A Remarkable Will

THE Houston Foundation for public welfare is the beneficiary of a remarkable will—that of the late Edward Pinkney Hill, jurist, capitalist and ranch owner, who died in San Antonio, Tex., during the summer of 1919. The provisions of this will, described in the November issue of The American City by H. Wirt Steele, director of the Department of Charity, Benevolence and Public Welfare of Houston, show that its author recognized a concept of social responsibility which might be that of some future utopia.

I give, bequeath and return to the people of Houston in their corporate capacity as the city of Houston, and the Houston Foundation as created and organized by and under the ordinance of said city passed March 22, 1915, and for the uses and purposes expressed and defined in said ordinance, all my property, real and personal, that I may own at my death.

I am influenced to this disposition of my estate by the reflection that I went to Houston early in 1886 with nothing. When I had made a few dollars above necessity I invested in city lots and continued like investments while I lived there up to 1897, before which time, after a division of my property, there remained to me enough to enable me to retire from business. This good fortune came unearned by me through increased value of real estate, and it seems appropriate that the city of Houston should have such share in that good fortune as I am in a situation to return.

Before his death Judge Hill had suggested to the mayor of Houston that there should be a department of the municipal government known as the department of public trusts which should receive and administer estates intended for public use. These conferences inspired the passage of an ordinance creating the Department of Charity, Benevolence and Public Welfare, and providing that:

This department should be under the control and management of a board of trustees to be known as the Board of Public Trusts of the City of Houston; to consist of seven members, each to be a resident of the city of Houston, of skill and discretion in handling financial and trust matters of good moral character, interested in welfare work and possessing a knowledge of the civic, educational, physical and moral needs of the inhabitants of the city of Houston. Any one holding or seeking political office is disqualified from serving on the board. Women are eligible for service on the board, but their membership shall not exceed three at any one time.

It was just after the passage of this ordinance that Judge Hill wrote his will conforming to its provisions.

In calling attention to legislation

fuse to apply these arguments to
children."

"He was right then," said Senator
Johnson. "He would not apply the
rule to children. I ask that it be
not applied to children today. I ask

women who require assistance of the
United States Government be ac-
corded that assistance."

Federal Grand Jury at Albany
Names Men as Bribe-Takers.

ALBANY, Feb. 12 (AP).—A Federal
grand jury indicted three prohibition
agents today on charges of accepting
bribes. The accused men are Philip
Remington Jr. of New York City,
Robert T. Simpson of Malone and D.
Stuart Brahe of Utica.

Simpson and Brahe are accused of
having accepted a \$200 bribe from
Thomas J. Loftus of Rensselaer, and
Remington is charged with accepting
money from Michael Bastian of
Albany.

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1. I am grateful for the opportunity afforded me this morning to speak as a religious ~~and~~ teacher on the subject of Social Service. Religion and social service are related to each other as the root is to the fruit. Religion is the dynamic impulse of Social Service: it is its driving motor. Religion is prophecy - the proclamation of the highest moral idealism of the race. Social Service is the priest-craft. No Social worker endeavours to give the vision of the religion a local habitation and a ~~new~~ name, to corporalize them as it were to ~~fix~~ them express them in concrete human wishfulness and human service. One is the moral adventure in the independent continents of the human spirit Path guide for mankind. This is the friendly guide assisting the handicapped of life, along the great highway of thought, the ways and perplexities of this world.

2. Religion ^{may have} has other functions to perform in social life, beside the ethical, but surely no religion, worthy of its inspiration, can remain uncognizant about social service. The compelling mandate of all religion has always been "to seek justice, rebuke the unfeared, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow."

3. I wish to speak this morning of one phase
of Social Service - its widening horizons. The scope
^{of organized philanthropy}
of Social service has been vastly extended in
recent years - transcending the earlier limitations,
both in purpose and technique.



To this the Jewish wife offers, the social worker. ^{occasionally} ~~occasionally~~
The S. worker is here concerned with the basic ^{third} unit
of society - the family. In restoring moral soundness
~~to the~~ and efficiency to a social organism - she is
performing one of the noblest and most vital services
to society.

And it cannot be spiritually the most satisfying
to a social worker. The world in which a S. worker
lives and works is after all a bad world,
full of sadness and misery, often here & there
and tragedy. It is a world of broken links,
wrenched personalities, maimed and scarred
by poverty and desolation. What keeps a S.
worker from spiritual desecration in such
a world - or what keeps her from a worse
fate - than becoming callous and hardened
~~to~~ in the face of human want - so that he
comes to perform his duties mechanically,
like an automaton, without lift of enthusiasm
or creative imagination.. The ^{privilege of} ~~men~~ ^{the} ~~deserving~~


