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What is at Stake in the Nazi Invasion of Russia? Should America Help?

On Sunday Morning, October 19, 1941 No one watching the magnificent and heroic resistance which the Russian people have maintained against the onsweeping odds of the Nazis can help but be filled with admiration and praise. Courage and bravery are always admirable. But they become superbly moving and exalted when they are evidenced against overwhelming odds and against seemingly invincible foes.

Some people in their ignorance or prejudice have confounded the Ru sian people with their present government which many people dislike and distrust. They forget that the Russian people preceded their present government and will long outlive it. The Russians have always been brave and stouthearted people or they would not now be in possession of one-sixth of the globe.

Frequently in the past they have been misled. Frequently in the past wars they were betrayed by the incompetence and even the treachery of their leaders and generals. During the last war it was not an uncommon thing for Russian soldiers to be sent into the battle practically unarmed. But when these people were given competent leadership, anything approaching adequate weapons, they turned out to be brave, even superb soldiers.

Fortunately for them today and for the world — that is, our world the Russian people in this war seem to have had surprising competent leadership and, weapons, if not quite adequate to meet the most militarized and the most completely equipped army in the world, at least have weapons ample enough to make the enemy pay dearly for every foot of conquered territory in Russia.

The Russians, in four months of the bloodiest fighting in history, have given a most excellent and amazing accounting of themselves, far better than the French and the English did a year ago. The French were demomlized and driven into a headlong and fatal routing at the first break through, and the English fled to cover. The Russians, however, who military experts prophesied could not hold out four to six weeks against the German Blitz-Krieg, are still in the field, defending every inch of Russian soil, laying down their lives by the hundreds and thousands, not for Stalin, not for Communism, but for their country and making the enemy travel over his own corpses.

The Nazis, too, were surprised and amazed and then furious at this determined resistance of the Russians. The fact that the Russians were not collapsing according to plans and expectations could only be accounted for, said the Nazis, because the Russians were morally depraved, beasts. They don't seem to know the rules of war. They don't know when they are licked. When we Germans tell them they have been complete surrounded and annihilated, they rise up and hit us in the face. These beastly Russians did not surrender their cities as graciously as the French surrendered Paris for fear of ruining their beautiful buildings; and unlike Japan, these Russians do not speak of honor and then promptly capitulate and collaborate. They continue to fight, these damn bolsheviks, against all the rules of Fascist warfare. They are defeated. They retreat. They reorganize and they fight again. Four times, now, we, the Nation, have officially announced that the Russians are finally being completely broken down, liquidated, never to rise again. Yet, here they are very much alive, still fighting. These unmannered brutes seem to be making liars out of us. And behind the soldiers are the civilians carrying on their/warfare. They, too, haven't heard of the invincibility of the Nazis. Then, what can you expect from a people not made up of Nordics?

I presume that Hitler was as much embarrassed today in Russia as Napoleon was 130 years ago. Napoleon, too, invaded Russia. Napoleon got to Moscow faster than Hitler. Hitler is not there yet. Napoleon, in

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less than four months reached Moscow, and Napoleon's army was not traveling on motorized cars and busses. Napoleon, too, scored victory after victory on the Russians — at Smolensk, Borodino, Moshaisk. He, too, sent back from time to time glowing reports to Paris of his glorious, breath-taking victories over the Russians and how he annihilated them time and again. The Russians were defeated time and again. They kept on retreating in admirable order, then reformed and fought again.

Napoleon captured Moscow and finally reached his goal. He had triumphed. Everybody knew it but the Russians. The Russians burned the city and abandoned it before Napoleon entered it. Napoleon wanted the Russians to sue for peace. They would not. Napoleon finally swallowed his pride and sent embassies to the Russians proffering peace. They would not hear him. So Napoleon cooled his heels in Moscow week after week. Winter was coming on — the savage Russian winter. Napoleon's army had suffered greatly. It had dwindled. It was cold and there was fear of famine. So after five weeks of waiting around in Miscow, Napoleon ordered retreat, the most disastrous retreat in history.

When he entered Russia his grand army numbered close on to seven hundred thousand troups, twelve hundred field guns and one hundred thirty siege guns. His army was composed of twenty nationality groups -- his own and also from twenty nations which he had conquered, just as Hitler has in his army. He, too, sought to give the impression to the world that his attack upon Russia was a vast crusade against the Asiatics, the Slavs. Europe had never seen such an army, even as Europe had never seen the like of the army which Hitler put into Russia.

