Shofar

A mystic significance was attached to the custom of Blowing the Shofar. In ancient times the blasts of the horn were believed to have the power of driving away evil spirits. To convert this pagan notion into a higher religious idea, the Jewish sages said that the Shofar is blown to remind us of the intended sacrifice of Isaac, for - according to tradition - Abraham attempted to sacrifice Isaac on the very day on the spot where the Jeruselem Temple was later erected. Since by the command of God, a ram was substituted for Isaac (see Genesis, 22) the sages explained that the blowing of a ram's horn would remind us of God's providence. Later the Jewish philosophers Saadie and Maimonides introduced the still loftier concept that the cound of the Shofar has the unique quality of penetrating into the human soul and causing the heart to tremble.

Dear Dr. Silver:

This note will take you back a number of years and is written, like many others you receive, in order to request a personal favor of you. You may remember that in late 1943 I was given a leave of absence from the United Jewish Appeal to help Mr. Henry Montor, then Executive Vice-Chairman of the UJA and the Executive Director of the American Zionist Emergency Council, in the latter's projected program of organizing local Committees. I was also asked to help build the first national meeting of the Council which was held in Cleveland, Ohio on December 11, 1943.

Shortly before that very successful meeting the Plenum of the American Zionist Emergency Council made a policy decision that the objective of the Council's program would be based on the full Zionist position and not merely a fight on the British White Paper of 1939. After that decision Mr. Montor resigned and both you and he asked me to assume professional direction of the Council. It was because of your requests, plus my own convictions, that I assumed the job. I served the Council faithfully, I believe, until I moved into the post of Executive Vice-Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal in early 1949. In 1950 I returned to the UJA. Prior to my coming to the Council I had worked for the UJA since January 15, 1939. Before that time I had served as one of the Trades Directors of the New York City Campaign of the Joint Distribution Committee.

You will remember that at the recent 25th Anniversary UJA Conference I was not among those who were honored for their service. It was claimed by the powersthat-be im our office that my service was not continuous but had been interrupted by my going to the Zionist Emergency Council. Agencies such as the UPA and the JDC are included as part of the UJA but not the Emergency Council.

Actually, when I went to the Council, having been invited by a National Chairman and an Executive Vice-Chairman of the UJA, I felt that I was still part of the UJA, away on special assignment. I felt and knew that I could have returned to the UJA once my job was completed at the Council. This is borne out by the fact that when I requested to return to the UJA in early 1950 I was immediately engaged. In fact, the work which we did at the Council helped immeasurably in creating a climate of excitement which made it possible for the UJA to raise in excess of \$100,000,000 in 1946, 1947 and 1948. At the time of my taking a leave of absence from the UJA I should have asked for a document which would have protected my position but because of my eagerness to shoulder the many new responsibilities of the job, I failed to do this.

As you can guess by this time, I am not too interested in the medal which was given my co-workers. What I am interested in Ls much more vital than that. The UJA will institute a pension this year and it seems that I will not be credited for my service in the Council. Taking off those years will make the difference of living out the years after my retirement in comparative comfort or be forced to scrape along with a menial income. The favor I have to ask is this: Would you write a letter to Herbert A. Friedman U as the Executive Vice-Chairman and/or to Joseph Meyerhoff as the UJA General Chairman, along the following lines -

> You noticed that I had not received the award for service at the Annual Conference and so you questioned me when you saw me in Cleveland. I told you that my service in the American Zionist Emergency Council had not counted, and you wanted to put the record straight. You, the Mational Chairman of the UJA and Mr. Henry Montor, the Executive Vice-Chairman, had both requested me to assume the job at the Council. In your opinion, a request such as this, coming from the then top officers of the UJA was tantamount to an order and I had no choice but to do your bidding. Therefore, I should not only have the Honor Award for service but any other benefits which may accrue to me as a result.

I think I have written much too much in this note but I do not know how to cut it short. If you believe in the justice of my position and feel able to write the letter which I have suggested, I will be most grateful.

I will be in Cleveland Sunday and will see you before you receive this letter. I hope that you enjoy your Birthday Party. My kindest regards to all.

I inquired in our subscription department why you were not receiving our newspaper. It turned out that your supposition, that your secretary had failed to pay the bills, was correct. I raised hell with the



My dear Mr. Meyerhoff:

I noticed at the recent Twenty-fifth Anniversary United Jewish Appeal Conference in New York City, which I had the privilege of attending, that medals of honor were distributed to a number of men and women who had given continuous service to the U.J.A., and I was greatly impressed by this action. I noticed, however, that my old friend and co-worker, Harry L. Shapiro, did not receive an award. When I saw him a few days ago here in Cleveland in connection with my Seventieth Anniversary Testimonial Dinner, I questioned him about it. He told me that his years of service in the American Zionist Emergency Council had not been counted. I should like to put the records straight.

In 1943, as National Chairman of the U.J.A., 1 and Mr. Henry Montor, who was then the Executive Vice-Chairman, requested Mr. Shapiro to take a leave-of-absence from the U.J.A., and to take a position with the American Zionist Emergency Council. This request, coming from us, was tantamount to an order and Mr. Shapiro had no choice but to abide by it. He, however, always felt that he could return to the U.J.A., once his job at the Council was completed. This, borne out by the fact that when he requested to return to the U.J.A., in early 1950, he was immediately engaged. His work in the Council helped immeasurably in creating that climate of excitement which made it possible for the U.J.A. to raise in excess of one hundred million dollars in the years '46-'48. I am inclined to believe, my dear Mr. Meyerhoff, that Mr. Shapiro is entitled not only to the honor award for continuous service, but to any other benefits which may have accrued to him as a result.

I should like to tell you now the purpose of this letter.

Before I came to this country in 1922 I was a promising young Hungarian poet. Here I stopped writing and I occupied myself with the every day task of making a living. My whole family, with the exception of my mother who was smuggled out of the Budapest ghetto in 1944 in a coffin, died in the inferno lit by Hitler. After the war we brought my mother out to this country. The tragedy in Europe and my own personal tragedy in particular as well as my mother's silence about her experiences caused a guilt feeling to develop in me. At about the time of my mother's death I started writing again in English, poems about my mother's escape from the ghetto, my brother's death in Mauthausen, the shooting of a poet friend of mine on the death march of the Hungarian Jews in 1944, about the dignity of a Jew facing death by shooting holding the hand of his ten year old son, and so on. The first pieces were definite expressions of guilt feeling which later changed into a desire fcr creative expression in attempting to write the sad song of our people. I am on the verge of completing a slim volume of poetry, the title of which is Kaddish.

I should like to take the liberty of asking you - before I start looking for a publisher - to let me send you a copy and ask you to kinely look it over. My purpose is twofold. First of all, I feel that it is my duty, in view of the subject matter of my work, to ask the opinion and advice of my Rabbi as to whether or not my approach and interpretation are correct. Secondly, I would not be human if I would not ask for your opinion - if you tare to express it - regarding the potential value of my work. I hesitate to ask for your attention and time. I hope, however, that you will be good enough to take an hour or so to read my manuscript which consists of a total of 18 pieces.

As soon as I hear from you I shall send you a copy and then ask for an opportunity to see you at your convenience.

Let me please take this opportunity also to wish you a happy birthday and many more years of good health to enable you to continue your noble service for Jewry as well as the whole of mankind. I am,

When I had the pleasure and the privilege of participation in the celebration in honor of your seventieth birthday, I voiced my wish that a fellowship in Rabbinics be established at Dropsie College in the name of Abba Hillel Silver and you expressed that the idea is a good one. I also mentioned this idea to Mr. Bertram Krohngold and he said that the fellowship would require fifty thousand dollars and he would talk the matter over with other members of the Temple.

A fellowship of fifty thousand dollars would bear interest of two thousand dollars annually. Mr. Ben-Gurion's Blind Spot

T HEODOR HERZL'S prophetic powers did not stop at formulating and predicting the creation of the "Judenstaat." The founder of political Zionism had also visualized the society which would be formed in the Jewish State, as well as the radical changes of heart and mind which would take place among the Jews of the world once the Judenstaat had been established and proved a success.

