You have been advised of their arrangements to visit the U.S.S.R. by Mr. Edgar Grant of our New York Office. As you know, Dr. and Mrs. Silver are awaiting their Russian visas, applications for which were personally presented to the Soviet Embassy in Washington by our Mr. S. S. Halsey. Mr. Isakov of the Consular Section, assured Mr. Halsey that the Silver's visa applications would be forwarded to Moscow without delay. We trust that these visas will be granted while the Silvers are in Paris and that you will be able to assist them in this connection. Mr. Boris Kharchenko, Vice President of Intourist at Moscow has confirmed Intourist Tour No. 15, starting at Leningrad on July 24th, and terminating at Moscow on August 16th. We have requested the air space for the Silvers indicated on the attached schedule. We have issued the necessary air tickets, but to date, the Aeroflot flights have not been confirmed. We shall appreciate your assistance in this connection also. As indicated, the Silvers will be spending the night of July 23rd in Helsinki. We have arranged for hotel accommodations and transfers for them there, but due to the time factor, since they are leaving on July 3, 1957, we have not obtained the Finnish visas. No doubt, your office can assist the Silvers with this formality. We know that you will do everything possible to aid Dr. and Mrs. Silver, and that you will extend to them all courtesies. We shall very much appreciate everything you do for them. For identification purposes, we have asked Dr. Silver to sign the duplicate copy of this letter. Yours very truly, G. O. Dear Rabbd Silver:

This is to let you know what we learned after following up the letter from Mrs. Becker which you forwarded to us.

As you may remember, Mrs. Becker asked your help in coming to Cleveland to live in a home for the blind or for older people.

Mr. Helper, Social Caseworker at the Jewish Community Service Society of Buffalo, New York, has looked into Mrs. Becker's situation. He has informed us that she is presently a patient at Buffalo State Hospital. She is 68 years old, legally blind, and has been at the hospital over a year. She made application to the Hosa Coplon Old Folks Home in Buffalo, but was not accepted partly because her emotional disturbance (paramoid ideation) will not allow her to adjust to a group situation.

She was previously in a New Jersey Mental hospital from 1954 to 1956. She made a poor adjustment and was released on her own demand and against medical advice, whereupon she went to Buffalo. She lived in a great succession of rooms for several months until her commitment to Buffalo State Hospital.

All opinions, apparently agree that she is quarrelsome, paranoid and has not been able to profit from experience. She was placed in a foster home by the State, but was unable to adjust.

She is a former librarian with a good command of English who makes a favorable first impression. She is an inveterate letter writer and manipulator who wants to leave the Buffalo State Hospital.

Her son's whereabouts are unknown.

In view of the above information, we have written Mrs. Becker that we will not be able to help her in regard to her request to come to Cleveland.



Dear Rabbi: After a telephone conversation with Mrs. Levine, and at her suggestion, I am writing this letter to you.

Approximately seven years ago, I had the pleasure of performing a concert for the Men's Club of the Temple, at which your distinguished father was present. As I recall, he was particularly enthused with the program, especially the original arrangements of my father's liturgical music .. (the late Cantor Josef Rosenblatt).

I have enclosed a brochure of my activities, which I hope you will read.

At present, I am busily engaged in assisting technically and musically with the filming of the life-story of my father, which prompted my leaving Temple Emanuel of Haverhill, where for the past five years, I officiated as Cantor.

Last week, I met with Dr. Freundenthal of Transcontinental Music, who informed me that Dr. Silver, during the High Holidays, might be in favor of engaging a Cantor with a repertoire of traditional music.

My work on the film, having undergone an unforseen change, alters my plans with regard to personal appearances.

With Dr. Silver's and your approval, I would love to avail myself of the opportunity of singing in your Temple during the Holidays.

As you will note in my brochure, I am well experienced in all three catagories of our Faith, - Orthodox, Conservative and Reformed, and I feature my father's music, which is specially arranged as a complete solo, or else, with choir and organ accompaniment.

HENRY ROSENBLATT

Biography

Born in Hamburg, Germany, November 10, 1907.

