

Dear Rabbi Silver:

I'm sure by now that you have read or heard of my engagement to Miss Frances Aub. Needless to say, there has at last entered my life a feeling of contentment and happiness never before known. But there is at present a problem on which I would greatly appreciate your counsel. It is a problem which I have always taken great pains to avoid, more for distaste than for fear. In the past I have almost invariably rejected more familiar social contacts with Gentile girls, simply feeling that being human I might fall in love with one. I didn't want to do that.

I met Frances three and one half years ago at the wedding of Billy Rosenfeld and Joan Weber. I knew then that her father was Jewish and her mother was not. I also knew that she had been raised in a religious void. We had a fine time together then, but after the festivities were over we separated. I did not pursue the acquaintance because 1) long distances made dull romance and 2) I did have an underlying concern about Frances' non-Jewish half.

On my arrival in Boston last July I again sought the company of Frances. At this point I needn't recount all the reasons a man falls in love. Franny had all the qualities I'd ever sought in woman, except one - the knowledge and feeling for Judaism that I enjoyed. Yet that hiatus was filled with a superbly humble and human approach to life that was the essence of a spiritual existence. Buring our courtship we discussed Judaism and although she felt ethically strong, she knew her education was remiss. A little of her history might explain way.

Frances' father is Dr. Joseph C. Aub. He was originally from Cincinnati, his family there being well known in the history of Reform Judaism in the United States. He came to Harvard to study medicine and has remained here ever since. His work in medicine has earned him well-deserved worldwide acclaim. He is one of the most respected and beloved physicians and teachers in Poston. Although he doesn't practice formal Judaism he has always been known and homored as a Jew. He is not a member of any congregation nor does he observe Jewish holidars and ritual. He did not give his three daughters any Jewish background except that which enanated from his own greatness. He did give them the modus vivendi which made his life rich and made me love his dargiter Franny.

Frances' nother, whose maiden name was Cope, is a Quaker. Her post-marital contact with that religious group has been as peripheral as her husband's contact with organized Judaism; and as little as the daughters know of Judaism, they know less of the Quakers. Although it is beyond the scope of this discussion, I will say in brief that Mrs. Subtoo has a noble background.

Now to describe Frances, born of a mixed marriage with a bilaterally rich heritage. She was educated in private prep schools and then at Sarah Lawrence. Her friends have been a heterogenous group of Jewish and Gentile people although I feel there were more Gentiles than Jews. Into here home have come hosts of visitors from all over the world, largely the guests of her father, with rarely a thought or comment as to whether they were Jewish or not. Although she has always answered queries that she is half-Jewish and half-Gentile one of the most charming things about her is that in recounting her friends in many cases she doesn't know who is Jewish and who isn't because it never occurred to her to find out. Her social evenings included Jewish and non-Jewish boys depending upon who asked.

I hope that my problem, as it faced me during our courtship, is clear to you. I had always wanted to marry a Jewish girl. The definition in this case is a semantic one, but non the less important. The more I saw of Frances and her family the more I knew that at last here was a girl who represented all that I had ever desired for a wife. The more I knew this, the more perplexed I became. I felt in my heart that she was Jewish yet obviously I was not totally convinced or I should not have been so troubled. Reason being at the soul's beck I found two good causes to consider her so. The most important reason is that Franny believes as do I and do all Jewish people that there is one God in heaven - the Lord our God, the Lord is one. A second and quasi-legal reason is that her father gives her a Jewish birthright regardless of the religious instruction or lack thereof which follows. These in mind, I asked Frances to be my wife, and she accepted. These in mind I feel that we should be and deserve to be married by a rabbi. I say "deserve to be married" because it has been suggested that Frances undergo a conversion ceremony. Such an idea is abhorrent and inconceivable to me. Freel that such a ceremony would be a doctringire and ignominious denial of her birthright and beliefs, V and would be the equivalent of forcing an American to undergo naturalization because he hadn't studied the constitution. Frances has, by the way embarked on a course of study in Jewish ethics, history, holidays and social problems.

Your opinion, favorable or not, while it cannot alter a fait accompli, will do much to clarify my thoughts.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

First, I want to express my admiration for the courage and the integrity which you display in voicing your opposition to the rearmament of Germany. While most Jewish leaders must feel dismayed at the present turn of events and our government's role in the rearmament of Germany, few have dared to publicly express their views. I am proud that your voice has not been stilled.

Second, I would highly value your opinion on the following question which will be taken up at the annual convention of the Federation of Jewish Womens' Organizations, Inc., Wednesday, Jan. 12th.