It is all there, in the utopian novel Altneuland (Old-New Land), written by Theodor Herzl sixty years ago. While ironically ridiculing the non-Zionists and anti-Zionists of yesteryear, whom he describes as having jumped on the bandwagon of the Jewish State, Herzl teaches the Zionists not to turn their backs on the latecomers, not even those who fought bitterly against the Zionist idea in the past, but to accept them into the "New Society."

What Herzl could not visualize was a Prime Minister of the "Judenstaat" who would systematically turn with ridicule and a biting tongue on Zionism and Zionists, and at the same time take to his bosom the non-Zionists and ant-Zionists. It seems as if, in the eyes of Psime Minister Ben-Gurion, Zionism is a dirty word. In Israel, under his aegis a "Zionist passport" is a poor recommendation, but if one comes there on a passport endorsed by the American Jewish Committee, for instance, he is assured of the warmest welcome. As matters stand today, it is a fair guess that, should Lessing Rosenwald decide to pay a visit to 'srael, he would be received by Mr. Ben-Gurion as a persona gratissima.

What set me thinking along tyese melancholy lines was a recent report from Israel about a delegation of the American Jewish Committee visiting there at the invitation of the Israeli Government. It was officially announced that the delegation, headed by the AJC's president, Mr. Sonnabend, would consult with Mr. Ben-Gurion and members of hi: Cabinet on a wide range of Israeli and Middle Eastern problems, Thus, this "I-rael-AJC Conference" will discuss not only Israel's internal economic and financial problems and the question of integration of the North African immigration, but also such clearly political issues directly related to the State of Israel's foreign bolicy as: a) the Arab refugee problem; b) the status of the Moslem and Christian minorities in Israel; and c) the bmoad issue of peace in the Middle East, which would

open the way for consolidation and constructive development of that region.

Now, there is certainly nothing wrong in discussing and searching for positive solutions of any and all of the above problems. Indeed, the Government of Israel would be falling down on its job, if it allowed one day to pass without trying to find such solutions. Nor is there anything wrong in the Israel Government's exchanging views on these matters with the leadership of the AJC, or with any other Jewish group in the United States or elsewere in the world.

WHAT IS EMINENTLY WRONG is that the Government of Israel extends this recognition to a most unrepresentative group of Jewish notables, while denying that recognition to the Zionist movement in the world. Time and again, the same Mr. Ben-Gurion has criticized. castigated and censured Zionist leaders. accusing them of interfering and meddling in Israel's internal affairs, but the American Jewish Committee is officially invited by him to express its views on such delicate, both internal and external, Israeli affairs as the Arab refugee problem, the non-Jewish minorities and integration of the North African immigrants in Israel's body politic and economic.

It is the second time that Prime Minister Ben-Gurion, when he wanted to discass things with American Jewry, has chosen the AJC as the right agency to represent the Jews of the United States. Cnce before he bestowed on us a Ben-Gurion-Blaustein Agreement, and we should not be surprised to be favored now with a "Ben-Gurion-Sonnabend" Agreement.

It is sadly characteristic of Mr. Ben-Curion's blind spot that he invites for this kind of broad discussion neither the Zionist Organization of America, nor the Hadassah, nor the American Zionist Council representing all the Zionist parties and groups, nor the Conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations (which are declaredly pro-Israel and pro-Zionist, and in which the American Jewish Committee does not participate), nor the American Jewish Congress or the E'nai Brith representing mass memberships-but the American Jewish Committee.

This is the Committee which, in 1944, withdrew from the American Jewish Conference because of the conference's stand in favor of the Jewish State idea. This is the Committee which until a few years ago was an exclusive club of the few wealthy and socially prominent, who never sought and never received the endorsement of the Jewish masses in the United States. In recent years, the Committee has somewhat breadened its local bases and established an organization which claims a membership of some thousands. However, it still does not pretend to be a mass organization and preserves its exclusive character.

H ERZL'S prediction with regard to the non-Zionists and anti-Zionists has come to pass. The American J-wish Committee went so far in its acceptance of the reality of the State that it has opened an office in Israel and started publishing a Hebrew magazine there. All this is most gratifying to American Zionists. It lends confirmation—if confirmation was needed—to the Herzlian prognosis of Jewish history and the Herzlian remedy for Jewish ills.

However, this belated and gradual rapprochement between the AJC and Israel is no way explains the antics of Mr. Ben-Gurion. The Prime Minister of the Republic of Israel is a "Labor Zionist," a leader of the Socialistic "Mapai" and of the Histadrut, the Labor Federation of Israel—why should he have such a marked greference for dealing not with the demscratically elected leaders of Jewish mass organizations in the United States, but with a few notables?

This writer cannot explain Mr. Ben-Gurion's behavior. This much, however, is abundantly clear: It is not only the Zionist movement in America that Prime Minister Ben-Gurion is so assiduously destroging, but he is also systematically cutting the ground from under the State of Lizael.

When I went to the bookshelf in search of the volume in question, found that I have several of his works but that the particular volume was missing. It had been loaned to Dr. Mark Schinnerer and returned, as I discovered yesterday when the book turned up in the glove compartment of my car.

In the volume, which consists of two books entitled "The Life" and 'Against Apion", at page 187 of the latter appears the following:

"Well, ours is not a maritime country; neither commerce nor the intercourse which it promotes with the outside world has any attraction for us. Our cities are built inland, remote from the sea; and we devote ourselves to the cultivation of the productive country with which we are blessed. Above all we pride ourselves on the education of our children, and regard as the most essential task in life the observance of our laws and of the pious practices, based thereupon, which we have inherited. If to these reasons one adds the peculiarity of our mode of life, there was clearly nothing in ancient times to bring us into contact with the Greeks, as the Egyptians were brought by their exports and imports, and the inhabitants of the sea-board of Phoenicia by their mercenary devotion to trade and commerce. (Nor, again, did our forefathers, like some others, have recourse to piracy, or to military schemes of aggrandizement, although their country contained myrtads of courageous men.)" (Underscoring mine)

VISIT TO THE ABBA HILLEL SILVER NAHALA

TA'OZ

"Good morning" Joshua greeted me in English, as I was still a full two hundred yards from him.

A little taken aback that my accent should be so obvious from such a distance, considering, too, that I had not yet opened my mouth, I queried him - in Hebrew - just how he came to know that I understood English.

"From your face, chaver" he replied.

I had earlier heard about Joshua from Moshav Ta'oz's pretty, Jerusalemborn kindergarten teacher, Sima Ziskind. "He and two ethers" she told me "besides working their meshakim, serve as border policemen. They are considered the aristocrats of the settlement". Perhaps this accounted for his long-range perception.

What Sima hadn't told me was that Joshua and his two colleagues were, uhlike the rest of Ta'oz's community, from Bombay. The other settlers including Joshua's wife - are Cochin Jews.

"But we married in India" Joshua told me, "and our two eldest children were born there. I worked in a factory, but also helped my father in his cocoa plantation, so I was not altogether new to agriculture when we arrived in Israel eight years ago".

I nevertheless, felt prompted to ask him why he had come to Ta'oz.

"Oh, we did not come here originally. We spert nearly a year and a half at Givat Hayim Meuhad. We only left because we feared the lack of religious atmosphere there would be a bad influence on our children".

"Is the community here a very observant one, then ?" I queried.

"Well" he answered "I only need tell you that the main synagogue is not big enough for all those who wish to worship, and about twenty of us hold our services in part of the school building, where we have the Sifrei Torah we brought from Bombay. Come with me to see my meshek, and on the way we shall pass the school".

He led me down a winding pathway past the main synagogue, the community store and the club.

"There's Kitah Aleph's classroom" said Joshua, stopping by a long, low building, "and the small room next to it is our synagogue. When the first immigrants

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came here thirteen years ago - they were Yemenis who have now moved to Tarum across the Jerusalem-Tel-Aviv road you see below us - both room were classrooms. But we new settlers had more children of school age, and the new building over there had to be put up for Kitah Bet."

