ABSTRACT OF THE ADDRESS DELIVERED BY DR. ABBA HILLEL SILVER OF CLEVELAND
BEFORE THE NATIONAL RECREATION ASSOCIATION IN ATLANTIC CITY ON
TUESDAY, MAY 18, 1937

The chaos of our day is most in evidence in the violent wrenching of traditional human activities away from their normal purposes and processes and in harnessing them to others for which they were not intended. No institution is allowed to retain its essential character and autonomy.

Thus, for example, the sovereignty of the human intellect which we have been accustomed to regard as the supreme achievement of the modern world is rejected. Authoritarian states spurn it as a base and dangerous heresy. Dr. Rust, Minister of Education in Nazi Germany, announced to the academic world assembled at the Heidelberg anniversary celebrations "The whole idea of science based on the sovereign right of abstract intellectual activity has gone forever," and Dr. Krieck, Professor of Philosophy at Heidelberg proclaimed: "We do not know of or recognize truth for truth's sake or science for science's sake."

Education thus becomes propaganda, and the human quest for knowledge and truth is forcibly diverted from its historic channels into the muddy waters of political intrigue and expediency and the urgencies of a self-perpetuating bureaucracy.

Similarly, the functions of the State are being distorted. From being a service agency for maintaining law and order and for insuring the largest freedom to the individual compatible with group cohesion, it is being exalted into an End in itself, into a vicious mystical abstraction, behind which a bureaucracy ~~submits~~ maintains itself in supreme power, denying the individual any inalienable rights and any safeguards of personal liberties.

Even sport which the Western World had come to regard as something autonomous and independent, supremely far removed from politics and all other extraneous considerations,

is being prostituted in our day by a program-ridden State into a ~~sports~~ branch of military training. Athletics has become a form of the military drill for the youth of many countries of the world today. Children are taught to play in trenches, with hand grenades, with small-sized guns and bayonets. The splendid ~~discreet~~ disciplines of sport which recognize no national boundaries and which aim to teach youth "sportsmanship", fairness, consideration, self-restraint and good will, are being pushed aside and in their place are installed the disciplines of a ravenous and insolent nationalism - arrogance, belligerency, and "ideals" of a victory and success at all costs.

The Dark Ages settle upon a world when the legitimate aspirations of human life are not allowed their natural outlet, are diverted, are inhibited from following through to their natural goals and are not allowed to find their own harmonies and adjustments. When human ideals, embodied in institutions and activities, are forcibly driven into a vicious totalitarianism, at the head of which stands some omnipotent state or church or class, then these ideals turn to gall and wormwood and embitter and degrade human life.