My mother, who knows you personally, having introduced you at several meetings, and who respects you highly, is the chairman of the Ladies Aux., Congregation and Talmud Torah Shomrei Emunah, and Chairman of the Rachel Chapter, Mizrachi Womens' Organization. She received a set of resolutions prepared by the FJWO, Inc., resolutions to be taken up at its Jan. 12th convention. Included amongst the otherwise fine resolutions, was one dealing with the Middle East, which would apparently sanction the increased armament of that region 'against the threat of Communist aggression". My mother considered this resolution suicidal, and proposed its re-consideration to the Shomrei Emunah Ladies Auxiliary, which fully supported her position.

I am enclosing a copy of their proposed resolution, as well as the position adopted by my mother and her organization, and I should be most grateful if you cared to express your views on that matter. I am enclosing a special delivery envelope for your reply, in the hope that I might receive a reply from you before the convention begins....While your name and your views would not be mentioned unless you so suggest, I am certain that knowing your views will encourage my mother to express herself on a matter which I consider to be of real importance.

Finally, I am enclosing a Scroll of Honor, one of hundreds being presented to Prof. Harold C. Urey, at a dinner in his honor in Chicago, Feb. 12th. I cannot forget your goodness in speaking out for clemency for the Rosenbergs, long before other spiritual leaders and political leaders throughout the world followed your example. I feel that your name should be high on the list of those paying tribute to this eminent scientist, who defended freedom of speech, so ably. Whether or not one agrees with Dr. Brey, this tribute will be to all who maintain America's traditions of freedom of expression of all views, populat and otherwise. Scores of respected leaders in all spheres of life have already signed, and I would feel highly privileged if you would sign adding any remarks you might desire.... Either way, please be assured of my deepest regard.

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

The Debacle Of "Western" Policy

By ABRAHAM L. FEINBERG

THE TREATMENT given by the Western powers to Israel, as compared with Germany, is a shocking example of human error, a tragic betrayal of the ideals for which World War II spent vast blood and treasure, a dire threat to peace, and a challenge to the eternal faith and hope of the eternal Jew. And it challenges the urgent and courageous action of the American people through their government.

Oil-enriched, U. S.-subsidized potentates of six vast Arab states, with a population of 42 million and bent on a "revenge" war, bellow their enmity against oneand-a-half million Israelis, crowded into a tiny, tense and economically-desperate pocket-state and pleading for peace-yet the British and American Near East "experts" ply the Arabs humbly with arms, like an obsequious host stuffing an important guest with viands. The Suez Canal is evacuated by the British without any attempt to end Egypt's illicit blockade of goods for Israel, a tri-partite agreement of the Western powers makes only a worthless "verbal guarantee" provision for protecting Israel against Arab attack, ex-Nazi gangstergenerals hire themselves out to the Arab armies, Franco's Fascist dictatorship sells to Egypt military equipment manufactured with American funds, and the U. N. inflates Arab arrogance with loud incantations of criticism when a few Arabs are killed by Israeli farmers in a desperate effort to end the widespread, continuous and silence-enshrouded murder of innocent Israeli women and children.

Ibn Saud not long ago stated that ten million Arab lives would not be too dear a price for the extermination of Israel—yet he remains the darling of Dalles diplomacy. The Arab States were created by the great powers after victory in two world wars which the Arabs did nothing to win, yet they are trusted as allies (or is it futile bribery?) while Israel, a proven partner of the West, is forsaken, because of the assumption that she will never forsake the free-world camp.

What about Germany? Her swift and enthusiastic re-armament by the West flaunts the bitter lessons of recent history. In the 1960's Western policy-makers, urged by London, acquiesced to German re-arming, after World War One, as a defense aginst Communism—with the ultimate and evil fruit of Hitlerism and unparalleled slaughter. Now, in the 5C's, Western leaders, for the

same meason, are being pressed by the United States into the same dead-end of illusion, self-deception and fateful peril for all mankind.

The official, authentic and undeniable record of the Nurernberg trials (from the Nazi's own documents) is clear, concrete and comprehensive; it tells us that the German nation under Hitler's leadership fell to lower depths of evil than any known to man in any of his past or present experience. And there was little appreciable resistance to the Nazi madmen, even when allied armies had made such action possible and safe.

