TAKING STOCK OF 1940

On Sunday, January 5, 1941 When you come to take stock of the past year and read over the record of the past twelve months, you are amazed how much actually transpired during that relatively short period of time. You hardly realize how little time has elapsed covering so many important events. We talked about these events so much. We felt about them so deeply. We somehow come to feel that these events must have happened a long time ago.

Actually ten months ago, Finland was still fighting Soviet Russia.

Eight months ago, Belgium and Holland were still free and independent countries who believed themselves secure within their neutrality. Seven short months ago, France still stood undefeated behind her inpregnable Maginot Line. Italy's invasion of Egypt occurred only four months ago, and her invasion of Greece only two months ago.

Great human emotions which are aroused by great events have a way of making these events recede in time, and seem more remote than they are. When you come to think of it, our world began its dizzy spin in chaos with the Nazi conquest of Austria less than three years ago, and all the shattering events which have shaken our world to its foundations have occurred within the brief period of a few months. That is why men and women today live much more -- mpt in point of duration but in point of intensity and experience. This generation is living a five-fold life compared to some of the generations of the past.

It is, of course, impossible to strike a balance of the year 1940.

All you can do today is to issue, as it were, a day by day communice. For the world is still at war, and no balance can be struck on a war until the last battle is over. The individual episodes during a war which may loom up at the moment have tremendous importance, which at the moment may seem terrifically important, may, when the war is over, become of little historic significance. For it is the last battle which determines the significance and proporation of everything which preceded.

Thus, for example, if the Allies win this war, the defeat of France, the invasion of the Lowlands, the conquest of some of the Scandinavian countries may prove of little or no significance at all -- just incidents in a war. On the other hand, if the Allies lose, these self-same events may have tremendous historical importance. And so it is impossible to draw a balance sheet for the past year.

The year 1940 began in an ominous pause. All was quiet on the Western Front. The Allies stood behind their Maginot line. The Nazis stood behind their Siegfried line. Nothing seemed to happen. Many came to believe that this was a make-believe -- a phoney war. Some of the great statemen in Washington believe that this is a phoney war. There was no fighting. The Allies had not come to the aid of Poland a few months before the 1940 began. The Allies contented themselves with flying over Berlin and dropping leaflets while Poland was destroyed. It appeared as if the fighting will of France had become paralyzed. They were perhaps looking for an easy victory. Perhaps they hoped to win the war with methods short of war. England relied upon the breaking power of the Blockade, perhaps upon the propaganda influence of the leaflets dropped from the sky. France decided to wait it out behind the fortifications. Seemingly neither the political nor the military leaders of these two countries understood the character of the foe facing them and of the fixed purpose of that foe. And so, for eight long months, from September 1929 to April 1940, the war was at a standstill.

And then swiftly and suddenly, in April, came the invasion of Denmark and Norway, and as swiftly and suddenly in May, the invasion of Belgium and the Netherlands. Blood began toflow in earnest. The war then came to the West - that war which had been in the making for years - that war which had been coming out of China, Ethiopia, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland - the war which they had hoped would always strike elsewhere, on battlefields far removed from their beait if ul cities - that war finally settled with all its fury and devastation upon their own countries.

It was a swift and crushing Blitzkrieg. It was amazingly short, amazingly crushing. Holland was conquered in four days. Belgium capitulated after two weeks. The battle of France lasted seventeen days. And it was all over! The English were driven into the sea off the continent. The Nazis now controlled the whole coast of Europe from the Arctic Ocean to the Bay of Biscay. England was about to be invaded.

By the middle of 1940, Nazi-Fascist power reached its peak and the fortune of the Allies touched bottom. The end of 1940, however, finds the prospects of the Axis powers not nearly as brilliant as they were six months before, and the fortunes of the Allies, although still very very grave but not nearly so desperate and seemingly so hopeless.

In the last six months certain events occurred which indicate that the triumph of the axis in the future will not be an easy one, nor a swift one. First of all the evacuation of Dunkirk - an amazing tale of a defeated army in retreat - that was the first event. Though it was a defeat, nevertheless it revealed certain amazing resourcefulness, certain amazing recuperative power on the part of England which gave much promise to the future. And then the failure of Hitler to invade England, an invasion which was scheduled and announced for September 1st, of last year. That was Hitler's first military defeat. Then in the last two weeks, the two disastrous Italian defeats. These represented the first two important Allied victories. So that the picture of the close of 1940 is not nearly as black as it was a few months ago.