But after ten weeks of retreat from Moscow, after the continuous attack on the part of the Russian armies, and Cossack bands and guerilla

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fighters, after ten weeks of winter and hunger and disease, when Napoleon finally crossed the he had with him just four thousand men. They were sick, bedraggled and all of them hungry. That was all that was left of the pride and flower of the greatest army which France had ever had. In the dark of night, leaving the pitiful remnant of his army to perish in the snows of Russia, Napoleon slunk back to Paris.

Now, history, my friends, never repeats itself. Certainly not in detail and in incident. And because a thing happened once in a certain way, it does not follow that it will again happen that way. Warfare in 1941 is not similar to warfare in 1830. But there still remains an anazing parallel and some amazing possibilities. B t Hitler is still in Russia, if not yet even in Moscow. The Russians are still fighting vigorously and army resisting furiously his advance. Their/has not been shattered. Hitler has scored victories as great as Napoleon scored. But the war in Russia is not yet ended. The Russians have not yet sued for peace. They are still taking a frightful toll of German dead and German wounded. They are still smashing up a good deal of the material which the Nazis have accumulated so painstakingly over a period of years and which gave them the edge over all the other nations. And winter is coming on -savage Rusian winter. Burning cities and roofless houses are not adequate protection for soldiers in sub-zero weather.

If the Russian forces hold out over the winter, if their armies do not collapse, regardless of how far they have retreated, if the Russian government does not will under and lose courage and sue for peace, then this Russian campaign of 1941 will be likely to tear with the heart of the German people. For they have been at war now for three years. They have been promised a speedy peace, a glorious prosperity. They have been given nothing but glory. You can't make peace

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with hungry stomachs. They have been given nothing for all their sacrifices. they have been offered poor food, shoddy clothes, longer and harder hours of work and their cities are being continusously bombed. Day after day, night after night, now, the reports of terrific casualties are slipping into the homes of people of the hundreds of thousands of slain and wounded.

There is also slipping into Germany the frightening realization that the ultimate enemy of Germany, England, is increasing in strength day by day, the longer Hitler forces are delayed in Russia; that behind England, the cumulative military power of the United States which had pledged itself to aid all those who were fighting Nazism which is increasing steadily and relentless hour by hour, day by day, week by week. And the knowledge/also sweeping into Germany that the countries which Hitler conquered and the people subjugated far from being reconciled to the are becoming increasingly more restive, more rebellious and new order revolutionary in spirit. And as Hitler's armies are bogged down in Russia the voices of the resentful and the subjugated but not conquered national spirit in Europe will threaten more and more the power of the Nazis. And if on top of it all during this winter the English will improve the occasion by some major attack somewhere else not on the Continent of Europe, perhaps in Egypt -- all these facts are destined to impress the German people in the sense of the ultimate defeat which adaits the seemingly invincible and all conquerable Hitler.

Therefore, it is of utmost importance for England, for the United States to send all possible aid to Russia to sustain their to re-equip morale,/them, to help them to prepare for the Spring Campaign.

Hitler must destroy Russia in order to subjugate England. There is a strange parallel here again between Hitler and Napoleon.

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Napoleon, too, realized that in order to destroy England he must first destroy Russia. Napoleon resolved to conquer Europe as Hitler has, but just as Hitler he found the one foe that could not accept his resolve to conquer Europe was England. So he determined to destroy England. Like Hitler, he planned an invasion of England in 1803. He prepared in the ports and harbors of the coast of France ships, gunboats, small craft which would enable him to transport in a single night one hundred thousand troops to England. Like Hitler's plan of invasion for one reason or another it failed. His better judgment told him that was impossible. So he determined in order to subjugate England, to destroy English sea power, just as Hitler endeavored to destroy English sea power by attacks im from the air. In the Battle of Trafalgar, in 1905, the French were disastrously defeated and England was Mistress of the Seas just as England remains Mistress of the Seas today.

In desperation, Napoleon turned back to the Continent and determined to subjugate England and impose a continental blockade against England. No English ships were to enter any European harbor. No European ship was to travel to England. Thus England was to be starved. By bringing suffering on the English people, Napoleon hoped to make them realize that he was conqueror and make them come to terms with him. But in order to consolidate Europe against England, Napoleon need the collaboration of Russia. Alexander I who vascillated just as Stalin vascillated as between an alliance with Napoleon or with the English... By 1811 Alexander I realized that the real foe of Russia was not England but Napoleon and he refused to collaborate with Napoleon in his axis scheme against England, with the result that Napoleon understood himself defeated. Russia, however, was not defeated. Hence the campaign of 1812 with its terrific rebounds, unfortunately, for the world.