Son of the world famous Cantor Josef Rosenblatt.

Came to the United States in July, 1912, living here ever since.

EDUCATION:

- Graduate, Institute of Musical Art of the Juilliard School of Music.
- Winner of four successive scholarships in Singing and Musical Composition, at the Juilliard Graduate School of Music.
- Graduate, School of Sacred Music, Jewish Institute of Religion, Hebrew Union College, with highest honors, as Cantor-Educator.
- Studied composition with Jasche Zayde, world famous pianist and composer; and with the late Dr. Rubin Goldmark.
- Studied Modal Harmony for the Synagogue with Dr. Isadore Freed, as well as with Professor A. W. Binder.
- Studied History of Hebrew Music and Bibliography, with Dr. Eric Werner of the Hebrew Union College of Cincinnati and New York.
- Mastery of a repertoire of approximately 55 operatic roles, 20 Oratorio roles, 5,000 songs in 20 languages. Eas a working knowledge of many of the languages in which he sings, other than English.

EXPERIENCE:

In 1934 Henry Rosemblatt sang on the Sophie Tucker Music Hall show (WMGM), winning two successive singing contests, which resulted in three programs weekly of his own on the same station for two years.

The late Erno Rappee tuned in on Mr. Rosenblatt's program for nearly a year and expressed his amazement at the realization that Mr. Rosenblatt never repeated a number on the program.

EXPERIENCE (Continued

Impressed by this extraordinary repertoire of songs and by the amazing voice and dramatic ability with which Mr. Rosenblatt was gifted, Mr. Rappee engaged Mr. Rosenblatt's services for the Sunday Opera Series of the Radio City Music Hall (Sunday broadcasts over the NBC Network). Mr. Rosenblatt appeared on these broadcasts with such distinguished artists as Jan Peerce and Robert Weeds. That program led to Mr. Rosenblatt's becoming guest star of the Musical Camera, MBC Network, sponsored by Rogers International Silver.

Subsequently, he appeared as guest soloist on the great stage of the Radio City Music Hall.

In 1937 Mr. Rosenblatt appeared as an exclusive feature on many NBC broadcasts. In Los Angeles, California, he was engaged by Eddie Cantor to appear on his radio show, "The Eddie Cantor Texaco Town," together with Diana Durbin, Bert Gordon (known as the "mad Russian"), and Jimmy Wallington.

As an outcome of the above success, Columbia Broadcasting invited him to appear on their network program, "The Hollywood Showcase," in which Mr. Rosenblatt's life story was reenacted. A month later this was repeated in his honor. This occurred on February 1938.

Upon Mr. Rosenblatt's return from service with the armed forces, Arturo Toscanini heard him at the New York City Center Opera and engaged him to sing a leading role in the NBC broadcast of La Traviata, which the Great Maestro conducted on December 1 and December 8, 1946. That broadcast has been recorded on the RCA Victor label and it is selling all over the world. The record shows his name as Faul Dennis, which Mr. Rosenblatt adopted in opera for many years in order to make a success in his own right rather than rest on the laurels of his father. Mr. Rosenblatt (Paul Dennis received "rave" notices for this broadcast, which was true of his other appearances, whether in opera or in other media.

His last radio appearance was on the initial broadcast of Madam Butterfly in the NEC networks, presented in English in 1950 with the Japanese soprano Tomiko Kanazawa. Mr. Rosenblatt sang the role of the BONZE, the uncle of Butterfly. This Line 1 150

Opera and Concerts

In opera, Mr. Rosenblatt sang as the leading bass-baritone or basso-buffo of the Hollywood Bowl, Opera Company D'Italiano of Havana, Cuba, the Philadelphia La Scala Opera Company, the New York City Center, and appeared as a guest with the all-star east of the Metropolitan Opera Company at the LaTraviata broadcast with Toscanini conducting.

EXPERIENCE (Continued)

Mr. Rosenblatt has appeared for many years on the concert stage, especially in joint concerts with his father, which took him to Europe and Israel where the late Cantor Josef Rosenblatt died.

