed in a somewhat splendid style.

Yes, I have the manuscript of the music for the three festivals. It was approved enthusiastically by the music committee, but since there were no funds appropriated and the demand is not too strong, the work has, up to now, remained manuscript. If you want it, I shall be glad to lend it to you for a moderate compensation.

The music for the High holydays has been edited by the Music committee under my leadership last year already, and I cannot understand that you have not received it. It was edited in a nice experimental form and contains some good material. If you write to Dr. Marcusson, you will surely receive it.

I was very happy to learn that you and your family have adjusted yourselves so well to the new congregation; and I may add that I have heard only very complimentary remarks about your work. If you want me to give a short lecture on any of my subjects (you ought to know them) Music of the Church and of the Synagogue, The Song of New Palestine, the Eternal Bridge, etc., I shall welcome the occasion of seeing you, Ollie, and the baby. I am speaking on March 20 in Pittsburgh in Freehof's temple; the next three days after that event I am free; later on early in April. I would love to see you again and tell you a few stories of the old alma mater.





Dear Rabbi Silver :

I have followed with interest and admiration your position on the Zionist issue these past few months. The Basel Congress seemed to me to mirror just about all the confusions of our time, spiritual and political. This is true of every major issue, as I see it, increasingly so.

As you may possibly have noticed in leafing thru the lecture folders, a certain Allen is not lecturing this year. Why? I would not know what to say about anything and, what's more, I do not think that audiences are either very rational or very perceptive (I suppose they have to be more or less rational to be at all perceptive) in this year of Grace. I am working on a book on 19th century Spain which calls, happily, for a lot of research.

However, I have made one exception to my no lecture rule, and that is to speak for the Jewish Welfare Society in Seattle on March 17th. I was born there. My Father, a lawyer, had many good Jewish friends most of whom I have fortunately inherited. I couldn't renege and my hope is that for at least this one lecture I will know what to say where I wouldn't, if I were trekking about the country.

It occurs to me to ask you two things. First, to be good enough to advise me briefly on what the Zionist lineup, or the lineup on the Palestine issue, might be in Seattle, something I suppose you will know--so that I will avoid certain pitfalls. I haven't been around enough up there to have any idea as to who stands where. Second, I am speaking of course for free, not being under contract. I usually think this a mistake as people never seem to like what they get for nothing, especially when it is a home-grown product. I am sure you won't think it odd of me if I ask you if you would be good enough to write some friend of ours, or simply the secretary of the Welfare society, Miss Ann Kaufman 207 Court Bidg., 408 Marion Street, some sort of endorsement, that I have spoken for you etc. I am sure you will understand this. I want them to feel that they aren't doing me a favor, as some groups are apt to

when they provide you with a platform. I would really appreciate this as I can see any number of my Seattle friends wondering whether they shouldn't have got some more impressive platform figure. You know the reaction, I am sure.

You are awarecf my interest in things Spanish. I should like to call your attention, if you have not already seen it, to a book on Laynez by an S J named Richter wheran it is admitted that Laynez was originally of Jewish faith. As yousurely know, the Jesuits have long denied ths, doubtless thinking that Saint Ignatius shouiu have known better than to choose as his right bower a man whose past was rotten in the "heresy" they most feared. As you have surely seen, today most Jesuits areinclined to doubt the sincerity of conversions in that period--with some reasog, I believe.

I hope to have the pleasure of seeing you again some day. In the meantime, let me wish you strength in thefight you have undertaken.

The Sgolds, wherever you find them are all rababi, members of two branches of a Hungarian family.

David Glenthals' maternal grandmother was a Sgold. David, like most of the members of his generation in the family, was born and reared in a small town in the mid-west, the only Jewish family, received no formal Jewish training for two or more generations, observed no Jewish ritual or ceremony.

These children, however, were taught to keep alive the spark of their Judaism, None ever denied his faith or was "converted" despite attendance at church and the contagion of revival meetings. Most of the generation (nineteen first cousins, Glenthals and Sgolds) married non-Jewish childhood friends (of good family and well educated), reared families, were

wise adjusted, loyal and useful citizens.  
Pain's High School valedictory address  
was entitled "Why I am a Jew"

I knew Henrietta Szold, her mother and  
sisters since my fifteenth year, loved & ad-  
mired them. Henrietta understood and  
appreciated the reasons why these young  
people were sympathetic to Zionism but  
could not believe in active Zionism. (She did  
influence others of the Szolds (Robert & Zep) to  
active Zionism, & they who were reared as  
we were, through conversation and not because  
of family tradition, became observing Jews  
and active Zionists.

Professionally, I sincerely think, most  
Hablis might be opposed to backgrounds,  
passive beliefs, mixed marriages, and non-  
apostolic such as ours. - I do not know  
your "plant" on the subject of Davis ap-
