That our community has been immeasurably stimulated culturally by the establishment of the Cleveland Orchestra is apparent on all sides. I came to Cleveland a year or two before the Cleveland Orchestra was founded and even though a layman, I nevertheless sensed the musical poverty of our city at that time. A few brave souls were struggling hard in those days to give to our community the gift of an occasional concert by a visiting artist. Our city, one of the greatest in the United States, had fewer opportunities for the enjoyment and the teaching of music than a city one-tenth its size in the Old World.

Within the last twenty years, however, there has been a remarkable change. Cleveland is no longer behind in this essential effort/to the cultural life of a community. It is not only that this great orchestra, under an inspiring conductor, is giving our community frequent musical programs of consummate artistry, but it has greatly stimulated and assisted many other musical activities in our city. In one way or another, the Cleveland Orchestra and its patron, the Musical Arts Association, have assisted in the establishment of a department of instrumental music in the public schools of Cleveland as well as music courses at Cleveland College. They have assisted in the development of the Graduate School of Music at Western Reserve University, the Cleveland Institute of Music and the Cleveland Music School Settlement. The splendid artists who are members of the Cleveland Orchestra have given their services most generously to numerous civic organizations, music groups and choruses in our city.
