

#### REPORT OF A WALKING CHAPLAIN



Rev. Raymond C. Burns was our first associate minister from 1929-1935. He then accepted a call to Hudson, Ohio where he became pastor of the Congregational Church and teacher at Western Reserve Academy. He entered the army as chaplain and saw service in Kanai and New Guinea.

Captain Burns returned to America in 1944 where he was hospitalized at the Harmon General Hospital, Texas. Since August he has been on inactive duty from the army but is very active at his church.

**October 31** is associate professor of history at Western Reserve University. He holds degrees from Indiana State and Harvard Universities. He is a popular authority on national and international politics.

In 1929 he studied the Alsace-Lorraine problem and has written an article for the Encyclopedia Britannica on it. In 1937 he attended the League of Nations and traveled extensively in Europe. He is the author of a book and of many articles and reviews.

Mr. Besse is a graduate of Heidelberg College and the University of Michigan Law School. Since 1929 he has been associated with the law firm of Squire, Sanders and Dempsey in which he is now a partner. He lives in Shaker Hgts.

His hobby is collecting and reading books on Ameri-

can history. He is an active member of the Speakers Bureau of the Council on World Affairs.

Miss Harriet Barrington who is to be our speaker on November 7 is a member of our Church, one of our ministry on the South India mission field. She was born in St. Marys, Ohio, graduated from Denison University and trained at Lakeside Hospital.

She went to India in 1921 returning to America in 1928 and was associated with the Jane Addams School. She was supervisor and instructor in Nursing at Western Reserve University for three years before returning to the Clough Memorial Hospital at Ongole, South India in 1937. She returned on the Gripsholm in August.

# CAN PROTESTANT CULTURE SURVIVE?



Dr. Fey is associate editor of The Christian Century, an independent religious magazine of national circulation. His recent series of articles entitled "Can Catholicism Win America?" has attracted considerable attention and comment.

Dr. Fey has traveled extensively. In 1940 he cov-

ered 32000 miles by airplane and interviewed leading personalities in the governments of Japan, China and India. In India he interviewed Mahatma Ghandi and Jawaharlal Nehru. He has lived in Manilla, Philippine Islands and has visited the battle areas of Luzon as well as many in Europe and Asia.

Dr. Arthur C. Wickenden who speaks on November 14 was a college-mate of Dr. Phillips at Denison University. He holds degrees of B.D. and Ph.D. from Chicago University. During World War I he was a member of a machine gun battalion. Dr. Wickenden held several pastorates in Iowa. Since 1927 he has been a Professor of Religion and Director of Religious Activities at Miami University. His book, "Youth Looks At Religion," is a recommended text-book in standard leadership training courses.


