WHAT IS THE TRUE MEASURE OF AN AMERICAN?" RABBI ABBA HILLEL SILVER. THE TEMPLE, SUNDAY MORNING, APRIL 29, 1928, CLEVELAND, Q.



Recently patrioteering has entered upon a new phase, -- that of blacklisting political heretics. This is a milder form of persecution than that which was adopted by the now discredited and shamefully exposed order of the klan. The art of tarring and feathering those whose political views are regarded as unorthodox, and of horsewhipping them, has yielded to the more urbane and genteel art of blacklisting.

The procedure involved in blacklisting is as follows: certain self-appointed monitors of Americanism, self-elected guardians of patriotism, determine beforehand what is good for America and what is not. These opinions of these groups, touching any and every policy of government -- it may be our international relations; it may be our national defense; it may be our immigration policy, or what not, -- these opinions of these groups become, because of the particular custodial relationship of these groups towards Americanism, the only sanctioned and authoritative American opinion. All other judgments and all other views become automatically un-American and unpatriotic; and those who entertain these contrary and opposing views are then hunted out and branded, excommunicated, as it were, and the story of their political crime is then sent to all affiliated bodies, or all those bodies which they are desirous of influencing, with the warning and the admonition that these people are to be avoided. They are

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dangerous; they are not to be listened to; their books are not to be read; their meetings are not to be attended. Certainly they are not to be invited to meetings of these respective organizations, for their opinions are poison to the innocent minds of American citizens.

Now these satraps of patriotism are seemingly not very proud of their handiwork, of their activities, for, like unto that hooded order, they, too, carry on their activities in secret; surreptitiously, if not courageously. They stab in the dark until they are dragged into the light and exposed.

Two agencies have been particularly active in recent years in this patriotic ritual of censorship and inquisition and expurgation, all in the name of unadulterated Americanism. One is the Reserve Officers Training Corps, and the other is the organization of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The Reserve Officers Training Corps, working through its national fraternity, called "Scabbard and Blade," a very symbolic and a very significant name, remniscent of the rattling sabre of the Hohenzollerns,--the Officers Training Corps drafted a list of these undepirable men and women in American public life, whose voices should forever be silenced, who are a menace to our free institutions, and broadcasted that list.

Among those included in this list of honor (or dishonor) are Senator William E. Borah, chairman of our Foreign Relations Committee. His particular crime

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which brought down upon him this anathema, are, first, that he favored recognition of Soviet Russia; that he advocated the release of political prisoners; that he addressed meetings of the American Civil Liberties Union, an organization devoted to the safeguarding of free speech in the United States. In this list is included the name of Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, and her crime was that she was very aggressive in the advocacy of woman's suffrage. The name of Jane Addams of course appears in this list; and the "Scabbard and Blade" calls Jane Addams "the most dangerous woman in America." Jane Addams, the most resplendent type of American womanhood, the glory of American womanhood, a path finder in social welfare, a benefactor of humanity, a name that will glow in the annals of America long after the very memory of this "Scabbard and Blade" will have been forgotten.

Another one included is Dr. Henry Stone Coffin, president of the Union Theological Seminary. His sin was that he was one of the group of clergymen who signed a protest against the Espionage Act. John Dewey, to be sure, is also included, because he taught in the new school of social research; because he signed a protest against the infamous Lusk law; because he is an advanced liberal,--John Dewey, the greatest living American philosopher, a pioneer in the realm of education, a world leader of men,-he, too, has been singled out for distinction in this blacklist. W. E. Dubois, editor of "The Crisis," is also

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dammed. His sin is that he toured the country to build up a friendly sentiment towards the Negro. Professor Francis B. Sayre, son-in-law of President Wilson, now on the faculty of Harvard Law School, is also included because he wrote a number of pro-labor articles. And of course Oswald Garrison Villard, editor of The Nation. He is blacklisted, with two double black lines under his name, because he is the editor of that most radical publication, "The Nation," one of the few truly fearless and informative magazines in the United States.

And the "Scabbard and Blade" paid me the high compliment of including my name in this list of heretics, and my particular crime seems to have been that I heartily indorsed the World Court, and that I, from time to time, was guilty of defending the cause of organized labor.

