

Will you come to Akron and preach at one of our Friday evening services some time within the next three months?


All expenses, of course, will be paid. I wish I could offer more than this. I might be in a position to do so before the time arrives. Only at present I can not be sure.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

The Young Mens' and Womens' Hebrew Association is very grateful to you for consenting to speak at our first annual banquet on January 8th. We are going ahead with our plans to spend an evening with you that will be both enjoyable and profitable. We are giving publicity to this occasion and we know our organization and city will be represented there and that your message will bear fruit.

This group of young Jewish people, numbering now over three hundred, has past thru its first year in real organization work. We had until a year ago no way of getting together communally, except just before the war in 1916 when the Council of Jewish Juniors was formed. That body necessarily became inactive, but the demand for a Young Mens' and Womens' Hebrew Organization caused us to unite again in 1921.

We have had difficulties. For ten months we met every other week at different quarters. Due to our inability to finance a home or to rent a suitable dwelling, we had no community house. The Orthodox synagogues offered their "schulles" but these were inadequate. Our Temple authorities could not afford to let us have their social hall for a rental that we could afford to pay. Now we have rented large rooms downtown. In spite of all obstacles we have grown in numbers, the spirit of enthusiasm for a real "Y" is better than ever, our aims and ideals are much broader than they were a year ago and we feel able to go on expanding and doing good.

We have now our own Literary and Dramatic branches, classes in Hebrew and studies in Semitic literature and languages, gymnasium for girls and a nucleus for a mens' basketball and baseball team. Our meetings, altho supported by paid up members are open to all and are planned to be of academic value as well as socially successful. We have good speakers, music, readings and dances. Our dance floor is very attractive and since a few weeks ago our own orchestra has sprung up.

When the business men of the city become interested in us, when those broad-minded and generous hearted men of Akron who support other Jewish activities worth while recognize

PARIS, May 1—About thirty thousand German-Jewish refugees are reported in various European countries by the delegates at an extraordinary conference of the Hicem which opened here today. Delegates from England, France, Belgium, Spain, Ireland, Poland, Switzerland, and other European nations are present to consider means of aiding these refugees to permanent settlement. Their numbers are steadily increasing, the delegates affirm.

Hicem, which is an amalgamation of three immigrant aid societies: Hias, Emigdorff, and Ica, is endeavoring to settle as many of the refugees as possible in the countries to which they have fled, and to facilitate the emigration of others to America, Canada, South America, Palestine, and other foreign lands. In spite of unprecedented difficulties due to world economic conditions, the conference reports that it is hopeful of good results.
