Dear Rabbi:

I received your letter and was pleased to note you and Virginia have had a pleasant trip so far. The unusual warm weather you are experiencing must be widespread as we have had a much warmer summer than customarily and reports from all parts are identical.

The membership committee has been at work with, however, only fair results. This can be attributed probably to three things - first, only part of the names were distributed; second, many of the members of the committee as well as the prospects are away on vacation; and finally the heat is not conducive to concentrated effort. Generally the suggestion of a voluntary increase has met with a favorable response among those who have been approached in person. As is always the case, the success of the campaign is dependent upon substantial coverage. So far close to \$1000 in increases has been obtained. The average is about \$25.

I have had two meetings with Sam Friedman and Abe Luntz concerning the remodeling of the assembly room. Each was upset over the amount of the cost. They expected it to be \$15,000 to \$17,000 and Sam's attitude had evidently undergone a change from what I expected it to be. It was my impression, from what I had been told, that he was seriously considering subsidizing the entire cost, but when I had my first meeting he was indifferent at the beginning and later showed greater interest in joining with others to finance the project. I believe I succeeded in impressing him with the importance not only of a generous contribution but also his leadership of the group. I sensed that his attitude at the beginning could be attributed to the high cost. I, therefore, suggested a second meeting at which I would have Mr. Boone present.

This meeting was held and was devoted to a thorough study of the work proposed to be done and to the possibility of reducing the cost without detracting from the general appearance and quality of the room. We are now waiting for revised plans and figures. Both Sam and Abe felt that in view of the use to which the room was to be put there was no necessity for bookshelves and that the plaster molding surrounding the ceiling could be eliminated. Mr. Boone felt that they were right and when new figures have been received I will urge Sam and Abe to get busy without delay.

The list of committees has been furnished to Harry Levy and the printing of the booklet will not be delayed on this account.

All in all, Sylvia and I are enjoying a pleasant summer but are looking forward to the autumn and the changes that it brings.

I hope that you and Virginia will continue to take it easy and that the medical treatments which she is taking are merely routine.


Dear Rabbi Silver,

In this case I feel that a great injustice
has been done to me. I trust that
you will see to it that it is corrected.

My Dear Ruth Silver!

As I have lived in the land of our people a little above two months, and I have seen a great deal of our Israel - the all important lands, the great cities - Tiberias and other historical places of our great masters, etc etc. I include by many visits to Jerusalem and the great city of Haifa. And of course living in Tel Aviv with the much too much Gaffo - with the very many gesheftzman; I find it, the most interesting place I have ever seen - yes, I have visited a good number of Kibbutzim - In some I have stopped over only for store or hour, others where I have good friends I stayed over night where I gave them some of my music for their children to study and play.

II

at Kibutz - AIN SHOPIHET - KIBUTZ AFIKIM
and to day I am visiting - Kibutz Geva
where 6 or 8 young men and their wives
from Cleveland, from the Gerschel family
who live at 2123 Hampstead Road, Cleveland
are trying to adjust their lives to the
Kibutz life. In Geva - There are about
nearly young Americans, that will soon
build their own new Kibutz - The work
will be hard for everyone of them.
Farming the land and what is goes with
farming - And building their new rooms
and hundred of other things that goes
with a modern Kibutz. Their job is a
hard and great one ahead. But what
I observed is - that they are all well.
They take the hard work and their
rugged farmers life like real men.
And the people that live and work at

in Geneva for the last 20 or 30 years
have only kind and friendly words for
all the American boys and girls. Of course
there are one or two cases, that a young
man of 18 or 19 cannot adjust himself
to the hard farming life, so they
return to go back home. So I think
the best thing would be that the French
government should help them to
find some legitimate work in the
cities or in the smaller towns indeed
so they can be happy and remain in
the land of our people, and help
to contribute to the growth and building
of a greater and stronger nation of
our people. Politically I cannot
speak, as I am only a musician, and
I am sure that you follow the economical
as well as the political situation of our land

I have had the pleasure to meet
Mr. Dshar Hanani member of the
Knesset. He invited me to a session
in the Knesset, when they debated the
abolishment of the Capital punishment.
I find him to be a lovely splendid
man, very friendly - He sends his
kind greeting and good wishes to you.
I may convey to you that I met
a good many people perfectly strangers
to me, who expressed their sincere
wish, that they would be happy to
see you again at your former great
work of the National Fund for Palestine.
They all say that since you have left
the fund diminished about 50 to 100
millions dollars less. I do not know
how true it is, but this is the general
talk of some sincere people in the Caffa.

