Dear Dr. Silver:

First of all, may I congratulate you on the magnificent quality of your latest book and thank you for the help it has given me in clarifying my own thought. The book deserves a wide audience. For my part, I shall see that it receives one wherever my voice is heard.

I was deeply intrigued by your sermon subject for November 11.


I must admit that I backed away from a pulpit treatment of the "Life" article which dealt with the stresses and strains of the ministry.

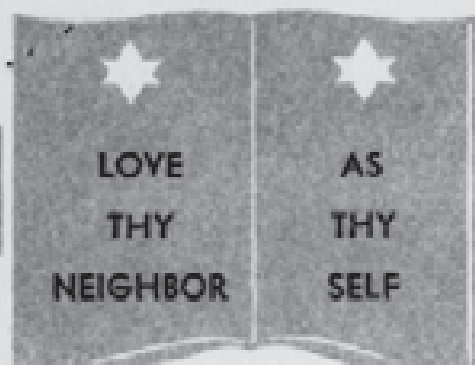



Dear Rabbi Silver,

A few days ago a man sitting at a table near mine in a restaurant said to a friend that he thought Jews were "stuck up," as a result of regarding themselves as the chosen people, and regretfully that he thought that unfortunate and that otherwise there might be companionship between them and Christians that is lacking. In connection with that I want to remind you that you said to me the evening of Dr. Freihoff's book review lecture that I "should not despair." One can always follow his aims and the nearest I come to that is from the awareness of the deterioration of the sense of values at this critical time. It seems to me that for the very reason that our affiliations with peoples with whom we have had the closest ties have seemingly worked loose the possibilities of those resources including art (which almost unobservedly have achieved in the past community of spirit among various peoples) should be re-examined and as is almost the case of them with us, reinstated.

So far as I am concerned with the supposed lack of companionship of Jews, remarked by the man in the restaurant, it seems to me that the work of a Jewish artist that lends itself to issues that face other people along with Jews, might be of some particular value under present conditions. The precarious situation of the Israelis seems to call for more adventurous efforts from us in fields where it is possible as I think it is in that of art. An inertia that seems to palsy, as in Cleveland's newspaper publishing business I feel personally, must be counteracted. I think, if I may express my views to you, that the newspapers have fallen victim to their own devices in limiting and de-activating their approaches to important issues. The artist in dealing with a subject aims to realize the fullest possibility of meaning. Everyone can take from the result what suits him. The artist thus produces a common wealth of meaning and acceptance that strikes a blow at paralyzing uniformity - or so it seems to me.

My dear Dudley:

Thank you for your kind letter of November 13 and for the lovely things which you say about my book. I am happy that the book is being received so well throughout the country.

Last evening I participated in a telephonic Panel Discussion on the book with Detroit which was celebrating Jewish Book Month. Three rabbis from Detroit were on the Panel and my replies were telephoned from Cleveland and broadcast into the auditorium in Detroit.

As regards my address WHY MINISTERS BREAK DOWN -- I spoke from notes and therefore am unable to send you a copy. Furthermore, there has been, as you probably know, a three-week newspaper strike in Cleveland and the address was not reported in the daily press.

In my address I followed the general line of the article in Life Magazine, only applying it to similar problems of the rabbi. I appealed for the organization of what might be called groups of lay-assistants to the rabbi, in every congregation, who would perform many of the services which are now assigned to the rabbi but which traditionally were performed by educated Jewish laymen in the community.

The United Hungarian Societies of Cleveland have set a goal of \$250,000 to be collected in Greater Cleveland for the aid of Hungarian refugees abroad, Andrew Dono, 3960 E. 154th St., president of the organization, announced today.

A total of \$25,000 has been collected already, \$8500 from a Tag Day Nov. 17, the rest from collections made in various Hungarian churches.

The United Hungarian Societies established its Hungarian Freedom Fund immediately after the outbreak of the Hungarian revolt against the Soviets.

Hungarian Freedom Fund is headed by the Rev. Matthias Daroczy, pastor of the West Side Hungarian Reformed Church, president; Mrs. Matilda Balazsik, 12607 Soika Ave., treasurer, and Andrew Dono, secretary.

Will Divide Funds

Funds collected by the Hungarian Freedom Fund will be equally divided by the National Catholic Welfare Conference, Church World Service, Lutheran Relief Assn. and the American Red Cross.