We cannot explain Germany's lapse into barbarismand I am not condemning the entire people of the land. Nor do I ignore the examples of sacrifice-sometimes resulting in death-which some brave and enlightened Germans made to help their Jewish brethren and other Nazi victims. The nihilistic criminality of the Nazi elite, the frenzied self-immolation and Hitlerolamy of a large section of the Reich populace, the indescr-bable horror of scientific mass-murders deliberately pla med and involving many thousands of "good" German citizens, the readiness of a "cultured, civilized, Christian" land to become an instrument of the most cruel and costly tyranny in human annals-all this will baffle students of human conduct and psychology for generations. It has already led to a deepening of pessimism about human nature among Christian theologians.

It would be suicidal, however, to forget the bestiality of German Nazism because we can't grasp its full extent and meaning for an evaluation of the human spirit and its capacity for evil. The blithe, optimistic, care-free romance of the Western powers with West Germany is a travesty on mature political thinking and a form of self-inflicted bliminess which can lead all humanity to an abyss.

A rearmed Reich will probably never again be able to block a Soviet attack in triumphant combat; the Soviet Union, under the whip of a monolithic, monomaniac, dictatorship, has been forged into a war-machine backed by the robotized and utterly-subdued human and material resources of a vast continent. But a marmed Reich, with or without Soviet connivance, may well become once more a lethal threat to its Western neighbors.

A prominent West German trade-union leader recently warned that the infiltration of ex-Nazis into that government has reached the alarming proportion of

1933, and that it will increase when Germany is granted its absolute sovereignty.

Today, the list of ex-Nazis officials in key posts reads like a "Who's Who" of the Hitler era. In the Federal Government we find loyal Nazis such as Dr. Schroeder, the Federal Minister of the Interior, recently much criticised for his handling of the John case. Schroeder was formerly a member of the S. A. and legal adviser to Schacht. One of his jobs now is, ostensibly, to suppress Nazism!

Then there are Dr. Theodor Oberlander, Minister for Refugee Affairs, who was an S. S. major until 1943, when he fell out with Himmler; Dr. Victor Emanuel Preusker, the Minister of Housing, an S. S. instructor on "racial questions"; Hans Globke, State Secretary of the Federal Chancellery, who wrote the official commentary on the Nuremberg racial laws; Waldemar Kraft, Minister without Poetfolio, an S. S. colonel who did much to pave the way for Hitler's invasion of Poland. Hitlerite officials have also been given a frightening portion of important diplomatic and consular posts overseas.

With so reasily former Nazis in policy-making positions, it is not difficult to understand why unrepentant Nazis were speedily granted an amnesty and why powerful ex-Nazi industrialists, including Krupp, again control the tremendous cartels, trusts and machinery of production.

The growth of neo-Nazi splinter groups, the numerous articles in West German papers glorifying Nazi leaders, the Naumanr plot exposure, the prolonged campaign for the release of "mortyred" war criminals, the frequent desecration of Jewish cemeteries and the belligerent diatribes of ultra-nationalist spokesmen—all these ominous developments do not support Dr. Adenauer's assertion that there has been no Nazi revival in Germany. Throughout provincial and federal governments, Nazi membership is practically a qualification for a position of public trust.

Can Germans with guns be trusted to point them only towards the Emt? The old Ludendorff idea of German-Russian partnership still has many adherents among the upper military echelons, the technical skill of Germany and the Soviet's vast natural resources would form an invincible economic partnership, the movement for "neutralism" appears to be growing rapidly among the vast bulk of Germans, memoirs and glamor-legends are again reviving the myth of German invincibility on the battle-field (the only fault in World War II was Hitler's tendency to guess wrong!), atrocity-allegations about Allied soldiers have begun to counteract any German guilt-feeling about blitzed cities, the majority of Germans have only contempt for "milk-sop" demo-

cracies. Adenauer may soon become a venerated, powerless "wooden statue" like old man Hindenburg before Hitler, and the itch to retrieve heroic Teuton honor will soon be stirring in the German "superman's" breast.

The release of General Kurt Meyer (Nazi sentenced to life imprisonment for ordering execution of Canadian war prisoners) is merely one instance of the generosity extended to war-criminals while the victims of Nazism obtain neither pensions, restitution or jobs. Hitler emptied the jails and asylums of sadistic perverts so that he might use their insane cruelty. Are the Western powers now emptying the cells of war-criminals to purchase their skill in battle? Perhaps these paragons will augment the ranks of German societies recently formed by the victims of anti-Nazi persecution to claim compensation for "democratic misrule!"