The other organization busily engaged in drafting blacklists, the Daughters of the American Revolution, that organization made up a list which includes some of these names and others, and not only the names of individuals but the names of organizations, -- the Young Women's Christian Association is included; the International League for Peace and Freedom; the Council of Jewish Women. In fact, every individual of prominence and every organization of effectiveness which may not enthusiastically endorse the naval program of the Mavy Department is proscribed. Some valiant souls, some members of the Daughters of the

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American Revolution, in whom the spirit of the American Revolution is still alive, fought valiantly at the last conclave of this organization in Washington to urge this organization to disavow these blacklists, but without success. They were overwhelmed, completely beaten; in fact, they were hissed, and they were made to feel that they were outsiders and enemies and bolsheviks.

Now, to be sure, the Reserve Officers Training Corps is a military organization, and very little of liberalism and of the American spirit can be looked for there. They are our American fascists, our irrepressible yunkers. Every nation has them, and naturally they are impatient with those who advocate peace. They have vested interests in war, and advocates of peace and disarmament are their natural enemies. What is a little surprising, and more than a little disheartening, is to find an organization like the Daughters of the American Revolution, bearing such an honorable name, and presumably having an honorable history, to permit itself to become the ladies' auxiliary of the American fascists; to become a tool in the hands of fire eaters in the Navy Department. In so doing they have aligned themselves with the forces of reaction in this land which are hindering the progress not alone of America but of mankind, forces which mankind will have to curb if it is to advance at all.

Again, by its action this organization, the Daughters of the American Revolution, went on record as

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favoring a patriotism which is built on the gibbet, a patriotism which is built on the pillory, a patriotism built on suppression and prohibition and on a refined drawing-room terrorism; not a patriotism built on education and on the free exchange of ideas. To have to resort to an <u>index expurgatorius</u> is a terrible confession of weakness and a lack of confidence in one's own position.

Truth: Truth never required the faggot and the stake and witch hunting to prove it or to spread it. All that truth requires is a chance to be heard, and the ultimate victory belongs to it. If this organization is convinced that its program is a sound one; that competitive naval armament and a three-quarters of a billion of dollars naval program are the surest ways to peace and security, then by all means let them present their thesis to the public; let it be discussed; let the pros and the cons be heard, and let them have sufficient confidence in the scundness of their position to permit the contrary views, not merely to permit but to welcome the contrary views to be heard. An idea which must depend upon a blacklist is a lie.

The action of these organizations is really not of great moment. Neither the organizations nor these particular acts are at all consequential, and the American people has, because of its native common sense and sound judgment and good humor, laughed them out of court. But the actions are, nevertheless, indicative of the means and

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the agencies which are being employed in this land to thwart, to check the work of peace and to discredit those who are devoting themselves to the cause of peace and to other liberalizing, emancipating ideals of the human race.

And this action is indicative of yet another thing of which I should like to speak, -- of the attitude of mind on the part of certain persons to regard patriotism and Americanism as a sort of a private monopoly. Their views, their judgments, their opinions, become ipso facto American and patriotic, and all contrary views become anathema, un-American, unpatriotic. These persons who arrogate to themselves this exclusive use of the term "patriotic" belong, as a rule, to the older and the wealthier and the class conscious groups in the United States. They are a minority; they have vested interests; they are conservative. Many of them are reactionary. Some of them claim blood kinship with the Fathers of the American Revolution; and yet very little of the spirit of these revolutionists of America has survived in these, their descendents.

I venture to say that the Fathers of the Revolution, if they appeared today on the scene, would be the first to be persecuted by these, the sons and daughters of the American Revolution. For all the staid, conservative elements in '76, or nearly all, were Tories. They sided with King George; they hated the American Revolution; they jeered and denounced the revolutionists; they called

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them the soum of the earth, sedition mongers, anarchists. Fifty thousand of these staid, conservative, influential Americans of '76 actually fought in the British ranks. It was the rebel and the liberal and the non-conformist who founded America; the radical, if you will; the disloyalist, if you will. And their descendants today, still boasting of the heritage, are attempting to destroy the very spirit which actuated their revolutionary ancestors.

The War gave the professional patrioteer in the United States his great opportunity, and he strutted across the face of this land, pompous, self-important, armed with usurped authority, to pursue and to destroy anyone whose patriotism did not conform to the canons of patriotism adopted by this professional patrioteer. Anyone, for example, who dared even to question the idealistic motives, the ineffable altruistic aims of the Allies in the War, was at once branded as disloyal and un-American. Anyone who dared to sympathize with the struggling masses of Russia and with their new experiment in self-government, was at once cursed as an anarchist and a disrupter and an enemy of America. Palmerism was abroad in the land. Every citizen spied upon every other citizen. Men and women were imprisched and detained and deported; and an urge of witchhunting in the name of patriotism.