The United Hungarian Societies of Cleveland cover all expenses of collecting the funds in Cleveland, ensuring that every dollar given to the fund will go to the refugees, Dono said.

Hungarian Freedom Fund will sponsor several events in December for the purpose of raising funds for the refugees. There will be a Hungarian dinner in Settler's Restaurant, 12906 Buckeye Rd., on Dec. 17. All food will be donated by the restau-

rant's owners, Mr. and Mrs. James Orosz.

On Dec. 27 there will be a musical program in Music Hall, arranged by Herman Pirchner, owner of the Alpine Village. The star of the show will be Hungarian-born movie star Ilona Massey. All proceeds will go to the fund.

The Finnish Central Committee of Cleveland will donate the proceeds of the Finnish Independence Day celebration Sunday at 3:30 p. m. in the West Side Evangelical Reformed Church, 3814 Bridge Ave.


Your attributing "shabby politics" (as I understood you) to the proceedings of Middle-east diplomacy fell gratefully upon my ears. ^{Something} I have recently written it seems to me may apply, though it may be debated

Peace is a religious concept, not a political one, or one of political expediency. It has not been written that the United Nations is my brother's keeper, but that I am my brother's keeper. It therefore follows that the responsibility for peace is mine and that my actions must be so informed that peace is consequent to them. The greatness of the hazards of the present time does not alter these considerations.

I read recently a quotation from Jefferson to this effect: The time to guard against corruption and tyranny is before they have gotten a hold upon you. It is better to keep the wolf from the fold than to try to draw his teeth and claws after he has entered it.

I think that there is a nearer possibility of the recognition in the present extremity of the break with our traditional allies that the conciliatory services of art be resorted to. What better than it can work to provide an atmosphere in which the harshness of difference can be mitigated?



Dear Rabbi Silver.

In his most praiseworthy address - need I say? - of yesterday Rabbi Daniel Silver dealt with things of very near interest to me. Hence this letter so soon after other communications of mine to you. I am being careful to put uppermost the object that I wish to be served by it. The characterization of art as adapted to the present, a consideration touched upon by Rabbi Daniel, is a matter, I am sure, of importance in this critical time when our leadership - is it not correct to say - has essayed to follow courses in waters uncharted in previous sailings. We sail with greater cargoes at stake than ever before. I am convinced that art for modern application and with modern implementation, is a means of making soundings and of discovering the force of the wind for the assurance of safe sailing of the shipping with the great cargoes at present at stake.

The world of Michelangelo and Da Vinci was comparatively a carefree one. There were the great resources of the west if their inspiration failed.

It is my contention that the great machines of journalism and communication generally, have become timid, but that the individual artist aware of his limitations and the application of his work is not so handicapped and may give enlightenment for sound progress out of knowledge of past experience.

It seems that the necessity of maintaining our traditional ties has become more apparent than it was a week or so ago. I expressed myself to Mr. James Lister at that time that they must be worked at none the less, and I know gained in his confidence for the idea of drawings of European subjects for St. Lawrence Seaway public relations work. This and the Hiobee Company Import Fair with which associations are indicated I look upon as practical means for aiding in strengthening reciprocal cultural relations with countries abroad. I have been too long away from work with these bearings that my work in Mexico had. Your interest - particularly if you feel reciprocal with the above ideas would be greatly appreciated by me, especially since some members of my family think them too unlikely of fruition for me to entertain. The artist must act upon the confidence gained from his experience.



I wish to commend your fine speech last night in New York City, to which I listened with great interest and delight.


Although not a Jew, I have followed to some extent your fine spiritual leadership in Cleveland and have often wished to make your acquaintance.



Thank you for your letter of December 18. Your reaction is a most interesting one. Of course, as I viewed the program, I was gritting my teeth with rage against the Syrian Ambassador, as you were.

I have been an ardent Zionist for many years; I am a member of Doctor Silver's Cleveland Zionist Society; was a Trustee of the Society and I own a number of Israeli Bonds. Mrs. Mintz and I had the great pleasure of being in Israel this last summer for ten days in celebration of our twenty-fifth wedding anniversary.

We contracted to act as alternate sponsors a couple of weeks ago. There is no way of knowing in advance who the speaker is to be. The program is national in scope and cannot be controlled locally. They do not announce who the speaker will be until the Wednesday or Thursday immediately before the Sunday on which the speaker will appear.

