Our boys are away from home - many of them are in far away lands, in distant continents, and on lonely islands of the seven seas. They are there because they loved their homes so much and us whom they left behind that they are willing to fight and die to defend them. Our government will give them the weapons to insure victory. Can we give them the care, the recreation, the solicitude, the companionship to maintain their spirit and morale during the long days of hard training and harder fighting? We can give all those things to them through the United Service Organizations for which Cleveland is raising money this week in the War Chest Drive.

At Stalingrad men who are our allies are dying today by the tens of thousands in one of the most heroic battles in history. An epic of human grandeur, which exalts all of us and renews our faith in humanity has been written by these Russians in the last fourteen months of their amazing resistance to the Nazi hordes. Their land has been ravaged and scorched. Their civilian population have suffered terribly. Are you willing to pay tribute to those gallant allies by helping their wives and children, their sick and wounded? You can do so through the War Chest of which Russian War Relief is a beneficiary.

Also in China, have men for five years opposed sometimes with nothing more than their bare breasts and clenched fists the furious might of Japan. They are still fighting. Their great and victorious offensive is still to come. Their people, too, <sup>from</sup> have suffered unspeakably bombing and invasion, from hunger and disease. We have not been able as yet to give them much military assistance. We can relieve their suffering somewhat and ease their tragic burdens through the United China Relief.

And there are others who have a just claim on our generosity and on the obligations of comrades in arms. Those who have read the Black Book of Poland know the stark, ghastly horror which the Nazis have spread over that land, and the hell through which its people are passing. Poland needs our help.

And the Greeks who thrilled us so much with their valor and ~~magnificent~~ courage, a year ago, and moved us so deeply now that they are defeated, with appalling hunger

and destitution of its men, women and children. Greece needs us.

And the Dutch, who always gave and never asked for help in the past, but who now require it because their land and their empire have been invaded -- and many of their sons and daughters are in dire want -- the Dutch need help from us.

And the British, who in their own bombed and ravaged cities, are caring for refugees of other lands, carrying a double load in their hour of great trial -- they, too, need the help of a loyal ally.

And our own Cleveland needy -- for whom we have always cared, proud and privileged to care, our aged, our orphans, our sick, our children, our youth -- surely we will not fail them, nor the numerous agencies and institutions which we built through the years and which have made Cleveland -- a good city to live in.

## **A SURVEY OF PRE-INDUCTION SCIENCE TRAINING**