And patriotism was that which some military official or some member of the State Department declared it to be. It was an ugly and an unpleasant era in American

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life, due, of course, to the hysteria of the War; but it was, nevertheless, ugly and discreditable, and these organizations who are today attempting to single out men to damn them, to muzzle them, because of their particular views which happen to differ from their orthodox views, are continuing this ugly, discreditable, miserable war psychosis among us.

What is patriotism? Patriotism is not a mysterious, esoteric science whose recondite meaning is revealed only to the elite and to the initiated. What is patriotism? Why, patriotism is nothing more or nothing less than what the simple phrase "Love of one's country" signifies. A man who is devoted to his country; who seeks its welfare; who works for its prosperity, is a patriot. He need not at all endorse every policy of government; he need not at all subscribe to the infallible wisdom of the State Department or the War Department, or even of the President of the United States. He may believe that his country is totally and completely in the wrong in a given instance and still be a patriot. He may be a conservative; he may be a liberal; he may be a radical; he may be a capitalist; he may be a socialist; he may be, if Lincoln is to be believed, even a revolutionist and still be a patriot.

And a man or woman may be a member of the Reserve Officers Training Corps and the Daughters of the American Revolution and still not be a patriot. For the test of patriotism is not whether one subscribes to one

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policy or another, but whether, in so doing, that individual is prompted by love of country or by selfish motives; whether that individual is seeking the augmentation of his land and the welfare of his people, or whether he is seeking personal aggrandizement. I venture to say that there is more patriotism in the so-called radicals of America, or of any country for that matter, than among the international bankers and profiteers.

Who is an American? What is the measure of a true American? An American is not necessarily a conformist: an American is not necessarily one who moves with the alignment of a piston in a machine, -- this vast machine of commercialism which we have built up and which makes such ruthless exaction of all of us, of discipline and conformity and acquiescence and single-mindedness. Not at all. An American may be an extreme individualist, a non-conformist, an intellectual rebel, if you will, and still be a true, perhaps a truer, American. An American is one who lives in America, native or naturalized, and who loves America and who works for its prosperity; whose life and thought and conduct are inspired by those motifs which inspired that immortal document, the Declaration of Independence; who believes profoundly and manifests his faith in action that all men are created equal; that men do possess inalienable rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that government is established for the people and not the people for government; that man is superior to the state; that man

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has a right to experiment with new ideas and new forms of human organization and new modes of conduct and thought.

The man who believes in these principles of American democracy, and practices them, that man is an American. The reactionary, the racialist, the exponent of racial superiorities, the exploiter of his fellowmen, the Know-nothing, the man who would like to stratify American society into classes and castes, the snob,--that man is not an American, quite regardless of how far he can trace back his native ancestry, or how furiously he waves the Stars and Stripes.

We must free ourselves from the war psychology, when we were dragooned into thinking alike and acting alike and speaking alike. We must regain each his freedom, his intellectual freedom, his spiritual autonomy. We must insist that the first qualifications of a free government is the readiness and the willingness with which it permits its citizens to live their own lives and to express themselves freely and fully. Democracy is too firmly rooted in the logic of human life, it is too strongly intrenched in the rationality of existence, to need censorships and inquisitions and witch-hunting and Palmerism to support it. Dictatorships require those agencies because dictatorships are inherently fallacious. At the core of every dictatorship is a cancer who destroys it ultimately.

Democracy is sound, firm, intellectually strong, and all that it needs, as truth needs, is a chance

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to be heard and express itself through avenues of free and unchecked public opinion, channels of intercommunication among men; free forums, free pulpits, free press, free schools, the right of assembly, and democracy is safe and secure. It need not intrench itself behind the bulwarks of such miserable blacklists in order to protect itself.

I want to read a phrase or two from the greatest American, Abraham Lincoln. I suspect that Abraham Lincoln, too, would have been put on the blacklist; for if you read Abraham Lincoln--and very few people, unfortunately, read him--you will find in him the real essence of that radical, revolutionary America which paved the new highway for humanity; which destroyed old traditions and respectable, antiquated notions, and launched into the world bristling ideas, dynamic ideas, which made people uncomfortable but which proved a cleansing and a healing for mankind.

Abraham Lincoln understood America. He knew that America is more than a territory, and more than a history, and more than an aggregate of millions of people. He knew that America was an ideal, or a set of ideals. It was a new mode of living and thinking, a new aspiration. It was something which the suppressed and the submerged masses of the world through the ages wanted to be and could not. It was a passionate hope of the masses of the earth to whom America was summarized in that immortal document, the Declaration of Independence.

