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TRIBUTE TO DR. HAROLD C. PHILLIPS By DR. ABBA HILLEL SILVER

I shall try to stick as close to the subject as my predecessors have....

I am happy to have been invited to speak my word of felicitation to your great church upon the completion within the walls of this beautiful edifice of ten years of distinguished service to this community. That your church is a beautiful church eyes can readily tell. I have often passed this building, coming and going, and have turned grateful eyes upon this structure, upon its dignified massiveness and grace of line. I have always left its neighborhood feeling I have been in touch both with strength and serenity. That the spirit enshrined within the walls of this beautiful structure is also beautiful and that the influence of its leader is also of the beauty of holiness, those of us who have lived and worked in this community can readily testify.

There is a saying by one of the ancient Rabbis of my people "that a city, the roofs of whose houses rise above the roof of its Synagogue is doomed to destruction". The e is a profound meaning in this saying of the sage. All that is happening in our world today attests this ancient wisdom.

I am grateful to have the opportunity to add a word of warm appreciation to the many which are being spoken here and elsewhere in tribute to my dear friend and colleague, Dr. Harold Phillips. He is one of the most beloved men in our community. My contacts with him have given me the key to the universal affection with which he is regarded. He is a man of absolute integrity, thoroughgoing sincerity and aristocratic simplicity which immediately evoke confidence and admiration, and then love. There is a generous outpouring of friendliness in the man, welling up from a deep respect for human life and human beings. He likes people and people like him.

He is a man who speaks the word of truth courageously and yet with love and compassion. He guides and leads. He does not incite or agit to. His intellectual approach is of the persuasive type. His appeal is both to reason and to the profound mystical reactions in the souls of men.

He is unafraid. I shall never forget the great sense of admiration and gratitude which I experienced when I read in the press the report of the address which Dr. Phillips delivered in Berlin, Germany, on the occasion of an International Conference of his Church. In that city, the very citadel of one of the fiercest and most ruthless despotisms known to man, he had the superb confidence and strength of conviction to speak up, there and then, for human freedom, for brotherhood and for the rights of minorities. Many voices have been silenced in the last few years because of caution, fear or inglorious worldly considerations. The voice of Harold Phillips has not been silenced:

Dr. Phillips now completes ten years of blessed ministry in our midst.

It is not easy, my friends, for a minister to take stock of his life's successes and achievements. The minister is unable properly to estimate the effectiveness of his work. A doctor, for example, can readily point to the number of cures which he has effected, the number of correct diagnoses which he has made or the medical discoveries which he contributed to mankind. The lawyer can point to the cases which he has successfully argued in court. The architect can point to the buildings which he has completed and which express the maning and the mission of his life. This is the case also with the engineer and with the members of other professions. Not so with the ministry. The minister deals not with tangible, material things, but with imponderables, with the things of the human heart and spirit, realities not visible to the maked eye, and sometimes not visible to the eyes of the person who is being ministered to.

The minister when he takes stock of his life's work must believe - and in that belief he must find his complete compensation - that somehow his heart-to-heart

and mind-to-mind service did shed some light in the darkness, did lift some burden, did bring some joy to some tired heart, did guide the wandering feet of some youth into the path of light and goodness.

This tribute-bearing throng of men and women assembled here tonight must tell in inmistakable terms that he would be fully justified in such a belief, that his work in this community has been fruitful and beneficent and that men and women, young and old, are deeply and happily grateful to him.

I feel myself privileged to be one of this great throng for I, too, am deeply and happily grateful.
