ABBA HILLEL SILVER OF THE TEMPLE, EAST 105TH STREET AND ANSEL ROAD AT HOTEL CLEVELAND BEFORE THE HADASSAH ON WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 16, 1940.

Palestine is today in the active war zone. The foes of mankind who are attacking the last great citadel of human freedom in Europe - Great Britain - are also attacking Palestine. The Land of Israel is today an important section of the front line of defense against the menacing barbarism of our day. We are proud of the way the Jews of Palestine are carrying on in the face of danger. Their courage is high. They are mobilized as one man for the defense of the land which they had built with such love, enthusiasm and sacrifice. They are wrestling bravely with the many serious economic problems which war conditions have forced upon them. Even under the fires of war, new settlements are being established and new land is being acquired for the refugees who are arriving into the country -refugees who keep on coming in spite of the great hazards and difficulties of travel in a war-ridden Europe. The Jewsof Palestine are sharing their homes and their meager resources with these new arrivals. The community is dauntless and undeterred. War has not quenched the great passion for building the Jewish Homeland, that extraordinary and consecrated passion which in twenty short years has raised the Jewish population from 75,000 to 500,000, and, upon land redeemed from disease, poverty and general backwardness has established more than 225 colonies, built villages, towns and cities, erected schools, colleges, a university and a national library, founded hospitals and a great medical center, revived a language and a national culture and made of Palestine the most modern and progressive country of the entire Near East.

The pincer movement of the Axis powers to capture Egypt and the Suez Canal may develop. This would mean that Palestine would be invaded and held <u>the war</u> until the end of the war. If the Allied powers wip, the invaders would, of course, be ejected and the Jewish community of Palestine would undoubtedly then have greater opportunities for development. And even if the Axis powers win the war, it is unlikely that Italy will proceed to disrupt the economic life of Palestine which depends almost entirely upon the Jewish community. She will not wish to make of Palestine an imperial liability like Ethiopia. Undoubtedly the Jewish community would be subjected to severe restrictions. But it will carry on as in the long past waiting for another political orientation to resume the historic and inevitable task of rebuilding a national home, for a people who is so desperately in need of a national home as the events of recent years have demonstrated.

The morale of Palestine Jewry is high. It is thinking today not in terms of retreat or subjection, but in terms of resistance and the re-enforcement of its position in that country. Thousands have volunteered for the defense forces of Palestine and many thousands more will await the opportunity to form a Jewish legion.

GERMANS ARE WARNED TO BEWARE OF POLES

Leaflet Distributed in Berlin Says They Are 'Despicable'

BERLIN, Sept. 17 (P)-Thousands of leaflets extolling the German "master race" and describing Poles second-rate beings were distributed to Berlin householders today by the Society for 'Germandom Abroad. Poles were called unfit for intermarriage or even comradeship with Germans.

The conquered Poles were described as especially despicable, the leaflets said, "because the atrocities in Poland compelled the Fuehrer to protect our Germans there with our armed forces." The leaflets then cite a series of alleged Polish atrocities, and exclaims:

"Fellow German! The Pole is never your comrade! He stands beneath every German on your farm or in your factory. Be just, as becomes a German, but never forget that you belong to the master race.

"If anybody comes and tells you his Pole is decent, then counter with: 'Today apparently everybody knows one decent Pole, just as at another time he knew one decent Jew.'

"The obsequiousness shown by the Pole toward the German farmer is perfidy. His friendly demeanor is a lie. The greatest care is essential to prevent Poles from grouping togethter and possibly engaging in espionage."

Farmers and factory owners were warned not to permit Polish laborers to write long letters home lest they contain untrue statements about Germany. The Poles, moreover, are to receive no cash.



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English Jewry has long been highly regarded for the programmatic way in which it has distributed its public funds for Jewish purposes. A few months ago, Simon Marks, an officer of and one of the leading contributors to the British Central Council for Refugees, reviewed what has been accomplished by English Jewry with funds raised to aid German Jews. He stated that 80,000 Jews from Germany and Austria had gone to Palestine and that the Council had assisted 20,000 of these to emigrate there, having allocated £900,000 for this purpose. He went on as follows:

"Whilst less than one refugee in a thousand of population has found sanctuary in most countries, the proportion in Jewish Palestine is one in five. This would have been impossible had not the foundations been laid over many years by the devotion and sacrifice of Zionists throughout the world, who did not wait for a Hitler to pose the Jewish problem of homelessness.