Henry sang many concerts for Pro Musica along the entire West Coast, from San Diego to Seattle, Washington.

He appeared frequently as soloist at the great events which took place at Madison Square Garden in New York City. He sang the leading role of Jeremiah the prophet in Max Reinhardt's extravaganza, The Eternal Road. Here Mr. Rosenblatt appeared opposite the famous actor, Sam Jaffe.

Mr. Rosenblatt would never refuse to sing for charity and always gave of himself to the utmost for the benefit of Hadassah, the B'nai Brith and other organizations.

These past achievements were not sufficient for Henry Rosenblatt. There was still one dream to be fulfilled: It was about 20 years ago when he had started on his quest for the authentic music of the Hebrew people, going unto the far corners of the earth to bring to light these treasures. He has a record for the most amazing "believe-it-or-not's" in being the first to bring to the attention of the public the music of the Sephardim (Spanish Jews). Music that dates back to the 12th century, etc. Music completely unknown to the Eastern or Western European Jews and to the American Jews as well. In 1947, Mr. Rosenblatt delivered a lecture on the history of Sephardic music, at the Spanish and Fortuguese Synagogue (Men's Club, of which Dr. de Sola Poole was President). Dr. Poole was very much impressed at Mr. Rosenblatt's findings and portrayal of this fascinating field. Mr. Rosenblatt states that it is easy to distinguish where the Avodah is extracted.

This was but the initial concert for Mr. Resemblatt, dealing with one phase of Jewish music. Then the Jewish Center Lecture Bureau of the Jewish Welfere Board sponsored him and sent him on one of the most extensive concert tours throughout the United States and Canada, where forfour consecutive years he lectured and sang on the subject of the music of the Jewish people, tracing it as far back as possible.

After these successes, Mr. Rosenblatt discontinued the use of the stage name of "Paul Dennis" -- feeling he had come to the point where his artistry as being recognized in its own right by the public. He reassumed his name of Henry Rosenblatt.

Finally came his greatest assignment and the fulfillment of the most cherished dream of all, and that was to present to the world the great melodies sung and written by his father, the immortal Cantor Josef Rosenblatt. How was this to be presented?

EXPERIENCE (Continued)

A few hours before his death, Cantor Josef Rosenblatt said to his son: "At least I know that when my time comes I will have left my son who will see to it that my work will not have been written in vain. You, Henry, will write new accompaniments to them."

The task was colossal. There were many compositions/sketched the melodies and indicated the words, but had no accompaniments. Others were mere accompaniments without words or the actual singing lines. Cantor Rosenblatt and his accompanist understood each other's cues, but for am outsider it turned out to be a jig-saw puzzle. Fortunately, Henry gleaned the meaning — the only one who could — but even for him it took 23 years to complete deciphering of the puzzle. Then came the task of writing the accompaniments to the interpretation and the use of Hebrew Modal harmonies.

To undertake this project and handle it successfully, Henry Rosenblatt decided to take a leave of absence from his regular duties and attend a full-time day school. Thus for two full years he was a student at the School of Sacred Music, carrying a full course of study of Jewish background in every sense of the word. He was graduated from that school with highest honors as Cantor Educator. The Hebrew Union College, of which the School is an integral part, considered Mr. Rosenblatt's step a brilliant forward move. As Dr. Franzblau, its Dean, declared: "Henry Rosenblatt is one person who is interested in the knowledge he could grasp, not the degrees."

Thanks to this environment, Cantor Henry Resemblatt was able to complete his father's masterpieces, which otherwise might have been lost and the world that much poorer. In October 1956 the great liturgical music of Cantor Josef Rosenblatt will be published by King Brand of New York. It is to be printed in serial form, four numbers to appear at a time. Advance notice will be given of future publications.

Dear Lou:

This is my first day back on the job after a two weeks vacation, and I want to bring you up todate on the Andrica and Rabbi Silver visa problems.

State Department complained to the Czechs for refusing Andrica a transit visa, and the Czechs didn't even reply. State says it's complaint was so worded that a reply wasn't demanded. It recommends that if Andrica applies for a visa in the future, the Department action in this case may help, but it guarantees nothing.

