

Dear Dr. Silver:

The writer had the privilege of being the first one to inform you on the morning of November 28th, 1947, that the Philippine Delegation had instructions to reverse its' stand on the Partition Question.

I am now taking the liberty of enclosing what purports to be an endorsement by you of an appeal being made by the Great Palestine Orphan Asylum Diskin, Inc. I am solely interested in ascertaining whether or not there is such an organization in existence.

It seems that the more I respond to appeals made by Palestinian Charitable Institutions, the more Institutions I hear from. In fact, I am now even hearing directly from private individuals who refer to themselves as Rabbis, enclosing endorsements of their appeals for personal assistance by Rabbi Herzog. Rather than turn down a worthy cause, I am inclined to send these organizations and individuals a contribution, even though I am sceptical as to whether or not they are in existence.

Don't you think that these appeals conflict with the drive of the United Jewish Appeal and other worthy appeals? If so, what, if anything, can be done about it? While the American fund for Palestinian Institutions is a step in the right direction, evidently it is an inadequate one.



MEMORANDUM

I. UNITY IS ESSENTIAL TO THE FUTURE OF THE JEWISH PEOPLE

II. THE RELIGIOUS TRADITION - BASIS OF UNITY

III. THE RELIGIOUS CENTER IN JERUSALEM

This memorandum, submitted to Mr. Wm.B.Herlands, President of The Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, attempts to focus attention on some past mistakes of world Zionist leadership with a view to the correction of a possible error on the part of religious leaders.

The consequent emphasis on the shortcomings and failures of world Zionist leaders should not be permitted to obscure their merits and achievements which are unquestionable.

I. UNITY IS ESSENTIAL TO THE FUTURE OF THE JEWISH PEOPLE

Unity is essential to the future growth and development of the Jewish people as a whole. It can be safeguarded and strengthened on the basis of the religious tradition only.

The internationally recognized State of Israel does not of itself insure the National Redemption of the Jewish people any more than the internationally approved "Jewish National Home" provided for the salvation of those who were destroyed.

Past errors of world Zionist leadership render the achievement of National Redemption very difficult. An error of a similar nature on the part of world Jewish religious leaders may prevent it altogether.

Past Errors

1. Conflict Over Means Sacrificed End Itself

A generation ago, the same world Zionist leaders who had labored to secure the Balfour Declaration engaged soon after in a conflict over proceduarl matters such as the mode of financing, qualifications of personnel, type of economy, stc., for the upbuilding of the "Jewish National Home" in Palestine.

a) That conflict and its direct and immediate consequences suppressed for many years the human and economic potential of the great and rich American Jewish community.

b) The absence of the necessary effort on the part of American Jewry - at a time when European Jewry lay prostrate from the ravages of war and pogroms - rendered impossible the speedy and large scale upbuilding of Eretz Israel which had been envisaged.

2. Philanthropic Appeal Replaced Zionist Ideal

Pressed by the need for funds which were not forthcoming from American Jewry, world Zionist leaders resorted increasingly to the philathropic appeal of "Palestine - a 'Haven of Refuge' for the persecuted Jews of Europe."

The financial reponse to this philanthropic appeal hardly warranted the replacement of the complete Zionist goal by a partial aim even as a matter of temporary expediency.

a) The omission of Zionist education furthered among American Jews a conviction that Zionism was a charitable enterprise for the benefit of the "unfortunate Jews of the Old World." They began to perceive the value of 'Palestine' as a 'Haven of Refuge' for <u>displaced</u> Jews only after they were more or less convinced that even the generous New World had shut its gates to the overwhelming majority of the Jewish victims.

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b) The results of drives for funds became less inadequate only after persecution of Jews in Europe became mass extermination of the victims who were denied everywhere even the elementary right of temporary asylum.

Past Failures Threaten Future of Israel

1. Failure to Prepare The Land For The People

The failure to settle and build Eretz Israel during the first fifteen years of the Balfour Declaration era cost the Jewish people:

- a) Countless more lives in the European holocaust;
- b) Much of the area originally recognized as Eretz Israel;
- c) The exorbitant sacrifices in lives and goods exacted from the small Yishuv in Eretz Israel.