"Fifty years of experience with the land and its climate have enabled the small Jewish community of nearly 500,000 to absorb these 80,000. With larger funds Palestine could absorb, it has been estimated, some 50,000 a year.

"The basis is already there. To the experience already gained, there is now added the experience in numerous branches of economic activity of many newly-arrived men and women, of scientists, chemists, doctors, technicians, skilled craftsmen and operatives who formerly held key positions in the science and industry of Central Europe.

"With the assistance of such forces and adequate financial help from outside, Palestine should again expand on an even surer foundation."

Judgment of Independent Expert

Dr. W. C. Lowdermilk, Assistant Chief of the Soil Conservation Ser-

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vice of the United States Department of Agriculture, made a thorough survey of the colonization program in Palestine. His report indicated that what was being accomplished by the Jews in Palestine carried interest even for the United States and the world as a whole. He said, in part:

"The colonization of the wasted land of Palestine is one of the most significant phenomena of our day in the relation of a human population to its land.

"A little more than fifty years ago, Jewish colonies undertook a formidable task to redeem this old land, and have carried out to date one of the most remarkable works of the restoration and reclamation of wasted lands that I have seen in three continents.

"This remarkable restoration and reclamation work has been guided and sustained by a well-thought-out experimental and research program. In the earlier stages, practical farming schools were established to train the young colonists who were to take up the burden of redeeming the land. As time went on, the need for more thorough study was realized and Rehoboth Agricultural Experiment Station was established and equipped and today stands as one of the best agricultural experiment stations that I visited in fourteen countries of Europe and the Near East.

"These agricultural colonies, covering about 5 percent of the total area of Palestine, serve as excellent demonstration projects to indicate how and to what extent the Promised Land may be restored to a condition of greater productivity and support for a larger population.

"These colonies are demonstrating that land has other values than its commercial products. They are demonstrating that land in the final analysis is an integral part of the corporate existence of a nation, even as its

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people are. If the Jews are permitted to carry out this magnificent restoration and redemption work of the wasted lands of Palestine, they will have set a Messianic example of the possibilities of the restoration of the wasted lands of North Africa and the Near East."

A ROSH HASHONAH MESSAGE from TAMAR DE SOLA POOL President of Hadassah

IT IS TERRIFYING to contemplate Europe on this first anniversary of what is called the second world war. Of the nations of Europe that were free and sovereign, only Switzerland and Sweden have remained unattacked. The highways and by-ways of Europe are crowded with suffering refugees who know not whither to turn. Utter despair and homelessness which the world thought to be reserved only for the Wandering Jew, have become a universal experience.

CAN WE, in the midst of it all, pause to apprehend the deep moral implications and see with unblurred vision the spiritual order in the chaos around us? The opening of the Jewish New Year which calls upon us to pause and look within ourselves as well as upward to the Source of all being, can give us the vision to see and the heart to understand. It is the messoge of Judaism to every Jew and it is the message of Jewish history to all the world that only through strengthening the spirit can true victory come.

SIX THOUSAND MILES from our home shores the Yishuv of Palestine stands firm and fcarless. The year of war has seen that Yishuv grow in maturity, in determination, in strength. It has proved to us that the Jew and the Arab, if left undisturbed by political machination, can be neighbors, collaborators and friends. There is no panic; there is no fear; there is no defeatism for that Yishuv and therefore there will be no defeat. All they ask from us is to uphold their hands, to strengthen their resistance against any assault that may come. Who of us can refuse that help? Who in Hadassah can fail them?

I bid you now, at the beginning of our Hadassah season and in anticipation of our holiest days, LESHANAH TOVA. These words have profound meaning for us today. They should bring us strength to do our tasks, courage to face difficulties, and vision to see beyond the obstacles which hinder only those who look back, and not up and beyond the immediate horizon.






