NOTED SPEAKERS ON "RELIGION - IN - LIFE - WEEK" PROGRAM

DR. JOHN ALEXANDER MACKAY, president of Princeton Theological Seminary; born at Inverness, Scotland; M.A., University of Aberdeen; B.D., Princeton Theological Seminary; also a former student at Universities of Madrid and Bonn; Presbyterian educational missionary at Lima, Peru, 1916-25, being awarded honorary D.Litt. by University of Peru for his work in that country; founded Anglo-Peruvian College and was professor of philosophy at National University of Peru; lecturer and writer for South American Federation of Y.M.C.A.'s, 1925-32; secretary Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions since 1932.

MARGUERITTE HARMAN BRO, with Council for Social Action since 1935; born in David City, Neb.; educated at Northland College, Ashland, Wis., Cotner College, Lincoln, Neb., and College of Missions, Indianapolis; missionary in China under the United Christian Missionary Society (Disciple) 1919-1925; attended University of Chicago, 1926-28; assistant to Dr. Ames, University Church of Disciples, Chicago, 1928-30.

DR. T. Z. KOO, leader in the new China; graduate of St. John's University, Shanghai; was for nine years an official in the Chinese Railway Service; then joined the national committee of the Y.M.C.A. in China with special responsibilities for colleges and universities; in 1925 a member of the second opium conference called by the League of Nations; more recently associate general secretary of the China national Y.M.C.A. committee and a leader in World's Student Christian Federation.

ROSE TERLIN, on staff of World's Student Christian Federation with headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland; educated at University of California and Union Theological Seminary; Y.W.C.A. secretarial work in Minneapolis and at San Jose State College; economics secretary, National Intercollegiate Christian Council, 1934-37; attended World's Student Christian Federation Conference on Social and Economic Problems, Swanwick, England, 1935, Pacific Area Conference at Mills College, California, 1936, and Oxford Conference on the Life and Work of the Churches, 1937.

DR. HENRY PITNEY VAN DUSEN, religious educator; dean of students at Union Theological Seminary, New York, since 1926; born in Philadelphia; A.B., Princeton University; B.D., Union Theological Seminary; Ph.D., Edinburgh University, Scotland; associate executive secretary, student division of the Y.M.C.A., 1927-28; ordained Presbyterian minister; trustee of Princeton University and Little School; fellow, National Council on Religion in Higher Education; national student committee and national board, Y.M.C.A.

DR. DOUGLAS HORTON, pastor, United Church of Hyde Park, Chicago; born in Brooklyn, N. Y.; A.B., Princeton University; B.D., Hartford Theological Seminary; D.D., Lawrence College and Chicago Theological Sem-

inary; further studies at New College, Edinburgh, Scotland, Mansfield College, Oxford University, and University of Tübingen, Germany; has held pastorates at Middletown, Conn., and at Brookline, Mass., before coming to Chicago in 1931; Navy chaplain during World War; on faculties of Newton Theological Seminary and Chicago Theological Seminary; member of prudential committee, American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions (Congregational).

DR. KIRTLEY F. MATHER, professor of geology, Harvard University; born in Chicago; B.S. and Sc.D., Denison University; Ph.D., University of Chicago; has served on faculties of Queen's University, Canada, Denison, and Harvard; geologist, U. S. Geological Survey since 1919; chairman editorial board, Scientific Book Club; president Adult Education Council of Greater Boston since 1934; contributing editor, World Unity Magazine.

DR. JESSE M. BADER, director of the National Preaching Mission and executive secretary, Department of Evangelism, Federal Council of Churches of Christ; born in Bader, Ill.; A.B. and D.D., Drake University; also a student at University of Kansas; has held pastorates at Atchison, Kan., and in Kansas City; Y.M.C.A. worker overseas during World War; national secretary of evangelism, Disciples of Christ, 1920-32; first president, World Convention of Disciples of Christ, 1930, and general secretary since that year; attended Oxford and Edinburgh conferences.

DR. J. MAXWELL ADAMS, director of university work for Presbyterian Board of Christian Education, supervising services of 69 university pastors at 52 state schools; born in Greensburg, Ind.; attended Wabash College, McCormick Theological Seminary—now Presbyterian Theological Seminary of Chicago, and University of Edinburgh; was faculty member of Women's Christian College and Meiji Gakuin, in Tokio, Japan; university pastor at University of Oregon, later pastor of Northminster Presbyterian Church, near Ohio State University campus; member of joint committee for the United Christian Youth Movement; served as campus secretary for University Christian Mission Committee.

DR. ABBA HILLEL SILVER, leader of one of the largest U. S. liberal Jewish Congregations, Cleveland; born in Lithuania; A.B., University of Cincinnati; D.D., Hebrew Union College; Litt.D., Western Reserve University; has served as university preacher at Harvard, Cornell, Chicago, Purdue, Syracuse; member of President Hoover's Unemployment Relief Commission; one of framers of Ohio Unemployment Insurance Bill; member National Child Labor Commission and Commission on Militarism in Education; vice president of Zionist Organization of America and member of Council of Jewish Agency for Palestine; frequent visitor to Europe for observation and study.
