Abstract of the address by Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver Sunday - February 7th - 1943

Why were the Darlan deals and the Vichy administrators in North Africa tolerated so long by our Government? Two explanations offer themselves - one of military expediency and the other of pr-Fascist leanings among certain elements in our own State Department.

Our Government, it is claimed, wants to win the war as "cheaply and as quickly as possible". It will, therefore, welcome anyone who wants to fight on our side. It will make deals with other Darlans, even with the Prussian Junkers - "if and when they are ready". After the victory is won, then we will worry about the Four Freedoms. This is a thoroughly fallacious and dangerous point of view. Behind it, is the fallacy that winning the war is an end in itself and that any means, even if they endanger the very objectives for which the war is being waged, are justified.

We may win the war with the aid of discouraged pro-Fascists in France, Germany, Italy and elsewhere, but we will end up by making the world safe for Fascism under another name. We shall leave those countries where we court or welcome Fascist renegades in the grip of these anti-democratic elements after the war, who will not be dislodged except through Civil war. We may actually find ourselves after the war backing up, of necessity, these very pro-Fascist elements with whom we are now collaborating, or hope to collaborate in the future, against the democractic elements of those countries. What then becomes of the Four Freedoms for which we are crusading? Or are we naively to assume that the deals which we are making will be good only up to the Armistice and that immediately thereafter, our Junker-monarchist - reactionary collaborationists will quietly step aside for a popular plebisite to determine the form of government which their country is to have?

You cannot fight Fascism with Fascists and hope to build a democratic world; and if we do not build a democratic world after this war and succeed only in exchanging Hitler's dictatorship for a Junker army dictatorship, then this war will have resulted in a greater criminal folly than the last one. You cannot sacrifice ultimate goals for temporary expedients. By attempting to make the war easy for outselves through deals with the sworn enemies of democracy in this or that part of the world, we are in danger of losing everything we are fighting for. It may be smart. But we shall be out-smarted in the end.

At Munich we thought that we could have an easy peace by dealing with the Fascists and sacrificing our friends and our principles. We got a quick war and a world disaster. We now hope to gain an easy victory by dealing with Fascists and by sacrificing our potential friends and our principles.

These deals with the known foes of human freedom, are sure to dishearten the oppressed peoples of Europe who find themselves today under the Fascist heel, and who are awaiting the day of liberation, not only from their Nazi conquerors, but also from their own native Fasist cliques of reactionaries and

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militarists who led their countries from one disaster to another. These oppressed peoples believe in the spiritual integrity of our cause. The unsavory Darlan-Peyrouton deals, are causing them to wonder whether an allied victory, when it comes, will make them merely pass from the frying pan into the fire. These deals, if repeated in other parts of the world, will put the cause of the United Nations on the same low moral plane as that of the Axis. Nothing could be more disastrous, for example, than to make peace with the Prussian Junkers, even after an unconditional surrender and total disarmament. To recognize an army dictatorship in Germany and turn that country over to the Prussian beaureaucracy, which for generations now, has brutalized the German people and indoctrinated it with all the vicious doctrines of racism and their destiny to rule the world and the glory of total war, is to betray whatever hope there may be for the future regeneration of the German people and for an enduring peace in Europe. These Junkers who used the Kaiser in the last war and Hitler in this war and who will discard Hitler as soon as they are convinced that their war is lost, and present themselves as the saviors of Germany, must be thoroughly broken, discredited and cast aside, if there is ever to be a new order in Europe. To deal with the reactionaries of Austria who destroyed that Republic and handed it over to Hitler, or with the political gangsters of Roumania, is simply to keep the witches! caldron boiling in Europe for generations to come. There

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are, undoubtedly, pro-Fascists in our State Department, friends of Petain, of Franco, and of all the political reactionaries of Europe. That same element assisted at the death of the Spanish Republic and jubilated over the Munich agreement. They, undoubtedly, had a powerful hand, not only in the original deal with Darlan, but in keeping North Africa for three months under the American flag, a place of concentration camps, of political persecution and of the infamous anti-Jewish laws which Vichy imposed at Hitler's order. Fortunately, the Casablanca meeting of Roosevelt and Churchill and the protests from all over the free world, are brining about a relaxation of pro-Fascist domination in North Afrida.

While making the world safe for democracy, we ought, perhaps, begin with out own State Department, where certain elements are at work, where sympathies are not at all in keeping with the ideals championed by Cordell Hull or President Roosevelt.

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