2. Failure to prepare the Jewish People for National Redemption .

The failure of world Zionist leadership to initiate and carry out a long range program of Zionist education, especially in the Western Hemisphere, constitutes a double threat to the future of the Jewish people.

a) The condition of a scattered people of Israel deprived for two thousand years of its Homeland was degrading but not devoid of grandeur. While struggling everywhere to assert its human worth and its freedom of conscience, the Jewish people was in reality fighting for the freedom and dignity of all men.

b) But the condition of a Jewish people confronted in the not too distant future with a stunted little state that will have waited in vain for the great <u>Shivath Tsiyon</u> (Return to Zion), which is the prerequisite to <u>Geulath Haam</u>, would be unmitigated degradation. Disunity and lack of education in the past brought the Jewish people to this <u>impasse</u>. The gates of Eretz Israel have been opened now by the supreme effort of the Yishuv and the belated assistance of . American Jewry. But one half of surviving world Jewry is not free to act, and the other half is not prepared to act.

II. THE RELIGIOUS TRADITION - BASIS OF UNITY

Zionist political endeavors and philanthropic action served in recent years to increase the dires of cooperation and unity of the overwhelming majority of the Jewish people.

But barring a renewed Anglo-Arab assault on the State of Israel, the Jewish communities in the Diaspora are not likely to engage in any political Zionist activities.

And barring a major world catastrophe, philanthropic action is unlikely to continue in the preeminent position it held of late in Jewish communal life.

Unlike the two preceding factors, religious interests are everywhere perceptibly on the ascendant in Jewish life. In addition to the impelling force of deeply rooted religious sentiments, various experiences and influences operate to increase adherence to the religious tradition among ever widening Jewish circles.

a) Jows are increasingly seeking to strengthen their communal cohesion through religious institutions and affiliation - a tendency further accentuated by the mass extermination of Jews in 'civilized' lands.

b) Jewish survivors of the European holocaust - even so-called radicals in collective and cooperative settlements in Eretz Israel show a new determination to hold on to the Jewish religious tradition. It is their intimate bond with those who wanted them to cherish the religious tradition and who did not live to reach the land of Israel.

c) Jews feel impelled to provide increasingly facilities for Jewish ceremonial life as a means to stem the tide of intermarriage, especially in the small Jewish communities in the Western Hemisphere.

d) The concern about being erroneously considered "godless" impels Jews to develop more and more the congregational set-up even in the smallest communities.

e) Jews in the Diaspora seem to become increasingly aware that the religious bond between them and the renascent Jewish nation in Eretz Israel is the solution to the problem that seems to preoccupy many of them. (See the New York Times, Nov.10,1948 = copy attached).

f) As the teachings of the <u>Torah</u> and the ideals of the prophets become increasingly the daily spiritual fare of the young generation in Eretz Israel, the Jewish tradition is bound to gain in vitality and creativity and experience a new flowering. g) Though there may be a tendency to "denominationalism of Judaism in this country," the fact remains that Jewish religious leadership is not disrupted by any doctrinal conflict. The three major Jewish religious sectors seem to have evolved some criterion of unity as evidenced by the existence of the Synagogue Council of America which represents Orthodox, Reform, and Conservative Jewry.

The religious tradition of Israel was and is the strongest permanent bond that unites the Jewish people in the Diaspora and can serve as the legitimate bond between the world-wide community and the Jewish nation that will evolve in its own land. This bond can and should be further strengthened and preserved through the creation of a great religious center in Jerusalem. (See memorandum dated Jerusalem, June 20, 1947).

III. THE RELIGIOUS CENTER IN JERUSALEM

A great religious center in Jerusalem would draw some of the best creative forces from the Diaspora. It would help to enrich the spiritual heritage of the Jewish people in the Jewish Homeland. It would serve to radiate the regenerating influence of the Jewish tradition from Eretz Israel to all the Jewish communities in the world. And the unity of the Jewish people thus strengthened and fostered could lead to ever greater achievements on the road to National Relemption.

The very existence of such a religious center in Jerusalem would give peace of mind to the overwhelming majority of the Jewish people.