As for the country in general, I find Israel to be the greatest music loving nation in the world, and the greatest music pioneering country on the globe!

Symphony concerts - Many Italian and French operas sung in Hebrew, and beautifully sung and with great wonderful acting - and with splendid stage settings - The very fine French Ballet - Violin - Piano and singing recitals - Chamber Concerts - other great plays with music like Midsummer night's dream and Othello - etc etc, and the great Radio with their good Concerts of Jerusalem. And strange as it seems, most all concerts are sold out. People will pay 2 or 3 pounds per ticket and can hardly afford to, and that is musical Israel. Yes Jean Pearce has been in Israel several weeks, and he

is making a sensation. People love him, when he sings to them some Jewish songs. And when he speaks to them - Mama Toshen, when he says to them, Och Dantz eide - instead of Toda Raba, or when they upload to much he tells them - Meine yeden geit ahtill - instead - Chekhit, just they enjoy it immensely. In general everything seems normal and quiet. Life is rather oppressive. But I am very happy to visit the land of our people, to see how they work and build and erect beautifully artistic new houses for the citizen. I am sure some town you would not recognize they say it was build up.

so I will conclude that it is a great
experience for me to see what is
being done at the present and for the
future. so I will say Shalom.
and say God Bless the Kibutzim as
these people have captured my heart
and my imagination. They are the real
heart of the Land of Israel!

I hope that you and your family are
having an enjoyable and pleasant
vacation; with my kindest regards.

Beziehung beide Religionen nur eine Gemeinde Gottes. Brüder in derselben

Sendung, der Welt das Licht der Erkenntnis zu bringen (Nicht des "Glaubens" - ein Wort, das nicht sichere Einsicht voraussetzt). Fuer beide gilt der Weckruf (Jes. 60), "Auf, leuchte, denn ueber dir strahlt Gottes Herrlichkeit, Finsternis bedeckt die Erde und die Voelker, du kannst ihnen Sonnenschein bringen".

B.

Die Sonderung, der tragische Gegensatz zwischen Judentum und Christentum entstand durch ~~etwas~~ sinnssichere historische Umstaende und durch Verschiedenheit der Vorstellung vom Ursprung der ueberirdischen Erbuchtung. Fuer Juden blieb felsenfest die uralte Ueberlieferung vom Herabsteigen Gottes auf den Sinai und von seinem Worte (Ex. 4,20) "Mein Erstgeborener ist Israel" und dem darauf basierenden Psalm 2 "Gott sprach zu mir, mein Sohn bist du" - ~~ein~~ Gedanke, den die Propheten als messianische Sendung dem Volke einschaerften. In griechischer Uebersetzung wurde aus Messias der fuer die neue Religion grundlegende Begriff "Christus", wobei statt der Sendung eines Volkes, das nicht in Achtung uert er den Voelkern stand, und unter Einfluss griechischer Mythen, die Version einer auf Erden erschienenen goettlichen Persoenlichkeit entstand. Auf diese wurden die prophetischen Bilder vom leidenden Israel uebertragen, darum er die ergreifende Schilderung Jes. 52, 13 und Jes. 53. Es ist ganz klar, dass die Juden die Verdrengung ihrer heiligen Ueberlieferung durch eine in ihren Augen heilige Umdeutung, ablehnen mussten. Die Darstellung der Evangelien von der Schule der Juden ist weder historisch noch durch den Inhalt der neuen Religion selbst gerechtfertigt. Die Kluft zwischen beiden Anschauungen ueber den Ursprung der Religion vermindert sich aber bei philosophischer Betrachtung. Denn beide enthalten antropomorphe Elemente. Sie vermaesslich fuer das zum abstrakten Denken unfuehlige Volk die Idee des goettlichen Erscheinens. Der Unterschied ist nur ein gradueller zwischen der Vorstellung, dass der unfaessbare goettliche Geist wie ein Mensch niedersteigt und redet, oder dass er (wie Dionysos in der griechischen Legende) als Menschenkind geboren wird. Rationalisten deuteten die Offenbarung, dass sie im Geiste eines jeden Menschen stattfindet.