Joshua was especially keen to point out to me the plaque affixed to the school wall by the Jewish National Fund to commemorate the 1,125-acre nahala established by American Jewry in honor of Habbi Dr. Abba Hillel Silver.

Joshua lived a little lower down the hill, in a red-roofed, whitewalled, three-roomed house. Nearby he kept his four hundred chickens, which he had received only the week before. "We must buy fodder for them outside" he told me "for our land is completely devoted to grapes, tomatoes, cucumbers and cauliflower. But nevertheless we hope to breed good calves for sale in Jerusalem. With water so strictly rationed here, we couldn't grow enough greenstuff for dairy cows to graze on, even if we had the land to spare."

I asked Joshua how he managed to work his land, tend his cows and chickens, and also find the time to help guard the nearby border. "Oh, it's no problem really" he answered. "The patrols are generally at night, so I have most of the day to work around here. My wife and the children feed the chickens and cows, and I have plenty of time to look after the rest."

After bidding Joshua goodbye, I climbed the hill on the other side past the last houses, to a solid stone building which, I was told, was formerly, a yeshiwa. From here, almost in the no man's land which at this point separates Israel from Jordan, I looked across on the one side to Latrun, and on the other down to Ta'oz, spreading out in three directions, and the highway snaking its way past Eshtaol, up the hill to Sha'ar Haggai, and onwards to Jerusalem.

On a neighboring hilltop was the Harel watchtower, from which the JNF keeps a vigilant eye on its young forests. In the valley the vineyards swept round in a wide semi-circle, coming to an abrupt halt at the rugged boulders directly below me. "One day these too may be cleared" I thought to myself, "and the soil beneath them bring forth fruit".

To my left, along the crest of the hill, I could see the newest forest of them all - the Ta'oz Forest. Covering these stony slopes with young green saplings from the JNF's tree nursery at Eshtsol has been the task of some of the

settlers of Ta'oz itself. The work with which the Fund provides them in the winter months gives a welcome boost to the family purse, and for some regular forestry work will soon be available.throughout the year.

The children in the kindergarten had looked contented enough, but their clothes were shabby, and Sims told me that conditions in many of the homes left a lot to be desired.

The kindergarten provided many of them with their first lessons in personal hygiene, and along one wall hung towels, toothbrushes and combs for each and every one of the twenty-five toddlers. One corner was a clinic in miniature, with all the necessary requirements for the children's doctor en his weekly visit. The little ones grew potted plants in their "nature corner" and made dolls, masks, and models in clay in their handicrafts section. They had a little library and brightly-covered tables for mealtimes. Outside they played on swirgs, on miniature parallel bars, and in a sandpit, all set in a lovely grove of young pines planted for them by the J.N.F.

The Cochin Jews are chrming, intelligent people. They are anxious to clirg to some of their tradition, and so would be loth to leave a place like Ta'oz where they can live together in community. But they are still strange to the conditions of moshav life, which demand not only devotion to the routine everyday tasks of running a farm, but also skills and knowledge which most of them do not yet possess. Many of the, too, are eld, and not a few are chronically sick. As their familiarity with the Hebrew language develops, their chances of doing better for themselves in the towns improve.

The future lies very much in the hands of the children. Whether they decide to plough back the skills they acquire at school into the running of the village remains to be seen. Several of them are already at agricultural schools, and others are keen to follow them. But the land of Ta'oz is limited in its economic potential without the benefit of cheap irrigation. Perhaps some sort of local industry would be the answer, as it has been in other similar places.

Now that the entire Cochin community has been brought to Israel - and in this sense it is unique - it must decide whether to attempt to remain ethnically separate, as it can best do by staying in places like Ta'oz, or to scatter and disperse itself. With the children growing up, studying in the

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towns, and serving in the defense forces, the solution perhaps is not entirely in their hands. But whatever happens, it is plain for all to see at Ta'oz that these people will make their mark on Israel's life. They are proud and unselfconscious, and bear no grudge against anyone. They love their new country, and appreciate the opportunities it offers them. This alone is a step in the right direction.

GENTLEMEN OF THE OHIO LIONS CLUBS CONVENTION OF 1962:

WHAT BROUGHT ME HERE TODAY TO TALK TO YOU?

WHO AM I TO BE SO PRIVILEGED?

WHAT IS THE SUBJECT OF MY TALK?

"TEN YEARS."

WHY NOT ONE YEAR, ONE HUNDRED YEARS, ONE THOUSAND YEARS?

MANY OF YOU MAY RECALL OUR FIRST MEETING MORE THAN TEN YEARS AGO ON MAY 26TH, 1951, AT YOUR LIONS STATE CONVENTION MEETING AT AKRON, OHIO. FOR THOSE OF YOU WHOM I DO NOT KNOW, PLEASE BE AS PATIENT WITH ME, AS I FEEL THAT THOSE WHO DO KNOW ME WILL BE, AS I TALK WITH YOU ON A SUBJECT TO WHICH I HAVE DEDICATED MY LIFE. FOR TEN YEARS YOU HAVE LIKEWISE BEEN DEDICATED. THE CHAIRMAN OF A MEETING ONCE SAID TO A SPEAKER: "WHAT WILL YOU TALK ABOUT?" SAID THE SPEAKER: "ABOUT A MINUTE." THE ONLY DIFFERENCE THIS DAY BETWEEN MY TALK AND THE "ABOUT-A-MINUTE" TALK IS THAT I WILL TALK ABOUT "TEN YEARS." DON'T WORRY. I CAN ASSURE YOU WHAT I HAVE TO SAY WON'T TAKE THAT LONG. SO, LET'S TALK A BIT.

ONCE I HAD A CLIENT -- YOU SEE I AM A LAWYER -- AND OLD SAM WAS HAVING A LOT OF TROUBLE WITH HIS WIFE. SHE JUST TALKED AND TALKED. SAM ASKED ME TO GO INTO COURT AND GET AM INJUNCTION AGAINST HIS WIFE; TO SECURE FOR HIM A BIT OF QUIET FOR A LITTLE WHILE. SAID THE JUDGE TO SAM AT THE COURT HEARING: "SAM, WHAT DOES YOUR WIFE TALK ABOUT?" SAM SAID: "YOUR HONOR, I DON'T KNOW. SHE JUST DON'T SAY."

I HOPE YOU WILL LISTEN TO ME A BIT FOR I WILL SAY AS BRIEFLY AS I CAN WHAT "TEN YEARS" IS ABOUT.

ARISTOTLE WAS A GREAT MAN. HE WAS A PHILOSOPHER AND ENJOYED A PLEASANTRY OR TWO. ONCE ONE OF HIS FELLOW TOWNSMEN WAS TALKING AWAY AT A GREAT RATE. ARISTOTLE

SEEMED TO LISTEN; TO TAKE IT ALL IN. SAID HIS NEIGHBOR: "I HOPE I AM NOT BOTHERING YOU." "CERTAINLY NOT," SAID ARISTOTLE, "FOR I WAS NOT LISTENING ANYWAY."

I HOPE I DON'T BOTHER YOU. I TRUST YOU WILL HEAR ME OUT. [WANT TO SPEND "TEN YEARS" WITH YOU TODAY.

I HAD A TOUCH OF BLINDNESS ABOUT FIFTEEN YEARS AGO. WHEN MY CATARACTS WERE REMOVED AND I CAME TO ENOW HOW LITTLE HAD BEEN DONE TO PREVENT BLINDNESS --- THAT THE MAJORITY OF THE CAUSES OF BLINDNESS WERE UNKNOWN TO SCIENCE, I MADE UP MY MIND TO TRY TO DO SOMETHING ABOUT RESEARCH IN SO IMPORTANT AND SO LONG NEGLECTED A CAUSE.