But to fulfil its great function, such a religious center must be of the Jewish people, for the Jewish people, and created by the concerted effort of world Jewry inspired and guided by a united religious leadership.

A New Error In The Making

The historic necessity for unity is certainly not less urgent today than it was a generation ago when individual and group ambitions, collective prejudices and misconceptions, etc., triumphed under the cover of ideological conflicts.

The cumulative effects of the past errors make a new one so much more dangerous. Yet an error similar in nature to the past replacements of the complete goal by partial aims seems to be in the making.

a) The unwarranted claim* to priority launched in the general press (See The New York Times, Nov.10,1948 - copy attached) is bound to arouse misgivings regarding its intent and purpose.

Remark: The Chief Rabbinate in Jerusalem has been urged for the last few years to initiate the planning of a religious center in Jerusalem. See attached memorandum dated June 20,1947.Other memoranda are available in Jerusalem. b) The prestige conferred upon one religious group of American Jewry through the presence of a special emissary from Jerusalem and the attendant publicity (See The New York Times, Jan. 27,1949 -copy attached) is another perilous <u>faux pas</u>. It is bound to conjure up in the minds of too many good Jews the fear of a possible development of authoritarianism and coercion in a realm where inspiration and guidance should prevail.

c) The fatal sequence of priority-prestige-privilege that palyed such a prominent (though not overt) part in the disruption of Zionist efforts at a crucial moment in Jewish history caused the Jewish people irreparable losses.

d) The substitution of Particularism for unity in the religious realm, if not checked now in its very inception, may rend asunder the Jewish people into a sort of "Catholic" Jewry with a Vatican" in Jerusalem and a sort of "Protestant" Jewry that will look for its religious personnel and guidance to New York City.

It is too difficult to envisage objectively the possible consequences of such a disruption of the basic religious unity of the Jewish people.

The Religious Tradition And Modern Zionism

Essentially, modern Zionism worked and works for the realization of the age-old religious hope of National Redention. What is more appropriate than that the religious leadership should now come to its rescue and make the concerted effort needed to insure the future growth and development of Israel both in its Homeland and abroad.

Today, Zionist leaders, especially in Eretz Israel, are engaged in the overwhelming daily tasks of absorbing a large scale immigration for which the land has not been prepared.

The religious leaders, especially in the United States, have before them the twofold task of:

a) Safeguarding and stregthening the unity of the Jewish people the unity that is rooted in the religious tradition, not in the transitory unity that springs from disaster.

b) Initiating the long overdue program of education for implanting the love of Zion without which we can hardly hope to achieve National Redemption.

The religious leadership of world Jewry can best carry out this twofold task through the medium of a great religious center in Jerusalem.

The very initiation of the planning of such a center by a united Jewish religious leadership would have a most beneficent effect on world Jewry in its present state.

Let the first act of cooperation of Jewish religious leadership of all the sectors be the establishment of the Great Synagogue in Jerusalem.

Stones and mortar help make history for a people. Let us remember what the <u>Kottel Hamaaravi</u> in Jerusalem meant to all the generations of Israel in the Dispersion. And let us also not forget what influence is being <u>now</u> exerted by the Moslem mosques of Old Jerusalem on the very destiny of our Holy City.

AUTHORITY IN FAITH IS URGED FOR JEWS

The Chief Rabbinate of Israel Suggested for Supreme Rule in Matters of Religion

The initial step toward recognition of the Chief Rabbinate of Israel as the supreme religious authority for Jews has been taken by the Rabbinical Council of America, which says it representss by between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 Orthodox Jews in the United States and Canada.

This was announced yesterday by Dr. Israel Tabak, president of the Council at a conference at its office 331 Madison Avenue. He hailed the establishment of close ties between American Jewish communities and the Chief Rabbinate as "epoch-making" and as a stabilizing factor in the interpretation of Judaism im for American Jews.

Dr. Tabak said that "whereas this authority will be similar in some ranges respects to the authority exercised in Rome upon the Catholic communities throughout the world, it does not envisage the creation of a hierarchy with power to appoint heads is of synagogues outside of Palestine.

