

A Thought for the Future

Historical Sketch of Temple B'nai Abraham

Congregation B'nai Abraham, we cannot but think of the biblical utterance: "And though thy beginning was small, yet thy end should greatly increase" (Job. viii:7). Started by a handful of people three-quarters of a century ago, who were driven by an irresist ble impulse to establish a place where they could congregate to offer up supplications to the Almighty, Congregation B'nai Abraham has passed through all sorts of trials and experiences, and now stands as one of the most conspicuous houses of worship in America. It sounds like a romance, a figment of the imagination; but the Diamond Jubilee we are now celebrating is indisputable proof of the magic history of B'nai Abraham.

Strange as it may sound, the forerunner of B'nai Abraham was an organization known as B'nai Rachmonim (Sons of the Merciful), whose object was to provide cemetery ground for the burial of the dead. This fact is emblematic of the whole of Jewish history. It was the inspiration drawn from the memory of the dead that spurred the living on to perpetuate the noble traditions inherited from the glorious past. Thus this Burial Society gradually developed into a congregation to provide a house of worship for the living. The incipient congregation was under the guidance of Moritz Berla, who, for over twentyfive years, acted as its president. It was named B'nai Abraham, in honor of Abraham Newman, one of its founders. After many tribulations, a little carpenter shop was acquired on Washington Street, between Market and Bank Streets, where Bamberger's is now located. It was remodelled for the purposes of worship, and the congregation remained there for a number of vears.

During this period the small congregation made but very little history for the Newark Jewish Community. All we can say about it is that it existed and managed to carry on, sometimes under the most adverse conditions. It was only about thirty years ago when, under the leadership of William S. Rich

as president, Julius Stahl, Harry Bloom, Louis Benstar, Samuel Nadel and a few others, a regular synagogue was erected at the corner of High Street and Thirteenth Avenue, that B'nai Abraham began to emerge from its obscurity and to assume an active role in the life of our community. Of those mentioned, Harry Bloom, who was the vice-president and chairman of the Building Committee, passed away in the midst of his labors, and Julius Stahl entered his celestial home while serving as president of the congregation. The others are, thank God, still with us.

It was in 1902 that the writer was called to the pulpit of B'nai Abraham, and immediately set to work, with the assistance of the leaders of the congregation, to make Temple B'nai Abraham one of the most outstanding, one of the most progressive, one of the most forward-looking Jewish congregations in this country. In order to accomplish this result, it was necessary to make the synagogue function in a three-fold capacity, as visioned by the ancient Jewish sages: It must be a House of Prayer, a School, and a Social Center. This was the ideal to be striven for. This was the goal to be reached. As the years rolled by, and the congregation expanded beyond the capacity of the synagogue to house it, it became imperative to plan for a new and much larger edifice. And so the movement was started which culminated in the erection of our present magnificent synagogue and social center.

Such a colossal undertaking would have been impossible had it not been for the "youthful" enthusiasm of "Daddy" Rich and the indomitable will power of Philip J. Schotland. When the immensity of the project dawned upon the leaders and they began to show signs of hesitation and faltering, these two men would not be discouraged, and, thanks to their inexhaustible energy and optimism, Temple B'nai Abraham stands to-day as the pride of the Newark Jewish community. In this great work they had the whole-hearted co-operation of a brave and loyal band, among them our present genial president, Albert Hollander; our vice-president, Henry Gross; Louis V. Aronson, the chairman of the Building Committee; Michael Hollander, the chairman of the Finance Committee, through whose noble efforts the sinews of war were furnished; Leopold Rich, George

Furst, Alexander Harris, Louis E. Goldfarb and others, including the whole Board of Trustees. They were later joined by the indefatigable Michael A. Stavitsky, Gus Holder, Harry Petchesky, Morris Tzeses and others. Their combined efforts translated our dream into a reality.


This short sketch would be incomplete without mentioning the contribution our women have made to this happy consummation. The Temple B'nai Abraham Women's Auxiliary, formerly the Lady Judith Montefiore Society, has been in existence probably fifty years. It has always proven itself an invaluable aid to our congregation. Especially during the last few years, while planning and carrying out our stupendous enterprise, the women showed themselves worthy followers of the noble Jewish women of the past, who have always shed lustre and glory upon Jew and Judaism. Mrs. Fannie Nadel, of blessed memory, was for many years president of the organization. She was tireless in her efforts to promote its welfare and progress. She was succeeded by Mrs. Julius Silberfeld, who for thirteen years successfully led the auxiliary. And now the society is presided over by Mrs. I. K. Schwartz, who devotes herself to her task with zeal and enthusiasm.

This, in short, is the story of B'nai Abraham. Rich in accomplishments as the past seventy-five years have been, we look forward, with God's help, to still greater glories and triumphs in the future.




