Announcements

Our Greatly Reduced Budget and the Consequent Rigid Policy of Economy Which Must be Pursued in All Departments make it necessary for the Board of Trustees to adhere for the present to all salary reductions determined upon as of April 1, 1933. The resignation of Mrs. W. O. Osborn, Dining Room Manager, has been received by the Administrative Committee and in view of the foregoing policy accepted with very great regret. Mrs. Osborn's tireless leadership in her department has been deeply appreciated by the Church and we regret more than we can say that there is no money available for the Dining Room Account beyond that already set up in the Budget. Mrs. Bertha Massey will continue to serve us in the general position which she has occupied in the Kitchen and Dining Room for the past thirteen years. For the time being Miss Helen Sutphen, chairman of the Luncheon Committee of the Women's Guild, will act in a volunteer advisory capacity to Mrs. Massey and whatever committee or committees may be appointed to carry on the Dining Room Program.

Put Red Circles Around the Wednesday Evenings of November! The Forum Season will begin on November 1, supper being served as heretofore at 6:15 o'clock. The speakers for the first three Church Nights are Linda A. Eastman, LL. D., Litt. D., Librarian of the Cleveland Public Library; Arthur M. Smith, Ph. D., of the Detroit News, who flew over the North Pole with Sir Hubert Wilkins; Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, D. D., Litt. D., of The Temple. Other speakers ahead definitely secured for the season are S. K. Ratcliffe of London, one of the best known lecturers in the English speaking world (Mr. Ratcliffe spoke at the Forum on March 8); Whiting Williams, who has just returned from Europe (no Forum season would be complete without Mr. Williams); Chester B. Emerson, D. D., Canon Residentiary of Trinity Cathedral; Louis J. Karnosh, M. D., Consulting Neuropsychiatrist of the City Hospital and Assistant Clinical Professor of Nervous Diseases in Western Reserve University; Ernest Hatch Wilkins, Ph. D., Litt. D., LL. D., President of Oberlin College.

The Adult Class will hold its first meeting next Sunday morning. Dr. J. Paul Visscher will be the leader this year. Many will remember his stimulating lectures last season. We are extremely fortunate to have him take this important responsibility.

The First Meeting of the Sunday Morning College Age Group will be held in the Church office on Sunday morning, October 1, at 10:00 o'clock. All young people of college age are invited to participate in the interesting discussions of current questions. L. G. Lawrence is the President.

A List of Covenant Students who are attending out-of-town preparatory schools and institutions of higher education in this city and elsewhere, is in preparation. Members of the congregation are requested to supply the Church Office with information which will be of assistance in compiling a correct student roll.

The Cleveland Volunteer Association and The Junior League of Cleveland announce a training course for volunteer social workers to be given this fall at Cleveland College. The course is open to every one who is interested in volunteer work. It will consist of a series of lectures on successive Monday and Wednesday mornings from September 25 to October 25 by Cleveland's leaders in civic, social and welfare work.
