Dr. Abba Hillel Silver has, for more than three decades, been the spiritual leader of The Temple in Cleveland, the largest liberal Jewish congregation in the United States.


Actively identified with many social movements of our day, he was one of the first advocates in this country, of unemployment insurance. He served as Chairman of the American Section of the Jewish Agency for Israel, Chairman of the American Zionist Emergency Council, and as President of the Zionist Organization of America. Dr. Silver is regarded as the foremost spokesman of Zionism in America. He represented the movement before the Assembly of the United Nations, and is one of the leaders who are responsible for the establishment of the State of Israel.

Author of several volumes on history and religion, notably his work on "Religion in A Changing World," and "The World Crisis and Jewish Survival," his latest book, "Vision and Victory," is a collection of his major addresses during the crucial years prior to the establishment of the State of Israel.

John Gunther, in his book, "Inside U.S.A.," speaks of Dr. Silver as "the first citizen of Cleveland." Dr. Silver, a graduate of the Hebrew Union College, was ordained in 1915, and was President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.

A Chain is No Stronger than its Weakest Link