The fact of Kurt Meyer's liberation is not as significant as the sickening romantic-hero aura with which the press enveloped it. All that remains now is for him to write his memoirs, like the convicted war-criminal Ex-Marshal Kesselring, or have his exploits filmed for a movie, like Rommel, "The Desert Fox."

Once the victorious Allies hoped to make Germans repent for the evil which, it seemed then, only God could forgive. Now the nexus of Western policy of "re-education" is-to help them forget. Peace of mind. protection from embarrassment and moral disturbance, has become an essential item in the re-awakening of the German ability to fight a war. Like the Mayor of Bergen-Belsen who asserted that he knew nothing about the infamous camp a mile from his doorstep (one could smell the corpses!)-all Germans will now be permitted the anodyne of blissful ignorance. A daily newspaper in the Reich can assert that "The first gas-chamber seen in Germany was imported to Dachau by the conquering Americans to fix the blame on innocent Germans," and Lord Russel of Liverpool had to resign from a government office in order to publish his powerful and undeniable Nazi-crime book on "The Scourge of the Swastika."

The German "problem-child" is of special concern to Jews. From Roman times, there has been a continuous Jewish settlement in that country. Jews lived in the Rhine Valley before the German people entered the stage of history. Throughout that long period the fortunes of German Jewry have fluctuated from the depths of sorrow to relative felicity. Jews have made an impact on German culture, and it has influenced ours. Yiddish, the language of the Central European Jewish masses, was originally a form of medieval German. The massacre of six millions Jews by the Nazis raised our casualties in the Second World War to a proportion of 40 per

cent-far higher than those of any other people. We are entitled to feel intensely about the trend of moral and spiritual development in post-war Germany.

Above all else, however, the direction taken by the German mind and soul will crucially affect the fate of humanity. I am keenly conscicus that the Russian riddle within an enigma (as Winston Churchill described it) is the Number One threat and omen for the world's destiny; the possible plans of the Kremlin for world domination cannot be ignored, except at grave peril to the West's way of life—and life. But the Russian threat is compounded by the danger which arises from a renascent and re-armed Germany. If the two coalesce, civilized man will confront the most potent power for evil the world has ever seen!

To dwell in an illusory paradise that drugs the memory is folly. And the West blinds itself to the potentialities of a Germany pathetically and pathologically subject to militarism, dreams of conquest and selfrighteousness. This does not help her to achieve that moral regeneration which can come only from realistic, sincere, criticism. Western civilization, under the pressure of United States foreign policy, seems willing to sacrifice Germany's moral rehabilitation in order that she might be converted into an armed fortress against the Soviet Union. From the viewpoint of religion and its eternal mandate to evoke the best in human beings, such a program cannot be upheld. As a practical strategy in a hard and bitter struggle for existence, it is a grave risk.

The Problem Of Synthesis

UDAISM in the Diaspora has been faced since the earliest days with the problem of accommodating itself to its non-Jewish environment. The need for a synthesis of traditional Jewish values and those of the surrounding world has been the inescapable corollary of Diaspora existence. At different times and in many places a wide range of relationships between both sets of values could be observed. At one end of an imaginary curve a maximum emphasis on Jewishness would be discernible, going hand in hand with a minimum awareness of the non-Jewish environment, whereas the other end of the curve would point to a pattern of major identification with the majority civilization while Judaism was kept, consciously or unconsciously, in the background. Neither of these opposite viewpoints aimed, in fact, at any real synthesis: Each in its own fashion concentrated exclusively on one element and ignored the other, rather than blend both civilizations through some compromise solution. A suitable formula of the latter type has been sought consistently since the days of Philo Judacus. Within the changing framework of time, the endeavors of Moses Mendelssohn, Samson Raphael Hirsch, Abraham Geiger, Mordecai Kaplan, and many others, reveal a striking similarity of purpose, albeit expressed in a variety of wars. In a sense, all of Jewish history can be viewed in terms of this one aspect, ever since the mass emigration from Palestine that followed Bar Kochba's last and ill-fated attempt at national independence.

In spite of this continuity, one should draw a sharp dividing line between the period that preceded the French Revolution, and the much shorter one that followed it. The very texture of the Jewish community changed radically in the eighteenth century, as Enlightenment and Emancipation heralded the final collapse of medieval society. But the Jews were not to acquire their new status without a price. When the wellmeaning Count de Clermont-Tonnerre (1757-1792) told the French Assemblée Nationale: "For the Jews as men, everything; for the Jews as Jews, nothing:" he clearly stated the terms of the quid-pro-quo that was offered. In exchange for the full rights of modern citizenship, the Jews were to accept a profoundly different concept of Jewish group loyalty. It marked the end of what Robert Gordis has called "compulsory Judaism," i. e. the dissolution of the all-pervasive authority of the Jewish community in practically all phases of daily life. The modern Jewish community, caught in the vigorous stream of a new society, emerged divested of its legal powers and retained but an ideological grip on its members. This precarious hold, inevitably, was subjected to the unceasing pressure resulting from the disintegration of such social, political and economic barriers that heretofore had both imprisoned and safeguarded the Kehillah.