Had we had the opportunity of buying the program earlier and had our name mentioned along with Mrs. Meir I should personally have been quite thrilled.

You have asked that you hear from me and I should like to give you a very frank expression of my opinion. So long as this is a free country and we have freedom of speech, it is not for an advertiser to dominate and control a program of this kind. The American Public are the final judges of everything which is said and done. While I deeply resented the sly remarks of the Syrian Ambassador, it was my feeling that everybody listening to the program could sense his total cynicism.

I do not think, however, you should permit your personal feelings to run away with you to the extent expressed in your letter.

I would say that talking about your group passing a resolution to eject the Syrian Ambassador from this country would be an extremely ill-advised and tactless thing to do. It would not help our cause.

I'm very happy to learn that you are one of our Stockholders and that Mrs. Haas is a depositor. Please do not hesitate to drop in at your convenience and make yourself known to me and I shall be glad to discuss this matter further with you.

Am sending copy of this correspondence to Rabbi Silver with the thought that any reaction of this kind is interesting to a man of his position.

In closing, let me say that I deeply agree with the first sentence of your letter. We should have been so happy to have had our sponsorship start with Mrs. Melr instead of the Syrian Ambassador.

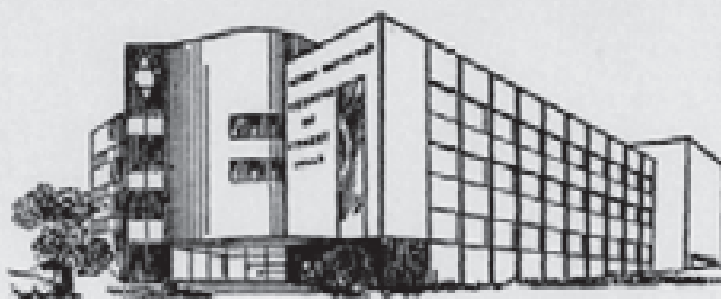

Dear Rabbi Silver,

One of our members, Julian Krawcheck, who is with the Cleveland Press, and whose wife is an Episcopalian, came to see me the other day & made the following suggestions and complaints:-

- (1) He feels that there should be social meetings for the new members - "get together, evenings," so to speak.
- (2) He thinks that The Temple should issue a brochure, setting forth the rights and duties of members - especially with regard to burial.
- (3) He has a boy in the Religious School who brings him to The Temple each Sunday. While waiting for the 10:30 service & hymns, he has been reading in the library, but of late has been ordered out of the library at 10:15 for some unknown reason. Because he practices organ music, he is aware & coming & service before 10:30.
- (4) He would like to join the Mrs. Davis Club but is barred by reason of age.
- (5) He is of the opinion that a two hour service, with one recess for the Religious School children is too long, and that there ought to be more social rapport among the children.
- (6) He is very anxious & interested his wife in The Temple (and she would be a distinct asset), but cannot do so because of the foregoing drawbacks.

Thank you for your letter of December 26th. It would perhaps be best if Mr. Krawcheck would drop in and talk to me or Rabbi Daniel. We could then explain many of the things in which he is interested in greater detail.

Answering specifically the items which he has raised:

- 1) the matter of get-together evenings for new members has been discussed from time to time but as yet no sentiment has crystallized in favor of it.
- 2) with reference to a brochure setting forth the rights and duties of members, especially with regard to burial; the Mayfield Cemetery Association, which, as you know, is operated by both the Temples, has such a pamphlet which from time to time is sent out to the members of both congregations. Mr. Krawcheck may obtain such a brochure in the Temple office.
- 3) The Temple Library is closed during the time of services in The Temple -- between 10:30 and 12:00 o'clock.
- 4) The Mr. and Mrs. Club operates within a definite age framework. It is intended for young married couples. Older people should join the Temple Men's Club or the Temple Women's Association. Having too wide a disparity in ages would make the work of the Mr. and Mrs. Club impossible.
- 5) the Sunday morning sessions of the Religious School are divided into three parts -- one, an assembly in Mahler Hall and two forty-five minute periods with a five minute recess in between.
- 6) I am happy to learn that Mr. Krawcheck is interested in getting his wife active in The Temple. There are many fields in which she may be active. I am going to suggest to the President of the Women's Association that she get in touch with her.