For any Authoritative Interpretation

"Judaiam is a religion of laws and not of men," he added. "and it is the authoritative interpretation of Jewish religious law contained in the Bible and the Talmud that will be handed down by a competent body of scholars associated with the Chief Rabbinate of the Holy Land. Religious authority centered in Israel would be analogous in Jewish religious law to the Supreme Court of the United States in civil law."

In the first step the 1,500 synagágues associated with the Council have made the first addition to their prayer books in 100 years in America by including a special prayer for the welfare of Israel and the Chief Rabbi of the new state, Dr. Isaac Halevy Herzog. The prayers will become part of the ritual of these synagogues, Dr. Tabak said.

Later, Dr. Tabak said, he will suggest a world conference of Jewish groups to be held in Jerusalem in an effort to stem the denominationalism of Judaism in this country.

Herzog Welcomes Phan

The idea for closer religious ties was first suggested by Dr. Tabak last May at the annual convention of the council. Following adoption of a resolution to this effect, Dr. Tabak expressed the desire in a letter to Dr. Herzog.

In answer to Dr. Tabak's letter, Dr. Herzog wrote:

"I welcome with deep spiritual joy the awakening that has arisen among you, rabbis of Israel in the United States, in the wake of the establishment of the State of Israel, to renew as of old the spiritual ties between the scattered communities throughout the world and the holy city of Jerusalem, the city of the sanctuary, by the reestablishment in Israel of the supreme religious authority to be ventered in Jerusalem."

Many American Jews, Dr. Tabak asserted, are now confused and perplexed when they stop to think of their relationship to the new state of Israel. As loyal Americans, he added, they can have no part in the internal political affairs of Israel.

"What character will the strong emotional attachment to Zion, which American Jewish masses have always had, assume in the future? "Our plan furmnishes the answer. The relationship will no longer be political but religious and cultural.

WO RLD CHIEF URGED FOR ALL RABEINATES

Special to The New York Times

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 26 - As Roman Catholics look to the Pope in the Vatican, the Rabbinates throughout the world should be unified through the establishment of a central institution around the Chief Rabbinate in Jerusalem, the midwinter conference of the Rabbinical Council of America was told today.

The proposal was outlined to the Council, composed of 400 orthodox rabbis ministering in forty states, by Rabbi Jacob Goldman, of Jerusalem, personal secretary of the Chief Rabbi of Israel, Dr. Isaac Halevi Herzog.

"Whatever obedience would be rendered to such a central body would be entirely woluntary," said Rabbi Goldman, who attended the conference as the emissary of Dr. Herzog.

"Obedience, "he said, "would not be political but purely religious, much as Catholics look to the Vatican for spiritual sustenance and guidance."

The Rabbinates of the European continent, he reported, seem tremendous possibilities for strengthening the Jewish religion through such a unification. The establishment of the Chief Rabbinate as the central religious authority in Israel for the world Jewry, it was pointed out, was first suggested by the Rabbinical Council.

At a press conference, Rabbi Goldman emphasized that the proposal was not intended to set up a clerical rule in Israel.

THE NEED FOR A SPIRITUAL CENTER IN JERUSALEM

TO PRESERVE THE UNITY OF ISRAEL TRANSLATION

> This is the summary of a talk with Chief Rabbi Isaac Halevi Hermog of Israel, submitted to him at his request onJune 20, 1947 in Jerusalem.

I. The Synamonue is the Central Institution of Jewish Life in the Western Hemisphere.

- The synagogue is the central institution of Jewish life in the Western Hemisphere, especially in the USA. Jews in the New World feel, according to their own statements, that the synagogue - notwithstanding its present limitations is the main bulwark that stands between them and total disappearance through biological assimilation.
- Heretofore the synagogue of the New World drew its spiritual sustemance and even its personnel from European Jewry. Even to this day, the foremost rabbinical scholars, the outstanding cantors and the overwhelming majority of those steeped in Jewish learning came to the Western hemisphere from Europe.
- 3. The European wellspring that supplied the spiritual nurture for the young and vigorous American Diaspora of six million Jews has been suddenly and cruelly destroyed. And this destruction came about at a time when Eretz Israel has not yet developed sufficiently its spiritual resources. And, indeed, the spiritual center of the Jewish people is now being developed not in Eretz Israel but in the United States of America.
- 4. Eretz Israel is hardly exerting any direct influence on the spiritual life which is developing in the great American dispersion. Nor is Eretz Israel offering that special assistance that is needed to oreate a solid foundation for the unity of the Jewish people - a foundation that would be able to safeguard under all conditions and at all times a legitimate bond between Israel in the dispersion and the restored nation in Fretz Israel.

