





NEW SESSION IN SIMLA

CENSURE REJECTED

MOSLEM SUPPORT FOR GOVERNMENT

FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT

SIMLA, AUG. 23

When the Simla Session of the Indian Legislative Assembly opened to-day a Congress Party motion for the adjournment to censure the Government for failure to take effective measures to protect Indian interests in Zanzibar was defeated by 66 votes to 52, the Moslems under Mr. Jinnah voting with the Government.

Congress spokesmen urged the placing of an embargo on the import of cloves into India, and claimed that the legislation sponsored for the clove industry by the Zanzibar Government was prompted by British interests. Government speakers, on the other hand, maintained that the Indian Government had secured safeguards for Indian interests in the new legislation.

The vote is significant as indicating a possible new alignment of parties in the Assembly as a result of the introduction of Provincial Autonomy.

SIMLA, Aug. 23.—The Viceroy will hold a Durbar at Lahore in the third week in October. The last Viceregal Durbar was held in April, 1926.—Reuter.

PEASANTS INVADE BIHAR ASSEMBLY

DEBT RELIEF PROMISED

FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT

CALCUTTA, AUG. 23

The introduction of the Budget in the Bihar Assembly to-day was preceded by tumultuous scenes. Some 10,000 peasants surrounded the building, invaded the galleries, and penetrated to the floor of the House, demanding that the Congress Ministry should carry out in full the Faizpur Congress resolution concerning peasants' rights. In particular they called for an immediate reduction of rents and a moratorium on debts. When quiet was obtained the Premier assured a deputation that the Ministry would introduce measures of immediate relief, whereupon the demonstrators dispersed.

The Budget, the main part of which, the Finance Minister said, he had taken over from his predecessor, is of a conservative character and shows a small surplus.

POSITION IN ASSAM

The Advocate-General of Bengal, Sir Asoka Roy, will address the Assam Assembly on Wednesday on the legal position created by its refusal to make entire provision for the Commissioners and their establishment. During the debate on the motion for this refusal on Tuesday, the Finance Minister pointed out that, if it were passed, 150 clerks might be thrown out of employment.

Last week the Assam Ministry suffered five defeats, and to-day it was again defeated on the Budget, when a motion to abolish the temporary Criminal Investigation Department was carried. The Premier, Sir Mohamed Saadulla, is understood to hold, however, that no question of confidence is involved, and that if the Opposition were to bring a motion of want of confidence it would be defeated.

BAN ON "RED SHIRT" LEADER REMOVED

FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT

DELHI, AUG. 23

The ban on Khan Bahadur Abdul Ghaffar Khan's entry into the Frontier Province has been removed by the Provincial Government. He has cancelled most of the programme of the tour in Sind that he had planned and expects to leave Karachi for the Frontier on Friday.

The Frontier Government have rescinded all orders of internment and restriction under the Public Tranquillity Act except those relating to interference in trans-border affairs. The ban on the Congress Party has also been lifted.

* Mr. Gandhi raised the question of the ban on Abdul Ghaffar Khan at his interview with the Viceroy on August 4, and the Viceroy promised to communicate his views to the Governor of the Frontier Province. Abdul Ghaffar Khan was leader of the "Red Shirt" Volunteer movement, which aimed at the eviction of the British from India and was declared an unlawful association in 1931.

BRITISH SOLDIER'S DEATH IN WAZIRISTAN

Reports from Waziristan state that Private R. Thomas, 1st Battalion, The South Wales Borderers, has died of wounds.

In the upper Shakti area enemy parties who fired on road protection troops have been dispersed. Tanks and armoured cars have carried out reconnaissance to Biche Kashkai without incident. Road work proceeds and new contracts have been placed with tribal contractors. Several notorious *badmashes*, however, are still abroad, seeking opportunities of mischief against troops and road workers.

MACEDONIAN LEADERS ARRESTED

VIENNA, AUG. 23

Dispatches from Sofia state that the police have arrested the leaders of the Macedonian Revolutionary Organization, which for many years after the War pursued in Bulgaria its struggle for Macedonian independence. As a first step towards improving relations with Yugoslavia (with its Macedonian minority) it was suppressed by the officers, under Colonels Gheorghieff and Veltcheff, who led the military coup in 1934 and forced King Boris to dissolve Parliament and the political parties, and to suspend the Constitution.

The arrested leaders are Jordan Chatrof, Cypriall Drangoff, Stratil Raswigoroff, the publisher of the Macedonian periodical printed in Geneva, Sileff, and the former representative of the Macedonians in Berlin, Moneff. The arrested men, who are likely to follow into internment in country districts other recently arrested politicians, have been vigorous critics of the foreign policy of the present Bulgarian Government, which consists of Ministers appointed by the King. It is said that they have been trying to revive the activities of their forbidden organization.

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FIGHTING IN THE NORTH

CHINESE HARD PRESSED

From Our Own Correspondent

TOKYO, AUG. 23

Certain liveliness in the North suggests the lull which has prevailed since Chinese 39th Army was driven from Peking-Tientsin area is nearing an end. The fighting that has been going on in the vicinity of Liangxiang, on the Hankow railway, for several days till now been directed to keeping Chinese forces from establishing bases in the hills near the town. Ones along the Suiyuan railway, west of Peking, are now on the point of success, and the menace from Chahar, to the Japanese right, has been disposed of. The Japanese in Hopei may be expected to move.