NEED I SAY HOW IMPORTANT SIGHT IS? WHERE CAN YOU FIND A NEW PAIR OF EYES? THERE ARE NO SPARE PARTS, NO REPLACEMENTS. EIGHTY-FIVE PERCENT OF WHAT WE KNOW COMES THROUGH THE EYES. IMAGINE ONLY A DAY WITHOUT SIGHT. IN THE UNITED STATES FORTY THOUSAND PEOPLE GO BLIND EACH YEAR. SIGHT IS A PRICELESS CIFT. YET, BLINDNESS IS INCREASING. TEN YEARS AGO IN THE UNITED STATES, AS NEAR AS WE KNOW. THERE WERE TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY

WHAT HAS ALL OF THIS TO DO WITH "TEN YEARS?" TEN YEARS AGO I CAME TO A CONVENTION JUST LIKE THIS. I ASKED THE LIONS CLUBS FROM ALL OVER OHIO TO ADOPT A PROGRAM IN AN ALL-OUT LIONS EFFORT TO AID RESEARCH TO PREVENT BLINDNESS AND THUS HELP FIND THE ANSWER TO A QUESTION WHICH IS AS OLD AS THE AGES --- "WHY BLINDNESS?" "TEN YEARS" OR MORE HAVE GONE THEIR WAY. TODAY I COME BACK TO A LIKE STATE CONVENTION OF ALL OF THE LIONS CLUBS OF OHIO TO MAKE A REPORT AND THUS BRING YOU UP TO DATE.

<u>NOW YOU KNOW WHO I AM.</u> <u>NOW YOJ KNOW WHAT "TEN</u> <u>YEARS" MEANS.</u> IN OUR TALK I WANT TO TELL THE OHIO LIONS OF THE PROGRESS MADE DURING THE PAST TEN YEARS.

WHAT WERE THE CONDITIONS RESEARCH-WISE WHEN I STARTED ON MY DEDICATED JOURNEY FIFTEEN YEARS AGO TO TRY TO FIND THE ANSWER TO THE PROBLEM OF HOW ELINDNESS COULD BE PREVENTED? ALMOST NO MONEY WAS AVAILABLE AT THAT TIME FOR EYE RESEARCH.

IN THE UNITED STATES TEN YEARS AGO, THIRTY THOUSAND PEOPLE WENT TOTALLY BLIND EACH YEAR. SEVERAL HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS WERE SPENT EACH YEAR TO TAKE CARE OF THE BLIND. HERE AND THERE IN A VERY FEW PLACES A PITIFUL EFFORT WAS BEING MADE ON THE PART OF A FEW PEOPLE TO FIND AN ANSWER TO THE UNDERLYING CAUSES OF THIS AGE-LONG AFFLICTION --- BLINDNESS. THE FIELD OF RESEARCH (WHICH IS THE ONLY ANSWER TO THE QUESTION "WHY BLINDNESS?") WAS A ROCKY AND BARREN ONE INDEED.

IN 1948 A FAMOUS OPHTHALMOLOGIST, DR. F. H. VERHOEFF OF BOSTON, SAID: "IN VIEW OF THE GREAT WEALTH OF THIS COUNTRY AND THE STRONG APPEAL MADE BY BLINDNESS, IT IS REMARKABLE HOW LITTLE HAS BEEN DONATED FOR OPHTHALMIC RESEARCH."

MANY OTHERS WELL INFORMED SAID: "SO NEGLECTED HAS BEEN THE FIELD OF BASIC RESEARCH IN BLINDING EYE DISEASES THAT IT IS INCONCEIVABLE THAT SUCH A CONDITION SHOULD EXIST IN THIS COUNTRY. SEVENTY PERCENT OF BLINDNESS IS PREVENT-ABLE."

ONE OF THE GREAT RESEARCHERS IN THE FIELD OF BLIND-NESS IN THE UNITED STATES, DR. DAVID COGAN OF HARVARD'S MEDICAL SCHOOL AND DIRECTOR OF THE HOWE LABORATORY OF OPHTHALMCLOGY, THIS COUNTRY'S OLDEST AND MOST OUTSTANDING EYE RESEARCH LABORATORY, SAID TEN YEARS AGO: "I CANNOT BEGIN TO CITE THE TREMENDOUS POSSIBILITIES OF EXPANDED LABORATORIES DEVOTED TO EYE RESEARCH. FEW DISASTERS COMPARE WITH THE TRAGEDY OF BLINDNESS AND YET SO LITTLE MONEY HAS BEEN AVAILABLE FOR ITS STUDY IN RESEARCH LABOR-ATORIES. SO LITTLE FUNDAMENTAL INFORMATION HAS BEEN DISCOVERED EVEN FOR THE NORMAL EYE. THE NEED FOR RE-SEARCH IS DESPERATE. THE HOPE IN THE FUTURE LIES IN THE SEARCH FOR FUNDAMENTAL KNOWLEDGE AND THE APPLICATION OF SUCH KNOWLEDGE TO FIND THE CAUSE OF BLINDNESS AND THE

PREVENTION OF THIS SCOURGE THAT FOR THOUSANDS OF YEARS HAS AFFLICTED MILLIONS OF PEOPLE. THE EYE IS THE MOST COMPLICATED AND LEAST UNDERSTOOD ORGANISM OF THE HUMAN BODY."

IN 1948 THE NEW YORK INSTITUTE FOR EDUCATION OF THE BLIND SAID: "THERE IS NO SINGLE GROUP INTERESTEE IN DEVOTING ITS TIME AND ATTENTION TO RAISING FUNDS TO FIND THE CAUSES TO CURE AND PREVENT BLINDNESS."

UNCLE SAM SPENT ABOUT ELEVEN THOUSAND DOLLARS PER YEAR AT THAT TIME FOR EYE RESEARCH. THERE EXISTED A COMMON BELIEF THAT THE PREVENTION OF BLINDNESS THROUGH RESEARCH WAS HOPELESS.

IN 1949 DR. V. EVERETT KINSEY, ONE OF MY CO-WORKERS IN THIS CAUSE, FORMERLY OF THE HOWE LABORATORY OF OPHTHAL-MOLOGY, HAFVARD MEDICAL SCHOOL, AND NOW OF THE KRESGE EYE INSTITUTE AT DETROIT, SAID: "THE NUMBER OF PERSONS WHO ARE CONDUCTING RESEARCH IN BLINDING EYE DISEASES IS SMALL INDEED. THERE ARE APPROXIMATELY THIRTY THOUSAND PERSONS BLIND FROM GLAUCOMA IN THE UNITED STATES. HOW MANY WORKERS DO YOU SUPPOSE ARE PRESENTLY DEVCTING FULL TIME TO RESEARCH ON GLAUCOMA? A GENEROUS ESTIMATE IS THREE. ACTUALLY, THERE ARE LESS THAN TWENTY FULL TIME RESEARCH WORKERS IN THE WHOLE FIELD OF OPHTHALMOLOGY. THE EXPLANATION OF THE LACK OF RESEARCH EFFORT AIMED AT PREVENTING BLINDNESS IS PRIMAFILY THE ABSENCE OF FINANCIAL SUPPORT. THE NEED FOR EXPANDED RESEARCH ON BLINDING EYE DISEASES IS APPARENT . . . A FRIEND OF MINE WHO HAD A DE-TACHED RETINA, A RELATIVELY COMMON EYE DISEASE, ASKED ME TO EXPLAIN TO HIM WHY THE RETINA BECAME DETACHED. I SAID: 'I CANNOT EXPLAIN IT. WE DO NOT KNOW WHY IT IS HELD ON IN THE FIRST PLACE.' WE ARE SO LACKING IN BASIC KNOWLEDGE THAT IT IS EXTREMELY DIFFICULT TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN THE DISEASES DEVELOP. THERE IS A NEW AND BAFFLING DISEASE CALLED RETROLENTAL FIBROPLASIA, KNOWN AS 'RLF,' WHICH BLINDS BABIES," (YOU WILL HEAR MORE ON THIS SUBJECT LATER.) "THE ANSWER TO THE QUESTION OF WHETHER RESEARCH IN OPHTHALMOLOGY WOULD BE FRUITFUL, IS AN EMPHATIC 'YES.'"