A direct outcome of the new situation was that the problem of synthesis was placed in an entirely new

nght. More often than not, recognition of the problem's urgency was predicated on the premise that such a synthesis, being both a sociological necessity and a recurrent historical phenomenon, was a priori possible. Whatever differences may have existed with regard to the methods for its realization, the principle itself of a fruitful Diaspora Judaism was rarely questioned.

The monumental record of Jewish creativity in Babylonia may appear, on the surface, to offer a pertinent instance of successful synthesis. It should be pointed out, however, that this record was chalked up under such social and political conditions as to render spurious any attempt to set it up as a model for a Judaism adapted to the modern structure of the Western Diaspora. The Jews in Babylonia, for all practical purposes, formed a state within a state. Governed completely by Jewish law in all the phases of their lives, they were under the authority of a Jewish ruler, traditionally descended from the House of David, and who, significantly, was known as the Exilarch. Conditions such as these would seem to be concomitant with the status enjoyed by Jews in an autonomous Jewish State, and the modern concept of 'Babylonians of the Jewish faith" did in no way apply. A politically autonomous (if shortlived) Jewish kingdom was actually established within the Babylonian Empire in the year 520 by an Exilarch named Mar Zutra. A somewhat parallel picture, perhaps, could be drawn between Babylonia and the Jewish centers of learning that flourished in Poland, ten centuries later, at the time of the semi-autonomous Vaad Arba Aratzot. But it still remains to be proved that Jewish creativity can rise to comparable heights within the cultural and political context of the post-Revolutionary Western Diaspora.

Such creativity, of course, is in no way ruled out by cultural heterogeneity. In Alexandria as well as in Moslem Spain, for instance, great achievements resulted from the special circumstances in which the Jewish community found itself at one particular time. Situated at the crossroads of the main cultural arteries of the day, it was able to rise to the occasion. In the introduction to his book The Life and Time of Yehudah Halevi, Rudolph Kayser pointed out that the key to the golden age of Jewish culture in Islamic Spain lies in the fact that the Jews were the only ones to be spiritually equal to the new situation brought about by the Moslem invasions. In them was mirrored, so to speak, the cultural conflict that had arisen at that time through the impact of the Oriental concept of life, in which all reality springs from God, upon the Western basic view inherited from Antiquity, of the power of Man as a free agent. The Jews, who had become integrated inhabitants of the West, had also remained spiritually rooted in the Orient; and they were thus in an ideal position to help bridge the gap between the two ways of thinking.

With all due admiration for the achievements arrived at under the influence of such extraneous factors, one may at the same time avoid the pitiall of arbitrarily ascribing to Diaspora life itself some inherent, mystical virtue that supposedly brings out the best in the Jewish genius. If Philo's outstanding attempt at Hebraic Helenistic synthesis is an immortal tour de force, his efforts to reconsider Judaism along the lines of Platonic philosophy can hardly be viewd as an expression of inner lewish creativity, rooted in traditional Jewish thinking, and conducive to further blossoming of Jewish culture. One may, with Toynbee, note the high caliber of performance that can result from the stimulus of pressures or the challenge of the environment; one need not conclude, however, that the adversity of national dispersion eads of necessity to cultural vigor. The history of Judasm before the French Revolution can point with pride o many eventful chapters; but none of these can be cited in evidence of a lasting, successfully worked-out synthesis, and none of them occurred in a social-political setting that would permit deductive generalizations applicable to the specific problems confronting the contemporary Western Diaspora.

At the risk of oversimplification one might distinguish two categories of synthesizing attempts during the past two centuries. One, traceable to the basic thinking of Moses Mendelssohn, stands committed to a synthesis from within the Diaspora, while the second, Zionism, advocates withdrawal to the culturally solid ground of the ancestral homeland in order to seek, from without, a more normative synthesis with the rest of the world. In this respect, the advent of political Zionism is more than the expression of the age-old longing for Zion; it also represents a spontaneous reaction in response to the new challenge of a modern world. That this challeng: can be met successfully from within, and in spite of the handicap resulting from a continued minority status, has not been proved. All attempts along these lines, in their heavy reliance on the precedent of prolonged Diaspora existence, make little or no allowance for the inevitable differences that separate yesterday's Diaspoca from the world of today.





