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

Representation National By-Laws, Article VI.—Sec. 2. Each State Branch shall be entitled to be represented at the meetings of the National Congress by its President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, or their alternates, and are alternates from the backs of the and one delegate for every one thousand members in good standing as shown on the books of the National Treasurer.

Sec. 3. The meetings of the National Congress shall be open to all members of the Congress, but the privileges of making motions, debating and voting shall be limited to the members of the Board of Managers and to the accredited representatives from each State Branch. A voting member shall have but one vote although entitled to vote in either of several capacities.

Revisions of By-Laws The proposed revisions to the By-Laws have been approved by the Board of Managers and by the Committee on Revisions.

Credentials The Credentials Committee will be at the Hotel Cleveland on Saturday, April 28, 1928, at 9.30 A.M., and throughout the convention sessions, for the registration of delegates, alternates and visitors. All delegates, both voting and visiting, should register at the Registration Booth; voting delegates should then present their credentials at the Credentials Booth. Registration fee, \$1.00 admits voting and visiting delegates to all sessions and entertainments.

75 per cent of the 1,000 rooms range in price from \$3.00 to \$5.00 per day single, or \$5.00 to

\$7.00 double.

155 Rooms at \$3.00 per day—160 Rooms at \$3.50 per day—125 Rooms at \$4.00 per day— 160 Rooms at \$4.50 per day-150 Rooms at \$5.00 per day.

A uniform rate of \$2.00 per day will be charged for each extra bed that is placed in any room. Extra large rooms to accommodate four to six persons \$2.50 a day per person.

Because of the above arrangements, whereby good accommodations can be secured at Headquarters at a minimum rate of \$2.50 per day, no other Hotels have been listed.

For those delegates desiring accommodations in private homes, arrangements have been made to offer beds at \$1.00 per day. Application for this service should be made to Mrs. Benjamin Franklin, 4455 West 20th Street, Cleveland, Ohio.

Special Railroad Rates The various passenger associations have granted rates of one and one-half fares for the Cleveland convention for members of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers and dependent members of their families.

Tickets will be good only by way of the same route going and returning.

One-way tickets may be purchased to Cleveland, Ohio, April 26 to May 2 in the Central Passenger Association territory. Other passenger associations have taken similar action. When purchasing ticket for Cleveland be sure to ask for a reduced fare certificate. Upon arrival at Cleveland hand the certificate, immediately, to the transportation chairman who will have it validated. The validated certificate when presented at the Cleveland ticket office will entitle the holder to half fare for the return trip. Tickets will be good for return to reach the original starting point not later than midnight of May 9. Dates of sales in the western portion of the U. S. begin earlier and return limits are later on account of increased distance. Details may be had from your local ticket agent.

If the reduced fare certificates are not secured when ticket is purchased for Cleveland, no

reduced fare can be secured.