England started the last half of 1940 almost beaten to her knees. Its army was in rout. Her entire military equipment was abandoned in Flanders in her headlong flight back home, and except for her Navy and for her far outnumbered but glorously spirited air force, England seemed to be defenseless. And during these last six months, England has been subjected to the the most savage kind of bombardment from the air. The Nazis boasted that they dropped ninety million

pounds of explosives over Great Britain. Many of her fair cities have been shattered, reduced to rubble. During those last six months, a frightful toll has been taken of her ships on the high seas - shipload after ship-load of precious cargo send to the bottom of the sea by Nazi warships, submarines and airplanes. And yet, at the close of 1940, England emerges and enters the new year with a Navy still undefeated and still in control of the high seas, growing in strength, and steadily catching up to the amazing air power of Germany, inflicting terrific damage on her foe daily. Her army has been re-organized, strengthened and is standing on the alert in England and is on a victorious offensive in the Near East. The morale of her people, in spite of this terrific punishment, is superbly unshaken.

What has contributed to the miracle of the recuperation of England is not only her own indomitable will, her amazing spiritual resourcefulness, but also the very important material and spiritual support which England has received from the United States. And this has been, in my judgment, perhaps the most significant event in 1940 - the awakening of America to a full realization of what was going on in the world, the awakening of America to the full implications of the struggle, the struggle either for freedom or for the enslavement of the world, the awakening of our country to a realization of first, the necessity to send maximum aid to Great Britain, the last outpost of human freedom in the world; and then a resolution to intensify, to increase that aid day by day, month by month.

What few people in this country realized a year ago, two years ago, five years ago, when they expressed that realization, and consequently were denounced as war-mongers - what few people realized then, many people realize and know today. The smug isolationism of our country has disappeared. They know that we can't ostrich-like hide our heads in the sand until the war blows over, and stuff our ears with cotton so as not to hear the roar of guns. That is gone. All the

Nazi-inspired talk about power-politics is now at an end. This talk no longer receives the respectful hearing of the masses of our people. All the appearement preachings fall on deaf ears.

The President of the United States, last Sunday, in a great address, voiced not only was was in his heart and mind, but what was in the heart and mind of the majority of the American people. "Never before since Jamestown and Plymouth Rock has an American civilization been in such danger as now". "If Great Britain goes down...all of us in the Americas would be living at the point of a gun". The realization came to our people rather slowly during the last year. But it has come, and as the realization has grown with greater conviction upon our people, our help to Great Britain has increased.

During the year, we have been sending to Great Britain. We have sent fifty destroyers, eight hundred thousand rifles, and fighting planes. Every day we are increasing this aid in our determination as the President of the United States states, that the Axis shall not win this war. America is awakened and it has determined not only to aid Great Britain, but to arm itself. America is awakened to the need to build more ships, to conscript its manpower if necessary. America will not be terrorized. American will not consent to submit to live in an enslaved world, its independence dependent upon the will of two or three countries of the European world.

America is also awakened to the danger here at home of spies and saboteurs and fifth columnists. It has begun to make life quite dangerous and difficult for these agents of foreign aggressor nations. America has awakened to a rediscovery of its heritage, of its mission in the world, of its destiny.

Americans have begun to speak again as they have not in generations of the American way of life, its uniqueness, its grandeur. That is something new that has come into our lives and into the life of the world - and that, in my m judgment, is/most significant event of the last year.

And the Nazis understand that fact. They fully understand the implication of America's resolve to help Great Britain, to proclaim freedom throughout the world, to be again the spokesmen of human life. Understanding it all, they have been trying to terrorize America. They announced a three-fold alliance with Berlin, Tokic and Rome, just to serve notice to America that if America becomes involved with any one of the three countries, the other two will gang up against the United States. But as long as the British Navy controls the Atlantic, and the American Navy controls the Pacific, and the Armies of Italy keep on running, so long is this merely part of a war of nerves, and propaganda stuff, and nothing more.