When Perkins talks schools, as he did recently at the Cleveland Engineering Society, his audience doesn't visualize brick and stone. They see kids, hundreds of them, yours and mine, growing up in an environment that lives and breakes around them.

It's plain to see that Larry Perkins loves children.

As a parent I listened to him: with the subconscious feeling that this guy is looking out for my youngsters. As a businessman, I felt he was looking out for my pocketbook.

He's doing both.


In a Perkins School, the architecture is part of the education process. Nature, Perkins says, is one of our most priceless textbooks. Perkins brings nature into the classroom through the use of wide openings of glass which brings the outdoor world into the classroom.

This is a small, but typical example of the detail given to "liberating" the youngster. For childrens Perkins says are the products we are processing in a school building. This thinking has led Perkins to establish a trend toward more humanistic and psychological values in schools. Children find fin, they enjoy the education process in environments designed for them.

And the taxpayers save money. An outstanding example of this is the comparison between Heathcate, a Perkins & Will School being completed in Westchester County, with a school of similar size construction along traditional lines in the same area.

The main body of the school bends gracefully around the black-topped entrance drive. This building received the silver medal of the Architectural League of New York.

Heathcase is a clear-cut expression of Perkin's belieff that the school child is an individual. And being an individual enjoys the rich happy use of his exvisonment. Heathcase has a construction cost of \$1,094,821.

Fox Meadow, the traditional school constructed in 1928 with substantially the same contents would cost \$1,274,410 to reproduce today, or 17% mare than its modern contemporary.

These comparisons sellect what has happened to school building generally: Structural seconomy and space efficiency give taxpayers more for their compositive school dollar today.

Perkins & Will ate for the most part leading the fierd in designing and planning the "draam school" that integrates the indoors with the outdoors to provide intimate, friendly, colorful elassrooms bathed in natural light. Michael Kane, Cleveland Architect, who is associated with Perkins & Will on work in this area, explained that "these schools differ sharply from monumental structures of the past. As you walk through the building you may see a gar colored door, a spot of colored glass here and there in the windows, small ceramic figures imbedded in the brick walls—why? For education? Perhaps. For Fun? Definitely!

Sometimes there are ireplaces in kindergartens and lounges. Classrooms have a door opening onto walks, gardens and playfields, with sunlight in every corner of every class room distinguishing these schools. All classrooms have movable furniture, low reilings, sinks, individual washrooms for all lower grades, built-in clothes closets and abundant storage space.

After seeing several of these schools I tend to agree with Larry Perkins and Michael Kane. Call these schools factories if you like. The products they produce are happy, well adjusted youngsters.

Dear Uncle Abba:

I trust that you and Aunt Virginia had a pleasant vacation down in Fiami despite your usual UJA duties down there. Incidentally, it might interest you to know that the national UJA as well as the Pittsburgh tri-state UJA gave me a number of speaking engagements last year. Naturally, since I am new to the fold, so to speak, they have tested my wings in smaller communities. However, on the basis of my talks in these various localities, I understand they are going to use me this year in connection with some more significant communities.

Though I was officially elected to my new pulpit last month I will not take over my new duties until some time in March or possibly April. Dr. Freehof is busy looking for my successor. In all e vents that man will probably not be able to take over here until June or July. However, we plan to get an interim appointment thus permitting me to take over my new responsibilities as soon as possible. Since my new congregation is right here in Pittsburgh and since they are without a rabbi and have been since last November, the press of my two congregational responsibilities dictates this interim appointment.

You mentioned in your recent letter to me that it was both Aunt Virginia's and your intention that I would remain on with Dr. Freehof until his retirement and then succeed him. Naturally, I have never been averse to such an intention and by the same token numerous important people in the congregation have privately expressed this sentiment as well which, of course, is very gratifying. However, God willing, as I mentioned before Dr. Freehof will not retire until he is at least 70. This would have meant my serving in my present capacity for another 7 years. Since Dr. Freehof is most reluctant, for strictly personal reasons, to share his pulpit even with a so-called "associate" my remaining on for such a period of time would cease to be a real vital rabbinical experience. I would rather be on my own for the next few years and have the invaluable solo rabbinical experience under my belt. It will stand me in far greater stead when the time comes for me to move up accordingly.