Schlussfolgerung: Eine Verstaendigung beider Religionen kann erreicht werden, wenn beiderseits von den Rahmenversionen abgesehen und an dem Inhalt der alttestamentlichen Lehren festgehalten wird. Selbstverstaendlich muss auf christlicher Seite die Legende von der Verdammtheit der Juden verschwinden. Die Wahrheit ist, dass keinem Volke der Welt der Segen Gottes in so vollem Masse zuteil geworden ist wie dem juedischen. Man darf den Juden nicht mit einer herablassenden Toleranz kommen, die eine Beleidigung ist. Sie muessen als altere Brueder in der gemeinsamen Religion, die ihnen gebuehrende Achtung geniesen, und von den hoechsten christlichen Stellen muessste die Weisung gegeben werden, dass von den Priestern kein vorletztes Wort gegen das Judentum geneussiert werde. Das staerkste Argument der Christenheit gegen die Juden bestand bis jetzt darin, dass sie aus ihren uralten Heimat vertrieben wurden. Nun hat die Geschichte auch dieses Argument zerstoert. Man darf den Juden auch nicht mit der Zumutung einer Bekehrung kommen, und eine gemeinsame Mission sollte zunaechst unter den grossen Massen in Amerika und Europa wirken, die aus Stumpfsinn und Unwissenheit alles Religioese verachten, und unter den Voelkern, die in Finsternis wandeln, um den Weg frei zu machen fuer Wahrheit und Frieden der Menschheit.

Dear Brother Rabbi :

The writer is a member of the B'nai & B'rith in Mexico, and was for many years active in Zurich, Switzerland.

His gratulations are presented to you for the stand taken as brought to publicity in the September issue of "Reader's Digest" -- an article that should no doubt have tranquillizing effects on the Jewish world in the United States. (May I add that I am now also a U.S.citizen).

I am convinced that this article, as opposing the line of thought shown in Mr. Lilienthal's, speaks very strongly in your favor.

Having lived here for a number of years, I feel rather acquainted with the mentality of the Latin inhabitants of this Continent, and beg your permission to point out several facts, which may not be known to you, but which support your own line of thought.

The foundation of the new State of Israel will of course bring with it a great many new situations for the Jewish world in general; deeply rooted traditions which are now considered to cover actual facts, will be divested of their glamour; and the fulfilment of a thousand-year-old dream will no doubt also destroy some of these traditions that we have cherished for centuries. There is also one detail, which is purely of the Latin-American world and which is entirely unknown in the English speaking part of America.

(1) Our community, in English, are "Jews"; we are "Jewish". But the same term as used in Spanish or French ("JUDIOS", and "JUIFS") carries with it a very disagreeable and, let us say, offensive connotation. The term "ISRAELITE" sounds far better to the Latin ear. The newspaper published here is called "Tribuna Israelita"; in France we have la "Communauté Israelite";, etc.

What shall be the outcome of this, hereafter ? Logically, an "Israelite" will be able to claim himself to be of that character only if he is a holder of a passport issued by the State of Israel; but not as a "Mexican Jew" or a "French Jew".

- (2) Latin-Americans (excepting of course Brasil, where Portuguese is spoken), are still wont to look to Spain as their mother country (*la Madre Patria*)--.

These Spanish speaking inhabitants have of course no intention of returning to Spain; of course well-to-do people do occasionally go to Spain, for old time's sake, as it were, to see once more the "old country" and perhaps to visit the lands whence their ancestors came over the ocean some hundreds of years ago.

I wonder whether it would not be a desirable thing to let the American Jew consider this picture.