SAID DR. KINSEY: "I KNOW, FROM MY EXPERIENCE, THAT YOU CANNOT AT THIS MOMENT HIRE TEN PEOPLE TO DO RESEARCH IN OPHTHALMOLOGY BECAUSE THEY DO NOT EXIST ONE CANNOT EXPECT PROGRESS IN RESEARCH BY MERELY HIRING A HALF DOZEN CHEMISTS. THEY MUST BE TRAINED IN OPHTHAL-MOLOGY. THE OPHTHALMOLOGIST IN TURN HAS TO BE TRAINED IN RESEARCH METHODS. THIS TAKES A PERIOD OF YEARS."

WHAT IS RESEARCH? --- RESEARCH IS THE FORERUNNER OF ALL MEDICAL PROGRESS. RESEARCH AND ITS INSEPARABLE COMPANION, MEDICAL EDUCATION, EXIST FOR THE PURFOSE OF FIGHTING DISEASES AND IGNORANCE. WHAT IS RESEARCH? ---A PLACE TO WORK; TOOLS TO WORK WITH; A TEAM OF DEDICATED MEN SEEKING THE ANSWER TO THE UNKNOWN TO SCIENCE; MEN PREPARED, MEN WHO KNOW WHAT THEY SEEK, AND HOFE AND WORK TO FIND THE WAY. THIS IS RESEARCH.

TEN YEARS AGO I ASKED THE OHIO LIONS CLUBS, IN A CONVENTION SUCH AS THIS, TO SUPPORT RESEARCH TO HELP MEET THE STAGGERING FACTS ABOVE RECITED. I SAID: "THE LIONS HAVE ALWAYS BEEN INTERESTED IN HELPING THE BLIND.

THERE IS NOTHING THAT I WANT FOR MYSELF, EXCEPT LIONS CO-OPERATION TO HELP ADVANCE EYE RESEARCH." I ASKED: "DO YOU VALUE YOUR SIGHT?" AND WENT ON: "EYES ARE PRICE-LESS. THEY CANNOT BE REPLACED. HELEN KELLER SAID: 'TO UNDERSTAND THE NEEDS OF THE BLIND, YOU MUST IMAGINE WHAT IT WOULD BE LIKE, NOT TO SEE ---- AND YOU CAN IMAGINE IT MORE VIVIDLY IF YOU WILL REMEMBER THAT BEFORE YOUR LIFE'S END YOU YOURSELF MAY GO THE DARK WAY. BLINDNESS IS TO LIVE LONG, LONG DAYS; AND LIFE IS MADE UP OF DAYS. BLINDNESS IS TO LIVE IMPRISONED, ALL GOD'S WORLD SHUT OUT; IT IS TO LIVE HELPLESS, STARING INTO THE DARK WITH NOTHING BUT THE DARK STARING BACK. '"

THIS IS WHAT WE TALKED ABOUT TEN SHORT YEARS AGO. <u>TODAY AT YOUR INVITATION I COME BACK FOR ANOTHER TALK</u> <u>WITH YOU.</u> <u>YOU HEARD WHAT I HAD TO SAY TEN YEARS AGO.</u> WHAT DID YOU DO TO MEET THIS GREAT PROBLEM? YOU KNOW. I KNOW. OHIO KNOWS. FROM THAT DAY ON, THE OHIO LIONS IN CONVENTION ASSEMBLED RESPONDED TO MY PLEA. YOU GAVE OF YOURSELVES. YOU ARE STILL GIVING. GREAT WAS YOUR INTEREST. GREATER IS YOUR ACCOMPLISHMENT. TODAY, TEN YEARS HAVING PASSED, I SAY, GCD BLESS THE OHIO LIONS CLUBS FOR YOUR WONDERFUL EFFORT AND OUTSTANDING RESULTS.

THOSE WERE THE HARD DAYS. FEW PEOPLE UNDERSTOOD WHAT WE WERE SAYING. A HANDFUL OF PEOPLE WERE CRYING THEIR HEARTS OUT TO A HARD WORLD WHICH THEN, AS NOW, WAS DIFFICULT TO MOVE TO ACTION. YOU ACCEPTED THE CHALLENGE WHICH TEN YEARS AGO I BROUGHT TO THE OHIO LIONS.

ONE MAN'S NAME STANDS OUT IN MY MEMORY. I KNOW HE IS HERE. I MET HIM IN JUNE OF 1949, MAY THE BLESS-INGS OF HIM WHO SITS ON HIGH GO TO EVERETT STEECE AND TO ALL OF THOSE WHOM HE LOVES AND WHO LOVE AND RESPECT HIM. ALL OF YOU KNOW WHAT HE HAS DONE OVER THE PAST TEN YEARS TO HELP ADVANCE, IN THE NAME OF THE OHIO LIONS, THIS GREAT CAUSE. I AM GREATLY HONORED AND PRIVILEGED TO SAY, "I THANK YOU, EVERETT STEECE," AS I ALSO THANK EACH ONE OF THE MEMBERS OF THE OHIO LIONS CLUBS. EVERETT STEECE DESERVES THESE THANKS, AS DO EACH OF YOU; AND I HAVE COME BACK AFTER TEN YEARS TO SAY THESE THINGS

TO MY GOOD FRIEND EVERETT STEECE AND TO THE OHIO LIONS FACE TO FACE. THESE THANKS ARE PART OF THE MEANING OF MY TALK, "TEN YEARS."

TEN YEARS AGO THE OHIO LIONS, AND ITS STATE ORGANI-ZATION, CREATED AN EYE RESEARCH PROJECT. YOUR GROUP DETERMINED TO SUPPORT, WORK FOR, AND AID RESEARCH TO HELP FIND THE CAUSE, THE CURE, AND THE PREVENTION OF BLINDNESS. THIS PROJECT WAS TO BE CARRIED ON IN CONNEC-TION WITH A LITTLE GROUP, OF WHICH I AM SECRETARY, NAMELY, THE NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR EYE RESEARCH. WE SOUGHT TO HELP BLOT OUT DARKNESS AND TO RESTORE AND GIVE SIGHT, THROUGH RESEARCH, TO COUNTLESS THOUSANDS TO THE END THAT THERE WOULD BE LESS BLIND PEOPLE IN THIS WORLD.

ON THE 29TH DAY OF FEBRUARY, 1952, FRANK J. LAUSCHE, THE THEN GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF OHIC, AS URGED BY EVERETT STEECE, PROCLAIMED THAT THERE SHOULD BE A "BLIND WELFARE AND EYE RESEARCH MONTH" IN OHIO. THE PROCLAMATION STATED THAT THE LIONS CLUBS OF OHIO WERE ENLISTING AID FOR A STATE-WIDE PROGRAM IN CONNECTION

WITH THE NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR EYE RESEARCH, TO SUPPORT RESEARCH IN ORDER TO ELIMINATE BLINDING EYE DISEASES AND TO PREVENT AND CURE BLINDNESS. BY PROCLAMATION, APRIL WAS DESIGNATED AS THE "BLIND WELFARE AND EYE RESEARCH MONTH" FOF THE PURPOSE OF SUPPORTING EDUCATION AND EN-LIGHTENMENT IN THIS FIELD, TO BE PARTICIPATED IN BY ALL OF THE LIONS CLUBS AND ALL OHIOANS.

AND, A LITTLE LATER ON, YOU BROUGHT ABOUT THE OR-GANIZATION OF THE OHIO LIONS EYE RESEARCE FOUNDATION, INC., OF WHICH EVERETT STEECE IS THE DIRECTOR. FOR THE PAST TEN YEARS SINCE OUR FIRST MEETING, YOU TOOK OFF YOUR COATS AND STARTED TO WORK. YOU ASKED NO THANKS OR REWARD. WHEN FUNDS WERE DESPERATELY NEEDED FOR RESEARCH TO PREVENT BLINDNESS, YOU WENT FROM DOOR TO DOOR AND FROM LIONS CLUB TO LIONS CLUB, AND SOWED THE SEEDS AND THUS PLANTED AN ORCHARD OF TREES. YOU GATHERED IN A TEN-YEAR HARVEST. "GREAT OAKS FROM LITTLE ACORNS GROW." YOU HARVESTED MORE THAN TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS FOR THIS PURPOSE. THESE FUNDS HAVE BEEN DIVIDED

AMONG THE MEDICAL SCHOOL AT CINCINNATI, THE WESTERN RE-SERVE MEDICAL SCHOOL AT CLEVELAND, AND THE MEDICAL SCHOOL OF THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY HERE IN COLUMBUS. I TRUST THAT YOU WILL CONTINUE TO SUPPORT, THROUGH FURTHER CON-TRIBUTIONS, THE FINE WORK THAT IS BEING DONE IN EYE RESEARCH AT THESE GREAT MEDICAL SCHOOLS.