The future, my good friends, is dark and uncertain. The war is far from being over. The powerful military machine is far from being destroyed. There will still be much blood, toil, tears and sweat. On the other hand, the winter of 1940-41 is not a good one either for Hitler, for Germany or for Italy. The peoples of Germany and Italy are not happy. Their food is scarce. Their wants are widespread. Their dangers have increased. The peace which was so confidently promised them for 1940 has not materialized. They have been given victories, of course. But a victorious people really should be in a position to celebrate its victories and not to have to hide itself from air-raids and in dark, dank shelters every night. They know that the war is still on. **Xmerica** England still tands. They know, of course, that America which helped to defeat Germany in the last war, is determined that Germany shall not win this war.

There is a growing unrest among the many conquered and subjugated peoples as their want and suffering increased. And in the Orient, China is still undefeated. And the British and French possessions in the Pacific have not been as easy plums to pick as one was led to think.

And Hitler is worried, seemingly worried - for he has begun to talk so much about God in his speeches. This man who said a few years ago that

"The religions are all alike, no matter what they call themselves. They have no future -- certainly none for the Germans. Fascism, if it likes, may come to terms with the Church. So shall I. Why not? That will not prevent me from tearing up Christianity root and branch, and annihilating it in Germany."

In the last few speeches which he has made, hardly a paragraph appeared in which he did not hobnob with God Almighty. Perhaps he suspects that the war is not yet won. Perhaps he suspects that he may never the win the war.

The year 1940, of course, has been a year of great human tragedy quite apart from politics. It has been a year of millions of refugees, not merely Jewish ones. Millions of refugees found themselves drifting over the face of with Europe, their homes gone, no food, no shelter, no medical care, many dying on the way, millions of war-driven, hate-driven, invasion-driven flotsam and jetsam of human wreckage. It has been a year in which civilians have been subjected to almost greater punishment than the soldiers. Men, women and children, young and old have had to bear this nerve shattering attack from the sky day after day, night after night, week after week and month after month. It has been a year of human tragedy incalculable.

For our people the year 1940 was the climax of seven years of horror.

The last few places of refuge of our people in Western Europe, the last few

Jewish communities - Holland, Belgium, France - were shattered. Nazi persecution,

Nazi discrimination, Nazi annihilation, policies cold, calculated, ruthless come

in the wak of Nazi invasion. France which was the first country in the world

to emancipate the Jew -- nearly one hundred and fifty years ago - great,

beautiful France, the very torch and light of human freedom in Europe - has

during this last year, under pressure of their conqueror, been compelled to

announce to the world anti-Jewish legislation, discriminatory measures against

the Jews of France who so valiantly served France throughout her history,

who laved France with every fibre of their beings.

What happened to the Jews of Poland this year we don't know. A dark curtain has been dropped over their heads. A horrible experience. But we do know that the million and a quarter Jews who are in Nazi-occupied Poland are being subjected to starvation, to epidemics, to slave labor gangs. All the Jews of Warsaw are pushed into a ghetto and an eight-foot wall built around them. Every one wears a badge to designate him as a Jew.

And as the Nazis have been moving into the Southeastern part of Europe in the last few months - into Roumania, Hungary -- the lot of the Jews in these countries has become increasingly more difficult, almost unbearable.

There has been only one brightspot in the Old World - as far as we Jews are concerned - there has been but one bright spot - and that has been the Jewish community of Palestine which is almost in the war zone and which is also menaced. It has also experienced bombing during the year. It is still strong, still free, still building. It is mobilized to defend every inch of the soil in Palestine with its blood if necessary. It seemed at first as if Palestine would become an early battlefield if the Italians moved across Northern Africa to the Suez Canal and if the Germans marched down through Palestine. What happened in Northern Afrida and Lybia postponed at least for the time being this pincer movement which might have brought them to the heart of Palestine. Palestine therefore experienced a great shock of nerves/the last few weeks. As long as the British Navy remains strong, the position of the Jews in Palestine is secure. The Jews are pouring into that country not only by land, but by sea, legally and illegally. There is a mad stampede of horror-driven sons and daughters of Israel pouring in trying to find some place of refuge. And there are no places for refugees except Palestine except for the few of them who can escape to the Western Hemisphere.

That is how the year 1941 dawns upon the world and upon Israel. There is fear in our mearts. But there is in all the hearts of freedom-loving men.