Just as Spain is for the Spanish-speaking Latin-American a spiritual cathedral where the Academia Espanola reigns over the language of Spanish the world over, without any political tinge or obligation, -- in precisely the same way should the new State of Israel become essentially a spiritual center for the Jews of the world, enjoying their full sympathies; but without committing thereby an apostasy against our new country and against its flag.

How this point could better be explained and presented to the Jewish world, is something that would lie in your able hands, and in those of your devoted collaborators.

I thought you might like to have this photograph, taken while we were together in Switzerland. I shall remember that day as one of the most pleasant of a very pleasant trip.






My dear Dr. Silver:

My Dear Abba:

Greetings. I trust that you and yours are well. I have been looking forward, in accordance with your letter to me of some time ago, to your contemplated New York visit and to your telephone call. You will recall from my letter to you after your recent return from France, that I mentioned therein that there is still some pending Palestine matter which needed your attention and which we may as well defer -- until we again meet in person during your next visit to New York. This matter has been pending since your departure for France. My letter to you on the same reached your Temple a day or so after you had left for France.

The letter of your secretary, dated October 26, which I received this morning, apparently in the said connection, and the enclosed correspondence by Mr. Kehaty will probably explain the request for your signature through the National City Bank of Cleveland on the part of the Jerusalem Savings Bank.

From the enclosed letter of Moses Kehaty, dated June 29, you will note that everything in connection with the sale of the property has been completed, with the only exception that Mr. Kehaty has not as yet succeeded -- because of the superfluity of red tape on the part of the Israeli Controller of Foreign Exchange -- in transferring the entire amount of the proceeds of the sale to my name. Desiring to make sure that no "consideration" whatsoever has been given by me to you for the transferring to me of the money in question, the Israeli Controller apparently wants to have the enclosed declaration signed by you and attested by the Israeli Counsel in New York. Not having heard from me in this matter, since last June because of the mentioned delay, it is apparent that Mr. Kehaty has been working in the meantime, nevertheless, to effect this transfer to my name without the last mentioned document.

It will therefore no doubt expedite the final disposal of this matter, which has dragged on for so long, if you will be kind enough, in accordance with Mr. Kehaty's letter, to sign the enclosed Hebrew declaration, and, if possible, have the same notarized, and to kindly return same to me by return mail. I will then have the


document attested by the New York Council, and I trust that thereafter you will not have to be bothered further in this matter.

You will note, from the enclosed Statement of Account, Mr. Kehaty's remarks in connection with Items I and II (The account of your late father with Messrs. Alexander Elieash & Co., Ltd., as of 3/29/49 and 5/29/49), to the effect that should we want a detailed copy of the same, he will forward it to us. If you are interested in the same, I will ask Mr. Kehaty to forward it to us in my next letter to him in which I expect to enclose your mentioned signed declaration.

I will, of course, have to excuse our friend Mr. Kehaty for assuming in his letter of June 29 my ignorance of Hebrew... The reason for my asking him to send me an English version of the Statement of Account was, of course, my desire to obtain a fuller and clearer explanation of the many items in question.

Notwithstanding our disposal of this matter by mail, needless to say that I am looking forward to our meeting during your next visit to New York for our usual pleasant exchange of family chat.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I was delighted to see in this morning's paper that you had answered Herbert Lehman's charges against Dulles.

It has always been my deep conviction that unfounded charges of bigotry constitute the worse disservice that any Jew could render to his people. Moreover, it adds force to my contention that it is only genuine Zionists who are capable of looking facts in the face without undue fear, on the one hand, or shoulder-chiplaying on the other. So, to me, your letter was something for which I am grateful in clarifying an atmosphere rendered turgid by political appeals based upon a low attempt to influence Jewish votes by false charges.

I presume you know of what I have fortunately been able to do in this section, along the lines of allaying anti-Jewish actions on the one hand, and unfounded Jewish prejudice on the other. My philosophy is set out in a letter to Tom Friedman, Director of the Southwestern Jewish Community Relations Council, copy of which I beg to enclose. To explain my reference to Governor Thurmond, there is enclosed an advertisement which Armstrong ran last year in the Texas papers, and copy of Governor Thurmond's reply (which, confidentially, I wrote for him).
