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

Seniors Sponsor Graduation Play

The sixty-eighth annual commencement activities will open with the Chi Delta Phi's commencement ball, June 2, in the college gymnasium at nine o'clock.

The Baccalaureate services will be held Sunday afternoon, June 4, at 2:30 in Academy Hall. Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland, one of the best known speakers in America, will deliver the sermon. The Reverend M. J. Coghlan, pastor of St. Francis Xavier's church at Moundsville, and the Reverend Charles G. Stater, D. D., Wheeling District superintendent of the Methodist church, will serve as guest chaplains for the occasion.

Following the service, Dr. and Mrs. Paul N. Elbin will be hosts at the faculty tea in Shaw Hall, at which the seniors and their friends will be honored.

The commencement address will be given by Dr. Halford E. Luccock, a distinguished Yale university professor, June 7, in Academy Hall at 10:30. The State Board of Education will be represented by Mrs. Mary Bachtler Boyd. Degrees will be conferred on fifty-six seniors, the largest graduating class in the history of the school, by Dr. Paul N. Elbin, president.

At 12:30, following the commencement exercises, the graduating class and members of the alumni will join in the annual alumni luncheon in Shaw Hall.

President and Mrs. Elbin will entertain the members of the Senior class at a reception June 6 at 9:00 o'clock in their home.

College Sponsors Summer Broadcasts

It's hail and farewell to the 1939 graduating class!

Four years of college life have slipped away quickly and quietly, and perhaps no senior will leave West Liberty without a feeling of regret. West Liberty has been a second home to the majority of these graduates, and what is more, they have obtained something that neither wealth nor poverty can destroy—an education.

The future is, for the most part, uncertain. Out of the college melting pot will come multitudes of hopeful young men and women eager to display their talents, to show their skills, and to exercise their abilities. But to many of these seniors, the future undoubtedly holds discouragement and disillusionment, for jobs are scarce and positions are hard to find. Yet despite the uncertainty of it all, these graduates, standing upon the threshold of life, can well afford to rejoice in the advantages and opportunities that college has presented.

The graduate will find his education a wealth far superior to any material gains that he might have acquired had he not entered college. Theoretically, he will be enabled to cope intelligently with the problems that life in this complex society presents. His education will have developed a keen appreciation for the finer things of life—music, art, and literature. And last is service. The graduate of '39 will be able to work better, to render a larger service to humanity, to the world, and to the community in which he lives.

And although, as the cynic points out, an education does not pay in dollars and cents, it certainly does in understanding and appreciation. Even though the graduate of 1939 does not get a five-thousand-a-year job in 1940, he will be able to work better, think better, and live more fully in his obscure position that pays perhaps only one thousand.

Soon indeed the 1939 graduating class of West Liberty will be one with all those that have preceded it—a memory. But West Liberty will be the better college because they were here, and they will be the better citizens because of West Liberty. Only a few perhaps will succeed as the world measures success; others must out of necessity fail; a college cannot transform a personality nor reform an individual any more than one can make bricks without straw, but certainly it can refine, cultivate, and nourish. That, in the final analysis, is the business of the college.

And to the graduate of 1939, we in behalf of the Administration, faculty, and students extend congratulations and say, "Good-bye and Good Luck!"

Her contributions for the anthology are "*The Old House*," and "*What Success Is*" which was carried in the March *Trumpet*.




