

The success of Col. Glenn's flight from Cape Canaveral is a proper reward for the three years of hard work-and the two months of delay-which went into it. . . . For the exploits of the last few months have plainly shown that there is no gross difference between the United States and the Soviet Union in their capacity to carry out exploits beyond the atmosphere. The Russians have the better rockets, but the Americans are more skilled at fitting them out with instruments and gadgets of all kinds. There appears to be nothing inherent in the competition between these two giants which decrees that one or other of them-in the end-will come out on top. The winner, most probably, will be the one who spends the most.

It is right to suppose that if Gagarin had failed, none of us would have known about it. On the contrary, if Glenn's flight had ended in a tragedy, we can say that we would have seen it with our own eyes.

Thus all those postponements, those vain

to cut off Barcelona from Valencia, now in the throes of a political crisis which reaches its climax with Moscow's recall of Ambassador Marcel Rosenberg. In two days Franco's troops drive a 25-mile wedge to cut off Catalonia.

- THE TEN-DAY STRIKE of the Cité Universitaire students in Paris against the university restaurant's food and prices ends. Both the International House and its restaurant will reopen for business.
- CONGRESSIONAL ACTION on President Roosevelt's proposals for reform of the Supreme Court will start as a result of lengthy conferences which the President has held with representatives of the Senate groups respectively for and against the measure. It is understood the Senate Judiciary Committee will take up the bill with the idea of setting the date for a public hearing.

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