II. Zioniss and the Unity of Israel in the Euture

1. Zioniam as the National Rebirth of Israel has not struck very deep or many roots among the six millions of Jews in the Western Hemisphere. (Witness the limitation of the pioneer youth movement of the entire continent to a few hundred chosen souls and of these many are not natives of the New World republics.) Jewish National Consciousness is utterly lacking in the overwhelmming majority of American Jews. The constitutions of the various republics, from the USA to Uruguay, never regarded the Jews as a national or ethnic minority. The Jewsborn in the USA, for instance, and even the Jews who came there in their early childhodd, consider themselves full-fledged members of the American nation, and not only as citizen of the American State. Thanks to the religious freedom that prevails on the whole American continent and the existence of many religious sects and denominations, the Jew readily identifies himself with his own "religious community."

- 2. <u>Zioniss as philanthropy</u> has found a much greater response, though by far not what it could have been. It is only due to the unprecedented tragedy of the destruction and uprooting of European Jewry that the last two years saw a more adequate willingness to contribute to Zionist funds. Still the number of contributors and the amount of the contributions fell far short of the possibilities.
- 3. Zionism as political action is limited even to a smaller number of individuals. It is safe to state that even these, in their majority, function in the conviction that their activities are something which is done for the benefit of others, and they are willing to carry them on as long as they are convinced that they are not acting in any way against the will of their government.
- 4. There is ground to doubt as to whether this sort of Zionism is apt to stand the trials and pressures that may arise in the course of time, especially should the Displaced Persons problem and the political struggle find their solution. There is perhaps something of a warning in what happened in Brazil when Zionism was supposed to have fallen there under a government ban for seven years, from April 1938 to April 1945. A journalist in Rio de Janeiro pointed out: "The gentile Carlos Prestes (Communist leader of Brazil) served some ten years in prison for his adherence to the doctrine of his master. We Zionists, not one of aur leaders saw the inside of a prison or paid any fine for adherence to Zionism. We quickly rid ourselves of our Zionism."

III. Only Spiritual Values Can Safeguard the Unity of Israel.

- The period of transition confronting us is without precedent in our millennial history. Whether the United Nations favor our cause or, God forbid, condemn it, the new reality which may result either way will place the majority of our people in the Diaspora to a test which may endanger the Unity of Israel.
- The spiritual values, which preserved our people throughout its long dispersion and which led . to the national rebirth of Israel on its own soil, are best adapted to safeguard the unity of Israel also in the future.
- Jerusalem has been the center to which the eyes and hearts of our people turned in prayer fourscore and more generations. Jerusalem should also in the future fulfill the mission which our prophets

Jerusalem should be built up as the great dynamic spiritual center capable of attracting the best talents of world Jewry and should be thus enabled to radiate its influence on Jewish life in the dispersion. Such reciprocal influence between the Diaspora and Eretz Israel is indispensable to the development and growth of Eretz Israel and the preservation of the unity of Israel in the future.

4. Naturally, the upbuilding of Jerusalem as the great spiritual center it should be is the work of generations, but the need for a planned beginning is very urgent at this time. The program would have to be worked by a large body of experts whose function it would be to do so. But it is desirable perhaps to indicate in broad outline some of the activities that should be started without delay.

