



"A POET'S PRAYER"

We were at our Ohio Valley Poetry Society meeting the other evening. Edward Davison, a brilliant young English poet, was our guest. He had been talking lucidly about the younger English poets and their work. Then he read some of his own talented verse. He had finished his selections when a deeply spiritual and poetic member of the Society requested him to read one of the poems from his "Harvest of Youth" called "O Hand Unseen." At the close of the evening he whispered in conversation to the lady who had called for this poem, "I'm so grateful you asked me to read 'O Hand Unseen.' It's one of my favorites and it's rarely requested." We print it in our corner because it is a poem by a young man who revolts-revolts against the vulgarities that threaten to turn our youth from the Beauty that endures to the cheap, tarnishing side of life.

O HAND UNSEEN be gentle and kind to me, Touch me in desperate hour

When I forget thy guidance; though I be Impatient of thy power Yet doth my heart elect

To turn along the way thou dost direct

- To meet the ultimate end,
- Content on thee, thee only, to depend.

Put forth thy healing fingers, close mine eyes When on the hill of sleep

- I stumble entangled in my memories, And weep, or seem to weep, Because of those uptorn—
- O not alone the rose but even the thorn That has her beauty too,

Annual Congregational Dinner Memorably Commemorated

The 104th Anniversary Dinner and Meeting of our Congregation will go down in our Temple Chronicle as a great occasion. The spirit of democracy and genuine fellowship evidenced Wednesday night, January 18th, at the Alms Hotel was a striking testimony to the strength and stability of our historic Congregation. Under the aspect of eternity we are very young, hardly out of our swaddling clothes; but in the chapter of the Jew in America, we are a lusty veteran. The presence of so many young men and women was the eloquent assurance of the future influence and development of our Congregation.

By general consent, the evening was the most delightful the Congregation has had since the historic 100th anniversary when Israel Zangwill was the distinguished guest. Last Wednesday night we were honored by the presence of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, of Cleveland. Speaking with rare eloquence and charm on the theme "What is Happening to the American Home," Rabbi Silver held the undivided attention of his auditors and left them profoundly stirred and inspired by his striking utterances.

The program proceeded flawlessly. Dr. Philipson offered a moving invocation. Mr. Julius Schild, President of the Congregation, read his report, which, though comprehensive, was brief and lucid. The climax of the evening came when Mr. Schild recommended a fitting celebration to be held next November in honor of the fortieth anniversary of Dr. Philipson's spiritual leadership of K. K. Bene Israel. The warm and spontaneous applause that greeted this recommendation revealed the profound love and admiration in which our Congregation holds its senior Rabbi. After Mr. Harry H. Friedman, Secretary, and Mr. Ralph W. Mack, President of the Men's Club had made the parliamentary proposals to carry out the President's proposals, applause once more shook the rafters of the Alms Hotel.

Dr. Philipson, deeply touched, delivered a short address, imploring Divine guidance and blessing upon the officers and members of the Congregation.

To relieve what otherwise might have been too serious a program, Mrs. Julian Schwab and Mrs. Carl Keifer composed and presented an Allegorical Farce called "As We'd Like It." Its appeal was instant and elicited enthusiastic praise. The entire cast is to be congratulated. They were:

A CARD FROM DR. PHILIPSON

I cannot refrain from giving public expression in our Bulletin to the great joy that was given me last Wednesday evening on the occasion of the remarkable gathering and demonstration at our Congregational dinner. I have never seen a finer spirit of congregational devotion and fellowship displayed. I wish to express my own appreciation, which I know is that of every person present, of the fine service of Mr. Julius Schild, the President of the Congregation, Mr. Samuel Gutmann, the Chairman of the Committee on Arrangements and Mrs. Harry A. Bohm, the President of the Sisterhood and their aides. They toiled hard for the success of the dinner, but their toil was wonderfully rewarded.

OUR RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Following the service, read by Mr. Ephraim Rosenzweig, at the Assembly of the Religious School last Sunday, a short sketch was presented by the children of the fifth grade. This grade has been attending classes on Tuesday afternoons under the leadership of Miss Herbst. The work taken up has been for the most part birthdays of great Jewish men. In this connection the lives of Moses Montefiore, Moses Mendelssohn, Max Lilienthal and Isaac Lesser have been studied. The last great man brought to the children's notice was Josef Israels, who was born on January 27, 1824. The children became very much interested in this great artist and decided to write a short sketch woven about his life and present it to the school. This was given in the form of a short dramatization in which stereoptican slides of Israel's paintings were thrown upon the screen. The little actors who wrote and presented this playlet were Regine Altman, Frieda Goldstein, Idyllun Herzberg, Marion Weiland, Sigmund Valin and Mildred Ann Rosenberg. They are planning to submit their production to the Scroll.

Room 11, one group of the Confirmation Class, reported perfect attendance and group 1 of Room C had one child absent. Room A of the fifth grade, sent in the largest philanthropic collection. This was followed very closely by Rooms 5, 2 and 8.

Sunday, January 29, will be Birthday Blessing morning. It is hoped that all parents of the January birthday children will be present for this very impressive ceremony.

The High School Assembly last Sunday morning was very well attended. Mrs. Sol Meis gave a delightful program on the organ. Dr. Philipson led the service and spoke to the young people on the present unusual situation in England, where Jews who are members of Parliament have been criticised for voting on the question of the Revision of the bill of Common Prayer, the ritual of the established Church of England. He set forth the situation from various angles and explained why it was not only the privilege but also the duty of these Jewish members who are representing constituents to vote as such representatives but not as Jews.

Messrs. Peiser and Schifrin, teachers of the Junior and Senior Classes conducted these classes to the Jewish Hospital for a lesson in modern philanthropy.

CENTER ACTIVITIES

Last Sunday afternoon the Rockdale Center offered a delightful tea-dance which was well attended. All present enjoyed the afternoon.

Miss Leona Rosebaum, Chairman of the Membership Committee, held a meeting last Sunday. The Committee is anxious to add to the membership and will welcome any suggestions that are offered.

The Religious Committee is taking care of the ushering in the Temple on Sunday morning. Mr. Sylvan Rothschild, Chairman, Avon 1815, will be happy to hear from any young men belonging to the Center who would care to offer their services in this connection.
