






INTRODUCTION

A CHRISTIAN DESCRIBES HILLEL WORK

Personally, I am a Christian, and even preach occassionally in Methodist churches. Although several of my dearest friends are Jewish, and though I have been very closely associated with them for three years, it was not until last fall that I got an insight into their religious life, and that helped me to understand them all the better. There is something in us that unconsciously seeks after the spiritual, and no matter to what religious belief we are inclined, there is something to be gained from them all, if we are only willing to look for it.

Two years ago there was no organization on the campus of the University of Michigan to unite the activities of the Jewish students. There was no resident Rabbi to whom they could go for aid and inspiration. There was no Hillel Foundation to which they could go seeking and finding the companionship of other Jews. They were a group of 800 students, unorganized, with no bond between them except that of religion, with no place to go for meetings and for fun.

But they saw the advantages of organization as shown by other groups, and with the aid of B'nai B'rith, their Foundation was established. There are only 300 foreign students on our campus, most of them are Christians, and as such participate in all the activities of the Churches. But even these few were organized into Japanese, Chinese, Hindustan and Phillipine Clubs, with the Cosmopolitan club for all. If these small groups felt the need of union, how much more necessary it is that the Jewish students should have their activities and interests organized.

Have you seen the Hillel Foundation here? It is one of the homiest places I have ever been in, and there is no doubt about the students appreciating it. The rooms are packed for the open-houses, everyone thoroughly enjoys the bridge games, the dances, teas, and the mixes. You just can't help having a good time. Then there is the other aspect, that of the study classes conducted under Rabbi Fink's supervision. I believe I have been the only outsider there this year, but they haven't let me feel like one. If it can afford me so much pleasure, it surely gives the Jewish students infinitely more.