In Chahar the Japanese forces attacking are cooperating with the Chinese Army from the direction of the pincers are closing. Five divisions in the mountainous region between Kalgan and Nankou, on the Suiyuan railway, are now held by the Japanese in front and rear. Unable to use the railway, they can escape only over the roads. Their numbers are large, but Japanese are satisfied that their dispersal is now only a matter

of time. A strategic town 10 miles west of Kalgan, was occupied yesterday by those who had crossed the northern part of the Great Wall, and news that has fallen into their hands is extremely favourable. Extensive air bombings at Liangxiang and the Chinese fortified positions west of Nankou and half a dozen points in between have greatly hampered the manoeuvres by which the Japanese have broken up what might have been a serious menace to their flank and

RUINING HERSELF"

A Reuter message this morning suggested that the Shanghai fighting might be prolonged. Chinese were settling down for night attacks against selected targets.

SONS DROWNED AT ALEXANDRIA

THE FUTURE OF PALESTINE

REPORT TO LEAGUE

TWO WAYS TOWARDS PARTITION

From Our League Correspondent

GENEVA, AUG. 23

A summary of the Report of the Permanent Mandates Commission to the Council of the League of Nations on the Royal Commission's proposals for Palestine was issued by the Secretariat of the League to-day. In general, it is in accordance with the particulars given in *The Times* of August 19, and is favourable in principle to an examination of a solution involving partition.

The full Report has already been sent to the members of the Council. With the Minutes of the Commission it will be considered at the Council's September Session. Both will be made public on or about September 5. The Report includes:

- (a) The preliminary opinion of the Commission on the problem of the status of Palestine;
- (b) A general observation on the disturbances of 1936 and the policy adopted by the Mandatory Power in regard to them; and
- (c) A number of special observations relating to the administration of the territory.

In its conclusions on the disturbances of 1936 the Commission fully recognizes the difficulties of preventing them, but is not convinced that it would not have been possible to adopt more decisive measures earlier to put down the armed resistance.

THE PRESENT MANDATE

In its preliminary opinion on the status of Palestine the Commission first discusses the possibility of maintaining the existing Mandate.

After noting that the obligations of the Mandate have not appeared to be irreconcilable, it states that the inevitable antagonism between the aspirations of the two races was further exasperated by circumstances which could not have been foreseen 20 years ago. Increasing anti-Semitism on the one hand, and growing Arab national feeling on the other, combined to increase the difficulties of maintaining the balance in applying the Mandate.

At the same time a certain fluctuation of policy by the Mandatory Power tended to encourage the belief among the Arabs that violence could stop Jewish immigration. Moreover, the present Mandate became almost unworkable when it was publicly declared to be so by the Royal Commission and the Mandatory Government itself.

THE NEW SOLUTION

The Commission therefore considers that it is worth continuing the examination of the advantages and drawbacks of the new territorial solution.

The proposal to withdraw the Holy Places from the domination of Arabs and Jews and place them under a special régime is described as a step which could not but be of advantage to general peace, provided that the new régime was based on Article 28 of the present Mandate [safeguarding in perpetuity the rights of the various religions].

If the partition scheme should be applied the Commission thinks its success would depend more on its effect on the relations between Arabs and Jews than on the territorial solution adopted. Any delimitation of new frontiers, with whatever wisdom and justice, will come into conflict with the same contradictory aspirations and will involve individual sufferings. But it should be remembered that the collective sufferings of Arabs and Jews are not comparable, because vast spaces in the Near East are open to the former, whereas the world is increasingly being closed to settlement by the latter.

THE INTERIM PERIOD

While declaring itself favourable in principle to an examination of a solution involving the partition of Palestine, the Commission does not thereby endorse the idea of the immediate creation of two new independent States.

Such States, it says, could hardly meet at the outset the requirements for the termination of a Mandatory régime laid down by the Commission and approved by the Council in 1931, demanding settled government, the maintenance of territorial integrity, public peace, equal and regular justice to all, adequate financial resources, and so forth.

The Commission therefore considers that a prolongation of the period of political apprenticeship constituted by the Mandate would be absolutely essential both to the new Arab State and to the new Jewish State. This apprenticeship might be carried on in one of two forms:

- (1) A provisional "cantonalization" whereby the two States, while enjoying a wide measure of internal autonomy and full power to regulate immigration, might be ~~united under the Mandatory Power for~~ matters of defence, foreign affairs, Customs, and so forth; or
- (2) A separate Mandate for each until such time as each had given proof of its ability to govern itself (which would not necessarily be the same time for both States).

The Commission emphasizes the fact that in this preliminary report it can only set forth briefly the elements of the problem. It is necessary, therefore, in examining the report to refer to the Minutes of the Special Session.

ADMIRATION FOR BRITAIN

The Commission concludes:

As for the Mandatory Power itself, the concern with which it has for nearly 20 years sought to appease the antagonistic feelings prevailing in Palestine must awaken in any man of good will a degree of admiration all the higher in that it was exercised in a world in which brutal violence often stills the voice of humanity.

Let the Jews, who all too often, and without justification, show impatience at the delay and hesitation which the Mandatory Power has felt compelled to bring to the building up of their National Home, ask themselves whether there has been so little persecuted and to which for generations past they owe so many benefits. Let the Arabs, whose opposition to what is nevertheless a measure of higher justice which cannot be carried out without a sacrifice from their side can be readily understood, remember the origins of their national emancipation.

Without British efforts certainly there would have been no Jewish National Home. But also there would have been, on the threshold of the twentieth century, no independent Arab State.