IV. Suggested Initial Activities

- Organization of a set-up for the creation and publication of illustrated booklets of the story and legends of Jerusalem throughout the ages. The material should aim to implant the love and reverence that past generations of our people felt for the City of David.
- The selection and earliest acquisition of an adequate area of land in Jerusales for the erection of the many buildings that the spiritual center will require in the course of time, as for instances a. House of Frayer of adequate dimensions;
 - b. Rabbinical Seminary;
 - e. Conservatory for the study and research of liturgical music;
 - d. Special Library;
 - e. Museum of Sancta etc.;
 - f. Hall of Prophets with the history unfolding in film and radio;
 - g. Biblical garden with retreats (cottages and rooms) for creative work of resident and visiting scholars and artists;
 - h. Residences for the personnel connected with the spiritual work of the center
 - 1. Hostels for pilgrims of limited means.
- 3. Creation of a Commission that will dedicate itself to the bducation of the inhabitants of Jerusalem for the duty of receiving pilgrims from all over the world.
- Establishment of an institution for the education and training of intelligent guides and receptionists for the pilgrims.
- 5. A Commission for promoting the development of housing facilities for the various categories of pilgrims.
- 6. A world-wide set-up for the promotion of pilgrimages from all lands to Jerusalem.
- 7. The initiation of broadcasts from Jerusales to the Diaspora (and rebroadcasts abroad) of regular Bible reddings, religious services of special occasions, Selihoth, liturgical music, etc.



Dear Dr. Silver:

I am writing to you about a local UJA problem in the solution of which you can be most helpful.

Mr. David Geffen, a local automobile merchant, has always been an active Zionist, and a pretty good contributor to the United Jewish Appeal (last year he gave \$4,375). He has just returned from Florida, and when I, as the Chairman of Utica's '49 campaign, asked him to go to Syracuse to a Regional Conference----Mr. Geffen told me in no uncertain terms that he wouldn't go----that he wouldn't attend ANY UJA functions this year, and that furthermore, he wouldn't give a cent. His reasons:----Dr. Silver and Dr. Neumann have lost their battle to retain control of the UPA----and he would have nothing to do with a drive headed by such "gangsters" as Henry Montor and Henry Morgenthau.

Thinking that anyone who has always been an ardent supporter of our cause, couldn't possibly put <u>any</u> personal considerations ahead of the welfare of the State of Israel-----I visited with Mr. Geffen last evening and after a long discussion, using every argument possible-----I obtained nothing except a confirmation of our previous talk, with this significant addition. Mr. Geffen would rather that the UJA raise 50 million this year under the leadership of Drs. Silver and Neumann, than raise 150 million under Mr. Morgenthau and Mr. Montor.

You can imagine my consternation at hearing such a remark-----and can only turn to you for help in straightening out this misguided individual. I an certain of your sincere interest in getting the maximum funds for UJA in this all-important year----and I am sure that the case of Mr. Geffen is that of a pupil going much, much further than his teacher had intended. Fortunately for us, his is an isolated case----ceal Zionist leaders like Archibald Silverman and Dr. Silver, regardless of their personal positions about the leadership of the campaign, are heart and soul in the campaign---and I am sure that a letter from you to Mr. Geffen will help rectify this unfortunate situation. His address is 437 Columbia Street-----and may I please have a copy of your letter sent to the above address, so that I can be properly guided as to how best to proceed.

Either I, or someone else who represents an opposing viewpoint, will probably debate this matter with Rabbi Friedman. I would therefore like to get a reaction from you concerning the enclosed statement, or such other material as you may care to supply.

You may remember me from Johnstown, Pa. My brother Elvin is still one of your staunch adherents.

Dear Dr. Silver:

For the first time, a sermon prompted me to write to the deliverer of it.

I always enjoy your sermons, your oratory is marvelous and your sincerity is beyond question. Usually you are right, sometimes you are wrong, and in my way of thinking, the opinions expressed in your sermon this morning are <u>basically</u> wrong. I say "basically" because the facts given by you were truthful, many of your opinions are undeniable, but there is one factor which you seemingly do not take into consideration; namely, the spirit and sims of the U.S.S.R. in general and of the Communist party in particular.

Before coming to the point, I wish to state that I spent 30 of the best years of my life in Russia. In 1905, I took an active part in the Revolutionary movement which aimed to get rid of the Czar and everything he stood for.