I STOP HERE TO NAME A FEW LIONS --- I WISH I COULD NAME ALL --- WHO, OVER THE YEARS, WORKED TO RAISE THE FUNDS REQUIRED TO ADVANCE EYE RESEARCH. WE HEAD THE LIST WITH EVERETT STEECE, GENERAL MANAGER OF THE OHIO LICNS EYE RE-SEARCH FOUNDATION. E. C. "CURLEY" BAUM, PAST STATE SECRE-TARY, AND ALICE BAUM, HIS GOOD WIFE. ED A. SCHAUER, FRED N. WILLIAMS, AND BURLEY GRAY OF DISTRICT 13-A; DR. MORRIS L. BATTLES OF DISTRICT 13-B; WILLIAM C. THOMAS, LEWIS C. YOHN, AND ED J. WARD OF DISTRICT 13-D; RALPH E. BLANEY OF DISTRICT 13-E: DR. DAN G. HUMMEL AND DE. JOHN E. WOLF OF DISTRICT 13-F; DR. GEORGE K, BECKETT, DISTRICT 13-G; T. H. MEHLBERG, DR. WILLIAM T. WARD, DR. WILLIAM LOFTY AND WILLIAM ALTHOUSE OF DISTRICT 13-H; AND DR. JOHANSEN, WHOSE DISTRICT I CANNOT NOW RECALL. DR. LORAND V. JOHNSON, AN OUTSTANDING LION OF MY HOME TOWN CLEVELAND, DESERVES SPECIAL MENTION. AND MY SINCERE THANKS TO EVERY MEMBER OF THE LIONS OF OHIO, DISTRICT 13 --- INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF LIONS CLUBS, FOR THEIR NOBLE EFFORTS IN SUPPORTING THIS CAUSE FROM THE VERY BEGINNING AND OVER THE YEARS.

WE GO BACK TO 1948, AT WHICH TIME I MET DR. FRED HITCHCOCK AND TRIED TO HELP HIM AND THE COMMITTEE HE WORKED WITH TO CREATE THE INSTITUTE FOR VISION AT OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY MEDICAL SCHOOL. DUE IN PART TO THE CO-OPERATION AND SUPPORT OF THE OHIO LIONS, WE WERE ABLE TO EXPAND THESE FACILITIES, WHERE FOR SOME YEARS DR. WILLIAM HAVENER DID OUTSTANDING WORK AS DIRECTON OF RE-SEARCH IN OPHTHALMOLOGY, AND WHICH ARE NOW UNDER THE LEADERSHIP OF DR. H. RICHARD BLACKWELL.

WHAT ELSE DID WE DO IN THIS TEN-YEAR PERIOD?

DURING THE PAST TEN YEARS, AT EACH BIENNIUM, THE OHIO LIONS AND YOUR SPEAKER WENT TO THE FIVE SESSIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF OHIO TO PLEAD SUPPORT FOR OUR CAUSE. EVERETT STEECE WAS EVER AT MY SIDE. THE LEGISLATURE, DURING THIS TEN-YEAR FERIOD, APPROPRIATED A TOTAL OF FIVE HUNDRED AND FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS WHICH SUPPLIED THE FUNDS NECESSARY TO BRING ABOUT EYE RESEARCH AT THE MEDICAL SCHOOL OF OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY AND TO BUILD THE INSTITUTE FOR VISION. DURING THE SAME PERIOD

THE OHIO LIONS, OUT OF THEIR OWN FUNDS, CONTRIBUTED ABOUT ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS TO THE MEDICAL SCHOOL AT OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY FOR THESE PURPOSES. THROUGH THESE EFFORTS AND WITH YOUR HELP, THERE WAS OBTAINED A TOTAL OF ABOUT ONE MILLION DOLLARS TO SUPPORT EYE RESEARCH AT OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY MEDICAL SCHOOL.

IN TELLING OUR STORY IN OUR VARIOUS APPEALS TO THE OHIO LEGISLATURE, WE THANK DR. CHARLES DOAN, DEAN EMERITUS OF THE MEDICAL SCHOOL OF OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY; STATE REPRESENTATIVE DAVID McK. FERGUSON OF CAMBRIDGE, OHIO; DR. ARTHUR M. CULLER; DR. JOHN PORTERFIELD, NOW WITH THE PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE OF THE UNITED STATES; THE GOVERNORS OF THE STATE OF OHIO, INCLUDING GOVERNOR MICHAEL V. DISALLE, WHO HELPED ADVANCE THIS CAUSE AND WHO HAS AN OUTSTANDING INTEREST IN EXPANDING RESEARCH IN ALL OF THE DISCIPLINES.

FOR TEN YEARS WE CONTACTED EVERY MEMBER OF THE VARIOUS LEGISLATURES AND, THROUGH A PROGRAM OF EDUCATION, BROUGHT HOME TO THEM THE FACTS WHICH PROMPTED THE LEGISLATURE TO APPROPRIATE THIS HUGE SUM OF MONEY IN ORDER TO BRING ABOUT, FOR THE FIRST TIME IN OHIO, AN OUT-STANDING RESEARCH PROGRAM IN THE DEPARTMENT OF OPHTHAL-MOLOGY AND TO EXPAND THE INSTITUTE FOR VISION.

AS AN EXAMPLE OF THE COOPERATION OF THE LIONS IN OUR PROGRAM, I WANT TO READ TO YOU A LETTER I RECEIVED MORE THAN TEN YEARS AGO FROM WILLIAM R. FLEMMING OF NEW PHILADELPHIA, OHIO (I TRUST HE IS HERE TODAY), IN WHICH HE SAID: "I WANTED YOU TO KNOW THAT YOUR PRESENTATION OF SO VITAL A PROBLEM TO OUR STATE CONVENTION WAS ONE OF THE MOST INTELLIGENT APPROACHES TO THE MATTER OF BLIND-NESS THAT IT HAS BEEN MY GOOD FORTUNE TO HEAR. I WAS DEEPLY IMPRESSED. HAVING BEEN IN LIONS WORK FOR YEARS AND HAVING SERVED THE STATE ORGANIZATION IN ALL OF THE OFFICES, INCLUDING DISTRICT GOVERNOR . . . I REALIZED THAT MUCH THAT WE HAVE BEEN DOING IN BLIND WORK AND THE CON-SERVATION OF SIGET HAS BEEN SOMETHING LIKE LOCKING THE BARN DOOR AFTER THE HORSE WAS STOLEN. I WANT YOU TO KNOW THAT I WILL DO EVERYTHING I CAN TO PROMOTE THE WORK

OF THE NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR EYE RESEARCH, WHICH YOU REPRESENT, AT EVERY OPPORTUNITY. WHAT I CAN'T DO IN MONEY, I WILL DO IN TIME AND EFFORT. IT IS WITH A GENUINE PLEASURE THAT I ENCLOSE THE CHECK FOR \$100.00 FROM THE , NEW PHILADELPHIA LIONS CLUB AS PLEDGED. YOU WILL BE PLEASED TO KNOW THAT BY UNAMIMOUS DECISION OF THE MEMBERS OF OUR CLUB, IT IS TO BE AN ANNUAL CONTRIBUTION FROM OUT OF OUR BLIND FUND. I SHALL WORK TOWARD THE END THAT OUR STATE ORGANIZATION ADOPT YOUR PROGRAM BY GIVING FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO SO WORTHY A CAUSE."