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I want to read this phrase or two. This is part of an address which he delivered in 1858 to a group of newly naturalized American citizens.

"We are now a mighty nation," said Lincoln. "We are about 30 millions of people." Today he would have said, "We are about 110 millions of people." "And we own and inhabit about one-fifteenth part of the dry land of the whole earth. We run our memory back over the pages of history for about 82 years (today he would have said 152 years), and we discover that we were then a very small people in point of numbers, vastly inferior to what we are now and a vastly less extent of country, with vastly less of everything desirable among men. We look upon the change as exceedingly advantageous to us and to our posterity, and we fix upon something that happened away back as in some way or other being connected with the rise of prosperity. We find a race of men living in that day whom we claim as our fathers and grandfathers. They were iron men; they fought for the principles that they were contending for, and we understood that by what they then did it has followed that the degree of prosperity which we now enjoy has come to us. We hold this annual celebration (the Fourth of July) to remind ourselves of all the good done in this process of time, of how it was done and who did it, and how we are historically connected with it. And we go from these meetings in better humor with ourselves, we feel more attached the one to the other, and more firmly bound to the country than anybody.

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"In every way we are better men in the age, the race and country in which we live for these celebrations. But after we have done all this we are not yet reached the whole. There is something else connected with it. We have besides these, men descended by blood from our ancestors. We have among us perhaps half of our people who are not descendents of all of these men. They are men who have come from Europe--German, Irish, French, Scandanavian, (today he would have added Italian, Pole and Hungarian) -men that have come from Europe themselves, or whose ancestors have come hither and settled here, finding themselves our equals in all things. If they look back through this history to trace their connection with those days by blood, they find they have none; they cannot carry themselves back unto that glorious epoch and make themselves feel that they are part of us; but when they look through that old Declaration of Independence, they find that those old men said 'that we hold these truths to be self-evident that all men are created equal,' and then they feel that that moral sentiment taught in that day evidences their relation to those men; that it is the father of all moral principle in them, and that they have a right to claim it as though they were blood of the blood and flesh of the flesh of the men who wrote that Declaration. And so they are. That is the electric cord in that Declaration that links the hearts of patriotic and liberty loving men together, that will link those patriotic hearts as long as the love of freedom exists

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in the minds of men throughout the world."

The electric cord which links all Americans together is a moral principle, a devotion to the ideals enunciated in that superb and magnificent document; the supreme manifestation of the freedom-loving soul of man; equality of all men; the inalienable rights of all men, rights which neither the state nor the majority can deprive them of; rights which are theirs by virtue of being men, children of God; rights which have come to them from God himself, and not given nor to be taken back by society.

That is America; that is patriotism. All else is pseudo-patriotism, misleading, harmful, destructive. The true patriot is the man who will today, in wholeheartedness and single mindedness, sign the Declaration of Independence.



An American is anyone who lives in America, native or naturalized, who loves this land, loves its free institutions, labors to uphold and to perfect them and carries into his life and conduct the heroic motifs of American democracy; - that all men are created equal; that they possess inalienable rights; that government is created for the people not the people for government; that man is superior to the State and that he is free to experiment with new ideas, new forms of human organization, new motifs of thought and conduct.

Reactionaries, racialists, know-nothings, defenders of caste are not according to the genius of this land, Americans, quite regardless of how far they can trace back their native ancestry or how furiously they waive the Stars and Stripes.

Broadcasting

For the next three weeks the Sunday services of the Temple will be broadcast over WTAM. This Sunday morning Rabbi Silver will discuss "Patriotism and Blacklists" and will dwell upon the recent action of the D. A. R., The Officers' Reserve Corps and other "Patriotic" organizations blacklisting those leaders of thought in America whose opinions they disapproved of.

Addresses of the Rabbis

On Wednesday last Rabbi Silver addressed The Canadian Conference of Social Workers at Montreal. During the next two weeks he is scheduled to address a meeting under the auspices of The American Peace Society; The Women's Council for Promotion of Peace; The Cleveland School of Education; The National Congress of Parents and Teachers; The Students and Faculty of Applied Social Sciences of Western Reserve University. On May 14th he will open The Community Chest Campaign of the City of Rochester, New York.

Last week Rabbi Feuer addressed a Campaign Meeting of the Bureau of Jewish Education.