Rabbi Silver's tour called for him to enter Russia via Leningrad July 24.

Halsey of the Washington American Express office does not know whether the Reds gave the Rabbi the visa, but he thinks it did not else he would have heard despite the Russian Embassy argument here that it isn't notified about such goings on. We're hoping that the cable sent to the Russian Foreign Ministry by the American Express vice president, plus conversations the local Express people, Sen. Lausche and I with local Russian Embassy people resulted in the Eabbi's getting a visa over there.

The Russians here keep saying they let Americans come into Russia all the time, and I'm wondering whether we should tell our readers the truth about how the Czechs tweated America and the Russians Rabbi Silver--after we've made certain the Rabbi had the door slammed in his face. Sounds logical that we should. Let me know what you think.

The vacation was fine. Now Sally and I are waiting our daughter's confinement -- and grandparent -- hood.

Taylor was to have left for his annual Ohio trip tomorrow, but he has told me he postponed his leave-taking until next week because Frank Ford said he had something for him to do. Harry said he didn't know what was up. Ford hasn't spoken to me about his plans.

Before I forget, I want to restate my advice to Taylor concerning his plans to visit Australia during his three weeks of vacation, and to take two additional weeks to complete his travels. I recommended to you that he be permitted to take the two additional weeks, but I recall that I suggested that we avoid a precedent and tell him the Ohio papers should not be asked to pay his wages during these two extra weeks. I bring this up again because Harry will discuss his plans with you during his Ohio trip, and I wanted you to know what I had told him about my views.

There are a lot of stories waiting to be written, so I'd better get after them.





It is just possible that you will recall that on my wmy from Geneva, Switzerland, via Toronto, to visit Dr. Nelson Glueck last February, I took the liberty of telephoning to you from the Airport at Cleveland to let you know that I have for several years looked forward to some possibility of meeting you.

After spending twelve years on the Staff of the World Alliance Y.M.C.As I spent seven months last year travelling through the Middle East, Asia, North America and Europe. Out of the many conversations with Governmental and educational leaders of all Faiths came the proposal—which I had opportunity of discussing with many leaders in Israel this Summer — of an inter-Faith World Conference in New Delhi in 1960 which it is hoped may open the way for a "World Congress of Faiths" in Jerusalem in 1963 on the theme: "World Order and the Kingdom of God in Relation to the East-West Tension of our Time."

The location of The Temple in an angle between two heavily traveled thoroughfares rendered parking practically impossible and exposed The Temple to the forces of deterioration which centered in the large rooming house district which had sprung up immediately West of Ansel Road. In fact, it was believed by many thoughtful members that the Congregation should seriously consider the question as to whether The Temple should not be abandoned and a new Temple in a new location provided. A project of that kind would have involved an expenditure of at least \$3,000,000. As an alternative it was decided, and I believe wisely so, not to abandon the present Temple but to enlarge the same on land which the congregation owned immediately North of Mahler Hall and to acquire the large tract of land occupied by a group of deteriorated residence buildings and other undesirable structures lying between Ansel Boad and East 101st Street, with the object in view of securing the vacation of that portion of Ansel Road which extends from 101st Street diagonally to 105th Street.

All this has now been accomplished, with the result that our enlarged Temple structure will now be appropriately situated, not on a narrow triangle exposed on two sides to the noise and traffic generated on the two heavily traveled thoroughfares, but on a large rectangular parcel of land having a frontage of 555 feet on East 105th Street and extending back of equal width to a depth of approximately 400 feet. The Temple will be provided on the West with ample parking areas accessible from every direction, and with a cultural park suitably planted with trees and sarubbery that will serve as an effective buffer to protect The Temple, the Hospital, and in fact the whole great cultural University Circle community against the forces of deterioration from the West.

When the Temple expansion and rehabilitation project as now assured is completed, it will constitute a very important cultural contribution to the whole University Circle area in which the great educational, cultural, Museum and other artistic and spiritual resources of the City are consentrated. In fact, it is recognized as such by