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Exactly the same situation has developed for Hitler. Because Napoleon failed to cross the Straits of Dover, he had to go to Moscow. Because Hitler failed to cross the Straits of Dover, he is on the way to Moscow. The one powerful nation which he tried to reduce to submission is England. Russia had refused to collaborate in his cheme. Hitler thought that Stalin would. For a time Stalin did. The Pact of 1939 was outrageous folly on the part of Stalin, for it opened the way for Hitler to conquer Europe. Regardless what the excuses of Stalin were, they were not sufficient to justify his strengthening the hand of Hitler. Stalin was too smart. He even out-smarted himself, even as Chamberlain and the Tories of France out-smarted themselves. They all share a common guilt before the bar of history.

But this is water under the bridge. Hitler is now out to destroy Russia as a prelude to destroying and then to ultimately dominate the world. Russia is now the battlefield of all anti-Nazi forces in the world who must fight Nazism. Informed people — well informed people understand that. What is happining in Russia today will have inevitable repercussions throughout the world. Japan is watching very closely what is happening at the gates of Moscow. The foreign policy of Japan is like a pendulum. Japanese cabinets rise and fall with seismographic sensitiveness to the fortunes of war in Russia. If Russia is defeated completely, finally, then the United States will be forced either to fight in the Facific or surrender to Japanese aggression in the Far East. For the Japanese are prepared to march as soon as they areconvinced that the Russians are finally dispersed, just as the Italians waited for their moment to stab France in the back.

The e is an electric chord which stretches from Max Moscow to

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to Tokio to Washington that can set off a frightful explosion. Therefore, what is happening on the steppes of Russia is of immediate and direct concern of America, not as a matter of sentiment, but as a matter of selfdefense.

The fact that we do not like Stalin, the fact that we do not like Communism has absolutely nothing to do with it. In the first World War we did not like Czar Nicholas and the infamous Rasputin. The Russian people disliked and distrusted despotism and fought valiantly for at least three years during the war. They helped the Allies to win the war ultimately. Without the aid of Russia the victory of the Marne would have been impossible. When the final battle had been fought and the Allies had won, <u>Was</u> Czar Nicholas disappeared. His government regime/completely gone. But the Russian people remained, a people of nearly two hundred million souls, a people that could produce a Pushkin, a Dostoyevsky, a Turgenev, a Tolstoy, a Chekhov, great artists, sculptors, a people whose intellectual and spiritual reserve has not even been tapped — that people remained. That people will remain after the war. Governments come and go.

Needless to say, the Communists of Russia have made grave and tragic mistakes. Their whole technique of dictatorship which they introduced in Europe was false and utterly bad — this sacrifice of method to ends. Their entire record, the sad record of expurgations, purges and the killing off of their own revolutionary leaders, is unspeakably cruel. Their net-work of spying and espionage, the terror cannot be justified by their avowed good intentions. Nor can Stalin's invasion of Finland, and his joining hands with Hitler in the partition of Poland and the rape of the Baltic countries be condoned in the name of progress or socialism; nor their attack on Religion - this too cannot be justified even by those who

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urge all out aid to Russia. Of course/is true that public worship is allowed in Russia. But there are no religious schools in Russia, no theologic schools. Thousands of churches, mosques were converted, and the State has been carrying on an aggressive anti-religious program to poison the minds of children. That, too, is a fundamental mistake. There is nothing in Socialism that runs contrary to religion...

But there are many great and noteworthy things that they have achieved, and only blind partisans would fail to recongize it. They have improved amazingly the educational system of Russia. They industrialized the country beyond the imaginings of the people. They have a planned economic life. They have taught races and nationalities to live together in peace. That remains to their eternal credit.

But we are not called upon at this moment to express our likes and or dislikes of Russia/of the Russian people. They are fighting Hitler. So are we. They are at war. We are pledged to provide the instruments of war to all who wage war upon this world desperado. There is much we don't like about England, too. There are many weaknesses and mistakes that have been made by England. But our destiny is linked up with that of England. England needs us and we need England. Russia needs us and we need Russia. A common need has made allies of us. All aid to an ally:

My dear friends, neither England nor the United States are yet ready to defeat Hitler. The best we can do is to delay him. The best we can do isto win time to arm fully for the ultimate reckoning which is bound to come next year, the year after or three years from now. Hitler's campaign in Russia is giving us this precious gift of time. The longer we delay, the stronger we shall become. That is the critical role, the critical role, perhaps the decisive role in this war that Russia will play — through the sacrifice of hundreds of thousands of precious men, Russia is bogging down that military machine with which we will have to reckon sooner or later.

Napoleon was not defeated at Waterloo, but at Moscow. We do not know where the ultimate battle will be fought in this war or under what circumstances, whether on land or sea or in the air. But it may not be at all impossible that Hitler, too, who set out to conquer Europe, was defeated at Moscow.



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