AFTER TEN YEARS, I SAY THANK YOU, LION FLEMMING, AND THE LIONS CLUB OF NEW PHILADELPHIA, OHIO, FOR YOUR ENCOURAGEMENT AND COOPERATION FROM THE VERY BEGINNING AND THROUGHOUT THE TEN YEARS.

WHAT WAS DONE WITH SOME OF THE MONEYS THAT THE LIONS CLUBS PROVIDED?

AN OUTSTANDING EXAMPLE IS THE SUPPORT YOU GAVE TO HELP WIPE OUT A NEW AND TERRIBLE SCOURGE OF BACNDNESS KNOWN AS RLF THAT AFFLICTED AND BLINDED THOUSANDS OF PREMATURELY BORN BABIES. A WAY HAD TO BE FOUND TO PREVENT THIS NEW AND GROWING CAUSE OF BLINDNESS. SOME OF THE MCNEYS THAT YOU PROVIDED WERE SPENT TO FIND THE ANSWER, THROUGH RESEARCH, TO RLF. YOU WILL FEMEMBER WHAT DR. V. EVERETT KINSEY TOLD US IN 1949 ABOUT THE NEED FOR SUPPORT OF EYE RESEARCH TO PREVENT BLINDNESS. THIS GREAT BIOCHEMIST LED GROUPS IN EIGHTEEN DIFFERENT CITIES TO FIND THE ANSWER TO WHAT ELINDED PREMATURE BABIES. HE IS HONORED ALL OVER FOR HIS GREAT CONTRIBUTION THUS MADE --- AND THE OHIO LIONS PROVIDED SOME OF THE REQUIRED FUNDS.

IN SOLVING RLF, BLINDNESS CAUSED BY AN OVERDOSE OF OXYGEN IN PREMATURE INFANTS, WE HAVE AN OUTSTANDING EX-

SUCCEEDS. THIS IS PROOF POSITIVE THAT THE SCOURGE OF BLINDNESS AND ITS ELIMINATION LIES IN RESEARCH.

DR. HOWARD A. RUSK RECENTLY SAID: "OPPORTUNITIES NOW EXIST THROUGH RESEARCH TO REDUCE SUBSTANTIALLY THE INCIDENCE OF MANKIND'S MOST FEARED DISABILITY --- BLINDNESS IT WOULD BE AN INJUSTICE SOCIALLY, ECONOMICALLY, AND MORALLY NOT TO TAKE FULL ADVANTAGE OF THESE OPPOR-TUNITIES."

THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF NEUROLOGICAL DISEASES AND BLINDNESS, THROUGH ITS DIRECTOR, DR. RICHARD L. MASLAND, SAID: "IT HAS BEEN STATED THAT THE COST OF THE CARE FOR THE THOUSANDS OF CHILDREN ALREADY BLINDED WILL BE ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND TIMES THE COST OF THE MEDICAL RESEARCH WHICH LED TO THE SUCCESSFUL PREVENTION OF THIS DISEASE THROUGH RESEARCH."

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, THE GOVERNMENTS OF THE STATES, AND PRIVATE PHILANTHROPIES SPEND MORE THAN ONE-HALF BILLION DOLLARS A YEAR TO TAKE CARE OF THE BLIND AGAINST, PRESENTLY, SIX MILLION DOLLARS BEING SPENT FOR RESEARCH TO PREVENT BLINDNESS.

IT HEALLY GETS DOWN TO A VERY SIMPLE QUESTION: WHAT PRICE HUMAN LIFE? WHAT PRICE DO WE PUT UPON THE DISCOVERY OF A RESEARCH BREAKTHROUGH WHICH PREVENTS BLINDNESS IN A CHILD?

DR. MASLAND RECENTLY SAID: "THE YEAR OF 1961 MARKED THE TENTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR NEUROLOGICAL DISEASES AND BLINDNESS. THE RECORD OF ADVANCEMENT WAS A MCST IM-PRESSIVE ONE. HEADING THE LIST WAS THE CONQUEST OF RLF. THIS RESULTED IN THE SAVING OF SIGHT OF MANY HUNDREDS, PERHAPS THOUSANDS, OF CHILDREN. THIS DISCOVERY HAS SAVED THE NATION ABOUT ONE-HALF BILLION DOLLARS ASIDE FROM THE SAVING OF SIGHT WHICH WAS INVOLVED. IF EVER THERE WAS AN EXAMPLE OF 'DOES RESEARCH PAY?' --- IT WAS FOUND IN THE HISTORY OF THE ELIMINATION OF RLF WHICH BLINDED THOUSANDS OF BABIES."

NO LION SHOULD EVER FORGET THAT THE OHIO LIONS MADE A CONTRIBUTION TO THIS GREAT ADVANCE IN OUE CAUSE. A LITTLE MORE THAN TEN YEARS AGO THE TOTAL CON-TRIBUTION FROM ALL SOURCES FCR RESEARCH TO FIND THE CAUSES AND THE PREVENTION OF BLINDNESS APPROXIMATED FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS. IN 1961 ABOUT SIX MILLION DOLLARS FOR EYE RESEARCH WERE CONTRIBUTED FROM ALL SOURCES. THAT'S A SPLENDID INCREASE AND GIVES MEANING TO OUR SUBJECT, "TEN YEARS."

WHY GO ON WITH FURTHER EXAMPLES OF THE GOOD THAT HAS BEEN DONE BY THE OHIO LIONS IN THE CONTINUEC SUPPORT OF THE PROGRAM YOU CREATED TEN YEARS AGO WHEN I CAME TO YOU FOR HELP? EVERETT STEECE DID NOT TURN ME DOWN. THE LIONS DID NOT TURN ME DOWN. YOU HAVE BUILT A GREAT MONUMENT TO EYE RESEARCH, WHICH IS CARRIED ON IN PART WITH THE FUNDS YOU HAVE GIVEN --- AND I TRUST WILL CONTINUE TO GIVE --- TO THE THREE GREAT MEDICAL SCHOOLS AT CINCINNATI, CLEVELAND, AND COLUMBUS OHIO.

IN JUNE OF 1949 THE INSTITUTE FOR VISION AT OHIO STATE WAS A PAPER ORGANIZATION. IT IS NOW A GROWING FACILITY. THE FINANCIAL SUPPORT YOU FURNISHED TO THIS

INSTITUTE PLAYED ITS PART IN THE OVER-ALL RESEARCH PRO-GRAM.

I AM GLAD TO TELL YOU THAT RECENTLY A FORMER OPHTHALMOLOGIST, DR. JULES STEIN, HEAD OF THE MUSIC COR-PORATION OF AMERICA, CREATED EYE RESEARCH INCORPORATED. HE AND HIS ASSOCIATES HAVE ALREADY CONTRIBUTED MORE THAN A MILLION DOLLARS AND HAVE PLEDGED ANOTHER THREE MILLION DOLLARS TO CARRY ON EYE RESEARCH THROUGHOUT THIS COUNTRY. THIS, TOO, IS PART OF THE HISTORY OF "TEN YEARS."

IT IS ONLY PROPER THAT CREDIT FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF RESEARCH TO PREVENT BLINDNESS BE GIVEN TO MY LONG-TIME ASSOCIATES, DR. V. EVERETT KINSEY OF DETROIT AND AL HIRSHBERG OF BOSTON, WHO HELPED CREATE THE NATIONAL FOUNDATION FOR EYE RESEARCH. PRAISE IS ALSO DUE TO MY GOOD FRIENDS, SILAS ADELSHEIM OF PITTSBURGH AND MILDRED WEISENFELD OF NEW YORK, BOTH BLIND, WHO FOUNDED THE NATIONAL COUNCIL TO COMBAT BLINDNESS AND THE FIGHT FOR SIGHT PROGRAM. THIS GROUP HAVE THUS FAR CONTRIBUTED MORE THAN A MILLION DOLLARS TO ADVANCE THIS GREAT CAUSE ALL OVER THE WORLD.

