

Following his ordination at the Hebrew Union College, Rabbi Sandmel served as Director of the Hillel Foundation at Yale Uni-



versity and as Professor at Vanderbilt University. He holds a Ph.D. degree from Yale University. He was a Chaplain in the Navy and Marine Corps during World War II. In 1951, he was elected a Fellow of the National Council on Religion in Higher Education in recognition of his contributions to religious education on the graduate level.

Rabbi Sandmel was awarded the President's Fellowship by Brown University and prepared a book on the New Testament which was recently published under the title, A Jewish Understanding of the New Testament. This outstanding work received highest commendations from Christian and Jewish scholars.

"THE DAWN OF A NEW WORLD: THE ROMANCE OF AMERICAN JEWRY IN COLONIAL DAYS"

by DR. JACOB R. MARCUS

Dr. Marcus occupies the Adolph S. Ochs Chair of History at the Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, Ohio and is the Director of the American Jewish Archives and of the American Jewish Periodical Center in Cincinnati. He is a Past President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis. Dr. Marcus is Vice-President of the Jewish Publication Society, and is President of the American Jewish Historical Society. In 1955, he received the Frank L. Weil Award from the National Jewish Welfare Board for his distinguished contributions to American Jewish culture.

He is the author of a series of books important to Jewish life and letters, among which might be included: Israel Jacobson; A Brief Introduction to the Bibliography of Modern Jewish History; Jewish Festschriften; The Rise and Destiny of the German Jew. He has also written The Jew in the Medical World, first source book in English on Medieval Jewish history. Communal Sick Care in the German Ghetto, an absorbing story of the origins of Jewish community sick care and hospitals in medieval Jewry, and Early American Jewry, an informal study in two volumes, of the life and background of the Jews in the colonial and early American period. His latest work is Memoirs of American Jews, 1775-1865, in 3 volumes. Always an extremely popular speaker in Baltimore, Dr. Marcus will introduce us to some of the fascinating personalities of early American Jewry with whom he became acquainted in the course of his researches.

"THE MEANING OF THE DEAD SEA SCROLLS FOR RELIGION TODAY"

by DR. A. POWELL DAVIES

The Rev. Dr. Davies is the distinguished minister of All Saints' Unitarian Church, of Washington, D. C. Born and educated in England, he came to this country in 1928, and has become noted for his energetic liberalism, both as a preacher and as a writer. He is the author of a number of books, including: American Destiny; The Faith of an Unrepentant Liberal; America's Real Religion; Man's Vast Future; The Temptation to be God; The Urge to Persecute; The Language of the Heart; and most recently, the best-selling The Meaning of the Dead Sea Scrolls. The subject which Dr. Davies will discuss for our Institute is one which has excited great interest over the past several years, both among Bible scholars and historians and among the general public.

3. "THE DEAD SEA SCROLLS"

by DR. SAMUEL IWRY

This course will present the background of the Scrolls, and will include actual reading of some of the published scrolls.

- 1. The Dead Past Comes To Life—Historical and literary background for the understanding of these documents.
- 2. A Modern Treasure-Trove—The physical environment of the excavations; the finding of the scrolls; description of their contents.
- 3. The Holy Brotherhood-An ancient monastic order and its rules.
- 4. "Sing Praises Unto God"—The hymns and psalms of Qumran as compared with the psalms of the Bible.
- 5. "In The End Of Days"—Anticipating the Day of Judgment; Messianic allusions.

(The student will be asked to purchase Dr. Gaster's Dead Sea Scriptures)

4. "THE PRAYERBOOK AND ITS MEANING

by RABBI MORRIS LIEBERMAN

While our people has been called "The People of the Book," a more accurate description would be "The People of the Books," adding the Prayerbook to the Bible as the basic volumes of Jewish religious experience and inspiration. Like the Bible, however, the Prayerbook requires explanation for its fullest understanding. This course will be a continuation of that begun last year, and will deal with the history of the Prayerbook, the significance of the prayers, the relationship between the Reform and previous prayerbooks, and the relevance of our liturgy for life today.

5. "THE JEW LOOKS AT THE NEW TESTAMENT"

by RABBI ABRAHAM D. SHAW

This course will attempt to acquaint the student with the history, philosophy and theology of the New Testament. We will discuss the various books, personalities and events, all of which have had, in large or small measure, an important bearing on our own Jewish religious development. The student will be asked to use two texts:

- 1) The New Testament
- 2) A Jewish Understanding of the New Testament By Rabbi Samuel Sandmel

6. "THE APOCRYPHA" by RABBI ABRAHAM SHUSTERMAN

In this course the canon of the Bible will be considered along with the reasons for the exclusion of the Apocryphal books from the Holy Scriptures. The contents and significance of some of the more familiar Apocryphal works will be studied, with special attention being given to the light they throw on our understanding of Judaism and Christianity and to the connection between the Apocryphal writings and the Dead Sea Scrolls.

7. "GREAT MOVEMENTS IN JUDAISM" by RABBI RICHARD STERNBERGER

Judaism as we know it today is a product of hundreds of years of development and change in its beliefs concerning God, man, revelation, etc. In this process many movements of thought have played their role. Some have caused a great revolution in its thinking; others, while causing repercussions, have remained on the peripheracology hat has been termed "normative Judaism." It will be the aim of this course to examine some of these movements, ascertaining what each has had to contribute to a living and dynamic concept of Tudaism. Those movements to be considered will be: the Prophets, the Pharisees, the Messianic movement, the Karaites, the Hassidic movement, and the Reform movement.
