An Important Meeting was held in our Church last Thursday evening. Every organization of the Church was represented by the president or authorized representative, and in some cases by other members as well. Plans for the fall and winter work by the various organizations were reported and revealed an unusual activity already begun. The necessity of making plans and choosing dates long in advance was plainly evident. This method will avoid a conflict of dates and an over-lapping of effort. It is urged that the Church Office be used by the Church Organizations to help in determining time and place for their special activities.

A Generous Proposition. At the Church Meeting last Thursday evening, when plans for the fall and winter were under discussion, the over-crowded condition of several departments of our Bible School was impressively brought home to the conscience and heart of the people. The need of adequate and properly equipped housing for our Bible School has long been evident to all. Our Auditorium, with its fine Hughes Organ and its new lighting system, gives us an attractive and comfortable place for public worship, but our Chapel is no longer equal to our needs, either present or future. This important matter received most careful consideration last Thursday evening, with the result that the Westminster Men's Club, through its President, Mr. J. B. Estabrook, announced that it would support in every possible way a project which would include a new building at the rear of the

auditorium that would provide adequate facilities for the needs of our Bible School and other organizations of our Church. This generous proposition was received with grateful appreciation of the meeting, which was indicated by a rising vote of all present. It was also voted to inform the Church Trustees of this action with request that they may see their way clear to take immediate steps to carry out the expressed wish of the meeting.