I graduated from a Russian high school and have a college degree. While I consider the U.S.A. (my adopted country) the best in the world, and while I love the people and the democratic way of living here, I nevertheless have an affinity toward Hussia, the Hussian people. At home, with my wife, I speak Hussian, read Hussian literature including the Moscow newspaper "Pravda".

In 1930, after an absence of ten years, I spent six weeks in the U.S.S.R., met an innumerable number of old friends and relatives, and spent many sleepless nights in the company of either Russian officials, former school mates of mine or people deprived of all rights on account of their political opinions. You can readily see that I had a good chance to study conditions there.

On the way home, I spent five days in Paris in the company

of a high Russian official, Semion Wulfson, a childhood friend of mine who was the U.S.S.R. grain export representative for France, Italy, and the Netherlands. (He is now dead so I can mention his name.) We spent evenings, late into the night, discussing old times and dreams of the future. It is surprising how the dreams developed by him over 18 years ago became so close to actuality: Absorption of the parts in Europe which formerly belonged to Russia (Poland, Baltic States), Communization of the Slavic States and all of Europe, and finally, the triumph of communism all over the world. The world one country: The Union of (all) Socialist Soviet Republics with the capitol in Moscow.

I personally have no objections to one world, but I would rather die than live under a dictatorship similar to the U.S.S.R. You know too well the living conditions (moral rather than physical) in the U.S.S.H. and there is no need for me to expend on the subject.

The "Marshall Plan" and the "North Atlantic Pact" have their very serious shortcomings. You pointed them out so ably in your sermon. I agree with every word you said about the U.N. and how detrimental it is to "stab it in the back". Nobody will deny how undemocratic the new comrades-in-arms, Portugal and Greece, are. However, is it not true that the Marshall Plan prevented so far the absorption behind the "Iron Curtain" of Greece and Italy? While the Atlantic Pact has its evils and shortcomings, will it not act as a barrier against the absorption of all Europe behind the "Iron Curtain"?

It is true that the U.S.S.R. top officials know that they are too weak to wage a war against the U.S.A. for another decade. But by strongly adhering to the motto: "The end justifies the means", and by gradually absorbing and "digesting" more territory and people, they will get to where my boyhood friend predicted unless stopped before it is too late.

I hate to live over another war. I have even selfish reasons as my son and son-in-law are reserve officers in the U.S.A. navy and army respectively. I hope and pray that the North Atlantic Pact will act as a stop gap only, meantime the people of the world will learn to see the light. It is better to experience a "cold war" for many generations than to have a "hot war" a decade from row. On the way out of the Temple, I overheard one fellow saying: "If we could live in peace with the Czar of Russia, why can we not live in peace with Stalin?" There is a big difference. The ruthless Czars of Russia, with all of their barbarism, did not aim to conquer the world, while the basic idea of communism and dictatorship is exactly this. In addition, communism is synonymous with fanaticism and has no bounds unless stopped in time.

Tomorrow I may be sorry for writing this letter but I was eager to get it off my chest. In addition, I hate to realize that notwithstanding your knowledge of the world conditions in general, and the U.S.S.R. in particular, you, I am sorry to say, seemingly fail to see the "spirit" of rulers for the U.S.S.R. and of the countries behind the "Iron Curtain".

I wish to convey to you my deep respect and appreciation.


Upon my return to Tel Lviv, I have appointments with some governmentpeople, including Dr. Kohn who wrote the proposed constitution.





I just completed a long talk with Danny, and it is upon his suggestion that I am writing to you.

I will be ordained in 1951, "im yirtzeh hasnem," and am anxious to spend at least one year in Israel before graduation. Although I have always been active in the Zionist movement, having been a lecturer-counselor at the National Senior Judaea camp and a leader and organizer of clubs in Cincinnati and Cleveland, I believe that my preparation for the American rabbinate would be incomplete without a first-hand, intinate association with Israel and the Jewish community there.

As Danny has probably told you, I intend to go to Israel this summer to spend a year studying at the Heorew University, for which I will receive credit at the Hebrew Unior College. I had originally planned to make application for one of the scholarships announced by the ZOA. However, when I was in New York this past week, Mr. Carl Alpert informed me that the national 20A had cancelled the scholarship plan and that the scholarsnips were now being offered by local districts only.