In this regard my recent election affords me a remarkably fine opportunity to gain "solo" rabbinical experience in a challenging new congregational setup, and at the same time also affords me the opportunity to remain a vital and active part in the Pittsburgh Jewish community, It is really an ideal situation. At the same time I shall also have the privilege of still being associated on a real colleagual basis with Dr. Freehof for the next few years. Since I plan to complete my doctoral work within the next few years, his presence in the city will help me immeasurably in this direction. Ruth Lee and I have come to enjoy Pittsburgh and so many of the fine friends and contacts we have made during the last three years can still be enjoyed.

-2-February 7, 1955 Dr. Abba Hillel Silver I am sure that you are familiar with Dr. Simon Hakin who took over Joseph Klausner's chair in Hebrew Literature at the Hebrew University a few years ago. Dr. Halkin was my Hebrew Literature professor at the JIR. Dr. Halkin presently is an exchange professor at UCLA for this year. I understand they have developed a new department in Near Eastern studies. In between semesters he is conducting a nation-wide speaking tour in behalf of Hebrew culture. While he was in Pittsburgh last week he talked to me about a very fascinating project in Israel. Since he knows of our relationship he asked me if I would write to you about this project to solicit your help. I know that you must receive hundreds of letters with reference to all sorts of Israeli and American Jewish projects. This one is rather unique. Perhaps you even heard about it. It is called Givat Hasofer. A special tract of Land has been set aside for this center of Hebrew Literature and men of letters in the colony of Herzelia-by-the-Sea. The idea, of course, is to enable creative men of letters to reside in this center and do their creative literary work free from the stress and strain of daily life. The ultimate plan will embrace 10 dormitories composed of 10 apartments within a dormitory. In the center of the project there will be a main building which will include a library, lecture hall, etc. Dr. Halkin tells me that 2 of the 10 dormitories have already been built with funds supplied from the Buenos Aires Jewish community and from the kibbutzim themselves. The plan is to have all of the buildings in horor of or in memory of great Jewish personalities or prominent centers of Jewish population. Dr. Halkin informs me that they are attempting to gather funcs here in Pittsburgh to build one dormitory in honor of Dr. Freehof. If you are at all interested in this project, I would be most happy to have Dr. Halkin contact you personally. He will be in the country at least until June at which time he will return to the Hebrew University. I would greatly appreciate it if you would let me know your sentiments regarding the above. Dear Abba,

Most unfortunately from my standpoint, I will not be in New York on the occasion of your next visit here, since I am leaving Friday for California on some speaking engagements on behalf of the ZOA. I have asked Harold to give me, if possible, a copy of your prepared address, the hearing of which I shall miss. I regret the circumstances of my absence, since it might have given me an opportunity to report to you on my recent wisit to Israel. But I will try to find another opportunity to do so. Not that anything really startling happened there.

Meanwhile, there are two items I would like to mention.

The first is the matter of an earmarked contribution of \$7500 for Kfer Silver, which came from Washington, D. C. (Mr. Turover). While Dr. Joseph Schwartz of the UJA and Goldmann of the Agency had agreed, and arrangements were made to buy and ship a tractor with the money, Ellis Radinsky had written about it to Josephthel, Treasurer of the Jewish Agency, and the latter had raised objection to such earmarking as a matter of principle. I took occasion to discuss the matter with Josephthel when I was in Jerusalem and he withdrew his objection - so that this gift will now be in order and I expect the tractor will be shipped shortly. The import license has already been granted by the Israel Government.

Secondly, I have had a number of conversations with Jack Verdi, of San Francisco. He is setting up a private foundation and is about to announce a gift of \$10,000 to Kfar Silver. He wants it to be used to put up a library and reading room. (He also wants to attach me name to this particular building.) In any case, this will be the first contribution of this size to Kfar Silver.

As you probably know, Winograd, in Tel Aviv, has been writing a book about you in Hebrew. He gave me two chapters, which I read on the way back. The spirit is good, but the material is mot, in my opinion, up to the highest standard; and I am a little puzzled what to do about it. Would you like to see these two chapters?