EVEN THOUGH I HAVE "TEN YEARS," I CANNOT TAKE THE TIME TO EVEN BEGIN SPELLING GUT THE NAMES OF THE RE-SEARCHERS WHO HAVE BEEN SUPPORTED IN THEIR WORK BY THE FUNDS PROVIDED BY THE LIONS AND BY A FEW GROUPS, INCLUDING THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND OUR OWN STATE OF OHIO. TO THE MEN AND WOMEN WHO HAVE BEEN ENGAGED IN RESEARCH, OF COURSE. GO GREAT THANKS FOR THEIR HARD WORK, DEDICATED SERVICE, AND WONDERFUL ACCOMPLISHMENTS. MORE POWER TO THEM.

THE OHIO LIONS DESERVE GREAT PRAISE AND THANKS FOR WHAT THEY HAVE DONE IN THIS DIRECTION IN THESE PAST TEN YEARS. WHEN YOU WALK DOWN THE STREET AS YOU LEAVE THIS CONVENTION TO GO TO YOUR RESPECTIVE HOMES, EACH ONE OF YOU WILL LOOK AROUND AND YOU CAN TRUTHFULLY SAY TO YOURSELF: "THERE GOES A CHILD -- OR A MAN -- OR A WOMAN WHO MIGHT BE BLIND BUT FOR ME, A LION, AND ALL THE LIONS OF OHIO, WHO WERE PRIVILEGED IN THESE TEN YEARS TO HELP RAISE THE FUNDS NECESSARY TO ADVANCE THIS GREAT CAUSE." THE INNER SATISFACTION, DEEP DOWN IN HIS SOUL, IS THE RE-WARD THAT COMES TO EVERY LION FOR THE PART THAT HE TOOK IN THIS PROGRAM. FOR THIS GREAT CONTRIBUTION ON THE PART OF EACH ONE OF YOU, I SALUTE YOU. I THANK YOU. THIS, TOO, IS PART OF MY STORY --- "TEN YEARS."

AS YOU LEAVE THIS CONVENTION, I EARNESTLY TRUST THAT YOU WILL RESOLVE, AS YOU DID TEN YEARS AGO WHEN YOU STARTED ON THIS PATH, TO CONTINUE THE SAME ROAD AND TO DO ALL THAT YOU CAN TO HELP ADVANCE RESEARCH SO THAT THERE WILL BE LESS BLIND PEOPLE ON THIS EARTH. IT IS OUR HOPE THAT YOU WILL, AS IN THE PAST, CONTINUE TO CONTRIBUTE IN EVEN GREATER MEASURE TO THE ADVANCEMENT AND EXPANSION OF SUCH AN OUTSTANDING, LONG-NEGLECTED, AND DESERVING CAUSE.

CONSIDER THE WONDERFUL ROAD THAT YOU HAVE TRAVELED IN THIS TEN YEAR JOURNEY. NEVER, NEVER IN THE YEARS AHEAD GIVE UP THE RESOLUTION THAT YOU, THE LIONS CLUBS OF OHIO, MADE TEN YEARS AGO TO SUPPORT THIS CAUSE. KEEP ON MARCHING. KEEP ON WORKING IN THIS OUTSTANDING

AND REWARDING EFFORT. BE PROUD OF CALLING YOURSELF A LION AND OF LIONISM. FOR HERE IS A BADGE OF GREAT HONOR, AND MAY ALL OF THE LIONS HOLD THE LIGHTED TORCH OF PROGRESS HIGH, AS EACH DAY YOU LOOK AROUND AND SEE YOUR FELLOW MAN AND CAN TRUTHFULLY FEEL: "IF I HAD NOT HELPED A BIT, MY NEIGHBOR, MY FELLOW MAN, PERHAPS ONE OF MY VERY OWN WOULD NOW BE BLIND.

TEN YEARS IS A LONG TIME, AND, AS WE GO CVER IT, A SHORT TIME.

WOULD I BURDEN YOU TOO MUCH IF I TALKED ABOUT THE NEXT TEN YEARS? THE TASK OF THE OHIO LIONS HAS JUST STARTED. THERE IS MUCH TO BE DONE IN THE NEXT TEN YEARS. AT THE END OF THE SECOND TEN YEARS, YOU CAN REVIEW THE SITUATION AS IT THEN EXISTS. HAVING REVIEWED THE BATTLE-FRONT, AS IT WEFE, YOU CAN DECIDE WHERE YOU ARE AND WHERE YOU ARE GOING. THE FACT REMAINS THAT UNTIL THE UNKNOWN TO SCIENCE, THE CAUSES OF MORE THAN FIFTY PER CENT OF THE BLINDING LISEASES STILL UNKNOWN, HAVE BEEN SOLVED THROUGH RESEARCH, YOUR TASK WILL NOT HAVE BEEN COMPLETED. IF

THESE CAUSES ARE EVER TO BE SOLVED, AND THEY MUST BE TO ELIMINATE BLINDNESS, RESEARCH MUST FIND THE ANSWERS TO MANY QUESTIONS, INCLUDING: WHY GLAUCOMA? WHY CATARACT? WHY DIABETES? WHY UVEITIS? WHY CANCER OF THE EYE? AND MANY OTHER LIKE QUESTIONS HAVING REFERENCE TO THE DISEASES THAT BLIND OUR PEOPLE.

DR. MORE AND MORE DIABETES IS AFFECTING YOUNG PEOPLE, WITH AN ESTIMATED MORE THAN SEVENTY THOUSAND JUVENILE DIABETICS IN THIS COUNTRY. IF THE DIABETIC LIVES LONG ENOUGH, HE MAY GO BLIND; AND IF HE MARRIES, HE MAY PASS ON TO HIS OFFSPRING THE TENDENCY TO THE SAME DISEASE LEADING TO MORE BLINDNESS.

AND SCIENCE DOES NOT YET KNOW THE SOURCE OF GLAUCOMA,

WHICH ACCOUNTS FOR THIRTEEN PERCENT OF ALL BLINDNESS.

I BEING THESE FACTS TO YOU SO THAT YOU MAY KNOW OF THE GREAT NEED THAT STILL EXISTS FOR YOUR FURTHER CONTRIBUTIONS TO HELP ADVANCE EYE RESEARCH. BY CON-TINUING TO SUPPORT THIS CAUSE, YOU WILL RENEW THE PLEDGE THAT YOU MADE TEN YEARS AGO AND THUS TRULY AND CLEARLY INDICATE YOUR SINCERE CONCERN TO HELP YOUR FELLOW MAN BY HELPING TO ELIMINATE THE TRAGIC CONSEQUENCES OF THE BLINDING EYE DISEASES.

I AM NEARING THE END OF "TEN YEARS." PERHAPS SOME OF YOU WILL BE BOTH GLAD AND SORRY. THIS REMINDS ME OF A FABLE THAT GOES SOMETHING LIKE THIS: ON A NIGHT IN ANCIENT TIMES THREE KNIGHTS WERE CROSSING A DRIED-UP RIVER BED WHEN A VOICE IN THE DARKNESS CALLED OUT, "HALT!" WHICH THEY DID. THE VOICE THEN INSTRUCTED THE THREE KNIGHTS TC DISMOUNT AND PICK UP A HANDFUL OF PEBBLES AND PLACE THE PEBBLES IN THEIR POCKETS. THE VOICE THEN SAID, "YOU HAVE FOLLOWED MY DIRECTIONS. TOMORROW WHEN THE SUN IS BRIGHT OVERHEAD, YOU WILL ALL BE BOTH GLAD AND

SORRY." THE NEXT DAY IN THE BRIGHT SUNLIGHT, THE THREE KNIGHTS REACHED IN THEIR POCKETS AND FOUND THAT A MIRACLE HAD BEEN PERFORMED. THE PEBBLES HAD ALL BEEN TURNED INTO DIAMONDS AND OTHER PRECIOUS STONES. THE TEREE KNIGHTS WERE BOTH GLAD AND SORRY — GLAD THEY TOOK WHAT THEY DID — SORRY THEY DID NOT TAKE MORE.
