


Dear Rabbi Silver:

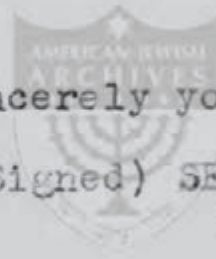

Ours is the only Jewish family in this community: I live with my sisters. If I lived in Cleveland, I would be a member of your congregation.


Since I cannot hear your sermons in person, is it possible that your talks may be made available for rabbis or other interested persons?



Dear Sir:

While the gates of repentance are still open, I send you this letter to wish you all good things on the threshold of the New Year, hoping that it will be a good year for the entire congregation of Israel which will endure forever.

I believe in perfect faith that you will pay heed to these, my good wishes for you and for your family, and that you will come to Israel as you promised, which I await most eagerly.

Without taking too much of your time, I will write you the essence of the matter.