GITTELSOHN TEMPLE ISRAEL BOSTON 15, MASSACHUSETTS March 24 1955 Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver The Temple Ansel Road Cleveland, Ohio Dear Dr. Silver: Tuesday, Dan Bloomfield, a personal friend of many years standing, came to tell me of his conversation with you in Cleveland and of your willingness to officiate in June at his wedding ceremony here in Boston. I am, of course, delighted that you, who confirmed him and have been his rabbi all his life, will be able to officiate at his marriage ceremony. The one thing that disturbs me, however, is an uncomfortable impression which Dan himself gave me that he had not related to you the entire story of what took place before he saw you in Cleveland. Prior to that visit, Franny and Dan had come to see me with the request that I officiate. I had a long conference with them and subsequently another with Franny's parents. I explained to all of them that before I could officiate, Franny would have to undertake a study of Judaism and a ceremony of some kind indicating her intention of living as a Jewess. The word "conversion" seemed to bother her from the beginning, probably because it carried for her something of its Christian connotations. I a ssured her that the word would not appear in the ceremony and that should consider it a ceremony of dedication or consecration if she wished rather than a conversion in the sense that disturbed her. The couple left me with the conclusion that they would undertake a study of Judgism, after which Franny would return to discuss her studies with me and let me know whether or not she found it possible to accept the kind of ceremony I had suggested. You are entitled to know that my reason for insisting on study and ceremony is that in the Boston community the Aub family has never, to my knowledge, identified itself in any way as Jewish. I am told by people of

standing in the community who have known Dr. Aub since he first came to Boston, that neither he, his wife nor his daughters have ever considered themselves or been considered by anyone else in the community as Jews. The one daughter already married has a Christian husband and is in no way affiliated Jewishly. Dr. Aub has told me that he never considered himself anything but a Jew, but there is no indication in his life in the community that this has been so. Franny herself never received any Jewish education.

I am writing to you because Dan volunteered the information on Tuesday that he had told you of his previous conversations with me but wasn't sure whether he had mentioned the request that I officiate or my reasons for declining unless conversion preceded the wedding ceremony. He thus, perhaps unintentionally, placed us in a rather uncomfortable position professionally. Much as I value my friendship with Dan and his family, my relationship with you as a colleague requires me to be perfectly honest in giving you this information. I sm also enclosing a copy of a letter being mailed today to Dan.

Mrs. Gittelsohn joins me in warm regards to Mrs. Silver and yourself. We hope to have the pleasure of seeing both of you soon.

Dear Dan:

I have tried from the beginning of our recent conversations to be as completely honest with you as possible. This letter is being written out of a desire to continue our relationship on that basis.

Since we spoke together on Tuesday, I have been disturbed by the statement you made that you were not sure whether you told Rabbi Silver that you had first invited me to officiate at your wedding. I believe you owed it to Rabbi Silver to withhold nothing from him; to tell him of my lengthy conversations with you, Franny and her parents; of your request that I officiate at and of my reasons for feeling I could not in good conscience do so without Franny first being converted to Judaism.

As a matter of rabbinical ethics and for the sake of my future relationship with Rabbi Silver I feel a very strong obligation to write him regarding these facts. I have no desire to influence his decision in any way or to discourage him from officiating; it would be presumptuous of me to do so. I am sure Rabbi Silver will agree, however, that he is entitled to all the facts and that I owe him a professional obligation of giving him any information you are not sure you mentioned to him.

I am, therefore, writing to Rabbi Silver today and want you to know honestly and openly what I am doing and why.

Please give my best to Franny and her parents. I hope to have the pleasure of seeing all four of you soon.

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
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

Gittelsohn Temple Israel Boston 15, Massachusetts My dear Roland: I was very happy to receive your letter of Warch 24th and the enclosed copy of the letter which you addressed to Dan Bloomfield. I am grateful to you for the additional information contained in your letter. My one concern is that these young people should not be alienated from Jewish life, and I am sure that that is also your main concern. Franny never regarded herself as a Christian, even though her father, who is a Jew, did not practice his Julaism, and therefore, as you state in your letter, objected to the use of the term "convert" and to the ceremony of "conversion." She wishes to build with Dan a Jewish home. They wish to be married by a rabbi. She has agreed to raise her children as Jews and if any male children are born, to have them circumwised. She has signed the Certificate of Conversion of the Central Conference of American Rabbis (omitting the word "convert" under her signature). This certificate has been countersigned by myself, Rabbi Stone, and Dan. She read the pamphlet on the principles of Judaism published by the Central Conference of American Rabbis and empressed her full assent to them. What more should be insisted on? To be sure, a preliminary course of study in Judaism would have been desirable, but as you know it is not obligatory, and she will have a lifetime in which to acquaint herself with our faith and our people, especially if she is warmly welcomed. Dan, who taught for some years in our Temple High School, will, I am sure, help her. I am hoping that the young people will join your congregation and that you will be able to integrate them into its religious activities.
